### DIFFICULTIES ENCOUNTERED.

These gentlemen have managed to secure options at reasonable prices on some land. One site was offered on the London and Port Stanley Railway. But the company said that it would not locate there because there would be an interswitching charge to pay on practically every car used. At \$5 per car this would run into a considerable amount in a year, too much to suit a concern that works on close efficiency

The company went after another site adjacent to both railways by means of spurs. It was not a large tract, three acres or so, and overrun by hens and weeds at the present time. But the owner (loyal to the interests of his native city!) wanted \$12 000 for the site. The company demurred.







Paris, Feb. 15.—The food ministry has decided that from February 19 maximum prices are to be fixed throughout France for milk, butter and cheese. In the department of the Seine, including Paris, the price of milk must not exceed 10c for a litre—about a pint and three-quarters—if bought in a shop, or lic if delivered. The maximum prices for butter vary from \$1.12 to \$1.34 per kilo—roughly two pounds—according to the quality and source.



This is the first moving picture of the Canadian army in France, actually engaged in battle. It shows the Canadians in the attack of September 15-16 last, when, in conjunction with the imperial forces, they swept the Germans out of their fortified trenches, and villages on a total front of 23 miles and to a depth ranging up to six miles -the greatest gain of any single British operation during the war. The faces of the men will be recognizable in thousands of cases by people in London and throughout Canada. Children will see their "daddy," parents will see their boys-there will be friends, neighbors, sweethearts and relatives of the men on the screen in every theatre in Canada where the pictures are shown.

### 2nd—The Tanks

This is the first moving picture to reach this country showing the tanks - those wonderful new engines of war which the British threw into the battle on September 15 last. They were distributed along the line of attack where it was known the German lines were strongest and opposite the machine gun fortifications of the villages. Several of them were apportioned to the Canadian section, and the film shows them in action with our own soldiers. The world has wondered what sort of a thing a tank was. London is among the cities to see them on the screen simultaneously for the first time on this side of the Atlantic. The moving pictures show them in action, crossing No Man's Land, and scaring the Germans out of their dens in the trenches.






