THREATENED ON MARKET

POLITICS AFFECTING

New York, Aug. 18.—For the first time this week today's stock market evinced a reactionary tendency, with a generally lower level of prices. In no instance were the declines serious, nor was there any evidence of en-fored liquidation, but rather of realiz-ing for profits with some attendant bear selling. The day's budget of news was not especially illuminating, although the general belief is that the political clouds are looming large over the financial horizon and the events of the next few weeks are bound to leave their impression on the securi-tics markets. Wall street at the mo-ment is devoting especial attention to the conflict within the ranks of the republican party. — Following London's lead, where, de-spite the good showing of the Bank of England prices for Americans were generally lower, the local market open-ed with recessions of a point or more in many of the active issues and soon went lower on unfounded rumors deal-ing with the alleged serious illness of the best known members of the stand-ard oil party. 


