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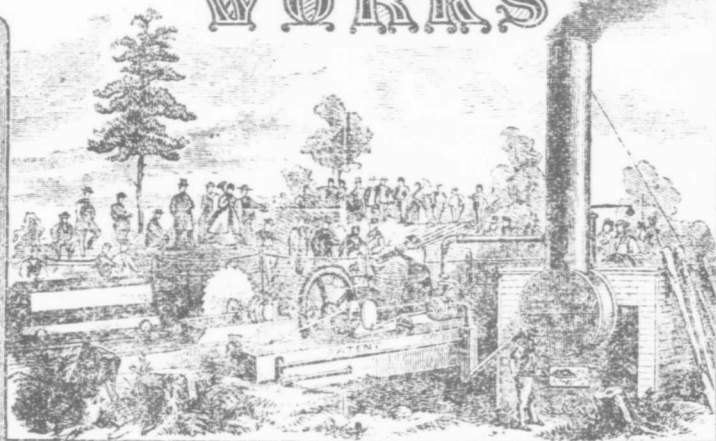
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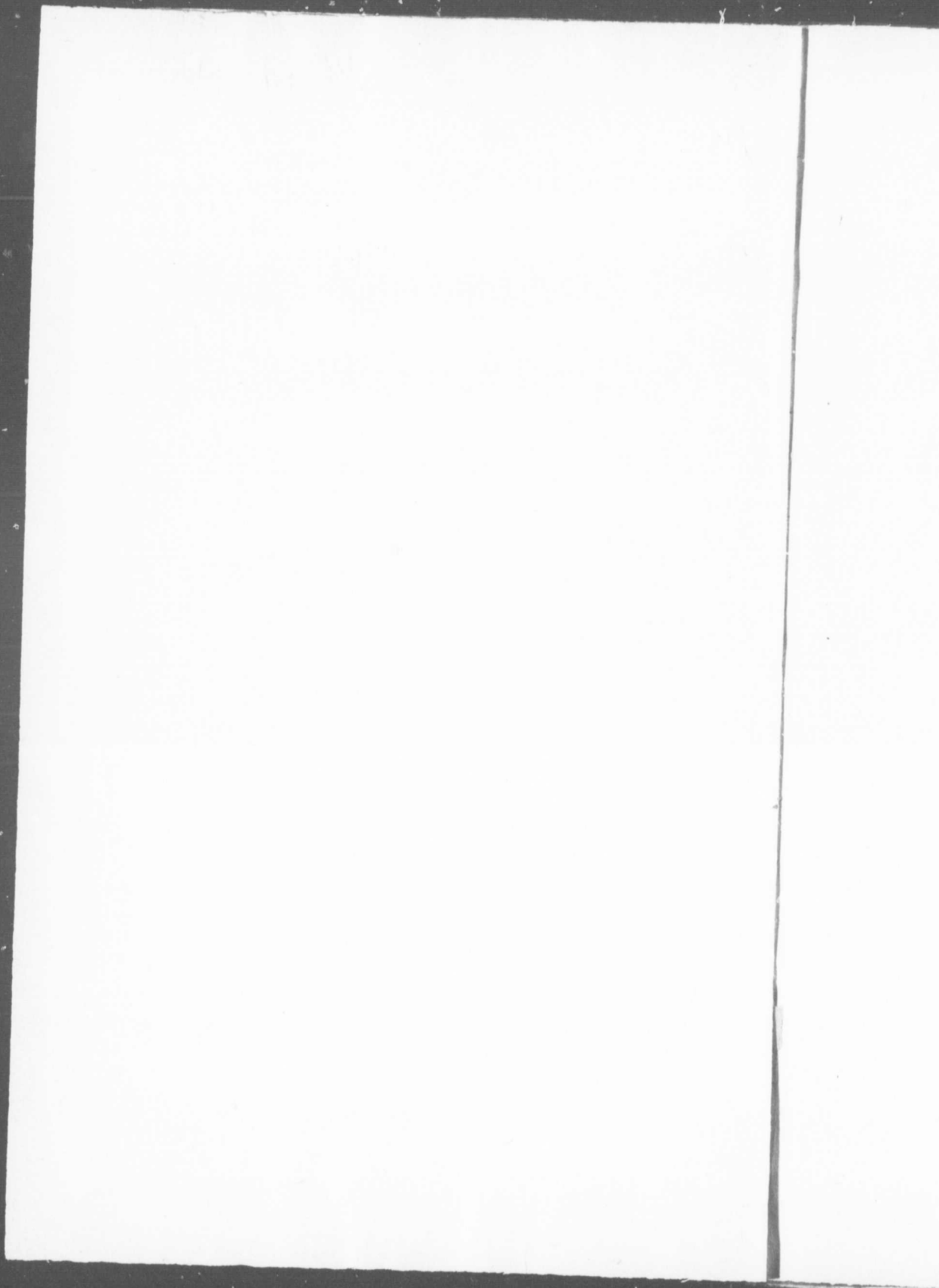


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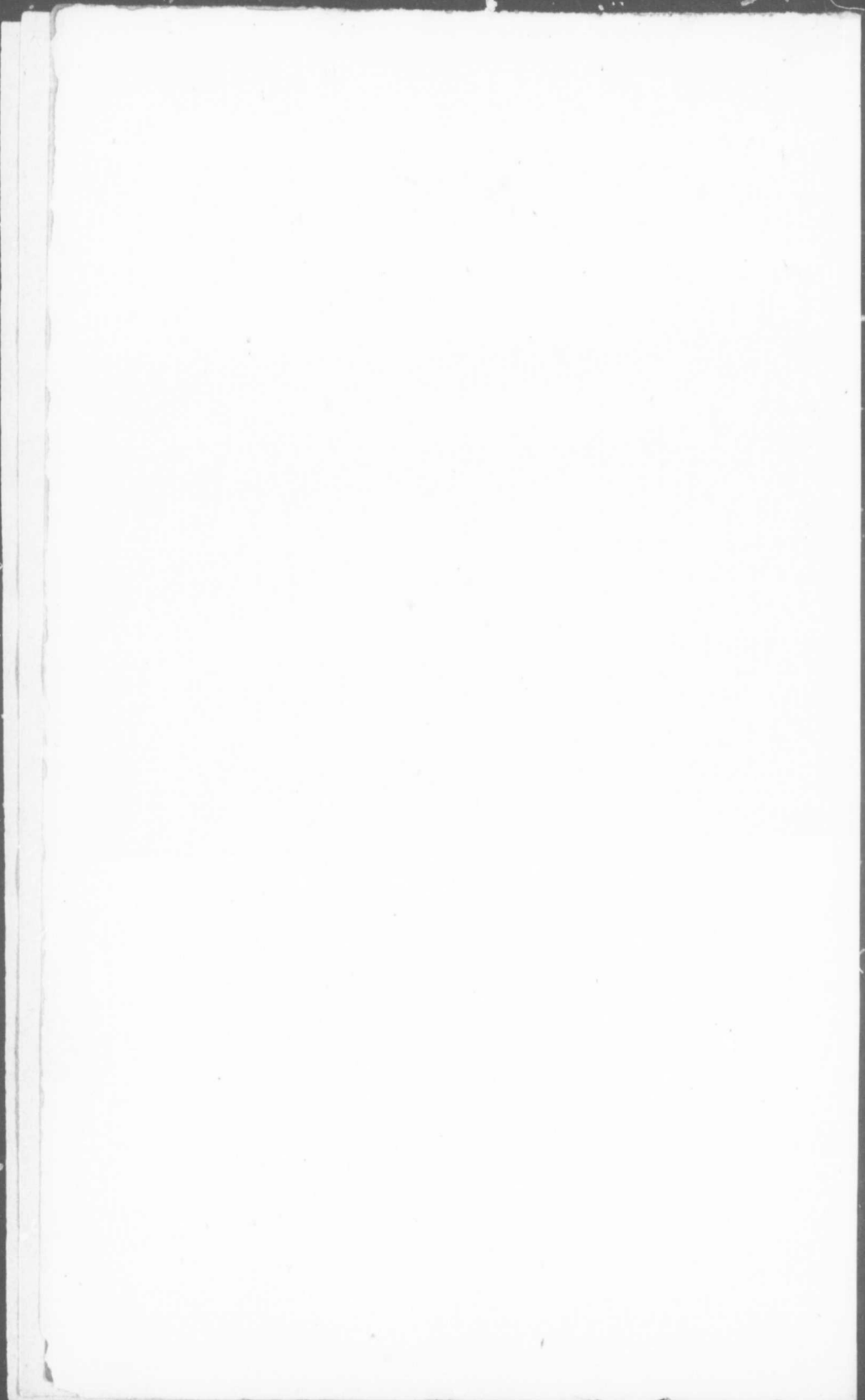

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PROVINCE OF CANADA.

Three centuries and a half have only passed since John and Sebastian Cabot discovered the portion of the continent of America to which the name of Canada has been given. It was still many years after this ere its territory was taken possession of or thought worthy of conquest. In the beginning of the sixteenth century the French took possession of the country, and attempted its colonization, with various and uncertain success. In the year 1540 Jacques Cartier was Captain-General, and Jean Francois de la Rocque, Lord of Roberval, Viceroy in Canada. The first endeavors of Roberval to settle the country were frustrated by the critical state of France at the time, and it was consequently some time afterwards that the attention of that country was drawn to the richness and extent of the fur trade of the colonies, which led to a vigorous and successful effort being made in colonizing this distant and hitherto neglected part of the French territory.

Britain was at this time energetically planting colonies, and during the wars that raged for many years between these rival States many unsuccessful attempts were made to conquer Canada, in which, however, Britain failed, till under the administration of the illustrious statesman, the Earl of Chatham, the country of Canada passed away from French rule. In the struggle that gained the country the brave General Wolfe fell just as he was assured he had won for his country a second Gibraltar, and an important and valuable colony.

On the eighth of September, 1760, the capitulation which transferred Canada from the Gulf of St. Lawrence to the unknown west, was signed—the Treaty of Paris—by which Canada was formally ceded to the British Crown, was signed on the tenth of February, 1763. From the overthrow of the French dominion to the division of the province into upper and lower sections, the colony experienced many vicissitudes. Many petty quarrels arose between the old French colonists and the new settlers of British origin. In 1774 the administration of justice and the affairs and government of the province generally underwent a radical, comprehensive and important change with a view to the tranquilization of the French and the encouragement of British immigration.

These constitutional changes were happily satisfactory both to the French and British colonists, and contributed in a great measure to the loyal attitude assumed by these provinces at the time the other thirteen British colonies to the south attempted and accomplished their severance from the mother country. Consequent upon the refusal of Canada to join the insurgents a double invasion of the country was determined upon, viz : by way of Lake Champlain and the Kennebec river. The insurgents were not successful in their attempts, and evacuated the country on the 18th of June, 1776, and until the termination of the struggle confined their operations to the defence of their own territory. This war was brought to a close in February, 1783, at which time the Treaty of Versailles was signed, recognizing the independence of the thirteen colonies, under the name of the United States of America.

From that time Canada began to prosper, retarded only by the difference of British and French habits, customs and notions of government, which eventually became so serious as to necessitate the passing of the Constitutional Act of 1791, by which Act the Province of Quebec was divided into Upper and Lower Canada.

Canada now found herself in possession of the fourth form of government in the short space of thirty-two years. From 1770 to 1773 she was ruled by martial law ; from 1773 to 1774 a tyrannical military government ruled the country ; from 1774 to 1791 a civil government of the most despotic cast was established, and in 1792 a new constitution was introduced, establishing freedom of election and responsibility to the people.

On the 17th December, 1792, the first Upper Canada parliament was convened at Niagara, being composed of 16 members, of which John Macdonald, of Glengarry, was speaker. By an Act of this parliament the names of the four Upper Canada districts (Luenburgh, Mecklenburgh, Nassau and Hesse) were changed into Eastern, Midland, Home and Western. An Act was also passed providing for the building of a gaol and court house in each of these districts. In the same year, during the administration of Col. John Graves Simcoe, the Province was divided into sixteen counties, which elected the representatives above alluded to as forming its first parliament.

The second session of the Upper Canada Parliament was held at York, (now Toronto,) at that time inhabited by only twelve families. During the administration of Lieutenant-Governor A. Gore, a Bill was passed determining the boundaries of the different townships and also an Act to establish public schools in every district of the Province (1807). Four years after this the first census of Upper Canada was taken, when the population amounted to seventy-seven thousand ; five thousand less than the combined population of the counties of Oxford and Norfolk at present.

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In 1812, while Britain was deeply involved in the struggles of Europe, against Napoleon, the United States declared war against her, and determined on the conquest of these provinces. After meeting, however, with complete defeat on land, and especially in the attempt to conquer Canada, the enemy continued the contest at sea, with more success. However, on the British being released from their engagements at home, and entering energetically and successfully into the war, the Americans were forced to propose terms of peace, ignoring the grounds of the war altogether. On the 24th of December, 1814, the Treaty of Ghent was signed. Thus, after two years' fighting, the war between Britain and the United States—in which both Upper and Lower Canada gave effectual proofs of their loyalty to the mother country—came to an end without any advantage being gained by either of the contending parties. From 1814 to 1829 the country was agitated by disputes between the "Family Compact" and the Reformers.

The political disputes and differences at last resulted in the unfortunate disturbance of 1837, headed by William Lyon McKenzie in Upper Canada, and by Papineau in the Eastern Section. The extreme measures taken by McKenzie, Papineau, and their followers can by no means be justified—yet it cannot be denied that grievances did exist, which, happily for the peace and progress of the country, have been redressed, and a new and popular character given to our institutions which challenge the admiration and respect of every class. On the 22nd of July, 1840, the Union Bill, providing for the re-union of the provinces, passed by both Houses: in January following it received the sanction of the Queen, and came into operation on the 10th of February, 1841. From the time of the union a marked and unprecedented progress has been made by the country. Her civil laws and institutions have been matured and perfected; her manufactures and commerce have increased, while public improvements have kept pace with the advancement in every other particular.

We have no space, in this brief summary, to notice the many interesting political changes that have from time to time occupied the attention of our legislature. The Confederation of the British American Provinces, now on the eve of consummation, is, no doubt, an event well calculated to subserve the interests of all sections, and is at once a wise and patriotic scheme for the consolidation of the British possessions on this continent.

Before closing our summary we cannot refrain from remarking upon the unjustifiable policy pursued in times past and at present by the United States, both in regard to the trade relations between the two countries, and in not controlling its citizens within the limits essential to the maintenance of peace, and the honorable performance of treaties solemnly entered into by them and the mother country. The lawless and wicked invasion of our

soil by American citizens in this present year, was an outrage unparalleled by anything but the events following the disturbance of 1837, and has again fanned into a flame the indignation existing in Canada against a power so manifestly regardless of all international obligations; and destroyed, to an alarming extent, the confidence the people of Canada may have entertained in the good faith of the American Government and public authorities. This is not at all surprising when we reflect that, for some time past we find an army created, troops enrolled, munitions of war provided, and money lavishly subscribed and paid, and a blow struck and threatened for the subjugation of the British Government here; or when we find laborers, mechanics, ministers of the gospel, magistrates, public officers, and leading statesmen of the great Republic actively and openly engaged, either in the preparation, or in the carrying out of the late atrocious and cowardly felony committed upon our peaceful people. At the same time it is gratifying to record the loyalty, firmness, and courage with which the invasion was met by every class of our citizens, and the unanimity and willingness with which Canadians bear the annoyances they are subjected to, rather than yield an inch of territory, or seek the protection of their powerful and grasping but unscrupulous neighbors.

COUNTY OF OXFORD.

