ALLIES HOLD GERMANS AND ARE HITTING BACK

ENEMY FAILS ALONG WHOLE BATTLE LINE

Great Offensive Broken Save at Few Minor Points.

THE FIGHTING IS FIERCE

Americans Took 1,500 Prisoners and Brigade Staff in Marne Combat.

With the American Forces on the Marne, July 16.—American troops today shot down a courier pigeon belonging to the enemy, east of Chateau Thierry. It was carrying a message from a German divisional headquarters saying that the situation was serious; that the Germans saw no chance of making further progress in the locality of that division.

With the American Forces on the Marne, July 16, 11:10 a.m.-Reports from one end of the battle line to the other say that, except for a few minor localities, the German offensive so far has been a complete failure.

Washington, July 16 .- 'The general situation this morning is regarded as satisfactory," says a war department statement issued today, based on dispatches from Gen. Pershing and Gen. Bliss, confirming press accounts of the fighting yesterday.

UPSET BOCHE PLANS.

London. July 16.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—A dispatch from American headquarters states that last evening the Americans commanded the river front so that the German plans there were completely upset. A famous German division on the left of the American positions repeatedly attempted all day long to cross, but all enemy assaults occurred under the American fire, and not a single German crossed.

1,500 Prisoners Taken.

Prisoners taken by the Americans at the river bend during the counterattack now total between 1,000 and 1,500, including a complete enemy brigade staff. The fighting, which is continuing, is of the flercest nature. The German objective in the morning was a distance of fifteen kilometres, but they were still far away from their objective two hours after the time they had fixed for reaching it. The Americans organized an attack while the open fighting was in progress. The Germans retired in hesitating fashion at first, but soon broke into a run, and within three hours the enemy had been driven across the river. BULLETINS OF

NO SURPRISE THIS TIME.
Paris, July 16.—(Havas Agency).
—All news from the battlefront indicates that the elements of surprise, a favorite German weapon, was a total failure Monday. The newspapers point out the importance of that fact.

The French military chiefs, says Maurice Barres in the Echo de Paris, foresaw with wonderful approximation the date and locality of the German effort, and Gen. Foch made all dispositions so that the attack was begun under conditions favorable to the Allies. The Matin declares the French commander was informed perfectly of the German preparation and knew on Sunday morning that the German troops had begun to use their reserve food supplies. This enabled the French artillery to deliver an intense fire against the Germans, with the result that the attackers were badly battered.

HIGHLY SATISFACTORY.
London, July 16.—A dispatch
from the French army head quarters,
timed 11 o'clock Monday night, says
the news from the battlefront is
highly satisfactory. The fighting
was hard, the correspondent says,
but preparations had been made
weeks beforehand, and these prevented the Germans from making
serious progress on any part or the
front. The attack along the whole
front east of Rheims was shattered
in the French advanced zone.

MANY GERMAN CORPSES.
London, July 16.—Great numbers of German corpses are hanging on the tangle of barbed wire on the front of the French positions along the Marne, and all the reports state that the losses of the Germans must have been exceedingly heavy.

HOT FIGHTING.

With the American Army on the Marne, July 16.—At one point on the front of the offensive, where American troops are fighting they organized a small counter-attack late yesterday on the flank of a salient established by the Germans and drove them out in short order, but in hot fighting.

Mowed Them Down.


The American troops in this section occupied intermediate positions in the rear of the first lines. The Germans were allowed to come through, but when they tried to cross the open fields up a slight grade the American machine gunners and infantry, occupying excellent positions, mowed down the advancing ranks, the enemy breaking and retiring at many places. This operation was conducted on a portion of the front to the east of Rheims.

GERMAN PRESS SCARED.

Amsterdam, July 16.—Attempts to enlighten the German rank and file on the American front by the distribution of informative printed matter by Allied aviators or by French balloons and guns had aroused apprehensions in the pan-German press, which are poorly concealed. The newspapers vent irate ebuilitions to the effect that the mental armor of the loyal and devoted German soldiers, who are conscious of their superiority, is proof against such shafts," as the Kreuz Zeitung puts it. A number of men from the M.C.R., St. Thomas, were present at the meeting yesterday, and reported that while they are working under the McAdoo award, they are not satisfied with it. The local men are waiting definite word from

The committee that is in conference with the war board has been given power to call a strike if some action is not taken by the board toward meeting the men on the question of wages. That some action will be taken today is the general opinion.



800,000 OF THE FUE

Whole Attack Held Up Five Hours After It Started in the Rheims Sector, Despite the Reckless Abandon With Which Germans Were Hurled Into Combat.

