## AUSTRAIIAN F円DERATION

BY RALPH W, GOSSET.

One of the most noted chapters in the History of Australia, will, (when all the Colonies have decided) be Federation. When this takes place Australia will be one of the largest Commonwealths in the world. A Commonwealth means a political community organised and united for the purposes of self government. The term " Dominion of Australia " or " United States of Australia," might with equal propriety, have been selected, but as the name "Commonwealth" was selected by the Convention of 1891 , on the recommendation of Sir Henry Parkes, it has been generally accepted as sufficiently comprehensive and appropriate to designate the coming "Federal Union of Australia." Australia consists of six Colonies, viz: New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania. When the Federal Bill was put to the vote in the Colonies of Victoria, Tasmania, Western and South Australia it was readily accepted; and on the 2oth June last the people of New South Wales by a majority of 24,000 votes have also decided in its favor. Queensland is now the last of the six Colonies to agree to the Federal Bill. The Government of this place have already passed the "Enabling Act" and will therefore very shortly submit it to the people, and by whom its acceptance is considered certain.
It is anticipated that-if all goes well the first "Federal Parliament" will meet on January 1st, 1901,otherwise about the beginning of the twentieth Century. At the beginning of the present Century New South Wales comprised the whole of the territory now consisting of and form-
ing the Colonies of New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania and Queensland.

In the large bay in the south of the present colony of Victoria, in 1835 a settlement called Port Philip was started. The population in and around this Settlement increased so rapidly that the inhabitants in the year 1849 separated from N. S. W. and their new Colony was called Victoria. Their first lot of postage stamps was issued in January 1850; at this date also the mother Colony of N. S. W. issued her first adhesive postage stamps. The final separation of Victoria from its parent Colony was effected on Ist July, 1851 .
About the Year 1845 the territory north of the present Colony of N. S. W. was thrown open for selection. The inhabitants of this district also increased to a great extent and on 1oth December, 1859, the country north of Point Danger was separated from ${ }^{\text {N }}$. S. W. and declared into a separate Colony by the name of Queensland. The postage stamps of this Colony first appeared on ist November, 1860.

Tasmania (which was separated from N. S. W. and made a Crown Colony in 1825) issued its first postage stamps in November 1853. Tasmania was originally called Van Diemens Land which name is on the earliest of its stamps. In the Year 1855 an Act was passed changing the name of the Island to its present title, Tasmania, in honor of its discover ; however the stamps bearing the name of Van Diemen's Land (the ist 2nd and 4th) were used up to 1870 .

THE POSTAL SYSTEM OF THE GERMAN EMPIRE.

The first Postal System in Germany was established in the Year 1516 by the Prince Regent of Taxis, who established a courier service between Vienna and Bruxelles.
Since that time the whole postal system was in the hands of the Taxis family.

The Taxis postal system included especially Middle, West and South Germany. Separate posts existed in several states, especially in the North, though this delivery took much more time, and the cost was very much increased.

In the beginning of this century, a letter from the Southern parts of Germany to Konigsberg cost 24 Silbergroshen ( 6 oc .) postage.

In the Year 1850 the German-Austrian Postal Union was formed. Law, inland, and foreign postage rates were introduced, and postage stamps were issued.

Bavaria issued the first stamp in 1849, the value being i Kreuzer, the color black.

On account of the war between Prissia and Austria in 1866, the greater part of the Taxis Postal system was bought out by Prussia.
On January ist, 1868, all existing posts in Germany with the exeption of Bavaria and Wurtemburg, were united into the ' Nordeutscien Bundespost " (North German Postal Union).

After the war with France in 1870, when Prussia and the other German States were united, this system was under the direction of Prussia, formed into the present "Deutsche Reichs post." Bavaria and Wurtemburg were again the exception, and still control their own Postal, Telegraph, and Telephone systems.
Under the direction of the Late Post-master-General Stephan, the founder of the Universal Postal Union, many new ideas for the benefit of the postal system were introduced, including the uniting of the Postal and Telegraph system, to which the Long Distance Telephone system has since been added.

The present manager of the postal system is State secretary Von Podbielski.

There are 4I Post and Telegraph offices which are again divided into I, II, and III Class and Postal Agencies. The latter are situated in Country districts, and are usuaily under the management of private individuals.

There are over 30,000 post offices in all in Germany; almost one-third of the post offices in all Europe (IO2,000), besides 70 post offices in the German Colonies, and in important foreign ports, such as Constantinople, Tien Tsin, China etc.

Over 160,000 people are employed in Germany's post offices.
I 50 Million packages on which the value was not given, weighing 600 Million Kilogrammes, and 3 Million packages, with the value indicated, were handled in 1897.

It must be remarised, that Germany has the best and cheapest Express system in the world. There are no express compinies in Germany. Packages are forwarded by the mails, at surprisingly low rates. A package of 10 pounds, which would cost from 25 c . to $\$ 2.00$ by express in America, according to distance, can be sent to any part in Germany, by mail for about 15 cts .