This county, which began to be settled as early as the year 1793, during the *regime* of the first Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada, Colonel John Graves Simcoe, formed what was formerly called the Brock District. It is geographically of an inland position, being bounded on the north by the counties of Perth and Waterloo, on the east by the county of Brant, on the south by the counties of Elgin and Norfolk, and on the west by the county of Middlesex. Oxford, since its first formation, has undergone several alterations, which apparently seem to be an essential or rather unavoidable inconvenience in connection with the settlement of all new countries. It was at one time juridically attached to the county of Norfolk—under its denomination as the Gore District—but in consequence of the rapid increase of settlement and population in Upper Canada it became apparent that the formation and constitution of the different counties of the Province should be changed from their original divisions under the British Act of Parliament 31, Geo. 3, 1792. Consequently an Act of Parliament was passed for abolishing the territorial divisions of Upper Canada and for providing for temporary unions of counties for judicial and other purposes, which Act took effect from the first of January, 1850. Subsequently it was enacted by Statute 14 and 15, Victoria, chap. 5, that Oxford should be formed, and constituted a separate county, consisting of the following townships, viz: East Zorra, West Zorra, North Oxford, East Oxford, West Oxford, Dereham, Blenheim, Blandford, Norwich, and East Nissouri, and the town of Woodstock, comprising in territorial extent seven hundred and ten

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square miles. This was the last territorial change experienced by the county. Prior to 1840 the territory which is now the county of Oxford was included in the Western District, which was thus described by Surveyor-General Smith, in the year 1796: "It is bounded southerly by Lake Erie, easterly by a meridian passing through the eastern extremity of Long Point, and comprehends all the lands north-westerly of these boundaries not including within the bounds of the Hudson Bay Company or the territory of the United States: the boundary which divided it from Louisiana is not well known after reaching the sources of the Mississippi." The court house and gaol for the Western District was by Act of Parliament required to be built in Detroit. It will be remembered that previous to the Treaty of 1794 (taking effect in 1796) the Ohio and Mississippi formed a part of the boundary of Canada. By that Treaty the line was drawn to the middle of the lakes. By the British Act 31, George 3, chap. 31 heretofore alluded to, the Governor was empowered to divide the Province within two years into as many counties, &c., as he might see fit, and elect therefrom not less than sixteen members to compose the House of Assembly, in accordance with which power Governor Simcoe, on the 16th July, 1792, issued his proclamation dividing Upper Canada into the following counties, viz: Addington, Dundas, Durham, Essex, Frontenac, Glengarry, Grenville, Hastings, Kent, Leeds, Lennox, Lincoln, Norfolk, Northumberland, Ontario, Prince Edwards, Stormont, Suffolk and York, nineteen in number. The townships which now form the county of Oxford were attached to the counties of Norfolk and York—the townships of Burford, Oxford (which is now North, East and West Oxford) Norwich and Dereham being connected with the former county. In this proclamation the county of Norfolk was thus described; "On the north and east by the county of Lincoln and the River *la Tranche* (Thames), on the south by Lake Erie until it meets the Barbue (to be called the Orwell river), thence by a line running north sixteen degrees west, until it intersects the Thames up the said river, until it meets the north-west boundary of the county of York." The county of York, to which the townships of Blenheim and Blandford were attached, was described as follows: "Bounded on the east by the westernmost line of a tract of lands belonging to the Mississauga Indians, running north forty-five degrees, west to the River Thames, on the south side of Lake Geneva, (Burlington Bay), and a carrying place leading through the Mohawk village to where it intersects the river Thames, thence up the said river to the north-westernmost boundary of a tract of land belonging to the Mississauga Indians. In the year 1798 the tract of land of a triangular shape, then called the Townsend Gore, was made part of the township of Burford, and in the same year, by the same Act, it was enacted that the townships of Burford, Norwich, Dereham, Oxford upon the Thames, Blandford and Blenheim constitute the county of Oxford, and the counties of Oxford, Norfolk and Middlesex, with as much of the province as lay westward of the Home District and the District of Niagara, to the southward of Lake Huron,

and between them and a line drawn due north from a fixed boundary (where the easternmost limit of Oxford intersects the river Thames) till it arrives at Lake Huron, formed what was called the London District.

By an Act of Parliament passed in the year 1821 the gore of land then attached to the township of Burford was made a separate and distinct township, and named Oakland, and the townships of Zorra and Nissouri were added to the county of Oxford. And also the gore of land on the east side of the township of Norwich became a part of that township. The courts were held from the year 1800 to 1804 in the house of Mr. James Munro, township of Charlotteville, and were removed in the latter year to the house of Mr. James Lodor, Innkeeper, Turkey Point (an original governmental reservation for a town and garrison selected by Governor Simcoe), where they continued to be held until a gaol and court house were erected, the former of log and the latter of frame, at the expense of the District.

In pursuance of an Act of Parliament passed in 1815, the courts were removed from Turkey Point to the village of Vittoria, and were there held, first at the house of Mr. Thomas Finch and then at Mr. Matthias Steel's, until the year 1822, when the brick court house was completed, the estimated cost of which was \$9,000. In November, 1825, this building was destroyed by fire, after which two or three courts were held at some private house in Vittoria, and also several in St. Thomas, until a temporary court house was erected in London.

By Act, 7th William 4, chap. 3, passed in the year 1837, it was provided that so soon as a good and sufficient gaol and court house would be erected in the town of Woodstock for the security of the prisoners and the accommodation of the courts, it should be lawful for the Governor to declare by proclamation the following townships a separate and distinct district with the name of "Gore," viz: Zorra, Nissouri, Blandford, Blenheim, Oxford, Burford, Oakland, Norwich and Dereham, and the town of Woodstock.

This proclamation was issued November thirteenth, 1839, and in the year 1840 the first court for the district was held at Woodstock.

By an Act of Parliament passed in the year 1845, the townships of Blandford, Blenheim, Burford, Dereham, Nissouri, North Oxford, East Oxford, West Oxford, Oakland, Norwich, East Zorra, and West Zorra, formed the county of Oxford; and by an Act of Parliament subsequent to the abolition of districts (1849) the following townships and towns constituted the county, viz: East Zorra, West Zorra, North Oxford, East Oxford, West Oxford, Dereham, Blenheim, Blandford, Norwich and East Nissouri, and the town of Woodstock, since which the following municipalities have been added: the town of Ingersoll and the village of Embro.

In connection with the territorial changes above described we will trace the political history of the county.

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THE REPRESENTATION OF THE COUNTY.

The first Canadian Parliament was from the 15th October, 1792, to the 5th June, 1796, and the second from the 3rd July, 1797, to the 4th July, 1800. Who the representatives for the county during these two parliaments were we are unable to ascertain, as the records relating to these matters were consumed by the Montreal fire of 1849, and for the following list, which we have every reason to believe is correct and complete, we are indebted to the researches of Thomas S. Shenston, up to 1851.

The third Parliament was from the 9th July, 1801, to the 9th March, 1804, and the election of a representative to serve in this parliament for the counties of Oxford, Norfolk and Middlesex was held in the year 1800, at Averill's Mills, (now Waterford) in the township of Townsend, James Walsh was returning officer. The Hon. David William Smith and Richard Cockerell were the candidates, the former of whom was elected and appointed speaker of the House. It was during this parliament that the first Representative Act was passed. The provisions of this Act did not change the representation with regard to Oxford, Norfolk and Middlesex.

The fourth Parliament was from the 6th March, 1805, to March 16, 1808. The election of a member for the three counties was held at Turkey Point. The candidates were P. Mallory and Samuel Ryerse. Mr. Mallory was elected.

During the Parliament of 1808 a further alteration was made in the Representative Act, by which Norfolk was entitled to a representative itself, Oxford and Middlesex being still united. The fifth Parliament was from the 9th March, 1809, to the 6th March, 1812.

The sixth Parliament was from the 5th August, 1812, to the 1st April, 1816. The seventh Parliament was from the 8th February, 1817, to the 9th March, 1820. The member for the counties of Oxford and Middlesex for this parliament was Malon Burwell.

On the 7th of March, 1820, during the fifth session of this parliament, an Act was passed providing that every county containing a population of one thousand should be entitled to a representative in the legislature, and such counties as contained four thousand two representatives. The population of the county of Oxford as then constituted amounted to two thousand four hundred and fifty-five, which, under the above Act, entitled it to one member.

The eighth parliament was from the 14th of April, 1821 to the 19th January, 1824. The election was held July 8th, 1820, when the late Thomas Horner was elected the first representative of the county of Oxford. The election was held at the old "Canfield place," East Oxford—Colonel Bowen, Returning Officer; Colonel G. W. Whitehead, Poll Clerk.

"Thomas Horner, the first white settler in the county, was born March 17, 1767, at Bordentown, New Jersey, then a colony of Great Britain; was

married in 1801, by Col. James Ingersoll, J. P., and died in Burford, August 4th, 1834, of Cholera. His uncle, Thomas Watson, had, during the Revolutionary war in the United States, rendered Colonel Simcoe some essential service, after he had been taken prisoner by the Americans—this service was not forgotten by him when he was appointed Governor of Upper Canada (1792); for soon after his arrival he wrote to Mr. Watson, and not only most pressingly urged him to come himself, but “to bring all his friends and relations with him, and promised them a whole township.” The Governor being not only anxious to reward him for past services, but equally anxious to get the Province settled by individuals from the United States, Mr. Watson, relying on a Governor’s promise, sent his son, Thomas Watson, to the county of Oxford, in company with his cousin, the late Thomas Horner, in the year 1793, before even a surveyor’s chain had jingled in its woods; and probably they were the first white persons who ever trod its soil.

To accommodate them, the Governor had ordered that the three first concessions of the Township of Blenheim should be at once surveyed.—Surveyor Jones and his Indian party arrived while they were there, to survey out those concessions, and they waited while that was done, and selected a site for a mill, and returned, Mr. Watson with the intention of not coming back, and Mr. Horner intending doing so. At the time of this, their first visit, the nearest white settler east was where Brantford now stands, and the nearest one west where Chatham now stands.

Mr. Horner resided for some time in Newark, (Niagara) and then moved to the town of Detroit, and remained there until that town was formally given up by the British government, then in possession, to the American General, Wayne, in 1796. Mr. Horner then proceeded to the town (now city) of Albany, N. Y., to purchase the material and engage the mechanics to erect his saw-mill—the first erected in the county of Oxford. He packed his goods in two small, roughly-made boats, which he launched on the river Hudson, near Albany, proceeded up the Hudson to the river Mohawk, and up said river about 100 miles; then carried their goods and boats across to the Norvel creek, thence down the Norvel creek to lake Oneida, across the lake to the Oswego river; thence into Lake Ontario, along the Southern coast of that lake to the Burlington Bay beach; drew their boats through a small outlet of the bay, and then proceeded across the bay and landed, all safe, near where Dundurn castle now stands. The boats were then made fast for future use, and the goods drawn by oxen, on roughly-made sledges, to their destination in Blenheim. The mill was got up and in working order in the latter part of 1795. It had not been run at all before the dam broke away,—and from the scarcity of hands, it could not be rebuilt till 1797, in which year the first plank was sawed.—

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The house—the old “homestead,”—since occupied by Henry Horner, J.P., is built of boards sawed at this mill. Mr. Horner erected a grist-mill, also, the first erected in the county. This was accidentally burned down in 1809, and never rebuilt. The place where these mills were erected is now the present saw-mill of Mr. Liel Martin, near the Governor's road, just west of Princeton.

When these mills were erected, Mr. Horner was in a position to claim the township of Blenheim, he having, at a very great loss, faithfully performed his part of the contract—in fact he was in actual possession of the township, as possessions were given in those days—but Governor Simcoe's successor would not acknowledge his claim; and he was most completely and shamefully, with very many others, “chiselled” out of his township, because it had become saleable at some trifling price, through his means and expense.

On the 22nd day of March, 1798, Mr. Horner was appointed captain of the Norfolk militia, and on the 16th day of June, 1806, he was appointed Deputy-Lieut. of the county of Oxford; yet, in the commencement of the war of 1812 he was represented to Gen. Brock as a person not to be trusted, not very loyal, and Ersign H. Bostwick, of an adjoining county, (Norfolk) was appointed Lieut.-Colonel over the Oxford Militia, and he left unemployed. Mr. Horner's principal reason for leaving the United States was his great attachment to the British Crown, and like a *true* British loyalist, he watched his opportunity, not to revenge himself on any of the very *lip* loyal by whom General Brock was surrounded, for the indignity shown him, but to render his country *any* assistance in *any* way, and in *any* capacity. With a “will” so good, a “way” was soon found. Several unsuccessful attempts had been made by different parties to get the Grand River Indians to join the expedition then being formed by Gen. Brock to attack Detroit. Col. Norton, the Indian agent, could only muster nine men. Mr. Horner, knowing his own influence with the Indians, eagerly caught at this opportunity, immediately proceeded to the Grand River, collected 75 Indian warriors, and marched to the scene of action, notwithstanding the American General, Hall, had issued his proclamation, refusing to give quarter to any white man found fighting beside an Indian.—Even under these circumstances he was recognized only when there was thought to be something to do. After remaining on the enemy's frontier for two or three weeks, he was dismissed and sent home, or rather toward home, for he and his men had only proceeded as far as Pike's Creek, on Lake St. Clair, when he was summoned back in great haste by General Proctor, William Jones being the bearer of the order. This summons was instantly obeyed, and he and his men returned to the frontier and remained there until discharged a second time. *The whole expense of*

this expedition was paid for out of his own pocket, nor was he ever paid one penny of it back.

Again, in the following winter, when General Winchester was advancing against Detroit to re-take it, Mr. Horner shouldered his musket, took his place in the ranks as a private, and so remained until duly discharged. A question very naturally arises here: where can we find any such display of *real* loyalty by any of his *lip*-loyal defamers who surrounded the Governor?

In connection with his parliamentary conduct, one little incident, we think, ought to be mentioned. Just before the passage of the "Alien Act," which caused such intense excitement throughout the province at the time, Mr. Horner called a meeting of his constituents, and addressed them as follows:—"Gentlemen, I wish to know how you desire me to vote on this bill, and I will vote just as I am instructed by you; but mind, if you say I shall support the bill, I will do so, because there is not time to elect another member before the vote is taken, *but I never will come to the county of Oxford again.* I shall give my vote as you direct, leave the House and the country, send for my family, and never return again." He was directed to oppose the bill.

The two beautiful poplar trees, so much admired, in front of the "old homestead," near the Governor's road, in the township of Burford, were brought by Mr. Horner, from Fort Erie, in 1808, in the shape of a riding-whip. On arriving at home, (Blenheim) he broke his riding-whip into three or four pieces, and stuck each piece in the ground, three of which lived. On his removal, in August, 1811, two of them were transplanted to the place they now occupy, to outlive their transplanter.

The Ninth Parliament was from the 17th January 1825, to the 7th May, 1828. At this time it was found that Oxford had increased in population, sufficiently to entitle it to two representatives, when Thos. Horner was re-elected, and Col. Chas. Ingersoll was elected for the first time. The election was held at "Martin's old Stand," Col. G. W. Whitehead returning officer.

The Tenth Parliament was from the 20th March, 1829, to the 6th March, 1830. The election of members for this county took place in July, 1828, at Henry Carroll's, West Oxford. Col. Horner, Finley Malcolm, and Col. Ingersoll were candidates, the two former of whom were elected. In consequence of the demise of George IV., this Parliament was dissolved; and the Eleventh was from the 16th March, 1831, to the 6th March, 1834. The election for this county was held at Martin's Stand, in the year 1831. Charles Ingersoll, Dr. Charles Duncombe, and Thomas Horner, were the candidates, the two former were elected; but in consequence of the death of Mr. Ingersoll (1832,) a vacancy took place, and Mr. Horner was again and for the last time elected, having died of cholera in August 1834.

