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

There can be no scheme of legislative union for the Empire without a delegation of some of the powers now exercised by the self-governing colonies and they are not likely to sacrifice in any degree an autonomy which they have been gradually accumulating, often with great effort. The evolution of the Empire is in the opposite direction, and is more likely to take the form of the complete legislative independence of the several branches of the race, the crown remaining the only political tie. The people are descended from the same great city where there is a constant ap-German stock, their history is interwoven for centuries, they have been in the van of western civilization, and have always kept alive the spirit of liberty. The blood of the vikings runs in the veins of the modern Norwegian, and little Norway remains to this day a great maritime power.

From 1397 to 1523, Denmark, Sweden and Norway were under the same crown. Then Sweden achieved her independence, and Gustavas Vasa founded a line of great kings, who made Sweden one of the most foremost military powers of Europe. The last of the line died childless in 1810, whereupon the Swedes offered the crown to Marshall Bernadotte, of France, a man of humble origin. In 1814 Norway separated from Denmark, and placed herself under the crown of Sweden. The present King, Oscar II., is the fourth of the Bernadottes, and one of the most accomplished men in Europe. He enjoys a unique reputation as an international jurist and arbitrator. He has been a great influence in harmonizing the relations of Sweden and Norway, and his retirement from the active duties of the monarchy, which was announced a few days ago, awakens dismal forebodings. The Crown Prince, Oscar Gustaf Adolf, is 37 years of age, and has shown marked ability, but he has incensed the Norwegians by his minatory attitude in the present crisis. A trial of strength between the two kingdoms would be unequal on land. Sweden, with a population of over 5,000,000, has a field army of 40,-000 men with 240 guns, and a militia of 450,000 men. Norway has a population of 2,253,000, a regular army of 18,000 men, a trained force of 31,000, and a militia of 50,800. The navy of Norway is stronger proportionately than the army, but her great merchant marine would be an easy prey for Swedish ironclads. It is to be hoped these two brave and enlightened races will find a peaceful solution of their dif-

Niagara Fower.

The commission appointed by Western Ontario municipalities to investigate the Niagara power problem has submitted a report. It is estimated that the 375,000 horse power already in process of development on the Canadian side of the Falls will be considerably in excess of the demands for many years to come. The fact that the city of Toronto with all its lighting, electric railway and manufacturing de. mands upon power, consumes only in the region of 30,000-horsepower is a partial index of the margin between

NOT YET READY FOR SELF RULE

Parker Declares Africa Should Have Intermediate Form of Government.

Parker, M. P., this week outlined the measures which, in his opinion, must precede full self-government in South

Addressing a largely-attended meetin Caxton Hall, Westminster, er the auspices of the Imperial South African Association, he said: "The way to reconciliation lies in so ordering the course of administration in these anxious days that no false hopes can be roused on the part of those who were lately our enemies, and are now our fellow-citizens. From every standpoint of logic, reason and expediency, an intermediate form of government should be given. We should delay the course of enlarged administration until a line can be drawn diagonally through the two races on some matter of national policy, and parties composed of both races can be formed. It is necessary that the unorganized political forces of the British population shall find common ground for action and policy, and find their leaders also. It has been said that capital would rule if representative government were given, but that apprehension is not well founded. An elective representative assembly, with a selected fixed executive, composed of British and Boers—a coalition adminstration-would bridge over a difficult time, and would prevent domination either by British or Dutch. For full self-government there has been no good preparation, and there still exists a body of irreconcilables, whose object is to fan the flame of faction.'




