MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Important Legislation to be Requested—Several Communications Read.

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Monday night His Worship the Mayor presiding. Councillors present, Messrs. Alexander, McDonald, Miller, Mowat, Moores and McLellan.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved; Councillor White entering the council chambers during the reading.
Communication received from the Board of Trade giving a condensed report of the public meeting held on their auspices, and enclosing copy of the amendment adopted at that meeting, viz:—"That Mr. Reid our member be asked to arrange a meeting between the I. C. Board of Management and the Town Council supplemented by a delegation from the Board of Trade to discuss and settle the question of the closing of Sugarloaf Street." Letter laid on the table.

Communication read from Jos. Boudreau re an application for Public Weigh Scales. Referred to Public Property and Streets Committee.

Communication read from Mrs. Mary W. Riddell re an application for rebate of Pool Room and Bowling Alley License Fees. Referred to Police and License Committee.

Communication read from W. H. Fraser re an application for refund of taxes on account of his removal from town. Referred to Assessment Committee.

Communication read from Daniel Court asking rebate of his assessment. Referred to Assessment Committee.

Councillor Mowat read the report of The Electric Light recommending payment of accounts totalling \$5600.74. Report received and adopted.

His Worship then vacated the chair which was taken by Councillor Alexander.

His Worship presented the report of the Bye Laws and Legislation Committee which dealt with the necessity of Legislation on the following matters:

1. To exempt the town of Campbellton from the municipality of Restigouche taxes, only as the County or Parish taxes apply to Campbellton.
2. To amend the Liquor License Act to include Beer License.
3. To exempt improvements from taxation.
4. To authorize the Council to issue Debentures for Water, Light and Sewerage purposes.

His Worship explained at great length the different aspects of the proposed legislation which would be asked and dealt with the various acts under which this further legislation would be asked.

The report was received and adopted.

Councillor White asked His Worship a question regarding the proposed legislation to be asked for, notice of which was published in the press.

The Mayor said that power from the Legislature, was being sought to repeal Sec. 5 of an act passed in 1906, respecting Campbellton Reservoir. Discussion on this developed the feeling that this request for legislation should be opposed, and the clerk was instructed to write Mr. Teed K. C., asking him if it would be suitable for him to attend the session at which time it would come up in the house.

NEW INDUSTRY FOR DALHOUSIE

Public Meeting Favors Concessions to Chappell Bros., of Sydney, to Erect a Saw and Planing Mill. Plebiscite to be Taken.

Dalhousie, N. B., Feb. 23.—That Dalhousie is to get another large industry seems assured if one may judge by the spirit of a public meeting called by the town council and held in the court house here on Wednesday night last, when proposals were made in favor of granting special concessions to Chappell Bros., of Sydney N. S., to induce them to erect large saw and planing mills in the town, to take care of the lumber cut on their newly acquired limits across the river in Bonaventure county. The meeting was well attended by a representative and enthusiastic crowd of ratepayers and by F. C. Chappell, who appeared in the interests of his firm, and who, in the course of the meeting stated that they would like to know just what the council could offer them by way of inducements, when they will be glad to take the question of locating here to serious consideration.

The chair was occupied by Mayor Stewart and the proceedings were interesting alike to Dalhousie in its recent policy of reaching out for more industries, and to the province, inasmuch as if the proposition carries it means that New Brunswick will have one more large millinery concern to its credit.

The movement has the support of the business people of the town, and employers of labor look to it as the "means to an end" of securing a larger section for the personnel of their mill staffs, while the mayor and council have shown themselves anxious to bring about an agreement satisfactory to Messrs. Chappell. It will be remembered that one of the principal planks of the platform which elected Mayor Stewart and his full ticket was the encouragement of new industries, and there is no doubt that in their attitude towards this new project the council is "making good" by working to give the new concern as large inducements as possible and at the same time taking care not to jeopardize the credit of the town by incurring heavier burdens than the ratepayers feel called upon to carry.

It is also known that the council is working quietly, but none the less efficaciously, towards the bringing of the main line of the I. C. R. through Dalhousie, and they believe that by adding one more to the list of their industries they would be offering greater inducement to the government to bring about the accomplishment of "the fact which will make Dalhousie bigger."

The principal resolution of the evening was that moved by ex-Mayor W. S. Montgomery, seconded by J. B. H. Storer, secretary of the Dalhousie Lumber Company, and endorsed by Messrs. Norton, DeLancy and Essigon, to the effect that the meeting was in favor of granting Chappell Bros., the following concessions and privileges:

1. A free site, including water sufficient for steam purposes and cost not more than \$5,000.
2. Free water and stand pipes for fire protection.
3. Flat rate of town taxation of \$5,000 for twenty years.
4. Right of way to the mill site.

DEATH OF DR. MOWATT

Aged and Beloved Pastor of Erskine Presbyterian Church Dies Suddenly in Church—Leaves Four Sons and Four Daughters.

Dr. A. J. Mowatt of Erskine Presbyterian church died very suddenly on Sunday, Rev. Dr. E. Scott was assisting Dr. Mowatt in the service had taken the lessons leaving the aged pastor to concentrate his energies on his sermon. During the singing of a hymn it was noticed something was wrong and Dr. Scott moving across the platform was astounded to find Dr. Mowatt unconscious. The aged divine was carried into the vestry and without gaining consciousness expired in a very few moments. Dr. Scott laboring under great emotion, broke the painful news to the awe struck congregation, and the service was closed.

Dr. Mowatt was born in Manners-Sutton N. B. in 1838 and received his education at college school, Fredericton, taking his Arts course at Truro, N. S., and his Theology at Halifax. Licensed to preach in 1866, he spent a number of years in the maritime provinces where he enjoyed a high reputation, being reckoned one of the ablest preachers in his church, and in January 1891 was inducted to the pastorate of Erskine church, where he labored with great acceptance winning the confidence and esteem of all his members. Dr. Mowatt was married to Miss Annand of Gays River N. S., who survives him, and leaves four sons and four daughters.

5. The council to move in securing fire-alarm services from the government and other minor privileges in consideration of Chappell Bros., agreeing to erect a long lumber mill capable of sawing from 10,000 to 15,000,000 superficial feet yearly, together with a planing mill to give winter employment to the workmen of the town.

The moving of this resolution caused considerable discussion, prominent in which were Messrs. Coman, Powell, Potts, Montgomery and Ald. Stewart. Mr. Montgomery offered his mill site, commonly known as the "shipyard field," to the town for the sum of \$8,000.

COUNCIL ECHOES

 The report of the bye laws and Legislation Committee was well handled by His Worship. For a concise statement he showed the injustice of having to pay all our own taxes for small-pox patients and pauper lunatics, and then also pay the county proportion, amounting as it did last year to 41 per cent. A change is needed here most certainly.
 The exemption of improvements from tax is a step in the right direction. This means as applied to property, a man would be taxed for his land, and not on the building, if any there on. All land would be assessed at a certain figure and if one man had a \$2000 house on his lot, and the man next door had not built both would have the same assessment.
 There is a general feeling in the Council that in the matter of granting licenses for business premises, a more definite application should be insisted on. Any one might apply for a small grocery store license and after paying their \$10 would at the expiry of the license blossom out in a T. Eaton & Co., whereas had it been known at first the ultimate idea, we would have been charging a tax of \$1000.

We hope soon to have something going with regard to our Fire Protection. The "Graphic" has spoken on this before and we hope to make some real progress in this direction.


BLACK CAPE