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The Twelfth Parliament was from the 16th April, 1835, to the 20th April, 1836. The election for this county was held at Ingersoll, on the 6th October, 1834; James Ingersoll, returning officer. The candidates were Dr. Charles Duncombe, nominated by Col. G. W. Whitehead; Robert Alway, nominated by Jacob Patrick; and Finlay Malcolm, nominated by Charles Lates, the two former were elected. This Parliament only held two sessions, when it was dissolved by Sir Francis Bond Head.

The Thirteenth Parliament was from the 4th March, 1837, to the 10th Feb., 1840. The election was held in the fall of 1836, at "Martin's Old Stand."—The candidates were Robert Alway, Dr. Charles Duncombe, Col. G. W. Whitehead, and James Ingersoll; of these the two former were elected.

In 1838 a vacancy occurred in consequence of Dr. Duncombe's having been expelled from the house, and R. H. Hunter was elected. The election was held at "Martin's Old Stand." He was opposed by Peter Carroll; Sheriff Hamilton was returning officer.

After the union of Upper and Lower Canada, the first Parliament was from July 1st, 1841, to the 9th December, 1843. The election for this county was held at Woodstock on the 15th March, 1841; James Ingersoll returning officer. The candidates were Francis Hincks, editor of the *Examiner*, Toronto, and Peter Carroll, of West Oxford.

Mr. Hincks was shortly after appointed Inspector General, and was in consequence obliged to vacate his seat and return for re-election. This election, which was contested by John Armstrong, of Zorra, took place on the 14th of July, 1842. John Armstrong closed the poll at noon on the third day, at which time the poll books showed a majority of 218 for Mr. Hincks. This Parliament did not sit out its full term but was dissolved by Lord Metcalfe in 1844; but previous to its dissolution a new election law was passed, the principal features of which were the requiring of a poll to be opened in each township, and also simplifying the election oath. The second Parliament was from December 20th, 1844, to the 28th of July, 1847. The election, which was the first held under the provisions of the new election law, for this county was held in October 1844. Edward Merigold was Returning Officer. The contest was between the Hon. Francis Hincks and Robert Riddle. The nomination took place in the Court House, Woodstock, on Friday the 18th of October, and the polls were opened in the several townships on the Wednesday and Thursday following, which at the close stood as follows in the several municipalities:—

Showing a majority of 20 for Mr. Riddle. Mr. Hincks finding himself excluded from Parliament, established a newspaper in the city of Montreal—the *Pilot*—in which he strenuously vindicated the justice of those views and actions which caused him to lose his seat for this county; and at the next general election which took place in 1847 he again became a candidate, and was opposed by Peter Carroll, then of Hamilton. The nomination was held in the Court House, Woodstock, on the 21st of December, John G. Vansittart returning officer. Polling days were Saturday the 30th of December and Monday the 1st of January. Mr. Hincks, during the election, was absent, having gone to Europe previous to the dissolution, but had taken the precaution—having anticipated a dissolution—of leaving his qualification with Mr. Shenston before he went, to be used in the event of an election taking place before his return. He had a majority of 346 votes; but Mr. Vansittart returned Mr. Carroll duly elected in consequence of Mr. Hincks not being present on the day of nomination to make declaration of qualification as demanded; however, Mr. Carroll was unseated by a majority in the House. Mr. Hincks having again accepted the office of Inspector General was obliged to return for re-election; and on Thursday the 25th of April 1848 the nomination took place at Woodstock, when he was unanimously elected representative for this county. This Parliament sat its full term, during which further amendments were made to the election law, by which the Sheriffs of the several counties are *ex-officio* returning officers of their respective counties; and township clerks *ex-officio* returning officers of their respective townships. Polls to be open two days, from nine o'clock in the forenoon until five o'clock in the afternoon. The first session of the 4th Parliament met on the 19th of August 1851. The election for this parliament was held in December, the nomination took place at Woodstock on Tuesday the 15th of November, James Carroll, Sheriff, returning officer. The Hon. Francis Hincks was opposed in this election by John G. Vansittart. The former was nominated by Benjamin VanNorman, of Dereham, seconded by E,

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Malcolm, of Oakland; and the latter by John Jackson, of Blenheim, and seconded by Robert Cameron, of Nissouri. At the close of the polls the result was as follows :—

Majority for Hincks 79. Previous to the next general election, which took place in the year 1854, the County of Oxford by act of Parliament was divided for electoral purposes into two distinct Ridings—North and South—the former comprising the following municipalities, viz: Blenheim, Blandford, East and West Zorra, East Nissouri, and the town of Woodstock; and the latter comprising North and South Norwich, Dereham, East, West and North Oxford, and the village of Ingersoll. At this election in the South Riding there were three candidates, Hincks, Miller and Carroll, the former of whom was elected, having received 489 votes, Miller 189, and Carroll 9.

The election in the North Biding resulted in the unanimous choice of D. Matheson, at that time warden of the county, he being, with the exception of Horner and Hincks, up to this time the only representative of the county who received this unusual mark of popularity. This Parliament sat the longest period of any for several years, and at the general election which took place for the next House in 1857 the candidates for the South Riding were Dr. Cook, Bodwell, Gourlay, Connor, Mason, Van Norman, Ball and Closter. At the close of the last day's polling the votes given for the several candidates were in North Norwich for Cook 414, Connor 43, Ball 32, and Bodwell 9; in West Oxford for Cook 3, Bodwell 10, Connor 196, Mason 55, Ball 33; Ingersoll for Cook 3, Bodwell 11, Connor 290, Mason 1, and Ball 59; South Norwich, Cook 11, Bodwell 1, Connor 3, and Ball 349; North Oxford, Bodwell 6, Connor 153, Mason 31 and Ball 39; East Oxford, Cook 139, Bodwell 3, Connor 175, Mason 3, and Ball 12; Dereham, Cook 7, Bodwell 67, Connor 120, and Ball 458. As will be seen from summing up the votes for the several candi-

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dates, the contest was chiefly between Connor and Ball, the former of whom was elected by one of a majority. This election was contested in the North Riding by D. G. Miller, D. Matheson and George Brown, publisher and proprietor of the *Toronto Globe*, who was elected by a large majority. Mr. Brown was elected at the same time as one of the representatives of Toronto, the seat for which he accepted, necessitating a new election for this Riding. The candidates were Hon. Joseph C. Morrison and Wm. McDougall, and the votes in the several municipalities at the close of the second day's polling stood as follows :

In 1858 a new election took place in the South Riding, in consequence of Dr. Connor accepting office in the Brown-Dorion Government. He was opposed by Mr. S. Richards, but succeeded in securing his election by a large majority. Mr. Gourlay also appeared as a candidate, but did not succeed in securing one vote.

The next general election took place in 1861. Dr. Connor and Stephen Richards, Q. C., were again the candidates in the South Riding. Dr. Connor was elected.

In the North Riding, Isaac Buchanan, M.P.P., of Hamilton, contested the election with Mr. McDougall, but, as will be seen from the state of the polls in the several municipalities, was defeated after one day's polling, by a very large majority :

Mr. McDougall, in consequence of accepting the appointment of Commissioner of Crown Lands, previous to the dissolution of this Parliament had to return for re-election, and, although his actions in this particular

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did not entirely coincide with the views of his constituents; still he was once more elected the representative of this Riding without opposition.

The next general election took place in 1863. The candidates in the South Riding were the Hon. George Brown and E. V. Bodwell, the former of whom was elected by a majority of 244. Number of votes for Bodwell, 805; for Brown, 1050.

The candidates in the North Riding were Hope F. McKenzie, of Lambton, and John Barwick, of the township of Blandford—the former of whom was elected by a majority of over two hundred. In this year [1863] another general election took place. In the South Riding the contest was between the Hon. George Brown and Dr. Cook, of Norwichville. The former was elected by a very large majority; and in the North Riding Hope F. McKenzie was elected without opposition; but in consequence of his death, which took place at his residence in Sarnia, on the 4th day of June, 1866, the writ for a new election was issued, and the candidates were Thomas Oliver, of Woodstock, and Dr. Clark, of Princeton, the former of whom was elected. We deem it unnecessary to refer to the circumstances in connection with this election, they being fresh in the memory of all.

The Hon. Geo. Brown having accepted the appointment of President of the Council in the Coalition Government of 1864 was obliged to return once more to the South Riding for re-election, and was returned without opposition.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

In 1858 the election for a member to the Legislative Council for the Gore Division, comprising the North Riding of the county of Oxford and the South Riding of the county of Waterloo, took place. The candidates were George Alexander and James Cowan, the former of whom was elected by a majority of 53 votes. The following shows the state of the polls in the several municipalities:

DISTRICT COUNCILS.

The first District Council met on Thursday, the 8th of February, 1842, in the Court House, Woodstock, in pursuance of Act 4th and 5th Victoria, chap. 10, by which a meeting of the council was required to be held in the months of February, May, August and November, on the second Tuesday of each. This Act also provided that no meeting should be longer than 6 days, subject to be dissolved by the Governor-General at his discretion, who had also the appointing of warden, treasurer and clerk. Each Township had to elect one councillor, and townships having over 300 freeholders and householders, two. Councillors were elected for three years. There were also two auditors appointed annually. The Hon. Peter Boyle deBlacquiere was the first District Warden, Wm. Lapenotiere clerk, H. C. Barwick treasurer, and James Cull surveyor. In 1846 an amendment was made to the District Council Act, by which councillors were not allowed more than 6s 3d for each day's actual attendance; also the power to appoint annually one of themselves Warden—to appoint their own clerk and treasurer—only two meetings to be held in each year, to commence on the first Tuesday in the months of February and October, and not to be held for a longer period than 9 successive days, &c. Jared Vining, of Missouri, was the first Warden appointed under the provisions of the new Act. In 1849, when Districts were abolished, further amendments were made to the above Act, by which the Reeves and deputy-Reeves of the several municipalities composed the county council. Benjamin Van Norman, of Dereham, was the first County Warden (1850), H. C. Barwick treasurer,

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and T. S. Shenston, clerk. Previous to the establishment of municipal councils monies were granted from time to time for public improvements. In 1806 £1,600 was appropriated for the improvement of the "Old Stage Road," the leading highway through the Province, from the Eastern to the Western District. How judiciously these appropriations were expended we cannot say, but one thing is certain, that not until the county had the management of its own local affairs, were public improvements prosecuted with vigor and success, and the county of Oxford will now, in this particular, compare favorably with any other in the Province. The construction of the Great Western Railway has been of incalculable advantage to this, as well as every other county in Canada through which it passes, affording every facility for transportation—so essential to the progress and prosperity of an inland county like Oxford. The amount of stock subscribed by this county was £25,000; and it was not until the road was fully completed, and in operation, that its advantages became apparent; and the exertions of the Hon. Francis Hincks and Mr. John Barwick, of Blandford, in behalf of the company were appreciated by the public.

EDUCATION.

In the very important matter of education, the progress effected in the county of Oxford is gratifying, having now the advantage of a liberal and permanent provision for the general and thorough education of its rising population, fully enjoying the privileges and benefits conferred by the excellent School Act for Upper Canada of 1850. The first Common School Act for Upper Canada, which was passed in the year 1816, provided that the inhabitants of any town, township, or village, might meet each year on the first day of June, and so soon as they would unite and build or provide a school house, and engage to furnish twenty or more scholars, they might appoint three persons to be trustees of such school, with power and authority to appoint a teacher, and examine him as regards his qualification, moral character, &c. Such teacher, when once appointed, could not be discharged by the trustees, unless sanctioned by the District Board of Education. Trustees were invested with power and authority to make rules and regulations for the government of the school, subject to the approval of the Board of Education, which was composed of five persons selected by the Governor General. From this period to the passing of the present School Act, [12th Victoria, Chap. 83] several changes took place. In 1839 there were only nine public schools in the county, and the total number of pupils attending those schools was 231. The last official report shows an increase since that time, of 104 schools, there being at present 113 in the county, with an aggregate of 12,797 pupils.

The Grammar School, which has, since 1846, been taught by the present highly esteemed head master, Mr. George^s Strauchon, was established

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in the year 1843. The building cost \$2,000. Of this \$780 was granted by government, and the balance made up by subscription.

In addition to the County Grammar School there is now a good Grammar School in connection with the Ingersoll Common School, which is taught by the Rev. J. G. Magill.

Receipts and Expenditures of Common School Monies for the year 1864.

The annual appropriation, and paid by the Department of Public Instruction from the Legislative grant for the salaries of teachers, was for the county \$4,760; in the town of Woodstock \$400, for Ingersoll \$233, in the village of Embro \$66. The amount apportioned and paid for the purchase of maps, apparatus, prizes and libraries being in proportion and equal to the amount expended from local sources, was for the county \$252 12; for the town of Woodstock \$20, for Embro \$7 50.

The law requires that each municipality shall provide a sum by assessment at least equal to the Legislative grant, but each municipality can provide as large an additional sum as it may think proper for school purposes. The amount provided by municipal assessment was for the county \$38,342 80; in the town of Woodstock \$2,757 08, in Ingersoll \$2,232 09, in the village of Embro \$562 56. As the council in the municipality so the trustees in the school section have authority to provide money for the support of their school or schools by assessment, and also by fees on pupils unless the ratepayers decide in favor of a free school.

Total amount received from Legislative aid and local sources, was for the county \$43,405; for the town of Woodstock, \$4,217 08; for the town of Ingersoll, \$3,156 09; for Embro, \$636 06. The amount available from the balances of the preceding year was in the county, \$764 59; in the town of Woodstock, \$492 81; in Ingersoll, \$998 43.

EXPENDITURE.—Total expenditure for all common school purposes for 1864, was in the county, \$42,590 33.

REGISTRY OFFICE.

In the year 1800 a registry office was established for the counties of Oxford and Middlesex, in pursuance of an Act passed in August, 1795, and Thomas Horner, the first representative of the county, received the appointment of Registrar. The office was kept at his residence in Burford. The fees for the first year only amounted to about eight dollars, there being but three deeds recorded, the first was for a lot in Burford. Mr. Horner was Registrar of the two counties for about 18 years, and of the County of Oxford up to the time of his death (1834), when James Ingersoll, the present Registrar, received the appointment, and kept the office at Ingersoll, until 1847, when it was removed to Woodstock, the county town. The late (1865) changes in the Registry Law will be found in another part of the work.

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COURTS.

On the 23rd of December, 1839, in consequence of the building of a suitable gaol and court house in the town of Woodstock, this county was set apart as a separate district by the name of Brock. John Arnold was judge of the District Court till 1845, when the present judge, D. S. McQueen, was appointed, and acted in that capacity till the abolition of districts, and is at present judge of the County Court.

COUNTY COURT.—This Court is presided over by the resident Judge in the county. Its jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed \$200, and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties, or signature of the defendant to \$400, and to all bail bonds or recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to any amount; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. The County Court also possesses equity powers to the amount of \$200, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

County Court Terms commence on the first Monday in January, April, July and October, and end the following Saturday.

COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.—This Court is held four times a year for trials by Jury, in cases of larceny, misdemeanour and other offences.

SURROGATE COURT.—The jurisdiction of This Court relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of Probate of Wills and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons, having estate or effects in the county, and all matters arising out of, or connected with, the grant or revocation of Probate or Administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

LAW CIRCUITS.—The Circuits are held twice a year in each County, between Hilary and Easter Terms, and between Trinity and Michaelmas Terms, and the Courts are held in the towns of Simcoe, Brantford, Guelph, Berlin, Stratford, Woodstock and Cayuga.

Clerk of Assizes.—Deputy Clerk of the Crown, *ex officio*.