100 Million Money orders, and 12 Million Money Letters were handled by the Money Order Dept. in 1897. There is another system, which has no equal. A man in one town desires to remit to another. He fills out a blank at his post office, pays the amount to be sent, plus a small fee, and that is all he has to do. The Post Office authorities do the rest. The money is paid to the person indicated at his own house, being delivered by special courier.

Then you can send goods by parcel post C. O. D. A person orders guods by Mail, C. O. D. subject to examination. The addressee is notified, and the goods delivered to him upon payment of the charges and a small fee.
Newspapers do not enjoy a second class rate privilege in Germany. But the P. O. Dept issues a yearly catalogue, listing all Newspapers, Periodicals and Magazines of every sort and description. This Catalogue is on file in every post office, and if you want to subscribe to any particular paper, all you have to do is to go to the P. O. and pay the subscription price. The P. O.forwards it to the publisher, with an order for the amount, less a trifling fee. What a blessing this system would be for philatelic publishers in America. No more unused stamps, U. S to Canadian publishers and vice versa, more or less stuck together, and on which the luckless publisher always loses a large discount to get them cashed.

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## AUSTRALIAN NEWS.

By Ralph W. Gosset.

## Auckland, N Z. August 31st 1899 .

The month just closed was not specially marked in any way as regards things in the philatelic line. Some of the "Island" stamps have come down in value while others have gone up. Amongst the former may be mentioned the three varieties of surcharges i.e. :-Samoa $21 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ red on 1 d . green : $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$ black on is rose ; and $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$ carmine on 1 s rose. The latter stamp was previously marked 2 s 6 d and 3 s , in the shops here while now it is 6 d . Although I have seen it on the approval sheets of a well known Sydney dealer marked at 6 s . The $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ surcharge black on Id blue Cook Islands, I have seen marked at 9d at some places here.

It is surprising the number of collectors there are at Wanganui. A short time ago a philatelic society was started there and ir less than no time they had a roll of about 60 members and I believe there have been some joined since. One of our largest and most popular collectors was in Sydney recently, where, (he informed me) he was in conversation with one of the largest dealers there, and that gentleman told him that some of his best customers were at Wanganui, also that there were some very advanced collectors at that town. The dealer also said that in Queensland the collectors were few and far apart ; New South Wales cannot boast of a great many collectors; Victoria, has on the average a good number, while New \%ealand for its size and population has a greater number than any of the above Colonies.

The collector I have mentioned while on his travels invested prettily heavily in stamps, something to the tune of $£ 200$, he has about 10 ,000 varieties, amongst which are about 30 odd Sydney views.

New South Wales :-A copy of the 2d type 12, perf. 10. Surcharged "O.S." in red has been met with used on a letter dated April 11th, 1880,. and apparently quite correct.

The new issue 3 d Brown N.Z. has been out of stock for some time at the Auckland post office, the 3d light yellow old issite having been sold instead. A few days ago $I$ bought a 3 deep range,
and the clerk intormed me that they only had the orange ones in stock, having sold completely out of the light yellow ones. I presume the istal authorities are selling out the old stock before the new ones are placed for sale again to the public.

At Palmerston North, N.Z., there are a fair number of collectors, a philatelic society has been formed there.

Down South the other day some unscrupulous person made a haul at a dealers's expense.

I have not been able to glean much information on the matter so far, and can only go on the following facts as laid out by the "N.Z. Herald "viz :-
"A stamp-dealer in Chancery Lane, Christchurch, has reported to the police (says the Lyttelton Times) that the other night a valuable collection of stamps was taken from his office. On Saturday week he left his establishment, and as he intended to return in a short time, he did not put the stamps in the sate. He was, however, prevented from again going to his office by illness for some time, and was informed by the policeon Wednesday that his place of business had been broken into. He found that the following articles were missing --Eighty-twothousand new issue New Zealand stamps, valued at $£ .42$, various other stamps to the value of $£ 10$, and some unused New Zealand stamps to the value of $£ 3$ 1os, as well as two boxes of cigars, and about 14 s in silyer."

The Cook Island Boat has just come in and by it I perceive an error in the surcharge of the $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ on Id blue, viz: double surcharge as under

1 am informed that only one sheet was thus surcharged, and of that sheet only about $1 / 4$ or $1 / 2$ thereof were sold to the public, who got the rest I know not. I only managed to get one copy and am informed it will very soon be worth some money. I wrote down there for some, but none whatever were to be had.
A person just arived here from Wellington, N.Z., informed me that the 4 d has just come out in that city with the
design of the Id, it is also printed in the same colours light brown and blue. It is unwatermarked, perf. 11 and printed on wove paper.

Yerterday I received a 2 s . stamp on a parcel from Dunedin, perf. 11, printed in the Colony. The 5 d and $21 / 2$ are also printed in N.Z., both unwatermarked and perf. 11.

