New York, Nov. 8.—Five women and two enen are believed to have been killed in the collapse of three floors of a building in Brooklyn, occupied by a concern supplying provisions to the United States Government. An explosion and fire followed.

One body, that of Miss Josephine Johannis, was recovered from the ruins, and firemen are searching for others.

The building, a four-story structure, was owned by the Johannis Steamship Provision Company, and was located within a block of the recent \$2,000,000 warehouse fire in Brooklyn.

Heavy machinery, located on the upper floors, is believed responsible for the collapse of the building. It dropped to the cellar, causing the explosion of an ammonta tank. About 3,500 bags of beans, destined to the American forces in France, were ruined.

LIBERTY LOAN OVERSUBSCRIBED

Washington, Nov. 8.—Americans responded to the call for a second Liberty war loan by subscribing \$4.617,532,300, an oversubscription by 54 per cent of the three billion dollars asked, and only \$383,000,000 less than the \$5,000,000,000 maximum fixed by the treasury. Tabulations completed last night showed that every federal reserve district exceeded its quota, and 9,400,000 persons subscribed in the big war financing operation.

Foe's Last Reserves Called For Big Drive Along West Fronts

Final Effort Before the Americans Arrive.

London, Nov. 8.—Germany called up her last reserves within the last few days, according to the Central News correspondent at Zurich, telegraphing under Wednesday's date. All men who previously had been rejected were ordered to present themselves for reexamination, and within twenty-four hours all not utterly incapacitated were on their way to the training quarters. This action, says the correspondent, is attributed to the intention of the Central Powers to make a final effort on the western front before America's help becomes effective.

Paris, Nov. 8.—"During the night we made two surprise attacks, one on the made two surprise attacks, one on the senemy trenches east of Nouilly, and brought back prisoners," says to-day's official statement. "In Upper Alsace the attack which we made yesterday on the German positions at Schoenholz, it is now learned, caused the enemy to suffer heavy losses. The number of prisoners captured by us has reached 121, of who two are officers. Important materials, which we have thus far not been able to enumerate, fell into our hands. "There is nothing to report from the remainder of the front."

LENINE, LEADER OF EXTREMISTS,

Petrograd, Nov. 5.—It has been indicated for some time past that an attempt was to be made by the Maximaliste in Petrograd to saize control.

The Maximalist, or Bolsheviki element, comprises the most extreme class of the Russian revolutionary Socialists. They first sprang into prominence in the early days of the revolution under the leadership of Nikolai Lenine, the radical agitator, who later was put under the ban because of his ultra-radical preachments, and his suspected progerman leanings. He is known to have been in concealment in Petrograd for some time past. Meanwhile the Maximalists were under the leadership of his chief lieutenant, Leon Trotzky, Kerensky Helpiess.

Premier Kerensky seemingly recognized that the growing menace to his government was one that he could not cope with by drastic measures, surrounded as he was by military power in the hands of his opponents. It was

HAIG'S BARRAGE, GERMANS ADMIT

Awful "Fire Roller" of British in Flanders Proves Irresistible.

FOE'S LOSSES ENORMOUS

Enemy Military Critic Declares No Way of Stopping Allied Might in West.

Copenhagen, Nov. 8.—Unwilling testimony of the irresistible might of the British offensive in Flanders is, given by Lient. Gen. you Ardenne, the military critic of the Tageblatt of Berlin, who sends from the Flanders front a graphic picture of the difficulties of the German defence. Norway, he says, has been devised to prevent the "fire roller," as the Germans term the moving barrage, from making slow and steady gains. He reports the German losses as very heavy, if an atand steady gains. He reports the German losses as very heavy, if an attempt is made to hold the front line trenches in force, while a thin line adds to the speed of the British advance.

Suffering is Great.

"The sufferings of the defenders in the front line," Gen. von Ardenne writes, "composed of shell holes almost filled with water, are such that the men must be relieved every two days instead of every week or every ten days, as last year. The infantry now spends two days on the firing line, two in support and two in reserve, until relieved.

"The German artillery is so numerically inferior to the British that it is seldom refleved, and as it cannot dig in owing to the boggy terrain it must fire without cover. The conditions in the shell holes are such that men falling into the centre of them are lost unless assisted. Horses breaking into the morass are shot, because it is impossible to extricate them. German counter-attacks can traverse the fire roller only by small detachments in single file. The loss is slight if the Suffering is Great.

A proclamation sent out through the wireless stations of the Russian Government today, and picked up here, states that the garrison and proletariat of Petrograd have deposed the Kerensky Government.

PARLIAMENT DISSOLVED.

London, Nov. 8 .- Leon Trotzky, president of the central executive committee of the Petrograd Council of Soldiers' and Workmen's Delegates, issued a declaration to the effect that the provisional government was no longer in existence and that some of its members had been arrested. The preliminary parliament has been dissolved.

ASSISTED BY GARRISON.

The Russian news agency, which, as reported last night, was seized by the Maximalists, sends the following dispatch from Petrograd, dated 9:50 o'clock last evening:

"The day brought certain changes in the general situation in the capital. The Maximalist movement made fresh and fairly appreciable progress, but no disorders have taken place.

"Towards 5 o'clock in the afternoon the military revolutionary committee of the Soldiers' and Workmen's Delegates issued a proclamation stating that Petrograd was in its hands, thanks to the assistance of the garrison, which enabled the coup d'tat to be brought about without bloodshed.

TO PROPOSE IMMEDIATE PEACE. "The proclamation declares that the new Government will propose an immediate and just peace, will hand the land to the peasants, and

will summon the constituent assembly. "Delegates from the three Cossack regiments quartered here declared they would not obey the provisional government, and would not march against the Soldiers' and Workmen's Delegates, but that they were prepared to maintain public order.

GOVERNMENT DEPOSED.



If a man has not been medically examined previous to his report for service, he will be directed by the registrar to attend for medical examination at a specified time, and his case will be dealt with according to his medical classification.

In this connection it is interesting to note that since the widespread use of bisurated magnesia was established, many druggists have arranged to supply it in 5-grain tablets, two or three of which are equivalent to a teaspoonful of the powder form, and are







Under the privilege now given by the finance minister the buyer of any bond (whatever the denomination) may have it registered, in which case the interest will be paid by check, and the bond, if lost, may be replaced after proper evidence has been shown. It is believed that this privilege will be greatly appreciated by many thous ands of small investors, who will thus be assured of the absolute safety of their investment even against fire or carelessness or any other accidental cause of joss. 