DIVISION COURTS.—These Courts (which in 1841 superceded the "Courts of Request," established in 1792, which had jurisdiction in cases under \$40, and were presided over by commissioned magistrates,) are held in different places in the county, for the summary disposal of cases not exceeding \$100 in amount so far as regards matters of debt or contract, and \$40 so far as relates to injuries to personal chattels and torts. A jury is permitted in certain cases. Attachments against personal property of debtors absconding from the Province, leaving property liable to execution, or removing their goods from one county to another, or from the Province with intent to defraud, or keeping concealed to avoid service of process with intent to defraud, may be issued by the Clerk of

the Division Court, or by the Judge, or by any Justice of the Peace. Their jurisdiction does not extend to actions for gambling debts, liquors drank in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejection, title to land, etc., or any toll, custom or franchise, Will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction or breach of promise, or actions against a Justice of the Peace for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in each Division or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Court of Quarter Sessions. A plaintiff as well as a ^{defendant} can remove suits out of a Division if nearer another.

North Oxford and West Zorra Gravel Road.—From Beachville, through Embro, to the 20th lot, 4th concession, on the direct Stratford Road.

Woodstock and Huron Gravel Road.—From Woodstock, and running on the twelfth line of East Zorra, to the northern boundary line of the County.

Ingersoll and Brantford Plank Road.—From Ingersoll, through Woodstock and Paris to Dundas.

London and Hamilton Road.—This is an excellent macadamized road, and well kept, and of such breadth as to admit of the passage side by side of two teams.

Brantford and Norwich Plank Road.—Running north from Otterville to Norwichville, thence in a north-easterly direction through Burford.

Woodstock and Otterville Plank and Gravel Road.—From Woodstock, through East Oxford, North and South Norwich, running south to Springford.

The Otterville and Port Dover Plank and Gravel Road.

Woodstock and Dereham Gravel Road.—Running from Woodstock to Sweaborg.

Ingersoll and Port Burwell Plank and Gravel Road.—Passing through the villages of Salford, (four miles from Ingersoll); Mount Elgin, 7 miles; Campbelltown, 14, and Tilsonburg 15.

The Dereham, Ingersoll and Dorchester Gravel Road.—Running through the villages of Culloden and Brownsville.

The above statistics being from the census report of 1861, do not show (even when the usual ratio of progress is calculated) the present number of pounds of cheese manufactured or the amount of flax and hemp raised, as these two articles have lately increased in production to a very great extent.

GENERAL REMARKS.

In addition to the foregoing information included under the territorial, political, municipal and educational history of the county, there are yet some facts and statistics that can be noticed, tending to show the progress and resources of this section, which we will give in this general review of the county. A correct estimate of the growth and prosperity of Oxford can be obtained by comparing the facts and information relating to it in years past with those of the present, from which we will see evidences of substantial progress and improvement, at once gratifying and satisfactory to those who have been its pioneers, and to the numerous and intelligent population who have since made it their homes. Our population has rapidly increased; our mills and manufactories have multiplied; our hamlets have grown into towns, and our rural districts have been transformed from dense forests into garden-like farms, while the log huts of the early settlers have given place to the comfortable and beautiful dwellings of the well-to-do and enterprising yeomen of to-day.

One of the greatest boons to this county is undoubtedly the construction of the Great Western Railway, affording as it does a cheap and rapid communication between it and distant markets, which its inland position renders desirable and necessary, and without which its native richness and resources would yet remain undeveloped to the present extent. In proof of the rapidity with which the county progressed subsequent to the opening of the railway, it may be stated that there were only 80,491 acres under cultivation in 1848, while the last report places the number at 231,058. The value of rateable property in 1844 was \$1,001,376, which had increased in 1861 to \$13,325,779, exclusive of the townships of Oakland and Burford, which were included in the former report. In population we find a like rapid increase. In 1842, the population of the county (including Oakland and Burford) was only 16,271; in 1851 it was 31,448, and in 1861 46,185; since which time it has increased in an equal ratio. The number of bushels of wheat raised in 1852 was 611,252; the number of bushels in 1861 was 1,044,136, at the same time that other grains have been cultivated to a much greater extent than formerly, and a greater area is occupied as hay and pasture land, in consequence of the numerous and extensive dairies which in the last few years have been established in the county, making it one of the leading and chief cheese manufacturing counties in the Province. The many streams that intersect the county in every direction furnish abundant water-power for manufacturing purposes, and exercise their fertilizing influence upon its soil, which is of excellent quality, perhaps the finest in the Province, being of great depth and fertility, and consisting, in some localities, of a rich sandy loam, and in others of a clayey nature mixed with gravel. The land in the county of Oxford is in general of a rolling and undulating appearance, and along the valley of the Thames is unrivalled in Canada

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for picturesque and beautiful scenery. The county of Oxford is altogether in a high state of cultivation, and the farm houses evince a degree of taste and wealth seldom seen in other parts of the Province.

NEWSPAPERS OF THE COUNTY.

Periodical literature seems to have had its rise in this county about the year 1840, when the late Mr. Menzies, in company with Mr. Walker, now of Howick, entered upon the publication of the *Herald* newspaper. The partnership with Mr. Walker lasted but a brief period, and the task of conducting an independent journal fell upon Mr. Menzies. That gentleman possessed rare abilities as a poet, but was not particularly successful as a politician; and after his death the *Herald* ceased. Contemporaneous with the *Herald* was published the *Monarch*, a paper started by Mr. Rodgers, and owned by a company. It was the advocate of extreme Tory views, and in matters ecclesiastical was recognized as the organ of the High Church party. Its views in both spheres denied it any scope of circulation or any usefulness, and after a sickly existence of about six years it ceased. The *Star*, published by Hay and Egan, was the next, but lived only a very short time. About 1846 the *British American* and the *Western Progress* were started, the former as a company concern, and the latter by Mr. Geo. Laycock. The *British American*, in 1854, was united with the *Progress*, and became the *Gazetteer*, and continued a useful paper until the *Sentinel* and *Times* monopolized the field, the former started by the Messrs. McWhinnie, and the latter by Mr. McCleneghan. The *Conservative*, started in 1863 by Hay and Lusted, never got a footing, and died after three months.

In Ingersoll the *Chronicle* was started in 1852 by Mr. John Blackburn, of Paris, and about two years after passed into the hands of its present publisher, Mr. J. S. Gurnett, and continued to be a successful enterprise. Mr. Spence, of Dundas, started a paper in Ingersoll, but it failed to succeed, and was followed by the *Oxford Herald*, published by T. A. McNamara, who, after some time, removed to Tilsonburg. In 1862 the *Oxford Reformer* was established by Sutherland and Robinson, and subsequently passed into the hands of R. R. Sutherland, who carried it on for some time, and sold out to A. R. Sutherland, who started a Conservative paper called the *Inquirer*, which was successfully published by him for upwards of two years, when the office was destroyed by fire. The *Inquirer* was followed by the *Plaindealer*, and Ingersoll enjoys the advantage of quite as many political journals as the county town. At Embro and at Drumbo for a time the political press had representation, but no measure of success attended either. At Tilsonburg, the *Observer*, owned by Mr. Law, supplies the wants of a section southward, and represents the oil interest of that promising locality. The typographical art has progressed rapidly in this county, and in common with the cities of the country, stands second only to supply the demands of the public, at least in one establishment.

TOWNSHIPS.

BLANDFORD—is bounded on the east by the township of Blenheim ; on the north by the township of Wilmot (County of Waterloo) ; on the south by the township of East Oxford—the dividing line being the Governor's Road;—and on the west by the township of East Zorra. It was, previous to 1836, attached to East Oxford—in which year the first township meeting was held, when the following officers were appointed : Assessor, W. H. Laudon; Collector, L. T. Thorp; and William Lapenotiere, Township Clerk. Blandford is well watered by Horner's Creek, and tributaries of the Thames, and is timbered, in the south-east part, with hardwood and pine. It is also well settled, (except the south-east part) and in a high state of cultivation. In the southern part of the township are several ponds, or small lakes, varying in size from fifty to two hundred acres, and surrounded by considerable low or swamp land. The town of Woodstock is in the south-west corner of the township. In 1846 the population numbered 733; and the census returns for 1861 showed an increase, up to that time, of 1262—1995. In 1846 the rateable property in the township amounted to \$40,896, and increased, in 1861, to \$811,469. Concessions run from east to west; and in the southern part, are eighteen lots in length.

The Buffalo and Goderich Railway runs diagonally across the northern part of the township. "Bright," and "Ratho," are the stations—these stations have Post offices.

There are two grist-mills on the river Thames on the Western boundary of the township.

BLenheim.—This township is bounded on the east by the township of Dumfries (county of Waterloo), on the west by the township of Blandford, on the south by the township of Burford (county of Brant), and on the north by the township of Wilmot (county of Waterloo). This was the first township settled in the county, and since its settlement it has—for a number of years back especially—rapidly increased in population and general improvement. The soil—particularly in the northern portion of the township—is good, and admirably adapted to the growth of the staple productions, being timbered with hard wood. It is divided into two portions by a swamp, on the south side of which the township is principally timbered by pine. Blenheim is well watered; Horner's and Smith's creeks passing through it, the former in the south-western portion, and the latter in the northern and eastern portions of the township. The first lot sold by Government was the 10th lot of the 14th concession, the purchaser of which was William Wardue. In 1846 the population numbered 1,772, and increased in 1861 to 6,993. Concessions run from east to west, and are 24 lots in length, which number from east. The principal villages in the township are Drumbo, Plattsville and Princeton. Blenheim is divided into north and south.

DEREHAM: which was constituted a part of the county of Oxford in the year 1798, by Act of Parliament, is one of the largest townships in the county, and is bounded on the north by the township of West Oxford, on the south by the township of Bayham (county of Elgin), on the east by the township of Norwich, and on the west by the township of South Dorchester, (county of Middlesex). The first portion of the township was surveyed by Mr. Hamley, in 1799, and the first lands were granted in September, 1800. The north half of Lot No. 12, in the first concession, was the first sold by Government, which was purchased by Stilton Hackett in the year 1834. This township, for several years after it was made a part of the county of Oxford, was attached for township purposes to West Oxford, and the first township meeting was held in January, 1832, when Mr. Harvey Tillson was appointed township clerk. Its settlement has been remarkably rapid, the census return of 1861 showing the population to be 5,477, an increase of 1,833 over its population in 1851. In 1842 there was only 1,014 inhabitants in this township. Within its limits are a large number of saw mills in operation, in consequence of which a very extensive lumber trade is carried on, and the facilities of transportation offered by the Otter creek, which flows through it, has no doubt induced capitalists to invest their money in mills for the manufacture of lumber in this particular section. It is well supplied with water-power for mill purposes, and is heavily timbered with a mixture of hardwood and pine. Dereham is traversed by the Ingersoll and Port Burwell Gravel Road, passing through Tilsonburg, a village of considerable importance, which is situated in the south-east part of the township. In the village and neighborhood petroleum has been of late discovered in considerable quantities. Concessions run from east to west; lots number from east.

MISSOURI, EAST.—This township is situated in the north-western part of the county, and is bounded on the north by the townships of Blanshard and Downie [county of Perth]; on the south by the township of North Oxford; on the west by the township of West Nissouri [Co. of Middlesex]; and on the east by the township of West Zorra. Previous to the year 1851 it was united with the township of West Nissouri, when the latter was made a part of the East Riding of Middlesex. The township of Nissouri, as at first constituted, was surveyed by Mr. S. Parke, in 1820, in which year the following lots were granted to a Mr. Davis, viz.: Lots 21 and 28, on the eighth concession; Lot 14 on the tenth concession; Lots 11, 19, 21 and 34, on the twelfth concession; Lot 8, on the 14th concession; Lots 26 and 28 on the 9th concession; Lots 7 and 17, on the 11th concession; and Lot 26 on the 13th concession. The first lot sold by Government in the township of East Nissouri was the 2nd Lot of the 11th concession, which was purchased by John Campbell, in July, 1834. It is now one of the best settled townships in the county, and the lands are in a high state of cultivation. The soil is very fertile, and excellently adapted for agriculture. In 1842 Nissouri [now East and West] contained a mixed population of 1460; and in 1861 the population of East Nissouri

alone amounted to 3484, showing an increase of 2024 up to that time. It is well watered by a branch of the Thames in the southern part. The village of Thamesford is partly in Nissouri, and the Thamesford and Nissouri Gravel Road runs through the township. An Agricultural Association, composed of the farmers of the township, has been successfully carried on since 1857. Timber principally hardwood. Concessions run from South to North; and the lots, which are 36 in number, number from the South.

NORWICH—NORTH AND SOUTH.—These townships, which have, for municipal purposes, been divided into North and South Norwich, formed, up to 1798, a part of the county of Norfolk; but were, at that time, by Act of Parliament, detached therefrom, and declared part of the county of

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Oxford. The first land granted was in the year 1800, and the first Lot sold by Government was in 1830, to Mr. James Holmes. Norwich was surveyed by Mr. Hamley, assisted by Col. John Bostwick; and the "Gore" by Peter Carroll, in 1835. In 1842 the population of Norwich was 2747, principally of American descent, with a few English and Irish; and by the census return of 1861, North Norwich alone had a population of 3334 (1718 males, and 1716 females); and the population of South Norwich numbered 2948. Each township has an immense growth of timber, principally hardwood, with occasional ridges of pine. Both townships are also well watered, and have excellent mill-sites upon the Otter Creek, which flows through them. Their general aspect is that of a pleasant rolling country, with land of a rich description, as evinced by the many excellent farms throughout the townships. Norwich is traversed by the following roads, viz: Brantford and Norwich Plank Road, Woodstock and Otterville Plank and Gravel Road, and the Otterville and Port Dover Plank and Gravel Road. There are five Post Offices in the Townships, viz.: Burgessville, Newark, Norwich, Otterville and Springford. There are flourishing Farmers' Associations in the Townships. Concessions run from East to West, and lots are 28 in number.

OXFORD—NORTH, WEST AND EAST—Although at present three distinct municipalities, the history of all are so interwoven as not to afford ground for division. Up to 1820 all three were one township, and with Zorra and Nissouri were assessed as one. At that late date the whole population numbered only 719 souls. The first records in respect to the settlement of this section are in possession of James Ingersoll, Esq., the present Registrar, and through the kindness of that gentleman we make a few extracts. Prior to 1793, and instigated by the proclamation of Governor Simcoe, which offered inducements to well disposed settlers from the United States, Thomas Ingersoll, father of our present official, in company with the Rev. Gideon Bostwick and others, made application for a tract of land, offering to comply with the terms stipulated by the Government, namely, in lieu of a township to provide forty settlers, whose

Upon this assurance, and in answer to the prayer of the petition of Mr. Ingersoll, an order in Council was passed, dated Navy Hall, March 23, 1793, giving to Mr. Ingersoll and his associates a tract of land of about 64,000 acres. Mr. Ingersoll, for himself and others, was to select the land; and putting himself in connexion with his friend Brant, the Chief of the Six Nation Indians, assisted by a posse of experienced hunters, explored the unoccupied lands west of the Grand River. Acting on his own judgment and at the instigation of his Indian friends, he made choice of that section which now comprises the three Oxfords. Having located his land, Mr. Ingersoll returned to his native town, GreatBarrington. He visited New York soon after, and through the aid of friends was placed in a position to carry out his design of establishing a settlement. Two years after Mr. Ingersoll, with his family, returned to Canada, but as there was no road west of Ancaster he wisely determined on halting at Queenstown. After spending two years on the frontier, Mr. Ingersoll pushed his way westward, and after great hardships reached the spot selected by his Indian friends as the most suitable spot for his camp, a spot now occupied by Mr. Poole, on Thames St., Ingersoll. Having so far carried out his purpose, Mr. Ingersoll set to work vigorously to clear a spot of ground on which to erect a house, and with his own hands felled the first tree that marked the presence of the white man. For years the trunk of that huge basswood was an object of curiosity, and its great size supplied much of the material that composed the rustic home of the courageous pioneer. But Mr. Ingersoll and his friends were not permitted to see their great endeavors rewarded as they had a right to expect. At the seat of Government, then York, there were persons who looked with jealous eyes on the efforts of others, and the American settlers came in for a large share of notice. The removal from this country at that juncture of Governor Simcoe, was an unfortunate affair, as it enabled the York influence with his successor to prevail, and the original allotment was withdrawn from Mr. Ingersoll and his little band. Great efforts were made by Mr. Ingersoll to induce the Government to keep faith, but destitute of the means necessary to carry his grievances to England and present them at the foot of royalty, he was forced to accept such terms as the authorities, in their generosity, would yield. The injustice of the Government, in this as in other cases, produced much dissatisfaction. Mr. Ingersoll, although not a U. E. Loyalist, was strongly attached to the British Crown; and, however much disappointed at the reverses, never wavered in his loyal determination: Mr. Ingersoll was an exception, and it was not to be wondered that the wrongs inflicted on the settlement turned not a few into doubtful supporters of the Provincial Government. The following is a copy of the original order in Council:

“UPPER CANADA COUNCIL CHAMBER, }
 “NAVY HALL, March 23, 1793. }

“His Excellency, John Graves Simcoe, Esquire, Lieut.-Gov., &c., &c., in Council.

