THE STREET RAILWAY CASE.

Full Text of the Judgment Agains) the City.

Experts Undecided Whether the Ex tension Was a Double Track or Switch - Therefore the City Had No Right to Tear It Up-The Devil's Strip All Right.

The full text of the judgment on Nov. 24 in the street railway suit has been received by the company's solicitors, Helmuth & Ivey, and appears to be entirely in favor of the defendants (the London Street Railway Company) as against the plaintiffs (the corporation of the city of London). Following is Judge Falconbridge's delivery in full:

"The contention of defendants that the bylaw and agreement are ultra vires, as set

"The contention of defendants that the hylaw and agreement are ultra view, as set forth in the first paragraph of the state-ment of defense, is res judicata, having been disposed of by the judgment of Mr. Justice Rose in the suit of the present de-Justice Rose in the suit of the present de-feedants against the plaintiffs, in the chancery division. And no new facts were shown bearing on paragraph 5, which sets up that the plaintiffs have no right now to construct tracks on Dundas street, west of Richmond street, and that issue is also res

Richmond street, and that issue is also res judicata by the same judgment.

"The experts all agree that it is not possible to tell on the ground whether the two uncompleted tracks were, or were intended to be, part of a double track or of a switch, and the defendants had therefore no right to assume that work which had not in fact actually become a nuisance would do so. (Garrett on "Nuisances," page 315.) Easton, etc., Passenger Railway Company vs. City of Easton, Pa. St. 505, is strong authority in plaintiffs' favor.

"True, the plaintiffs were assuming to work on defendants' property—an element of distinction from some cases on this subject—but plaintiffs were not there as tres-

of distinction from some cases on this subject—but plaintills were not there as trespassers, but of right, as Mr. Justice Rose has found, provided they are in other respects within the bylaw and agreement. The argument that 'single track' in section 2 of the bylaw means just a single line of rails, and that the company cannot even have a switch on Dundas street, west of Richmond, is too refined and subtle for me, and I cannot give effect to it.

"Nor do I think section 6 (which deals with what in street railway parlane is known as 'the devil's strip' can apply to switches where the rails must converge at both ends.

both ends. "And I read the whole of section four o'And I read the whole of section four together, and hold that the supervision and satisfaction of the city engineer have relation to the 'substantial manner and according to the best modern practice,' as to which there is no real complaint, but the complaint is founded on a supposed construction of the bylaw and agreement. Section 22 provided that the railway shall not be opened until he shall have given his certificate in writing that the road is in good condition and has been constructed in all respects conformably to the provisions of the bylaw. That is another matter.

"There will be judgment for plaintiffs as prayed with an injunction and a reference as to damages, in which reference the master is to have regard to the agreement of Aug. 2, 1893, filed before meant the argument.

TIE-UP OF A CITY LAW SUIT.

The London City Council, by a majority vote, last night agreed to appeal against the decision of Mr. Justice Falconbridge, which found that the mayor was in the wrong when he took the law into his own hands and ordered the tearing up of the street railway tracks on the Dundas street extension.

This will be welcome news for the lawyers, but not a very pleasant prospect for the taxpayers.

Going to law is like betting on a horse race. There is always a chance of winning, but it is always risky. Sometimes it is decidedly slim in results, and anyone who listened to the city's own witnesses at the trial of this rashly-entered-on dispute must reach the conclusion that the council appeal is not unlike the act of a drowning man grasping at straws.

The effect of the appeal, while likely to add a large sum to the expenses already piled up, may hang the law suit up till next year, when it will be presented as a legacy to the new Board of Aldermen. The better plan would have been to adopt Ald. Parnell's motion and get down to business as soon as possible.

The large audience present were delighted with the vigorous and clear exposition of this phase of the controversy.

Mr. Cullen chose as his text Jeremiah, xxxv., 18-19. His theme was "The Rechabite's Reward," and he drew from the passage the strong lesson that total abstinence principles had here been strikingly rewarded. Mr. Cullen divided his address into seven propositions. They were as follows:

1. Total abstinence is a safe practice for any man to follow. "If you do not drink you cannot get drunk" seems to be a trite utterance. Yet it is astrue as it is trite, and as sublime in its simplicity as it is simple in its application.

2. Total abstinence is a respectable habit. In an intelligent community, who ever knew an honorable citizen to suffer loss of character because he was a total abstainer from all kinds of narcotics? No man! The common sense of humanity is in favor of the practice of legitimate self-denial on the part of man, either for his own sake or for the sake of his/fellows. In many fustances even the victims of unnecessary stimulants themselves respect the men who will not follow their example and decline to become their associates in so-called moderation and dangerous self-indulgence.

3. Total abstinence from strong drink preserves and improves health. Without it the highest physical development cannot be reached. Tom Sayers, that king of English pugilists, never touched spirits, ale or porter when training for a prize fight. He reveled in cold water and in dumb-bell exercise. Cold water made him a Sampson. Alcohol killed him. Both in the frozen regions of the north, in those dangerous exploring expeditions, and in the sweltering heat of the tropics, total abstinence has proved its superiority over moderate drinking. THAT ASSAULT CASE.

Fox and Madden Charged with Injuring Peter Lewis-Sent for Trial-Released on Bail.

Released on Ban.

There was an unusually long session of the Police Court yesterday. The charge of assault and wrongdoing against James Fox and Peter Madden, who were said to be implicated in the serious injuries recently inflicted upon Peter Lewis in the Western Hotel billiard room, was being investigated. The evidence went to show

recently inflicted upon Peter Lewis in the Western Hotel billiard room, was being investigated. The evidence went to show that the two prisoners were the only persons directly implicated, although all the witnesses, with the exception of William McDonald, would not swear that Madden threw the pool ball from which Lewis was laid up. Magistrate Parke thought that the case should be further investigated, and committed the prisoners to stand their trial. Bail was accepted.

William J. McLean, the keeper of the billiard tables at the Western Hotel, said that he was present at the fracas. For some time prior to the incident the doors of the room were looked. Thomas Breen, Edward Schusler, James Padfield, Peter Lewis and William Lewis were with him at the time. Some one tried to kick the door open. Fox and Madden had been in the hotel during the greater portion of the afternoon. They were extremely noisy, and he had locked the door so that the two could not enter. Peter Lewis went to the door and said: "What do you fellows want?" A scuffle immediately followed, which the witness, being behind the door, could not observe. Lewis again entered the room. He walked over to one of the tables in evident excitement, picked up a couple of balls, and again made his exit into the hall. As the witness was going for the police, just at this juncture, Fox and Madden entered by another door. When McLean returned there was every indication of a protracted squabble. Billiard balls and cues were lying on the floor in every direction. Witness did not know how Lewis was struck.

That person grappled with him, and hit him with his fist. Witness did not see Madden. There were about 25 or 30 persons in the room at this stage.


