### CROWD APPLAUDS VERDICT OF JURY

Two Victoria Co. Men Not Guilty of Robbing Car on Train

Andover, Feb. 27-The County Court opened in Andover on Tuesday with Judge John L. Carleton presiding. In the morning S. B. Mooney obtained an order of review in the trial of the King vs. Joseph Gagne at Edmundston on March 4. In this case Magistrate Soucy of St. Leonards fined Gagne for driving a cab without a license within the town limits of St. Leonards. Judge Carleton granted the order for a new into C. P. R. freight cars and stolen trial on the grounds that the magistrate acted wholly without jurisdiction and that the costs were exhorbitant. Albert Dionne will conduct the case for the defence when the trial comes up at Edmundston.

The case of the King vs. Ralph Acton and Cecil Wright, the charge was that the defendants had broken goods therefrom on Sept. 11 last. Stephen B. Mooney, for the defence, challenged 13 jurors necessitating an additional panel of 12 jurors.

After the jury was finally chosen C. H. Elliott, the Crown prosecutor, introduced separate confession signed by Wright and Acton and witnessed by two C. P. R. detectives, Castello and Ritson. Mr. Mooney in a brilliant cross-examination, which he carried on against one of the investigators, Castello, for an hour and three-quarters, materially weakened the confessions, signed by the accused, showing the great possibility of duress and undue influence having been used by the investigators against the two sus-

### **GRAND FALLS** POWER APPROVED

Waterfall, One Estimate

(Telegraph-Journal)

Hon. Dr. E. A. Smith, chairman of the New Brunswick Electric Power tight aluminum packages, Commission, returned yesterday from Fredericton where he had been discussing with Premier Veniot the report of H. G. Acres, Ontario power expert, engaged by the New Brunswick government to investigate the proposed hydro-electric development at

Dr. Smith stated that the report was very favorable one and practically confirmed the report made by the engineers of the commission. Mr. Acres was of the opinion that at Grand Falls the province had a first class water power and one that compared favorably with the inland waters of both Ontario and Quebec. He also stated that, in his opinion, the power could be developed economically and was a good commercial proposition.

The report of the commission, which Mr. Acres was checking up, has not yet ben made public but a previous report on the power available at Grand Falls estimated the amount, when it was fully developed at 150,000 horse power and the initial development at 50,000 horse power

The commission has prepared a plan showing distribution from Grand Falls which will cover the province and by linking up with smaller powers, such as the Musquash, provide hydro energy to every place in the province where it might be required for manufacturing or to supply light and heat

It is understood the commission at the present time are working on the plans for the development of a 50,000 horse power plant and it is expected the Legislature will, at the coming leason, pass the necessary legislation