"His Excellency informed the Board that he wished to call their attention to several petitions he had received for townships.

"Read: a petition signed Gideon Bostwick, Robert Williams, Seth Hamlin, Abel Kelsee, and Thomas Ingersoll and numerous associates, praying for a township.

"Thomas Ingersoll appeared in behalf of himself and the above named petitioners.

"In consideration of the well known loyalty and sufferings of the Rev. Gideon Bostwick, one of the petitioners, His Excellency and Council are of opinion that he comes precisely under the description of person who ought to be encouraged to settle in this Province; and not doubting but that he will have due regard to the principles and morals of the proposed inhabitants in his neighborhood, grants the aforesaid petition for one township.

Reference to the list of the inhabitants of the Oxfords and Ingersoll will show that those worthy men who introduced civilization into this section left many to perpetuate their names and emulate their virtues. Charles Ingersoll, son of Mr. Thomas Ingersoll, for many years represented this section in Parliament, and, perhaps as a slight recompense for the injuries inflicted upon his father, James Ingersoll has enjoyed the office of Registrar for nearly forty years, a greater part of the time acting as agent for one of our banks. The Bostwick family are residents of the Counties of Middlesex and Elgin, and in every branch of the family those Christian traits which so much distinguished their father are yet seen and felt. David Curtis, Esq., Collector of Customs, Brantford, is of the family of the early settler of that name, and so also is Mr. Elisha Hall, of Ingersoll. Indeed, with but few exceptions, every family has a very creditable representation in the county, and in public good will.

The present township of East Oxford is bounded on the north by the township of Blandford, on the south by North Norwich, on the east by the township of Burford (County of Brant), on the west by the township of West Oxford. It is considered one of the best cultivated townships in the county, and is watered by tributaries of the Thames, having also an abundant supply of water from streams and brooks for mill purposes. The timber in this township is chiefly hardwood of a heavy growth. By the census of 1861 the population of East Oxford was two thousand seven hundred and twenty-nine—one thousand three hundred and eighty-one males, and one thousand three hundred and forty-eight females—being an increase of five hundred and nineteen over its population in 1851. Births recorded in 1860, one hundred and thirteen; deaths, fourteen. It is traversed by the Woodstock and Otterville Plank and Gravel Road, and also the Great Western Railway, which has a station (Eastwood) within it. Concessions run east and west, and lots number from east. There is an agricultural association in the township, which was organised in 1852.

NORTH OXFORD is divided from West Oxford by the River Thames, and is bounded as follows: on the north by portions of East and West Zorra and East Nissouri, on the south-east by the township of West Oxford, and on the west by the township of North Dorchester (County of Middlesex). In territorial extent this township is the least in the county. The soil is generally very fertile, and well adapted for cultivation, and the timber is principally hardwood. It is well watered, and has also several good mill sites. In 1861 it contained a population of one thousand seven hundred and seventy-one, showing an increase over the population of 1851 of three hundred and ninety-three. There are two gravel roads passing this township; also the Great Western Railway. The agricultural association with which the township is connected is the "Ingersoll and West Oxford Agricultural Society." The middle branch of the Thames flows through the western portion of it, and part of the town of Ingersoll is also in this township. Concessions run from west to east.

WEST OXFORD is bounded on the north-west by the township of North Oxford, on the south by the township of Dereham, and on the east by the township of East Oxford. The Thames divides it from North Oxford, the tributaries of which waters the township, in addition to numerous streams within its area. It is well timbered with maple, beech, oak, ash, elm, &c. The soil is rich, and well adapted for agriculture. There are a number of saw and grist mills in the township. According to the census return of 1861 the population numbered two thousand seven hundred and twenty-two males, and one thousand and three hundred and fifteen females, being an increase over the population in 1851 of eight hundred and forty-three. The township is traversed by the "London and Hamilton Road." The principal portion of Ingersoll is in this township. Concessions run south-west.

ZORRA—EAST AND WEST.—These townships, which, previous to the year 1845, were united for municipal purposes, was surveyed by Mr. Shubal Parke, in the year 1820, and organized in 1822 by a warrant issued by Charles Ingersoll—brother of the present highly-esteemed Registrar of the county—and Peter Teeple; and the following were the first township officers, viz: Joseph Fitch, Town Clerk; Henry Larne and Joseph Fitch, Assessors. At this time there were only 145 acres cleared in the whole township, 39 of which were cultivated. By Act 8th Victoria, Chapter 7, that part of the Township of Zorra which lies to the East of the line dividing the eighth and ninth Concessions, was formed and constituted a separate and distinct township, by the name of East Zorra, and is bounded on the North by the Township of S. Easthope, (County of Perth); on the East by the Township of Blandford; and on the South by the Townships of Blandford and North Oxford. East Zorra is well watered by tributaries of the Thames, which forms part of the Eastern boundary, and is supplied with excellent water power for mill purposes. The soil is of an excellent quality, and well adapted for agricultural and horticultural cultivation, being timbered almost exclusively with hardwood. Its settlement has been rapid, as will be seen by the census reports; and it contains, now, some of the finest farms in the county. The Woodstock and Huron Gravel road traverses the township; and it is also supplied with mills of every description. The first lot sold by Government was No. 2, in the 9th Concession, and was purchased in 1830, by a Mr. Strong. The population in 1861 numbered 4,510 (2345 males, and 2165 females), being an increase over the population in 1851—which was 3,200—of one thousand, three hundred and ten. The township has a farmers' association named the "East Zorra Agricultural Association." Concessions run from South to North.

WEST ZORRA—is bounded on the North by portions of the Townships of Downie and Easthope (County of Perth); on the East by the Township of East Zorra; on the South by the Township of North Oxford; and on the West by the Township of East Nissouri. There are 56,400 acres in the township, according to the return made by the Crown Lands Office. It is watered by a branch of the Thames and its tributaries, and is heavily timbered, with hardwood, principally. Its general aspect is rolling, and the soil is rich and fertile, producing excellent crops of wheat, oats, peas, and roots of every description. The predominating nationality of its settlers is that of Scotland, and principally Highland, which are ever proverbial for industry and perseverance, and which is fully displayed by the high state of cultivation which this township is in at present. The first lot sold by Government was the North half of Lot 12 in the 4th Concession, on the 13th of January, 1832, at two dollars per acre. In 1838 there were only three schools in the township—as then constituted—and taught severally by Mr. Hugh Matheson, Mr. Lewis Hyde, and Mr. Hugh Gordon. In 1861 the population of West Zorra numbered 3691 (1952 males, and 1739 females)—showing an increase of 389 over the population as returned by the census of 1851. It is traversed by the West Zorra Gravel Road. The Village of Embro is situated in this township, comprising the East halves of Lots No. 11 and 12, in the 4th Concession, and the West halves of Lots 11 and 12, in the 5th Concession. Concessions run from South to North.

The County town, and
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the township of Blandfo

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WOODSTOCK.

The County town, and judicial seat of the County of Oxford, is advantageously and pleasantly situated in a central location, being in the south-west corner of the township of Blandford, bordering on the River Thames and Cedar Creek, and nearly evenly divided by the line of the Great Western Railway, of which it is an important station. In nowhere throughout Canada could a more desirable site for a town be found—elevated itself, and surrounded with the most picturesque landscape in the Province, and a section of country unsurpassed for fertility of soil, inhabited by an industrious, enterprising, and now wealthy class of people, surely there is nothing more necessary for the progress and prosperity of a town, and the general comfort of its inhabitants. It is distant from Hamilton 48 miles, from the Suspension Bridge 91 miles, from Paris 19 miles, and from London 29 miles. Thirty-five years ago the present site of Woodstock was almost an entire wilderness, although the western part was reserved by Governor Simcoe for a town a number of years previous to its first settlement. It was for a long time called the "Town Plot," which included what is now the north-western portion of the town; and up to 1845 its limits embraced only that portion of what is now the town which lies north of Dundas and west of Riddell Streets. It was first defined by Act of Parliament in the year 1845, and with the exception of the southern half of the eastern boundary the limits were as above set off. In 1837, on the 24th of April, a public meeting was held for considering the propriety of erecting a Gaol and Court House in Woodstock, when it was decided to proceed at once with the erection of the buildings, and the gentlemen who were appointed a building committee were authorized to raise a loan of \$12,000. Mr. Leighton, who drew the plan which was adopted for its construction, was employed to superintend the work, and the contractors were Henry Bishop and John Harrison, for the sum of \$14,800. On the 11th of November, 1839, the building was pronounced fit to be occupied, and on the 23rd of December, 1839, a proclamation was issued by the Governor-General setting apart the County of Oxford as a distinct district, with Woodstock as the District town, and the first case tried was on the 28th day of April, 1840, before Judge Arnold, who acted in that capacity until 1845. On the 7th of October, 1835, a post-office was established in Woodstock, and mails were received tri-weekly up to 1844, when a daily mail was established. In 1836 the first brick building was erected in the place, from which period it has made rapid progress in public improvements. Additions were constantly made to the business establishments, and costly brick structures—stores and private residences—took the place of the wooden buildings of former years, until now it is unrivalled in this respect by any town of equal size in the Province. The increase in population has likewise been rapid. In

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1844 there were only 950 inhabitants in the place, and the census returns of 1851, showed an increase of 1,162, the population at that period being 2,112. In 1861 the population numbered 3,327, being an increase of 1,215 over that of 1851. Within the last few years the increase has been more rapid still, and now the population of Woodstock is upwards of 4,000. The first municipal election for the town was held in the year 1851, on the 7th of January, when the following gentlemen were elected councillors, viz : Hugh Richardson, Wm. Wilson, Alex. Green, Valentine Hall, and Andrew Smith, and at the first meeting of the Council Hugh Richardson was elected Reeve, Jas. Kintrea Clerk, and Thomas Scott Treasurer. In the year 1857, through the instrumentality of our then representative, Donald Matheson, Esq., Woodstock was raised to the status of a town, it having the requisite population to meet that position. The limits of the town were somewhat extended and slightly changed. The following, from the Act, embraces all essential particulars :

“ Commencing on the northerly limit of Dundas street, at a point where a post has been planted at the south-west angle of lot number 18, in the 1st concession of the township of Blandford ; thence in a northerly direction along the western boundry of the said lot, to the allowance for road between the first and second concessions of the said township of Blandford ; thence continuing the same course to the northerly limit of the said road allowance ; thence westerly along the said northerly limit to the river Thames ; thence in continuation of the last mentioned course, across the said river to the water's edge, on the westerly bank thereof, to a point opposite the southerly bank of Cedar Creek ; thence along the water's edge of Cedar Creek, on the southern side thereof, to the eastern limit of the allowance for road between lot number 21 in the first concession of the township of East Oxford, and the Gore between East and West Oxford ; thence southerly along the said eastern limit to the southerly limit of the allowance for road between the first and second concessions of the said township of East Oxford ; thence easterly along the said southern limit to a point opposite to the centre of lot number 18 in the first concession of the said township ; thence on a line equi-distant from the eastern and western side lines of the said lot number 18, on a course about north 15° 40m. west, to Dundas street ; thence continuing the same course to the northern limit of Dundas street ; and thence westerly along the northern limit of Dundas street to the place of beginning.”

In the various branches of mechanical industry, Woodstock is well represented. The “ Woodstock Iron Works,” established in 1842, and owned and carried on by H. P. Brown, Esq, are situated on Dundas street, nearly opposite the Gore Bank. In it are manufactured stoves, threshing machines, plows, cultivators, mill-gearing, tin and sheet-iron ware. There is a 10 horse-power engine in operation, and 26 men are kept constantly employed, who turn out work annually to the value of 50,000. The “Vul-

Paulin & Co., who purchased it in 1864 from Copp & Bro., is also a very extensive establishment, having 25 men employed in the manufacture of steam-engines, agricultural implements, mill-gearing, cheese vats, and dairy utensils, and stoves. It is situated on Vansittart street. There is also a magnificent flouring and grist-mill situated near the Great Western Railway, which was built by James Watson, in 1857, (of brick) at a cost of \$40,000. It is five stories in height, eighty feet in length, and forty in breadth. The machinery is propelled by a 60 horse-power engine, and there are five run of stones, which are capable of grinding 1,000 barrels of flour per week. It is owned and carried on at present by Andrew Eaton. There are also several other extensive mills within the limits of the town, namely, the Woodstock Mills, owned by T. Clark; also the International, erected by H. Frizelle, but at present owned by T. J. Clark, and leased to Hayes & Collins. Mr. T. J. Cottle has a Linseed Oil mill and oil-cake manufactory, to which he has recently added a scutching machine. This mill is situated at the East end of the town. An extensive flax mill and rope factory, situated on the Thames to the West of the town is owned by Mr. John H. Brown, a gentleman who was the first to introduce into this immediate section the cultivation and manufacture of flax, an article which contributes very considerably to the agricultural products of the County. Mr. Brown employs about 40 hands in the different branches of his business, and dispenses annually a sum not less than \$400,000. An oatmeal mill has recently been erected, near the Great Western Railway depot, by Mr. John Forrest. D. Penman & Son are the proprietors of a woollen factory, which is situated a little south of the depot. The Woodstock Brewery is owned and carried on by S. Collens & Sons, who do an extensive business: it is situated in the east end of the town. The Cedar Creek Oil Refining Company have their refinery at the extreme west of the town, where can be procured the very best quality of coal oil. The owners are Messrs George White & Thomas J. Clark. Clark's barrel factory situated on the corner of Queen and Mill streets, was established in 1856. In this establishment 30 men are kept constantly employed, and the machinery is propelled by a ten horse-power engine. There are two very extensive planing mills in the town: one on Wilson street, near the Great Western Railway, owned by F. B. Scofield, and the other by Alexander White, situated between Light and Vansittart streets. Wilson's tannery is situated in the western part of the town, in which ten men are employed. Mr. Joseph Close is the proprietor of a potash, soap and candle manufactory, which was established in 1854. He also manufactures bricks and drain tiles. In the manufacture of carriages and wagons the principal establishments are Gardner & Rose's factory, situated on Vansittart street,

Carryer's saddlery, and harness and trunk manufactory, is situated on Dundas street in the East end of the town. It was established in 1849. Mr. John Douglas, who has been established here since 1837, is doing a very extensive business, having six men constantly employed in the manufacture of saddles and harness, of every description. McKay & Bickerton have lately started business near the market, on Dundas street. They have on hand a good stock, and are doing a prosperous trade in this line. Mr. Robert Douglas has an establishment on the West side of the Market Square, also lately started, where he keeps several hands employed in the manufacture of saddles, harness, &c.

