CUSTOMERS MOST WANTED. Guelph, June 12.—Addressing the great gathering held in honor of Mr. Laurier on Wednesday night, Mr. Geo. H. Bartram, the well-known Toronto manufacturer, said that it was as a plain business man attending to his business more than to the politics of the country that he essayed to discuss the trade question. Not as a political theorist, but as a practical man and a manufacturer he discussed the subject, with the result that he presented a complete case in behalf of the revenue tariff policy of the Liberal party. He made an eloquent plea for freedom, justice and toleration for all classes in the country. He pointed out numerous anomalies in the tariff which have come under his personal observation as an importer of raw material. Amic great applause he declared that when the Government taxed the raw material of the men who were employing labor it was injuring the manufacturer. The trade policy advocated by Mr. Laurier, he said, would benefit the manufacturers more than the National Policy. "I believe," Mr. Bartram said, "that a moderate revenue tariff suited to the requirements of the country, will give, as a matter of fact, all the advantage that any Canadian manufacturer has a right to expect in any shape or form." His Letter Withdrawing Acceptance of a Provincial Honorary Degree.

This Little Compliment Paid to Him as a Scholar Was Likely to Bring to the University More Annoyance and Disturbance Than it Was Worth.

Toronto, June 12.-This letter has been addressed by Mr. Goldwin Smith to the president of the University of Toronto:

Escorted to the Rink by a Big Crowd.

It Was 8:30 Before the Train Had

Meeting Closed After Midnight-How Employes Were Driven Into the Procession - Speeches by Sir Charles, Dr. Montague, Mr. Beattle and Sir John Carling.

Sir Charles Tupper and Dr. Montague came and saw last night, and it remains to be seen who will conquer. The engine of the special train conveying the party had a break-down during the day, which threw the entire programme about an hour late. Because of that it was 8:30 before the party arrived at the William street crossing of the G. T. R. Here they found a large procession awaiting them. It extended from Dundas street to York, along York to Maitland and up Maitland to King street. First came about 200 wheelmen, then a num-ber of horsemen, then the carriages containing the visitors and Sir John Carling, Dr. Roome, ex-M.P., Joe Marshall, ex-M.P., A. B. Ingram, ex-M.P., John McClary, Aldermen Cooper, Douglass, Taylor, Garratt, Skinner, Pritchard, and Carrothers, Messrs. Gray, Mullins, and Darch, officers of the Young Conservative Club, Returning Officer Wright, ex-Ald. Callard, Richard Bayly, and many others. Citizens on foot followed, and scattered throughout the line were both bands of the Seventh Fusiliers, brass and bugle, several impromptu drum corps, a piper, the North End Conservative Band (R. Clare, leader), and the Musical Society Band. There were two banners in the procession. One was inscribed, "Honor to Sir Charles Tupper, the Champion of the National Policy and the Workingman's Friend." Another read, "The London and Petrolea Barrel Company. We Flourish Under the National Policy." The employes of this, as well as almost every other Conservative firm employing labor in the city, were in line. It was currently reported about the streets that the empolyers of some of these men had used a mild species of intimidation in their effort to lay over the Liberal procession and had given the men to understand that they were expected to march "for the honor of the Premier." Buried in Mud

A Mexican Town Almost Completely Destroyed.

Struck by a Cyclone and Waterspout-Mud Eight Feet Deep in the Streets.

Mexico City. June 12.—Details of a cyclone which devastated the town of Topac, State of Jalisco, have just arrived. The storm was accompanied by a waterspout that detached from the sides of the mountain masses of rock and earth, and mud was piled up in the streets of the town to a depth of eight feet, and in some cases to the level of the lower branches of trees in which the inhabitants had climbed to escape the inundation of water and Three-fourths of the town was atterly destroyed.

Thirteen bodies have been taken out from under the mass of earth, including children, and many people were so seriously injured that the last rites of he church were administered. More than 30 persons are missing, and it is expected their bodies will be discovered under the debris. WOMEN MAY VOTE.

Episcopalian Convention a Detroit Decides.

Detroit, June 12.-The Episcopal clergymen and lay delegates who are attending the diocesan convention had a red-hot fight yesterday over the question of allowing women to vote upon church matters. Two years ago the clergy voted in favor of the canonical amendment, but it was defeated by two votes by the laity. Last year, the question of legality was sprung and it was reterred to a committee. It was upon the report of this committee that the fight occurred yesterday.

The report was against allowing women to vote at vestry meetings until the laws of the state regarding the right of suffrage had been chang-It was stated that any change until then would be "unwise and un-

The vote on the minority report showed 28 clergymen and 34 laymen in favor, and 20 clergymen and 15 lay men against the change. Bishop Da vis ruled that unless a measure had been voted on at two previous consecutive conventions, a two-thirds majority was required. This laid the mat ter over until next year, when only a majority will be required. In the afternoon, on the opinion of Elliott G. Stevenson, the ruling of Bishop Davis was changed, and the majority vote was ruled sufficient to change the canon and permit women to vote, without waiting another year. The convention approved the opinion.