London, July 15.—The great German attack was definitely held up on the whole front east of Rheims five hours after it was launched, according to the latest advices reaching London, and the only German gains worth mentioning were in the neighborhood of the Souain road and Prunay, where they succeeded in penetrating for about one and half miles on a narrow front. At both these points the French initiated strong counter-attacks late in the morning.

On the front west of Rheims the Germans had rather more success, but the only important gain to their credit for the morning's work was the crossing of the Marne and a zone little more than a mile beyond on a front of about ten miles. The Marne in this district is only a small river; it is shallow and can easily be crossed in the early morning mists. Its loss to the Allies, however, deprives them of a fairly valuable defensive landmark.

PRELUDE OF RAIN OF SHELLS.

The battle began with a wholesale bombardment, inaugurated about midnight, along the whole front from Chateau-Thierry to Massiges, except for a narrow sector around Rheims. This intensified bombardment of the French lines, with the usual accompaniment of trench mortars by the thousands, was also reinforced by a long-range bombardment of the back areas on a scale greater than ever heretofore attempted. This back area bombardment was systematically directed along the line of Chalons, Montmirail and La Fort-sousgitten are counted.

The Prench general commanding the group of armies in this sector under a congratulatory message this afternoon powerful far-reaching guns must have been used in numbers greater than ever before.

LAUNCHED UNDER COVER OF MIST. The bombardment lasted until 4:30 o'clock. Then came the German attack, launched at dawn under the cover of the morning mists, which are particularly heavy in the Marne valley. The French communications, however, were well maintained throughout the morning, and news of German penetrations here and there came through promptly to the general staff, enabling proper disposition of the reserves to be made rapidly and accurately.

The general view of men who watched the proceeding from afar was that the Germans have lost some of their punch, for nowhere did the present attack gain the sweeping success which their previous efforts yielded them.

By mid-afternoon the Entente military experts were actually feeling optimistic, although the danger was not yet over. But it was evident that the first big rush had falled to yield the Germans anything like the results which might have been expected. One reason probably is that the attack this time had no element of surprise, for General Foch knew of the German intention days in advance, and the French made their plans for it last week.

SCHOOL CASE WILL BE ARGUED BEFORE THE PRIVY COUNCIL

Action of Regina Citizen Goes to Highest Court.

Regina, Sask., July 16.—On, or shortly after July 17, the case of John Mcarthy, versus the Regina public school, which aroused keen interest two years ago, will be heard before the privy council in order that a ruling from the highest court in the empire can be had concerning the right of Roman Catholics in Canada to pay their taxes to separate or public schools, as they desire.

A. Bartz, a Roman Catholic, who was a ratepayer of the city of Regina during the years 1915 and 1916, was assessed in 1915 as a separate school supporter, and in 1916, at his own request, as a public school supporter. John C. McCarthy appealed against the assessment to the 1916 court of revision, and the appeal was not allowed, whereupon the appeal was taken to the local government board and allowed in a written judgment of April 10, 1916, that A. Bartz should be assessed as a separate school supporter. The case was appealed by the public school board to the court en banc, which upheld the decision of the local government board.

CONSERVING OF BANKING CREDITS FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE WAR.

[Extracts from a circular to the general managers of banks from the president of the Canadian Bankers' Association.—May 15, 1918.]

"It is quite clear that if the war requirements of the Government are to be financed without undue expansion of banking credits, not only must there be some reduction of existing credits, but there will have to be applied a rigid check upon the further expansion of credit in directions not clearly essential for the prosecution of the war and for the health and necessary comfort of the

"In the absence of any official classification of the more essential and the less essential things and enterprises, it will be necessary for each banker, in determining how he may do his share in the conservation of credit to use his own judgment. There seem to be, however, two clearly defined groups of loans:

"(a) Loans to facilitate production or distribution;

"(b) Loans for non-productive or non-distributive purposes.

LOANS FOR NON-PRODUCTIVE OR NON-DISTRIBUTIVE PURPOSES. Loans for non-productive or non-distributive purposes are usually loans for ne-essential purposes. The following are types of this class of loan:

Loans for purchasing or carrying property, whether real estate or personal

Loans for additions to or improvements of property not used in production

By inquiring the purpose for which each new loan is required, and declining By inquiring the purpose for which each new loan is required, and declining wherever practicable to grant loans of these classes, and by gradually causing existing loans of these classes to be reduced or eliminated, bankers could conserve credit without causing hardship, and also give many people an impetus to save at a time when saving is of vital importance to Canada. But discretion must be used in not forcing borrowers to reduce loans to an extent that is unreasonable or would cause avoidable hardship or embarrassment; much can be accomplished by sound advice and the exertion of moral pressure.

