U. S. CRUISER MAINE.

Last Wednesday, the United States
cruiser Maine, while lying at anchor in
Havana harbor was blown up, with large
loss of life. Secretary Long of the Navy
received the following detailed despatch
from Captain Sizer, the commander of
the destroyed Maine:

"Advise sending wrecking vessel at
once. Maine submerged except debris;
mostly work for divers now. Jenkins
and Merritt still missing. Little hope
of their safety. Those known to be
saved are officers, 24, unharmed; crew,
18. Wounded now on board Ward line
steamer and in the city hospital and at
hotel, 59, so far as is known. All others
went down on board or near the Maine.
Total lost or missing, 235. With general
exceptions no officer or man was more
than a part of a suit of clothing, and
that is wet with harbor water. The
damage was in the compartment of the
crew. Am preparing to telegraph list of
wounded and saved. Will send all
wounded men to the hospital at Havana.

FARMERS AND DAIRYMEN.

FREDERICTON. — The Farmers' and
Dairymen's Association met in annual
session on Tuesday afternoon last week.
The president, C. E. Raymond, presided,
and on the platform were Lieut. Governor
McClellan, Premier Esderson, Hon.
Mr. Lablouis, Attorney General White,
Dr. A. A. Stockton and others. The
hall where the meeting was held was
densely packed. The president referred
to the more recent of the association during
the year and the inauguration of the Farmers'
Institute work which had been so success-
fully carried on by the joint action of
the Department of Agriculture and the
association. The interest through the
province in the pork packing industry
and the great developments in butter and
cheese were also touched upon.

Gov. McClellan spoke of the pleasure
of meeting so many farmers, and referred
to the improved facilities for the exportation
of agricultural produce through the
port of St. John.

Hon. Mr. Lablouis spoke of the determi-
nation of the government to assist the
association, and was supported in his re-
marks by Premier Esderson and Dr.
Stockton. Addresses were also delivered
by Attorney General White and Mr. W.
Saxby Blair; and Mr. Fawcett read a
paper on taxation which was thoroughly
discussed by the association, but no action
taken.

The reports of the county vice-presi-
dents and of the treasurer and correspond-
ing secretary filled in this morning's
session. The vice presidents' reports
showed an average crop in all the coun-
ties of the province.

The report of the treasurer, George
Fisher, showed receipts of \$429,70, of
which \$180 were membership fees and
\$249,70 proceeds of provincial govern-
ment grant, and disbursements of \$427-
91, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,79.

The report of the corresponding secre-
tary, W. W. Hubbard, contained a care-
ful review of the work of the year, in
which material advances were noted in
several lines. The Dominion minister
of agriculture, Hon. Mr. Fisher, was
thanked for sending Dr. Fletcher and
Messrs. Saxby Blair and A. G. Gilbert
to the province to lecture on different
branches of agriculture, and the profitable
character of the work of these gentlemen
was referred to in highly appreciative
terms, as was also the work of Dairy
Superintendents Mitchell and Tilley in
improving and making uniform our
cheese exports. The dairy school at
Sussex was credited by Mr. Hubbard
with having a marked influence on the
cheese and butter factories of the
province. The appointment of a com-
missioner of agriculture for the provin-

cial government was commended as a
step in advance, and flattering mention
was made of the zeal of Hon. Mr.
Lablouis in behalf of the association and
agriculture generally. The St. John
Exhibition Association also came in for
a good deal of praise for the magnificent
display made at the last fall's show.

NEWS NOTES.

F. P. Reid, Moncton, had a meeting
with the minister of railways at Ottawa
on Tuesday last and tried to persuade
Mr. Blair that Traffic Manager Harris's
freight regulations will be very damaging
to the lumber industry of New Brun-
swick.

Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, Feb. 14.—Replying to ques-
tions by members Mr. Blair said the
supplementary estimates will show "that
the government was going to take steps
toward the examination and development
of the route of the Klondike. No con-
tract had been made with the Kingston
works for locomotives, but the govern-
ment intended, if possible, to obtain
their locomotives from Canadian shops.
The government propose to take over the
Drummond railway on March 1st. Mr.
Blair also gave the names of the new offi-
cers appointed at Montreal. The salary
of Traffic Manager Harris is five thousand
dollars. The agent at Montreal gets two
thousand, Travelling Agent Laanbin gets
\$1,000. Mr. Blair remarked that it was
proposed to modernize the Intercolonial
management without increasing the cost.
The government had bought two engines
at Philadelphia at \$10,000 each. They
were bought on the recommendation of
the general manager. The minister said
\$8,181 had been spent in plumbing and
heating apparatus of the new station at
Moncton. The work will be awarded
to James H. Dooly, of St. John. The
contract was cancelled and a new one
made with F. E. McManus at \$8,277.
The minister gave the number of re-
tired men who had been dismissed from
the Intercolonial and stated that the reduc-
tion was caused by the dullness of
trade.

Mr. Foster got an order for papers con-
nected with the case of Benjamin Palmer,
formerly lighthouse keeper at Palmar's
point, Kings county. E. B. also an order
for papers connected with the Atlantic
winter steamship service from St. John
and Halifax.

Mr. Ellis got an order for papers giv-
ing the total cost of Haasard publication
from 1890 to 1897.

Sir Hilbert Tupper got an order for
information regarding the dismissal of
William Sutherland, civil engineer at Stell-
arton.

Referring to the statement made in the
Senate Friday by Senator Scott, re-
specting the tariff preference of
25 per cent. to the United Kingdom
alone, Sir Charles Tupper asked for con-
firmation of the statement.

Sir Wilfrid said that when the budget
was brought down he hoped the leader
of the opposition would have an oppor-
tunity of reiterating his arrangement
of reentering his gratification.

Sir Wilfrid stated that the arrange-
ment entered into at Washington bet-
ween the minister of the interior and
the American government was an unof-
ficial one and consisted of an under-
standing that regulations should be is-
sued by the Secretary of the treasury of
the United States which would render
effectual the privilege of landing Cana-
dian goods over territory in the posses-
sion of the United States at Dyea and
Skagway and deal with the navigation
by British vessels of the rivers upon the
Alaskan coast, the navigation of which
is secured by treaty. The premier also
stated that the regulations referred to
have been issued, though not yet officially
communicated to the Canadian govern-
ment. The Canadian government are
not being right of the legislation which
is now before Congress, and if the regula-
tions be passed under it should ham-
per Canada in navigating the Stikine
river the country will be compelled to
at once take steps to secure the construc-
tion of a railway from Glenora or Tele-
graph Creek down to some port in British
Columbia by what is known as the A-
B-C route. The only thing left for the
Canadian government, if Congress bars
its way, is to construct a route
from Fort Simpson that is truly all-Can-
adian and beyond the reach of hostile laws
and regulations; either this, or suffer the
Americans especially to steal Klondike
from us.

SENATE.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell gave notice
of the following committee to investigate

Drummond County Railway affair:

Sensors Clemow, Cox, Boucherville,
Ferguson, Kirchoffer, King, Loughbell,
Laurie, Miller, Mills, McDonald, B. C.
Power, Prosser, Primeau, Thibault,
Wood and the mover.

The debate on the address was resumed
by Senator Power and continued by Sen-
ator O'Donoghue and Senator Ferguson.

Senator Power made a vigorous defence
of the Yukon railway contract.

OTTAWA, Feb. 15.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier
moved his resolution calling for an en-
quiry into the affairs of the Drummond
County Railway. At the suggestion of
Sir Charles Tupper it was amended by
omitting the words, "parliament of Can-
ada" so that the substance granted by the
Provincial Legislature of Quebec might
also be enquired into. The opposition
quarrelled a good deal over the matter,
protesting that they had not made any
charge of corruption against the govern-
ment, but had merely objected to the
terms of the debate as impertinent. Mr.
Tarte quoted from Mr. Foster's speech
in Toronto a charge of corruption made
against him and his sons, and denounced
it as a cruel slander. Mr. Foster did not
reply. The discussion was lively while
it lasted, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Louis
David and Mr. Tarte speaking on the
government side, and Sir Charles Tupper,
Foster, Haggart and Cair