THE CANADIAN LITERARY INSTITUTE is located at the East end of the town, and has a very plain site on a rising ground, commanding splendid natural views. It is a noble structure, (reflecting great credit on its architect, David White) of three wings or compartments, surmounted by a handsome dome, having four large entrance doors, spacious halls and school rooms, with comfortable and well-ventilated dormitories for the resident pupils, together with ample play grounds and all the "means and appliances to boot," for their healthy recreation and amusement. With the great advantages it possesses, coupled with the efficiency of its staff of professors and teachers, this educational establishment is rendered one of the best scholastic institutions in the Western part of the Province. The present structure has been but recently built, and on the site of the original one, which was erected at a cost of about \$30,000, but which was destroyed by a disastrous fire, in January, 1861. The Institute is under the control of the Regular Baptist denomination. It has three different departments, viz: Primary, Higher, and Theological, the average attendance on which consists of fully 100 students. The Primary school is attended by pupils over eleven years of age, who study the various branches of an ordinary English education. In the Higher department the students are prepared for the study of Theology, or for matriculation in Arts, Law, or Medicine. The fees for attendance in these departments vary from \$20 to \$28 per year. In the Theological department, attended by about 30 students, the tuition is *gratis*.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL.—The Grammar School was established in 1843. The present building was erected in 1848—Messrs. White & Dixon, contractors—at a cost of about two thousand four hundred dollars, and is situated on the corner of Hunter and Graham streets. The school has been under the charge of Mr. George Strachon, the present efficient and highly-esteemed gentleman, over twenty years. A thorough classical, mathematical, and higher English education can be acquired here. The num-

COMMON SCHOOLS.—There are two very large and handsome school buildings in Woodstock—one on the corner of Beale and Princes, and the other on the corner of Hunter and Delatre streets,—these buildings were erected during the years 1853 and 54, at a cost of (land, fencing and buildings included) ten thousand five hundred dollars. The East end school is at present under the direction of Mr. Archibald, and the West end school under the direction of Mr. Dick, under whom there are very efficient staffs of teachers.

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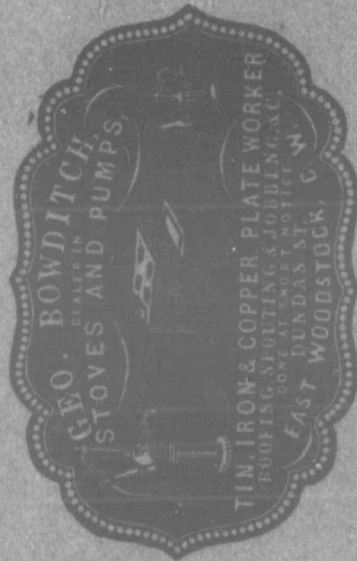

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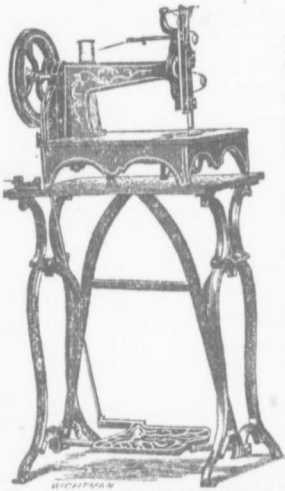

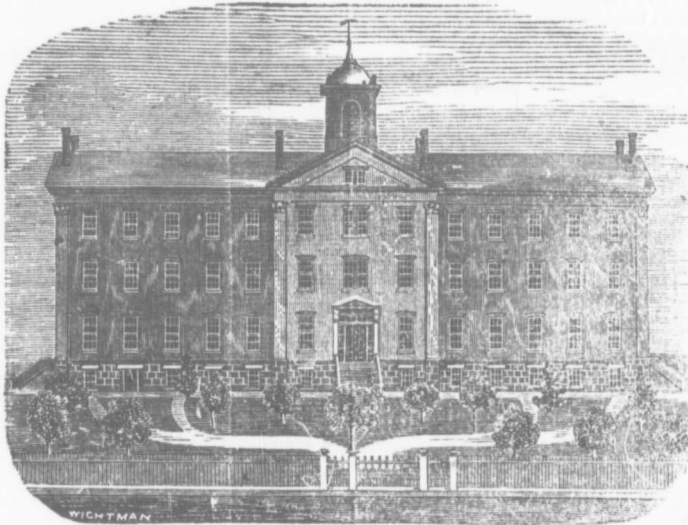

The Institute edifice of which a cut heads this advertisement, is 142 feet long, and 70 feet deep in the centre. It was planned with reference to furnishing the best facilities for instruction, and comfort and convenience for the boarders. It contains ample Steward's rooms, Teachers' rooms, School rooms, Library, Reading and Music rooms, besides accommodations for about eighty boarders. And as many more day scholars can be accommodated.

There is a trusty watchman, who takes up his charge every night at ten o'clock. For the purpose of furnishing healthful out-door exercise in all weathers, there are two gymnasia, 150 feet long by 16 wide, one for the male and one for the female students.

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INGERSOLL.

Ingersoll, which was constituted a Town by act of Parliament in the year 1864, is situated on the River Thames, (being divided by it) partly in the township of North Oxford, and partly in the township of West Oxford. The site of the town is advantageous and pleasant, being on a rising eminence, and in the midst of a fine agricultural section of country. It is also the principal shipping station for the lumber manufactured in the Southern portion of the county. This, together with the many enterprises within itself, has made Ingersoll one of the most important stations on the line of the Great Western Railway; since the construction of which it has made rapid progress in population, wealth and importance. It was here that the first Post office in the county was established, and, as will be seen by referring to the historical account given of the townships of Oxford, in another part of this work—it was on what is now Thames street Mr. Ingersoll, the pioneer of this particular section, first pitched his tent. The post office was established in 1821, when Charles Ingersoll, Esq., was appointed postmaster. It is distant from Woodstock 10 miles, from Hamilton 60 miles, from Lopdon 20 miles, from Windsor 129 miles, and from Port Burwell, on Lake Erie, 32 miles. Ingersoll was incorporated as a village in 1852, containing, at that time, a population of only about 1,200; and in 1861 it had increased to 2,756. The following are its corporate limits, viz :

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" north-westerly bank of the said river Thames, up the stream, to a point
 " in prolongation of the aforesaid boundary line between lots numbers 17
 " and 18, in the Broken Front concession of the township of West Oxford ;
 " thence across the said river to the place of beginning."

In manufactories the town is now well represented in almost every department, containing two large foundries—one carried on by W. Eastwood, in which he manufactures threshing, reaping, mowing and sawing machines, agricultural implements, &c. Mr. Eastwood's establishment turns out work annually to the value of about \$30,000 dollars. It was established in 1839 by W. A. Rumsey. The other foundry is that of J. & S. Noxon, who are largely engaged in the manufacture of all kinds of agricultural implements, mowing, reaping, and sawing machines, &c. Their manufactures amount to over \$25,000 per annum. There are also two extensive steam sash, door, and blind factories, and planing mills, one of which is owned and carried on by John Christopher & Brothers, and situated on Thames street, north of the G. W. R. This firm keeps over thirty men constantly employed, and their monthly expenditure averages over \$2,500. In addition they have lately erected a very extensive oil refinery in the north-east end of the town, convenient to the Great Western Railway track. In the town there are two flouring and grist-mills, propelled by water power, one of which is owned by R. H. Carroll, and the other by James Smith. There is also a very large steam flouring mill in the western part of the town ; also an oatmeal mill, named the " North Star Mill," owned by John Stewart, situated on the gravel road leading to Tillsonburg. There are two large breweries in successful operation, one of which is owned by the Messrs. Bixel, and the other by the Messrs. Henderson, and situated back of King street. Also an extensive tannery, carried on by Thomas Brown. The Ingersoll woollen factory, situated on Queen street, adjoining Carroll's mill, is now owned and carried on by Waterhouse, Bradbury & Co. In it are manufactured tweeds, flannels, &c., &c., and 12 men are kept in constant employment. Ingersoll likewise contains several carriage and wagon factories, furniture, pail, and other steam factories.

The law and medical professions are well represented.

In the town there is a handsome and commodious town hall and market house, erected of brick, at a cost of several thousand dollars ; a handsome and large brick school-house, and also several fine large blocks of brick buildings, two, three, and four stories high, on the principal streets for business purposes. There are eight churches in the town, also agencies of the Commercial and Niagara District Banks ; two weekly newspapers, the *Chronicle*, published by J. S. Gurnett, and the *Plain-*

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH—Situated on the north side of King Street West. Erected in 1864 of brick, at a cost of seven thousand dollars. Size, 55 x 75. Capable of seating 1,000. Rev. L. Warner, pastor.

R., and sixteen miles distant from Woodstock, the county town, and seven miles and a half from Drumbo. Smith's creek flows through the village, affording excellent water power for mill purposes. Plattsville was laid out by Samuel Platt, from whom it has taken its name, and who erected the first mill in the village about the year 1851, containing four run of stones. Mails are received daily from the east and west; Samuel Platt, Post-master; John Smart, assistant.

The village now contains three general stores, two groceries, one steam woolen factory, situated on Albert street, established by James Crombie & Co. This is a very extensive factory, having 50 hands constantly employed in the manufacture of tweeds, stocking yarn, &c. There are sixteen looms, five spinning jacks, 1200 spindles, and all other requisite machinery, which is propelled by a sixty horse-power engine. There is also one steam cabinet factory, three carriage and wagon factories, one saddle and harness shop, one potash manufactory, one stove factory; a masonic lodge, and an agricultural association.— It contains four church organizations, three of whom have churches; also, a good school. There are two mills, one of which is situated half a mile south of the village, and carried on by A. R. Stauffer. Plattsville contains a population of about 700.

TILLSONBURG.

[DEREHAM P. O.]

This village is situated on the Ingersoll and Port Burwell gravel road, on lots 5 and 6, 12th concession, township of Dereham, distant 25 miles from Woodstock, the county town, and 15 miles from Ingersoll; 5 miles from Eden, 8 miles from Straffordville, 14 miles from Vienna, and 17 miles from Port Burwell, on Lake Erie. The village was laid out by Jessie P. Ball, Esq., in the year 1828—34 (two surveys having been made). The village made very little progress until about the year 1851, at which time the excellent hydraulic power afforded by the Otter creek, which flows through the village, was taken advantage of—saw-mills were erected and the lumber trade of this section increased materially. Lumber and timber commenced to be rafted to Port Burwell, affording cheap transportation to the lake. Petroleum has been discovered here, although not in paying quantities, so that out of ten wells only one is in operation—the Hebbard & Avery well—which is down to the depth of over 920 feet, and has all the indications of salt. The Messrs. Hebbard & Avery were induced to sink their well below the depth of 600 feet by the Provincial geologist, Professor T. S. Hunt. The County well, which was sunk to the depth of 700 feet, was commenced in 1863, on the property of E. D. Tillson, and was the first in operation. In the village there are five general stores, seven groceries, four boot and shoe shops, two harness shops, two tin shops, two foundry and machine shops, two tailor shops, one wagon shop, four blacksmith and horse-shoeing shops, two cabinet shops, a carding mill and woolen factory about a mile south of the village, three grist mills, two saw-mills, a sash, door and blind factory and planing-mill, three hotels, three milliners, two photographic artists, three physicians. A weekly newspaper, the *Observer*, published by W. S. Law, who has in connection a stationery and book store. A good common school, with an average attendance of 160 pupils, in which there are three teachers; also a private school.

Daily stages; and mails received at 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Post office and telegraph office in connection, on Oxford street; Lachlin McLean, postmaster and telegraph operator. The village of Embro, which became a separate municipality by Act of Parliament about the year 1858, is pleasantly situated on a branch of the River Thames, in the Township of West Zorra, comprising the east halves of Lots number eleven and twelve, in the fourth Concession, and the west halves of Lots eleven and twelve in the fifth Concession. It lies in a northwesterly direction from Woodstock, at a distance of ten miles, and is six miles from Beachville, on the line of the Great Western Railway. The site of the village could not be more desirable, having unsurpassed natural hydraulic power for mill and manufacturing purposes; and being on a rising eminence, and also surrounded with a fertile and beautiful section of country, and were it not for the lack of proper means of transportation, the village by this time would have unquestionably grown into a town. In the village there are some handsome and substantial stone and brick buildings, among which might be noticed the Canada Presbyterian Church erected of brick in the year 1861, at a cost of about ten thousand dollars; also the Albion Hotel, built of brick, three stories in height; in connection with which is a commodious hall, in which the courts

Its general business consists of several mercantile establishments and workshops in the various branches of trade, a foundry carried on by Farnsworth & Murray, three excellent flouring and grist mills, two oatmeal mills, an ashery, and a carding mill and cloth factory, owned by Mr. John McDonald; three physicians, and a law office, a military organization, Loyal Orange Lodge, and the United Brethren; three churches, viz: Canada Presbyterian, Baptist and Episcopal Methodist; and two schools. The courts of the Third Division are held here, of which D. Matheson, Esq., J. P., is clerk. The municipal administration of the village is carried on by a council presided over by a Reeve, who is at present John Short, Esq. The West Zorra Agricultural Society, which was organized in the year 1853, hold their meetings in the Town Hall.

BEACHVILLE,

A Post Village and station of the G.W.R., situated on the banks of the Thames, four miles and a half west of Woodstock, and about the same distance from Ingersoll. Previous to the construction of the railway considerable business was done here, and for a long time it was the Post office station for a large section of country to the north, east, and south, before a post office was established in Woodstock or Embro. Beachville and its immediate vicinity was among the first portions of the county settled, in consequence of which the farms are now in a high state of cultivation. There is ample water power in its vicinity for mill and factory purposes. The London and Hamilton macadamized and gravel road passes through the village; also the North Oxford and West Zorra gravel road. It has daily mails, and contains five church organizations, viz: Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Episcopal, Wesleyan Methodist, and Baptist; two schools, one foundry and machine shop, owned and carried on by Mr. R. Whitelaw, in which are manufactured agricultural implements, mill gearing, steam engines, sawing machines, &c., &c.; one grist and flouring mill, one saw-mill, shingle and turning factory, a wash-board factory, and two Tanneries, three general stores, three groceries, two blacksmith shops, one wagon shop, three shoe shops, and three hotels. Population about 500.

THAMESFORD,

Although corps of Volunteers have existed in this County for the last ten years, until lately, no step had been taken to organize a Battalion, or place the independent companies under proper authority for efficiency in time of need. In 1863 a Battalion was formed under the command of Lieut.-Col. W. S. Light. Subsequently the command fell upon Lieut.-Col. J. B. Taylor, now D. A. A. General, London. Under recent authority a re-adjustment of the Battalion took place as follows :

COUNTY OF NORFOLK.

