To deal with the memorable event more in detail it may be said that about 9 o'clock, on the evening of December 28th, 1858, Halifax was startled from its propriety by the cry of "fire." The energy with which the alarm was caught up foretold something unusually dangerous. The scene of the confiagration was a portion of the Bigby buildings, corner of Duke and Hollis streets, in the occupation of Jonas Hagar as a hat and cap manufactory, A thick, black column of smoke proceeding from the shop door of Mr. Hagar was the first intimation that anything unusual was about happening. Immediately atterwards a bright red flame shot into the air, and a scene of demolition commenced.

The combustibles with which the building was stored added energy to the flames in their rapid progress. ten minutes all thought of saving the whole range was at an end, and attention was diverted to preventing the fire extending to the adjoining buildings. The brick gables of McLeod & Co.'s and Coombs shoe store showed most fully the necessity of having similar ends inserted in all future buildings. They alone checked the progress of the devouring element, otherwise the consequences would have proved disastrous to an alarming extent. As to the Park, the destruction there, will be complete, if the proposed Terminal scheme is carried out; for, if not immediately, yet in a very few years, level yard room must be had, and that taken out of the Park, destroying the only park of note, as well as the only outlook and view of the mouth of the harbor (which no other city would park with for millions of money); again, the cars crossing the entrances to the Park, this resort will, not only be unsafe to walk or drive over, "even dangerous," but more especially so for children and girls to frequent, not alone on account of the locanoucives passing but the greater evil easily understood, viz.: from the class of people who usually frequent such a locality as this will become, the only recreation ground within the city.
