

ONCE THE NUNNERY NOW THE STAGE

Girls Disappointed in Love Become Theatrical Slaves

Once They Marry, How, in Germany They are Discharged by Manager. BERLIN, March 4.—For three hours after midnight yesterday morning a crowded audience in Philharmonie Hall listened with mingled horror and compassion, to accounts of the slavery to which, it was alleged, thousands of young German women in the theatrical profession were condemned by their employers. The occasion was a meeting of the Parliament actresses to discuss grievances and demand relief. One of the causes of complaint was the compulsory provision of costumes, the cost of which was far beyond the incomes of the actresses. The speakers said it was not uncommon for actresses earning from 50 to 240 marks monthly to possess ten costumes. Many worked all night making their own clothes, being obliged to become seamstresses in order to remain actresses. Rosa Lorenz, a well known actress, said that the overworking of the profession was the main cause of the miserable salaries. A girl disappointed in love formerly entered a nunnery, but nowadays she went on the stage. Many girls, too, offered to act gratuitously.

Another speaker raised a storm of indignation by describing the system under which actresses were discharged if they marry. Herr Rickell, an actor at the Lessing Theatre, displayed contracts under which actresses and singers received from 25 to 35 marks monthly. "Was it true," he asked, "that many managers perjured actresses with their attentions?" There was a unanimous shout of "Yes" from the actresses. Stage Manager Wagner, in closing the debate, said that the artistic life was necessarily martyrdom. If the word "artist" disappeared from the stage vocabulary, art would cease to exist. One only became a great artist through suffering.

A resolution was enthusiastically adopted demanding laws to compel managers to supply costumes and to allow actresses to marry.

FRIDERICTON, March 4.—Mr. Fleming delivered his budget address in the house this afternoon after routine business had been disposed of. HARBOR MEN TO ACT WITH CITY RULERS

Big Meeting Condemns Harbor Bridge Plan

High Bridge Will Fall—Hillyard's Reef Said to be Better Site Than Those Suggested.

A committee composed of men interested in the navigation of the upper harbor and the falls is to be appointed to co-operate with the committee of the Common Council appointed to look into the feasibility of a harbor bridge. This was the result of a conference between the civic committee and tugmen, fishermen and others interested in harbor navigation held last night. The conference was largely attended. The general expression of opinion was that a harbor bridge would be a great obstruction to navigation unless sufficient distance between the bridge and high water was given to allow for the free passage of the largest tugs. The location proposed by F. W. Holt, C. A. Moore, and others was held to be impossible and the Hillyard's Reef site advocated if a bridge were built. Many of those present, however, showed that they were strongly opposed to a bridge of any kind.

The chairman, Aid. Scully, threw the meeting open to discussion saying that questions could be asked Mr. Holt, who was present.

A. W. Adams said that he and others were decidedly opposed to a bridge at the level proposed at any location.

Mr. Holt replied that he knew the level proposed and by having soundings taken knew the various depths.

The government had received a petition signed by seven hundred out of the eight hundred and fifty residents of the parish of St. John, Gloucester Co., asking that no liquor licenses be granted in that parish this year and the next. Mr. Holt said that he had no pleasure in proclamation in answer to that petition which prohibited the granting of liquor licenses. FRANCIS BECK WITH DEAD AT WALTHAM

BOSTON, Mar. 4.—Francis R. Beckwith, who carried a medal of honor awarded him by Queen Victoria for bravery in placing a flag on Fort Carver in India, died at his home in Waltham, yesterday, aged seventy-six years. He was born in Fredericton, N.B., and served in the British merchant and naval service for many years. He saw service in India and was a veteran of the Persian war. During the civil war he was on British vessels running the blockade of Southern ports. He leaves a sister in Andover, N.H., three sons, and a daughter. Alleging ill treatment, Gertrude O'Connor to-day petitioned the Superior Court for divorce from Frank O'Connor of Shives, Athol, N.B., and the custody of the eleven years old son also asked.

HORSE BITTEN BY A DOG GOES MAD

TORONTO, March 4.—A great fight took place at Goldstream with a mad horse owned by Donald Campbell. The animal was bitten by the dog some time ago and died to-day in agony. Campbell, with seven neighbours, tried to control the horse, and were scratched and bruised and covered with foam from his mouth. Several times they narrowly escaped death from one of his wild rushes. They will leave at once for the Pasteur Institute, New York.

NOVA SCOTIA'S AWFUL PLIGHT

Gun Discharges, Shot Enters Horse

Team of Logs Overturned—Man Pinned Beneath and Dragg'd.

ANNAPOLIS ROYAL, N. S., March 4.—A thrilling accident and one that may result in the death of Edward Shaw, occurred at Hillsboro this afternoon, news of which has just been received by The Sun correspondent over the telephone.