This County is bounded on the north by the Counties of Oxford and Brant, on the east by the County of Haldimand, on the south by Lake Erie, and on the west by the County of Elgin. Norfolk was constituted a County by proclamation of Governor John Graves Simcoe, in pursuance of the British Act of Parliament 31, George III., chap 31, (1791,) by which its boundaries were on the north and east by the County of Lincoln and the River Thames, on the south by Lake Erie until it meets the Barbue, (to be called the Orwell river,) thence by a line running north sixteen degrees, west until it intersects the Thames up the said river, until it meets the north-west boundary of the County of York. It included the townships of Burford, Oxford upon the Thames, Norwich and Dereham, of which Burford has been made part of the County of Brant, and the others part of the County of Oxford. By a subsequent Act 38, George III., chap. 5, (1798,) it was enacted "That the Counties of Norfolk, Oxford and Middlesex, with as much of this Province as lies westward of the Home District and the District of Niagara, to the southward of Lake Huron, and between them and a line drawn due north, from a fixed boundary, (where the easternmost limit of Oxford intersects the River Thames,) till it arrives at Lake Huron, do constitute the London District." The courts for the London District were held in the township of Charlotteville, from the year eighteen hundred until eighteen hundred and three, when they were removed to Turkey Point, an original Government reservation, selected by Governor Simcoe for a town and garrison, and which was laid out as a town by order of Government. The accommodations and conveniences were such as were afforded by the private enterprise of Mr. Job Lodor, innkeeper, at whose house justice was dispensed with satisfaction, until a log gaol and frame court house were erected by the District. These buildings were in use until the war of 1812 broke out, when they were appropriated for the use of the troops assembled at that point, and were after used for their original purpose, the courts having been removed temporarily to the house of Mr. Thomas Finch, and subsequently to that of Mr. Matthew Steel, and in 1822 established at Vittoria, a village situated near the south-east corner of the towship of Charlotteville, within three miles of Lake Erie, and laid out some six years previous. Vittoria continued to be the District town till the removal of the District office to London, in 1826. Subsequently the Counties of Norfolk, Oxford and Middlesex were erected into Districts, with the respective names of Talbot, Brock and London. The Talbot District consisted of the following townships, viz : Charlotteville, Houghton, Middleton, Townsend, Woodhouse, Windham and Walsingham, and the town of Simcoe,

which was constituted the District town. The Act of Parliament (1849.) abolishing Districts, made no change in the territorial formation of the County of Norfolk.*

THE REPRESENTATION OF THE COUNTY.

The County of Norfolk was united to the Counties of Oxford and Middlesex for electoral purposes up to the year eighteen hundred and eight, at which period an alteration was made in the Representative Act, which entitled it to a separate member. The names of its representative while united to the Counties of Oxford and Middlesex will be found in the information relating to the County of Oxford in another part of this work. We have been unable to ascertain who the representatives of the County were previous to 1820, at which time an Act was passed providing that every County containing a population of one thousand inhabitants should be entitled to one representative in the Legislature, and such Counties as contained four thousand should have two representatives. The County of Norfolk contained the required population, and consequently it returned two members to this Parliament.

The first two representatives of the County were Francis F. Walsh and Col. R. Nichol, the former of whom continued as one of the representatives for a number of years. Up to 1840, when a union was effected between Upper and Lower Canada, the following are the names of the several gentlemen who represented the County: Duncan McCall, Dr. Baldwin, who was elected in the year 1828 in the place of Mr. Walsh, and McNellidge. In 1834 Mr. Walsh was again elected, and with him Dr. Chas. Duncombe. Dr. John Rolph, in 1835, who was obliged to vacate his seat in 1838. He was followed by Wm. Salmon, Esq., the present judge of the county. After the union of the Provinces in the first Parliament, which was from the 8th April, 1841, to the 23rd September, 1844, Norfolk was represented by Israel W. Powell. He was opposed by the late Wm. Wilson, but succeeded in securing his election. At the next election, which took place in 1844, Mr. Powell was re-elected. The third Parliament was from the 24th January, 1848, to the 6th November, 1851. For this Parliament the Hon. H. J. Boulton was elected. In 1850 a new election took place. The candidates were the Hon. J. Rolph and L. H. Hunt, the former of whom was elected. The fifth Parliament after the union was from the 10th August, 1854, to 28th November, 1857. The election for the member to serve in this Parliament took place in 1854 the contest was between the Hon. J. Rolph and James W. Ritchie, the former of whom was elected. The next who represented the county was Walker Powell. He was opposed by Thomas W. Walsh, P. L. S. The election took place in 1858. At the next election, (1861) the present

GENERAL REMARKS.

The County of Norfolk is one of the best watered counties in the Province, being abundantly supplied with hydraulic power for mill and factory purposes. Many of the streams flow through lands covered with excellent pine, affording supplies to the numerous saw-mills within its limits. Upon the whole, Norfolk is well adapted to agricultural pursuits, and produces fruit of every description in great abundance. There are eight municipalities in the county, viz: Charlotteville, Houghton, Middleton, Townsend, Walsingham, Windham, Woodhouse and Gore, and the Town of Simcoe, all of which are now well settled. The first settlers of Norfolk were principally U. E. loyalists, whose individual names will be found with the description of the respective townships in which they settled. Col. Samuel Ryerse was the first settler in the county, about the year 1793; and it was he who erected the first mills, which were built in the Township of Woodhouse, in what is now called Port Ryerse, on the lake shore, seven miles from Simcoe. By a return of the census of the county, made in the year 1817, the population numbered at that time only three thousand one hundred and thirty-seven. In 1839 the population had increased to nine thousand and sixty-six; in 1842 ten thousand four hundred and fifty-five; in 1848 nineteen thousand two hundred and seventy-four; and by the census return of 1861 the population numbered twenty-eight thousand four hundred and ninety. Of these, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-two were natives of England and Wales; natives of Scotland, nine hundred and two; of Ireland, one thousand four hundred and four; of Canada not of French origin, twenty-one thousand six hundred and fourteen; of French origin, two hundred and ninety-seven; of the United States, one thousand five hundred and eighty-nine; of Nova-Scotia and Prince Edward Island, one hundred and three; of New Brunswick, two hundred and eight; of Newfoundland, seven; of the West Indies, twelve; of Prussia, German States, and Holland, four hundred and fifty-two; of France, twenty-seven. Number belonging to the Church of England, three thousand nine hundred and thirty-eight; Church of Rome, one thousand five hundred and seventy-four; established Church of Scotland, one thousand two hundred and one; Free Church of Scotland, one thousand three hundred and forty-eight; United Presbyterians, three hundred and fifty-three; Wesleyan Methodists, five thousand nine hundred and sixteen; Episcopal Methodists, one thousand five hundred and forty; New Connexion Methodists, two thousand three hundred and forty-two; Other Methodists, three hundred and seventy-one; Baptists, six thousand

nine hundred and sixty-five ; Lutherans, two hundred and sixty-four ; Congregationalists, two hundred and sixty-four ; Quakers, thirty-three ; Christians, forty-six ; Second Adventists, twenty-two ; Protestants, two hundred and sixty-three ; Disciples, twenty-two ; Jews, five ; Menonists and Tunkers, nineteen ; Universalists, one hundred and eight ; Unitarians, forty-two ; no religion, six hundred.

The county is interspersed with good roads, and the farms are in a high state of cultivation. In lumber there is an extensive business done—also in the manufacturing and shipping of square timber.

Education, in this, as in almost every other county in Canada, has made a degree of progress at once gratifying and satisfactory ; and now the many educational institutions within its limits receive the united support and countenance of every class. The common schools throughout the county are under an efficient class of teachers, and the general and thorough education of the rising population seems to be the aim of every one. In each municipality schools are conveniently established, and comfortable and commodious school houses have, in the majority of places, been erected.

Iron ore at one time was found in considerable quantities in this county. In the townships of Houghton, Charlotteville, Middleton and Windham, it yielded 33 per cent. Smelting works were established in the county at an early date. The Long Point furnace was established in the year 1821 by Joseph VanNorman, Hiram Capron and Geo. Tilson, who employed about one hundred and fifty hands. The works were situated in what is now called the village of Normandale, Lot 16, b. f., township of Charlotteville, eleven miles from Simcoe.

NEWSPAPERS OF THE COUNTY.

The Long Point *Advocate* was the first newspaper started in the county, about the year 1841. It was carried on by John H. Davis during the first seven years of its existence, when it passed into the hands of Dr. Park, who carried it on until 1851. It then passed into several hands, and in 1858 was purchased by Mr. W. H. Oliver, who changed its name to the *Norfolk Reformer*. He very shortly after disposed of it to Mr. Buckingham, the present publisher and proprietor of the Stratford *Beacon*. Mr. Buckingham, in 1863, sold out to the present proprietor, Mr. R. Thoroughgood, and the *Reformer* continues to be a successful and useful enterprise. The first Conservative paper in the county was established by Mr. Alex. McCleneghan, of the Woodstock *Times*, in the year 1847. It was called the *Simcoe Standard*. He successfully published it for several years, and disposed of it to the present publisher of the *Perth Standard*. Mr. Abbott did not continue its publication long, when he sold out to Mr. Wallace, who changed its name to the *British Canadian*, under which it is still carried on, and we understand enjoys the entire confidence and united support of the party whose interests it represents. A division having taken place in the Reform party, in 1851 another paper was started under the management of C. D. Clancy, who continued its publication until his death, (1862,) after which it was carried on by his wife until 1866, when the office was destroyed by fire.

S., in the year 1794, and at that time commenced to be settled principally by U. Loyalists, whose attachment to the British crown induced them to leave the United States with their families, and endure the hardships of pioneer's lives in the then wilderness of Western Canada. They received grants from Government, and by their industry the land soon became valuable. The following are the names of the first settlers in this township, with the respective dates of their settlement, viz: F. More, 1794, near Lot No. 2, broken front; J. Beeker, 1794; David Secord, Silas Secord, Nathan Barnum, and Peter Teeple, all about the year 1796; also Daniel McCall, who had five sons, John, Daniel, Duncan, Joseph and Hugh, one of whom afterwards represented this District in Parliament; Thos. Price, James Blaney and Robert Henderson and family, in 1796. The next settlers were E. Lot, Wm. & Joseph Tisdale, who settled on the broken front, east quarter town line, in the year 1801. In the year 1817 this township contained a population of nine hundred; one hundred and thirty-two houses, three grist and three saw mills. The population increased in 1851 to two thousand four hundred and ninety-eight. It is well watered in the north-west corner by Big Creek, which empties into Long Point Bay; Murray's Creek, which drains the western portion of the township, having its rise in the 5th Lot. of the 6th Concession; and Young's Creek, rising in the centre of the township, and entering the Lake at Port Ryerse. There are also several spring brooks in the southern portion of the township. The soil of the township is principally a sandy loam, with occasional ridges of clay, and is well adapted to agriculture; also produces fruit of every description in abundance. By the census return of 1861, the population numbered three thousand four hundred and seventy-five; natives of England and Wales, 196; of Scotland, 91; of Ireland, 109; of Canada, not of French origin, 2612; of French origin, 4; natives of the United States, 189; of New Brunswick, 34; Prussia, German States and Holland, 25. At that time in the township, there were 385 belonging to the Church of England, 1220 Baptists, 95 Roman Catholics, 691 Wesleyan Methodists, 113 Episcopal Methodists, 313 New Connexion Methodists, 215 belonging to the Established Church of Scotland, 84 to the Free Church of Scotland, 43 United Presbyterians, 28 Congregationalists, and 18 Universalists. Charlotteville contains 54,956 acres of land. The concessions number from north to south, and lots from east to west. The villages of Vittoria, Forrestville, Normandale, St. Williams, Charlotteville Centre, Portland and Lyndock are in this township. There is an agricultural society, called the "Charlotteville

Branch Agricultural Society," which meets in the village of Vittoria, at which place the annual exhibitions are held. President, James Coverton, and W. Smith, Secretary. The roads throughout the township are, generally speaking, in a good condition, and many of the farms are in a high state of cultivation.

HOUGHTON.—This township is bounded on the north by Middleton, on the east by Walsingham and Middleton, on the south by Lake Erie, and on the west by the township of Bayham, County of Elgin. It is of a triangular shape, and the smallest township in the County. In 1841 it only contained a population of 277, and the rateable property at that time amounted to \$25,964. The timber is principally pine, and the soil sandy, with occasional ridges of clay. The Lake Shore Road passes through the township, also the old Talbot Road. Total amount of acres of resident lands in the year 1866, 27,361; non-resident lands, 6,516. Total value of real and personal property, \$257,115. In the township there are several saw mills in successful operation.

MIDDLETON.—This township is bounded on the east by Windham, on the north by Norwich and Dereham, Co. Oxford; on the west by Bayham, Co. Elgin, and Houghton; and on the south by the township of Walsingham. The soil in the greater portion of this township is sandy; but in some localities there is clay. The timber is about equally divided between pine and hardwood. The north-west corner of the township is watered by the Otter Creek; and the eastern portion by a branch of Big Creek. A large quantity of lumber is manufactured in the township, and shipped to different parts. Population in 1841, 555; increased in 1861 to over 2500. This township is not so well adapted to agricultural pursuits as some others in the county, but produces excellent fruit of every description. Total population, 2903. Natives of England and Wales, 155; of Scotland 91; of Ireland 126; of Canada not of French origin, 2132; of French origin, 5; of the United States 135; Nova Scotia and Prince Edward's Island 16; New Brunswick, 36; Prussia, German States and Holland 189. Number belonging to the Church of England, 329; Church of Rome 215; Established Church of Scotland, 109; Free Church of Scotland 82; United Presbyterians, 48; Wesleyan Methodists, 377; Episcopal Methodists, 225; New Connexion Methodists, 297; Other Methodists, 87; Baptists 700; Lutherans, 214; no religion, 192.

TOWNSEND is bounded on the north by the county line between Brant and Norfolk, on the east by the county line between Haldimand and Norfolk, on

the south by the first settlers of the Daniel Beemer at ham in the year 1 John, Timothy, and Sovereign, who came with his brothers about the year 1790, under General Maitland. He retained only seven mills. In 1851 there were 166 mills, and in 1861, 166; natives of England, 10; of Canada, not of Brunswick, 35; land, 357; Church of Scotland 980; Episcopal Methodists, 23; land, and is one of the best in the county. The Simcoe and the western part of the township through the centre is sandy and the soil is loam. It is timbered east to west, and the villages of Waterford, Bloomsburg,

WALSINGHAM is bounded on the east by Chatham, on the south by the township of Houghton, 35 Lots, and four number from South Township contain that time amount Venison Creek, several small streams in the township there are of the staple produce attached to the

the south by the township of Woodhouse, and on the west by Windham. The first settlers of the township were J. Beemer, J.P., (in 1812,) Abraham Beemer, Daniel Beemer and Henry Beemer, all of whom settled in Townsend and Windham in the year 1798. In the same year the Culver family, (Gabriel, Aaron, John, Timothy, Michael and Nesbit) settled here, also L. George and M. Sovereign, who carried on the Waterford Mills, which were built by one of the brothers about the year 1806. These mills were destroyed by the Americans under General McCarty during the war of 1812. In 1817 this township contained only seven hundred and sixteen inhabitants, one grist and three saw mills. In 1851 the population numbered three thousand, nine hundred and sixty-three, and in 1861 it increased to five thousand, seven hundred and forty-two; natives of England and Wales, 330; of Scotland, 141; of Ireland, 196; of Canada, not of French origin, 4,734; of the United States, 269; New Brunswick, 35; Nova Scotia, 12; number belonging to the Church of England, 357; Church of Rome, 117; Established Church of Scotland, 160; Free Church of Scotland, 237; United Presbyterians, 54; Wesleyan Methodists, 980; Episcopal Methodists, 429; New Connexion Methodists, 572; other Methodists, 23; Baptists, 2004; Christians, 36. This township is well watered, and is one of the best cultivated in the county, containing excellent farms. The Simcoe and Waterford Plank and Gravel Road passes through the southern part of the township, also the Port Dover and Brantford Road, running through the centre of the township. The soil in the south-western portion is sandy and the south-eastern a clay loam, and part of the township is a sandy loam. It is timbered with pine, oak, beech and maple. Concessions run from east to west, and are 14 in number, and lots number from north to south. The villages of Waterford, Boston, Villanova, Townsend Centre, Rockford, Hopeville, Bloomsburg, Round Plains and Hartford are in this township.

