His Views on the McKinley Tariff as Reported by an Interview here last Reported by an Interview here last evening, said: "While I do not know that I am prepared to discuss details now. I am prepared to have a market for our products. The United States is our natural market for two-thirds of our produce. It is divided from us only by an imaginary line, which men, and not Providence, have placed, and the United States market includes more than 60,000,000 people. So we have right at our doors the largest market we can find. The markets in the two or three countries in Europe which are open to us are 3,000 miles away. If ever there were two countries

DESIGNED TO TRADE TOGETHER they are the United States and Canada. Now the tariff steps in and proceeds to interfere with this beneficent design. By this new law the interference will be greater than ever. Under the old tariff some little trading was possible. You needed our products, our mutton, oats, barley, eggs, horses, farm produce generally; so we needed some of your manufactures and other products. There was bound to be some interchange of commodities under these circumstances, but the increased duties of the tariff are practically prohibitive in some of these lines and will have the effect of

some of these lines and will have the effect of

STOPPING TRADE ALTOGETHER.

The new duties on horses, cattle, barley and all other agricultural products are prohibitive. There was a particularly good trade in horses. With the new duty on eggs of 5 cents a dozen, that is prohibitive, and there was a good trade in that line. Mr. 'Mercier as an instance mentioned the closing of the St. Hyacinthe brance of a Boston produce house which did a \$200,000 yearly business with Canada. The relations of the countries, he said, were such that if one was injured the other must suffer. Toronto, Oct. 4.—The Trades and Labor
Council sat for three hours and a half
last evening. The legislative report, among other items referred with regret to the
many idle men in the city at this time, and
especially deplored the tendency of employers to take advantage of the crowded
state of the labor market to reduce the
wages. It was not noticeable, however,
that the manufacturers made a corresponding reduction in the prices of their goods.
Strong dissatisfaction was expressed at the
insinuation made by Mr. W. R. Moredith,
M.P.P., at the recent dinner to Sir George
Baden-Powell, that the labor classes are not
interested in higher education. This
"charge," they said, "is unfounded
in fact, and could emanate only
from one who did not desire to or
would not understand the working
classes in their attitude towards Toronto
University." The working classes were, on
the contrary, keenly alive to the advantages
and great value of higher education, and
were ready to fairly encourage and foster
it. They deplored, however, that high
fees at times excluded the children of the
working classes from the University.
The Education Committee expressed
pleasure at the trend of public opinion in
favor of compulsory education; quoted the
criminal statistics and the charge of the
grand jury at the recent Woodstock
Assizes in support of this position; opposed
the ward system of electing aidermen and
school trustees, favoring rather the cumulative system. The establishment of
technical schools was again favored, and a
special act will be sought from the Ontario Legislature to assist in their establishment.

Chicago, Oct. 4.—A statement having been made that nine telephone giris had gone crazy in New York City, the superintendent of a telephone exchange in this city was interviewed for the purpose of discovering whether the western telephone girls took more kindly to their work. He said that whatever grounds the superintendent might have for becoming insane, he could not see that the operators had any. He had never seen any signs of insanity in the young ladies under his charge; on the contrary, they were bright and efficient, and that was why he kept them. There was no record of insanity among the operators.

London, Oct. 7.—A meeting of 10,000 dookers was held at Mile End Thursday night, after a parade through the streets, amid much enthusiasm. The meeting was addressed by the leading delegates to the Dookers' Congress, just closing. John Burns was one of the principal speakers. He talked plainly to the men, and told them that it depended upon themselves whether the improvement wrought by the union in their wages and hours was to permanently benefit them or not. He advised them to stop drinking and gambling and to save a

little money for a rainy day. He was greatly applauded.

London Light, Gas and Coke Company have emphatically declined to accede to the demands that only union men be employed in the works. The stokers threaten to strike. The number of men involved is six times larger than that engaged in the previous strike.

Orders have already been issued that 800 soldiers at Chatham be in readiness to proceed at a moment's notice to protect the gasworks. The stokers declare the reports that they intend to go on strike to force the company to dispense with non-union laborers unfounded. They made no demands upon the directors, but only suggested that it would be to the advantage of each side if only union labor was employed in the works.

DAYTON, Tenn., Oct. 4.—The Richland and Nelson miners, to the number of 1,200, are on strike against a reduction in wages.

London, Oct. 4.—The directors of the London Gas Light and Coke Company continue their preparations to guard against a stoppage of their works in consequence of any possible trouble between them and their employes. Barracks have been built at Beckton to shelter the non-union employes and cavalry and infantry whom it may be necessary to call upon to protect the work men. The company has enough coal stored to meet its requirements for ten weeks.

The stokers retierate their statement that they never intended to strike.

A Trip to Mount St. Elias.

Port Townsend, Wash., Oct. 4.—The United States steamer Corwin arrived from Yakutat Bay, Alaska, with the National Geographical expedition for the expioration of Mount St. Elias on board. The party consisted of Prof. J. C. Russell and Mr. B. Kerr, of the Geological Society, and seven packers. Prof. Russell extended his geological studies from the terminal morains to the heads of all the principal glaciers flanking Mount St. Elias and the adjacent ranges. A large glacier in Disenchantment Bay which was explored was named Hubbert Glacier. A magnificent peak at the head of the glacier was named Mount Bosemann. At an elevation of 4,500 feet Mr. Russell discovered fossil plants and mussels. Accurate measurements were taken of the glaciers and its rate of moving was determined. A splendid series of photographs were secured, which will embellish a report to the society later. Prof. Kerr's observations developed two facts of great interest to the geographical world; first, the absolute certainty that Mount St. Elias is in United States territory; second, that its height and that of all the other peaks in the vicinity has been greatly overestimated. Mr. Kerr estimates the height of Mount St. Elias as toomething less than 1,500 feet and other peaks in proportion.



The Sabbath commemorates God's cessation from creative work, affords man a respite from the toil and care of labor, and prefigures the rest offered in labor, and prefigures the rest offered in Scripture to God's people. Surely there is acthing in these fundamental ideas of the Sabbath to warrant the view that its proper observance is with sorrowful heart and countenance. The lady who possesses a sealskin sack these days should keep the moths out of it, and treasure it above all things—that is, if in future years she wishes to own an article of dress that will be a rarity. In New York, sealskins have advanced in price 25 per cent. over last year's cost. Fur overgarments fashioned in last winter's styles may still be had at their old figures, but sealskin sacks and capes of the present mode sell at the advance. The advance, which may be much increased before the year is over, is due to the failure of the Alaska seal catch, which for the past score of years has averaged about 100,000 skins. This year the catch is but 21,000, so that, although the catch of Copper Island, on the Siberian coast, has increased from 52,700 skins in 1889 to 58,000 in 1890, the decrease of good skins is 73,700. The catch of the Behring Sea, Victoria, and Northwest coast seal, which yields an inferior skin, is also at least 50 per cent. less than it was last year. This deficiency is in a measure made up by the catch in Chinese and Japanese waters, but this source of supply cannot be calculated on in the future, for the same causes which have tended to exterminate the seals will in time produce their effect there. The skins thus obtained, too, are very inferior. High-priced garments are made the Alaska and Copper Island skins. It seems to be only a question of time when the seal will be as rare as the buffalo is. The latter is now practically exterminated, and if civilization in these northern parts continues to advance towards the North Pole, we may also expect the fur of the beaver, the otter and kindred animals to become increasingly scarce. What will the furriers do? The answer of one of them is that when the time arrives that will see furs worn only by those who now are able to wear diamonds, they will be kept busy supplying silk plush which will be the substitute for