Shaw had been teaming in the woods and left for home with a heavy load of logs drawn by two horses. On the sled was a loaded shot gun. In some unknown manner this was discharged and the shot, miraculously missing Shaw, who was driving, found a target in the flanks of the horses. The animals started forward, half turned over the sled and Shaw was entombed under the heavy logs. Then, madly driven on a mad career over the frozen ground, dragging the upturned sled and Shaw with them, over rough ground and smooth the animal sped until they reached a small lake near Hillsboro. The ice here was thin, and while nearing the shore the horses fell through. Shaw, suffering terrible agony, was pinned under the logs, which prevented the horses from aiming, and it was not until late this afternoon that he was rescued by some men returning home from the woods. Doctors have been summoned, and at the time of writing hopes are entertained for Shaw's recovery, although he is frightfully injured. Both legs are crushed, and it is feared several ribs are broken in addition to other injuries. Shaw is married and has several children.

UNITED STATES

MAY INTERVENE

BLUEFIELDS, Mar. 4.—After three days of secret conferences, every reason to believe that General Estrada, the leader of the revolutionists, and his advisers reluctantly have acquiesced in the demand of Americans resident in Nicaragua that a receipt be issued to any proposed American intervention which will guarantee to them the rights of the denial of which caused the revolution. The original demands of the revolutionists included the overthrow of President Zelaya which was accomplished and the restoration to the people of common rights of citizens which it was alleged had been taken by them under the regime of Zelaya.

RAPID GROWTH OF ST. JOHN'S SHIPPING

An Interesting Review of the Past Few Years

An Increase of Twenty Millions in Exports Since 1898—The Remarkable Expansion of Traffic.

The growth of shipping at the port of St. John makes an interesting study for the citizen who is in search of an argument to show that this city is going ahead. In the winter of 1897-98 there were four trans-Atlantic steamship lines running from this port and only a few years before that time there were no lines from here. Steamers in 1897-98 carried freight to and from Liverpool, London, Glasgow, and Belfast and Dublin. In 1898-99 the Manchester service was started, and a year later the Atlantic service was inaugurated. The C. P. R. added the London and Antwerp and the Bristol services in 1902-04 and in 1906-07 the Allan's inaugurated the London and Havre line, which is likely to show a marked increase in the business between this country and France in the future, in consequence of the new French treaty.

With the registered tonnage of the steamers coming here in 1897-98 was 102,316, as compared with 474,620, the figures for last season, and the value of the cargoes has advanced from \$4,848,768 to \$24,564,540 in that time. Thus there was an increase of nearly twenty millions of dollars in twelve years.

In addition to the trans-Atlantic business, the South African service has been successfully carried on since 1893. Last year the exports to South Africa amounted to \$1,155,794, as compared with \$665,538 in 1902-03. There has also been the regular service to the West Indies, and during the past few years a very profitable trade has been developed with Cuba. The coastwise service has been greatly improved in the last few years as well by small steamers, and regular steamer trips from this port to the south shore of Nova Scotia have had the effect of increasing trade to points in that district.

Next season it is altogether probable that a line of steamers will be running from this port to Australia, carrying away Canadian products and bringing back large cargoes of mutton for which the port is well known. Negotiations are also under way for inaugurating a steamship service between Canada and Austria with Montreal as the summer port, and St. John as the winter terminal. It is probable, too, that the new steamship line to Italy will next winter make St. John its Canadian port.

With the present season's business showing a big increase over last year, there is every reason to feel satisfied with the rate at which St. John is going ahead in this regard.

ABSOLUTE DIVORCE FOR WM. J. LEMMON

Wife's Maine Divorce Not Recognized and Subsequent Marriage Furnished Grounds—Wright vs. Wright Postponed.

His Honor Mr. Justice McKeown opened the divorce court at noon today in Chambers here.

On application of the plaintiff in the case of Wright vs. Wright the case goes over until next Saturday at eleven o'clock. Mr. John A. Sinclair appears for the plaintiff and Mr. J. J. Porter for the respondent.

His honor delivered judgment in the case of Lemmon vs. Lemmon, granting the plaintiff an absolute divorce. The plaintiff, William James Lemmon of this city, and the respondent, Lillian Madeline, his wife, were married here on April 16th, 1885, by the Rev. Henry Penna, pastor of the Portland Methodist Church. They lived together until August, 1905. Three children were born. On account of frequent quarrels the couple parted, and Mrs. Lemmon went to Maine, where she obtained a divorce from her husband. She then returned to this province and went through a form of marriage with one Wilson, and both reside on City Road. One child was born to them.

The divorce obtained by the woman in Maine is not recognized by the state of this province, as the court of Maine had not jurisdiction over Lemmon, he being domiciled in New Brunswick. Accordingly, Mr. Lemmon sued his wife for a divorce, a vinculo matrimonii, and the case was tried before his honor at Fredericton on February 22nd last. The wife's adultery was proven by a person who attended her at the birth of her last child and his honor therefore granted the divorce.

Mr. I. P. D. Tilley appeared for the respondent. The respondent did not appear.