LOANS TO FACILITATE PRODUCTION OR DISTRIBUTION

The three main groups of borrowers for productive or distrib are farmers, manufacturers and merchants.

1. FARMERS.—The farmers are being asked to produce more than ever be fore and loans for productive purposes must have the right of way.

In sections where farming profits have been large an endeavor should be made to induce farmers to apply a good portion of them to the reduction of long-standing loans or to the financing of their seasonal requirements, thereby conserving

bank credit.

2. MANUFACTURERS.—Manufacturers who are making large profits should be urged to reduce or extinguish their debts rather than increase capacity and output unless the industry is one which is clearly necessary to the prosecution of the war. All manufacturers should be urged to carry as small inventories as practicable; to eliminate from their products elements which add to its cost but not to its intrinsic or value and serviceability, or which are introduced simply for fashion or appearance; and to avoid as far as practicable introducing new styles during the period of the war. fashion or appearance, and during the period of the war.

The payment of large dividends by manufacturers, under existing condition In payment of large dividends by maintacturers, under existing conditions, is strongly deprecated. It is highly expedient that the present abnormal profits, due to the war, should be conserved to insure, as far as possible, the continuance of ordinary dividends, and to provide for the unforeseen contingencies that will arise during the reconstruction period after the war. There will then be large demands for capital for new industrial development.

a MERCHANTS.—Almost the same suggestions that have been made with regard to the production of goods by manufacturers may be applied to the discribution of goods by merchants, namely, reduction of stock carried, reduction or elimination of that portion of their stock, consisting of articles of mere fashion or luxury and the substitution of plainer and more serviceable articles, and the avoidance of the introduction of new styles in clothing, articles of personal compared to the introduction of new styles in clothing, articles of personal compared to the introduction of new styles in clothing, articles of personal compared to the introduction of new styles in clothing.

The conservation of credit and money will result in the saving of labor and naterials which the Government needs for the prosecution of the war; and every mprovement or expenditure which an individual, a corporation, or a municipality refrains from making during the war represents a requirement to be fulfilled when the war is over. Merchants and manufacturers will readily understand that present saving is laying up for the future an important reserve purchasing power which they may count on during whatever period of readjustment may follow the

FINANCIAL AND BUSINESS CONDITIONS IN THE UNITED

It appears the financial needs of the country will require the sale of certificates of indebtedness to the amount of \$6.000,000,000 within the next four months. There is also contemplated an offering to the public directly and through the banks of \$2,000,000,000 of certificates. This is taken to mean that the next Liberty Loan will be floated in October or November at the latest. As touching the railroads, no agreement has yet been reached between the Government and the owners as to details of terms under which the Government's management has been assumed. Some observers have seen in the regulations announced from time to time the embodiment of a purpose to creat a situation that will make a return of the transportation properties to the owners very difficult, if not impossible. The railroad officials are not in accord with any prolonged arrangement which might mean dispossession of their properties, which they claim should not be the outcome of emergency legislation growing out of the war. Meantime immense sums are being conserved by Secretary McAdoc's drastic economy, while great strides are being made for betterment of roadway and increase of equipment.

Foreign trade for May reached its highest point this year, exports amounting to \$552,000,000, while imports reached the largest on record, \$323,000,000. The total of money in circulation on June 1 was \$5,246,662,253, showing a decrease from previous month of \$71,884,464. The amount of gold coin also shows decrease of \$77,707,093. The total supply of money, however, as compared with June 1, 1917, shows an increase of \$515,335,271, with an increase in gold coin of \$285,384,154. Business conditions reflect the enormous appropriations by Congress for war requirements, and indicate that America's participation has been conceived upon such broad lines that industry may safely accommodate itself to enterprises, whose essential purpose is war work.

The money market remains most favorable to further expansion, with more

than an ordinary availability of funds for time loans and ample funds for call

loans at 4 to 5 per cent. The commodity markets show continued strength, with a slightly upward tendency. To curb wheat speculation the authorized capitalization of the Food Administration Grain Corporation has been increased from \$50,000,000 to 150,000,000. This increase to meet the new demands upon the corporation incident to the purchase by the Government of large stocks of wheat and flour. A huge crop of wheat is expected, and the Government deserves to be in a position to make purchases in whatever amount may be necessary to prevent competitive bidding that might bring about an increase over the present Government price of \$2.20 per bushe!.

Therefore, irrespective of whether or not taxes are materially increased, if the Germans are not more successful in the present drive than they were in the last offensive, a bull market might develop at any time, although all large money institutions, both in Canada and the United States, would sharply deprecate any uch movement. In the meanwhile, no matter what occurs, investors need have no hesitancy in making commitments in the securities of the railroad, equipment and the higher grade of motor companies, many of which represent attractive