WALSINGHAM.—This township is bounded on the north by Middleton, on the east by Charlotteville, on the south by Lake Erie, and on the west by the township of Houghton. It has a broken front, which contains about 35 Lots, and fourteen concessions with 24 Lots in each. Concessions number from South to North, and lots from west to east. In 1841 this Township contained a population of 1,046, and the rateable property at that time amounted to \$18,412. This township is watered by Big Creek, Venison Creek, Spring Creek, Mud Creek, Murphy's Creek, and also several small streams, which are sufficiently large for mill purposes. In the township there are good roads, and the soil is well adapted to the growth of the staple productions, yielding fruit in great abundance. There is a gore attached to the western part of the township, together with Long

Point, a narrow neck of land running into the lake to a distance of about 30 miles. This township is timbered with a mixture of hardwood and pine. There are a number of saw-mills in successful operation in this township; also grist and flouring mills. Col. John Backhouse was one of the first settlers in this township, and it was he who erected the first mill, in the year 1804. This mill was the only one not destroyed during the war of 1812. Total population, 4855. Natives of England and Wales, 374; of Scotland, 103; of Ireland, 246; of Canada not of French origin, 3713; of French origin, 59; United States, 261; Prussia, 39. Number belonging to the Church of England, 499; Church of Rome, 228; Established Church of Scotland, 75; Free Church of Scotland, 289; United Presbyterians, 83; Wesleyan Methodists, 1772; Episcopal Methodists, 192; New Connexion Methodists, 68; other Methodists, 60; Baptists 1041; no religion, 472.

WINDHAM.—This township is bounded on the north by Burford, County of Brant, on the east by Townsend, on the south by Charlotteville, and on the west by Middleton, and Norwich, in the County of Oxford. Windham has fourteen concessions, which number from north to south, each concession containing 24 lots, which number from east to west. In 1841 this township contained a population of 1568. Timber is a mixture of hardwood and pine. Soil principally sandy, with occasional ridges of clay. Total population, 4,095; natives of England and Wales, 171; of Scotland, 69; of Ireland, 170; of Canada, not of French origin, 3,130; of French origin, 178; United States, 265; number belonging to the Church of England, 542; Church of Rome, 398; Established Church of Scotland, 205; Free Church, 58; United Presbyterians, 71; Wesleyan Methodists, 447; Episcopal Methodists, 423; New Connexion Methodists, 972; Baptists, 657; Protestants, 119; Congregationalists, 47.

WOODHOUSE AND GORE—is bounded on the north by the township of Townsend, on the east by Walpole, (county of Haldimand) on the south by Lake Erie, and on the west by Charlotteville. This township contains excellent lands, and is well adapted to agricultural and horticultural cultivation. It is well watered, and is timbered with a mixture of hardwood and pine. Concessions number from south to north, and lots number from west to east. Total population in 1861, 3703. Natives of England and Wales, 306; of Scotland, 295; of Ireland, 318; of Canada not of French origin, 2453; United States, 242. Number belonging to the Church of England, 742; Church of Rome, 265; established Church of Scotland, 199; Free Church of Scotland, 487; United Presbyterians, 54; Wesleyan Methodists, 834; Episcopal Methodists, 52; New Connexion Methodists, 47; Baptists 421; Protestants, 122; no religion, 338; Congregationalists, 32.

SIMCOE,

The County Town of the County of Norfolk, is pleasantly situated on Patterson's Creek, in the Township of Woodhouse and Gore, at a distance of twenty-four miles from Brantford, forty-five miles from Hamilton, twenty-eight miles from Paris, and forty-eight miles from St. Thomas, in the County of Elgin. It is the principal business place in the County, and contains a population of over two thousand. It was first laid out in the year 1835, and surveyed by the late Lewis Burwell, P. L. S.; Aaron Culver and Wm. Wilson being the owners of the property upon which the survey was made. Previous to the survey having been made a store was kept here by a Mr. Bird, and in the year eighteen hundred and twenty Mr. D. Campbell, the present manager of the Gore Bank, opened out a store; he also started a flouring mill, distillery and an ashery in the year eighteen hundred and twenty-five. In eighteen hundred and sixteen the first grist mill was erected here by Mr. Aaron Culver, the circumstances in connection with which we think is worthy of mention. Governor Simcoe having visited this section of the county, pitched his tent on the ground upon which Mr. Campbell's residence now stands. Mr. Culver, hearing of the Governor's arrival, called upon him, and presented him with a sack of water melons. The Governor at once understood the design of the gift, and generously procured a grant of a mill site for Mr. Culver, upon which a mill was erected by him. The Town made very little progress until about the year eighteen hundred and thirty, when the business of the place began to increase materially. From 1837—at which time this became the District Town of the Talbot District, a court house and gaol having been erected—it made rapid progress in population and general importance. The Registry Office was not removed from Vittoria until the year 1848. Francis L. Walsh, the present Registrar of the County, held the office at that time. In eighteen hundred and thirty-seven the first church (Baptist) was erected, of frame, and situated on Colborne Street, since which time this denomination has erected a very handsome brick structure. The next church was erected by the Wesleyan Methodists in the year eighteen hundred and thirty-eight. It was a wooden building, and in eighteen hundred and sixty-one was destroyed by fire, and replaced by a brick edifice. The next church erected was the Presbyterian, in the year eighteen hundred and fifty-six, of brick, at a cost of three thousand dollars. The Union School, a very large and substantial structure, was erected in the year eighteen hundred and fifty-eight or fifty-nine, at a cost of ten thousand dollars, of which the Messrs. Jackson, of Simcoe, were the constructors. It is designed in the old English style, and is

PORT DOVER.

Port Dover, which is situated in the Township of Woodhouse, at the confluence of the River Lynn with Lake Erie, is the most important village in the County, containing a population of about nine hundred, and having also the advantage of a good harbor, which was built in the year 1843, at a cost of one hundred and forty-eight thousand dollars, to which additions and improvements have been made, and it is now capable of holding from three to four hundred vessels at a time. The present site of the village was laid out in the year 1834, on the property of Powell and Nickerson, and surveyed by Mr. Alchin, P. L. S. What is now called Upper Dover was laid out in the year 1810 by the late Daniel McQueen, who erected the first grist and saw mill in this vicinity about the year 1801, which was destroyed by the Americans in April, 1814. The mills were rebuilt by Col. Robert Nichol, in the year 1824, and passed through several hands, until they were purchased in 1847 by the present proprietor, Mr. Andrew Thompson. The village made very little progress till the year 1840, when a market was established, and lumber and timber began to be exported in considerable quantities. In 1842 a tannery was built here by Bennett Lawson, which is now owned and carried on by Peter Lawson. In 1861 a woollen factory was started here, which is still in operation. There is another factory, for the manufacture of satinets, in course of erection. I. W. Powell was the first who started a store in the village, about the year 1834, and the first hotel was built in 1836 by Joseph Parke. The Presbyterian denomination was the first who erected a church here, which was built in the year 1846. In 1853 they erected a handsome brick church and manse, at a cost of nine thousand dollars. The size of the church is 30 x 40 feet, and is capable of seating 500. Rev. Mr. Craig, Pastor. The Wesleyan Methodists built the next church in 1853; a frame building, and a parsonage in 1866, situated corner George and Chapman Streets. Seats 300. Rev. Mr. Laird, present Pastor. The Episcopalians next erected a brick building on George Street, in the year 1853, Gothic style, at a cost of \$3,000. Seats 200. Rev. Mr. Irwin, Incumbent. A Universalist, built in 1855, of frame, and cost about \$1,000. Seats 150. No regular pastor.

The village now contains 3 dry good stores, 4 groceries, 1 hardware store, 1 harness shop, 1 drug store, 1 bookstore, 1 watchmaker and jeweller shop, 3 tailoring establishments, 1 tin shop, 1 bakery, 1 soap and candle factory, 2 cabinet and chair factories, 2 carriage factories, the most extensive of which is carried on by Thomas L. Gillies; 4 blacksmith shops, 6 hotels, 1 saloon, 1 Masonic Lodge, 1 Orange Lodge, 1 Chess Club. The principal business carried on here consists in the purchase and exportation of lumber, timber and

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grain, leather and cloth, and general merchandize. There is a good Union School, [grammar and common], under the charge of Mr. Burns, as principal; a brick structure, built in 1857, at a cost of \$6,000; capable of accommodating 300 pupils; also two private schools.

The 8th Division Court is held here, of which Samuel Gamble is Clerk. The Council for the Township of Woodhouse meet in the Norfolk House.

There are several insurance agencies in the village.

The Post Office was established in the year 1832, in Upper Dover, Colin McNellidge, and removed to the present site in the year 1836. Henry Waters was then postmaster. The present postmaster is David Able. Mails daily, from east 6 p.m., and depart at 7½ p.m. From Paris at 7 a.m.

VITTORIA.

This village is one of the oldest in the county, having been, at one time, (from 1816 to 1827) the district town and judicial seat of the London District. It was settled a number of years previous to its survey having been made, which was in the year 1816, by M. Burwell, P.L.S. In 1827 the Court-house was destroyed by fire, in consequence of which the courts were removed to London, materially injuring the prospects of the village. About the year 1800 the first grist mill was erected here, which, with but one or two exceptions, was the only one not destroyed by the Americans during the campaign of 1812. Vittoria is situated near the Eastern corner of the township of Charlotteville, in a well settled and fine agricultural district. The Vittoria grist mill was built in the year 1816 by Joseph and Matthew Tisdale, near where the present mills are now situated. In 1847 the present grist mill and distillery were erected. A foundry was established here in 1826, by Luke Teeple, which subsequently passed into the hands of his sons. This foundry is not now in operation. The next foundry was built in the year 1861, by Israel Williams, and destroyed by fire in 1864. It was rebuilt by him, and is now in successful operation.

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The first store was opened out by Col. Nichol, in the year 1810. At the same time a hotel was started by John Stover, being the first in the place. The village now contains a population of about five hundred—several mercantile establishments, and workshops in the various branches of mechanical industry. The Division courts are held here, of which William Hewitt, Esq., is Clerk. There are four churches, viz: two Baptist, Church of England, and Presbyterian—also, a Town Hall, in which the Municipal Council of Charlotteville hold their meetings.

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PORT RYERSE,

A Port of Entry and village, situated near Long Point Bay, at the mouth of Ryerse's Creek, partly on lots 2 and 3, in the Broken Front of the township of Woodhouse, distant $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Simcoe; about 5 miles, by the road, from Port Dover, and $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles, by the road, from Victoria. This was settled about the year 1794 by Samuel Ryerse, who built the first grist and saw mill in the county of Norfolk. Previous to this date they had to go to what is called Sugar Loaf, on the lake shore, nearly opposite Buffalo—a distance of 65 miles. Said mills were destroyed by the Americans under Commodore Campbell, in 1813. These mills were afterwards rebuilt by George J. Ryerse, in 1847, and destroyed by fire in 1861. The Post office was established in 1854—Wm. H. Ryerse, first and present postmaster. The village now contains one general store, one grocery, one blacksmith shop, one pottery, one hotel, one school. The property here being entailed, part of it was released by Government to Edward P. Ryerse and George P. Ryerse, giving them privilege to build a harbor and lay out a village, who purchased a drudge for deepening, and who extended the docks a distance of 720 feet; but, not being very solid, part was carried away. A company was formed in 1862, called the Simcoe Railway and Port Ryerse Harbor Co. Edward P. Ryerse, president; Walter Holmwood, secretary and treasurer; Edward W. NEW MUNICIPAL ACT.

The new Municipal Laws are comprised in two chapters, numbered fifty-one and fifty-two of the Acts of last session of Parliament. With regard to towns, the qualification of electors is changed from twenty dollars of annual to four hundred of actual value, freehold or leasehold, or partly each; and that of Councillors from freehold of eighty dollars, or leasehold of one hundred and sixty dollars of annual, to freehold of eight hundred or leasehold of sixteen hundred dollars of actual value of real or equitable estate, as shown by the last revised assessment roll. Each town elects a Mayor, who is to be the head of the Corporation; and where not separated from the county, a Reeve; and if it have the names of five hundred freeholders and householders on the last revised assessment roll, then a Deputy Reeve is to be added; and for every five hundred names of persons possessing the same property qualifications as voters on such roll, an additional Deputy Reeve.—The number of Councillors for towns having five or more wards, is fixed at two for each ward; but those having fewer wards than five, will have to reconcile sub-section three of section 66 as amended by cap. 52, with section 88 of cap. 51. The former says: "The Council of every town shall consist of the Mayor, who shall be the head thereof, and of two Councillors for every ward," besides a Reeve and a Deputy or Deputies as before; while the latter says, "in towns having less than five wards there shall be three Councillors elected for each ward, on the first Monday in January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, one of whom shall retire annually in rotation: and on the first Monday in January in each year thereafter, there shall be one Councillor elected for each ward in all towns."

The mode of election henceforth is to be as follows: A meeting of the electors is to be held at the Town Hall on the last Monday but one in the month of December before the election, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, for the nomination of Mayor, Reeve and Deputy Reeve; and on the same day at noon, in each ward, for the nomination of Councillors. If at these nominations only the requisite number of candidates to fill the vacant seats are proposed within one hour, the elections are then and there determined; but if a greater number is proposed, a poll is to be opened in each ward or in the ward in which a contest may have arisen, at nine o'clock in the forenoon of the first Monday in January, and to be closed at five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, when, if the ward is not divided into electoral divisions, the Returning Officer is forthwith to declare the result of the election; but if divided the respective Returning officers are to transmit their poll-books to the Town Clerk, who is to add them up and declare the result. In the cases of Mayor, Reeve and Deputy Reeve, the poll-books are in any event to be sent to the Town Clerk on the day following the election, and he is as soon as possible after their receipt to add up the votes and publicly declare the result on the day following the return of the poll-books.

In townships, electors are to be subject to a property qualification of one hundred dollars of real property, either freehold or leasehold, or partly each; and Councillors to one of freehold of four hundred, or leasehold of eight hundred dollars, as shown by the last revised assessment roll. A meeting of the electors is to be held at such place in each township as shall from time to time be fixed by by-law, on the last Monday but one in the month of December before the election, for the nomination of candidates for the offices of Reeve, Deputy Reeve, and Councillors; and if only the necessary number is proposed and seconded within one hour, the persons so proposed and seconded are to be declared duly elected; but if a greater than the requisite number is proposed and seconded, and a poll is demanded, the election is to be adjourned until the first Monday in January then next, from nine o'clock in the forenoon until five o'clock in the afternoon, at such place as the Council may have by law determined, if the township be not divided into electoral divisions; but if it be, then at such place in each electoral division as the Council may have by by-law appointed for that purpose. On the day following that of nomination, the Clerk or chairman of the meeting is to post up in the office of the Clerk of the Municipality, the names of the persons proposed for the respective offices, and it is the duty of the Clerk to supply each Returning Officer, with a certified list of the names of such candidates, specifying the office for which they are respectively candidates; and with an alphabetical list of all male freeholders and householders rated upon the then last revised assessment roll for real property lying in that electoral division, to the amount required to qualify them to vote at the election, which last list is to be attested by the solemn declaration of the Clerk as to its correctness. He is also to provide each returning officer with a poll-book in which to record the votes. On the day after the close of the election, each Returning officer is to return his poll-book to the township Clerk, verified under oath before the Clerk or a Justice of the peace, as to the due and correct taking of the votes; and the Clerk, or the person who may have presided as chairman at the nomination in the Clerk's absence, is to add up the votes set down for each Candidate in the respective poll books, and ascertain the aggregate number of votes, and on the day following the return of the poll-books, at noon, at the place where the nomination was held, publicly to declare the result. In case of an equality of votes between any two candidates, the Township Clerk, whether otherwise qualified or not, is to give a casting vote, so as to determine the election; but otherwise is not to vote at any election.
