Paris, Feb. 14.—At the plenary session of the preliminary eace conference this afternoon at 3:30 p.m. at the Quai d'Orsai, President Wilson, as chairman of the commission on the league of nations, will read and explain the following report:

"Preamble: In order to promote international co-operation and to secure international peace and security by the acceptance of obligations not to resort to war, by the prescription of open, just and honorable relations between nations, by the firm astablishment of the understandings of international law as the actual rule of conduct among governments and by the maintenance of justice and a scrupulous respect for all treaty obligations in the dealings of organized people with one another, the powers signaory to this covenant adopt this constitution of the league of article.

Two Organizations in Siberia Equal Rights For Men and Women, Repatriation of German Prisoners of War and Establishment of a League of Nations Among Various Clauses of Governmental Plans.

> Copenhagen, Thursday, Feb. 13 .- The program of the new German Government, which has just been published at Berlin, includes equal rights for men and women, the improvement of the educational system, conscription along democratic lines to establish a people's army, rationwounded and the families of those killed during the war, the socialization of all industries ready for such treatment, particularly the coal and iron mines, and considerable additions to income taxes.

In the realm of foreign affairs, the program declares for peace along lines laid down by President Wilson, but refusing any peace of violence; for the repatriation of German prisoners of war, and for the establish ment of a league of nations, with disarmament and an obligatory court



#### ADVISABILITY OF HOME WORK FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN QUESTION THAT BRINGS OUT DIFFERENT OPINIONS

Inspector Frowns Upon the Work For Pupils Under the Fifth Grade-Necessity Under Regulations, Says the Collegiate Principal-Mothers Not in Favor.

"The teachers are not to blame."
was the opinion expressed by several citizens interested in education, who were interviewed this forenoon on a subject introduced in a letter written by Dr. J. I. Ferguson, which is published in The Advertiser today, the subject of too much home-work for boys and girls who are doing their growing up while being educated in the public and high schools. So far as the public schools are concerned, inspector Edwards speaks for them as follows:

"The closing of the schools during the epidemic has made the home work heavier this year, and the teachers are not to blame. They must cover the prescribed course. So far as the public school system is concerned, my experience with my own children has been that the amount of home work given depended largely upon the teacher. Some teachers could get over the ground with their classes; others were obliged to give home work."

"The advice is that the home work on the eighth grade be such as the pupil can prepare alone and compass within three-quarters of an hour.

Make Work Enjoyable.

"Our ideal in school work is to have the children enjoy it, and we are moving in the rational direction of giving them the subjects adapted to their mental capacity at a certain age. Modern developments in child study have ern developments in child study have must be 'fed' certain subjects required for their mental development at certain foods adapted to their physical development at certain ages, just as they are given certain foods adapted to their physical development at certain ages. Take spelling and arithmetic for example. These are not subjects adapted to the beginners who will find them hopeless mysteries. But the older child will assimilate them readily. We are moving in this direction, but it isn't possible to realize an ideal that all at once. As a result of observations for 40 years by members of the Mellwraith Ornithological Club, the following interesting facts have been compiled regarding the habits of birds that are to be seen in Canada during the summer months. A list of the dates of arrival of about 150 different species is also given, the observations having extended from one to forty years. The routes that are taken by the birds in their migratory courses are also dealt with in the following article which has been prepared. It is hoped by the members of the club that teachers and others will find the information both interesting and useful.

The Board of Health.