## A New pigeon post

The proprietor of the Original Great Barrier Pigeon gram agency is about to inaugrate a pigeon service between a group of Island called Marotiri Islands, and Auckland. These islands lie about 40 odd miles to the North-West of the Great Barrier Island and about to miles to the North of this city. There is no telegraphic communation with the Islands, and a steamer only goes there once a fortnight with the mails. There are a fair number of inhabitants on the islauds, also one or two copper mines. It is chiefly for the latter that the pigeongram agency is to be started as the management of the copper mines in Auckland want to get regular reports from the mines and I believetheyare subsidising the pigeonpost. I hear that a stamp is to be used, and am informed that the die for same is in the hands of the engravers who hope to have it finished very shortly. The stamp so I hear will be something like the previous original Great Barrier Stamp i.e. :-The words " one shilling " at the sides, "Marotiri Islands" at the top, and at the bottom "pigeongram." The centre of the stamp will be occupied with a pigeon flying with a letter in its beak, around the whole will be filagree work.

## NOTES ON COOK ISLANDS.

 by our australian correspondent.I have lately received $\exists$ few interesting notes and statistics from Rarotonga in the Cook Islands. The first set of stamps of these Islands was issued in 1892 . They were ordinary looking, plain block and type set stamps, with the word "Postage" at the top, underneath which were the words "Cook Islands." The center of the stamps was occupied by a circle of six stars with a larger one in the middle of the circle. At the bottom of the stamps is the value above which is the word Federation. The whole is surrounded by a fancy border. The centre star on the stamp represents Rarotonga, the largest and chief island of the Cook group, and the
six smaller stars represent the remaining six islands, viz :-Mangaia, Aitutaki, Atiol, Mitiaro, Mauke and Manual. Some of the latter islands have only a few inhabi tants.

The yearly salaries of the Postal officials as allowed by the Government are as follows.

It will be seen from the above the ann.tal salary ot the postal officials is by no means enviable. Actually the postman at Atiu, Mangaia, Aitntaki gets more than the postmaster, from that I fresume that the postman has more work in carrying the letters round. The islands are under the supervision of the New Zealand Government who appoint a governor for the whole group ; the present one is Lieut-Colonel Gudgeon. There is a Federal Parliament at the group, of which the Governor is the head. Makea, the principal chief or Ariki on the island is called the Queen of the Cook Islands; her head is on the present set of stamps, which are watermarked "star and N. Z." The islands export coffee, copra, cotton, limejuice, oranges, fungus, cocoanuts, bananas, pineapples, etc. The value of the exports for last year came to $£ 11,200$. Under the heading "stamps sold for postage, " I find the following amounts for the period 1892-1898.

His term of enlistment is for six months or one year if required. Before leaving he made a transfer of his property viz :-TLe Dominion Stamp Co. and the montreal philatelist to Mr. F. W. Wurtele, Mgr. of the International Stamp Co., giving full power to represent him in all matters during his absence, and to sell or otherwise dispose of the estate. Mr. Wurtele accepted the trust merely as attorney or agent, without assuming any liabilities of any kind.

The business at No. 6 Beaver Hall Hill of the Dominion Stamp Co. has since been sold to Mr. James Anderson, who will continue at the old stand.

No decision has yet been arrived at in regard to the future proprietorship of the paper, certain negotiations are in progress, but meanwhile the trustee invites correspondence from persons who might be desirous of purchasing it.

In the December number we hope to announce the completion of some per. manent arrangement which is now under way, and although the prize contests and special offers made by Mr. Bach must be considered cancelled, it is certain that the montreal philatelist will not be discontinued. It is an established fact, it has a large circulation, valuable ad. vertising patronage and is bound to be maintained.
While bidding a sorrowful farewell to Mr. Bach, the Montreal Philatelist offers to him a well earned tribute, in the recognition of his ability and energy, and of that perseverance which he has shown during so many months in placing this paper in the position it occupies in Phil_ atelic Journalism

He now leaves us to manifest his energy and dogged perseverance in another more exciting field than the peaceful one of Philately. We wish him a prosperous
voyage, one free from all mishaps; we wish him a splendid chance to show his courage in the face of the foe, and making a right use of such an opportunity a share in a glorious victory and let us cherish the hope of seeing him return at no distant day, covered with glory and reflecting credit upon himself and his country.

I do not, however, take any responsibility for debts of members or stamps lost in transit, substituted or damaged.
The success of the department will depend upor the support I get from the members. I shall be pleased to hear from those having duplicates etc, to sell or wishing to be placed on circuit.
A copy of the rules will be sent on application also blank books at five cents each or 6 for 25 cents.

All transactions will be on a strict Cash basis. 10\% will be charged on sales to cover working expensis.

RULES Sales Department
league of canadian philatelists For Sellers

1. Blank Books will be supplied at 5 cents each 6 for 25 cents.
2. Stamps must be affixed by hinges and the price of each book must be at least \$3.00.
3. The lowest cash price must be marked below the stamp in ink.
4. Damaged or heavily cancelled stamps are not desirable.
5. Entrre envelopes or postals not admitted unless the Supt. may have a call for them from buyers; when a special circuit will be made up.
6. The Supt. reserves the right of rejecting any books he may think undesirable.

## For Buyers

7. Circuits may be kept 3 days ; but if retained longer, a fine of to cents per day will be imposed.
8. In removing stamps mark the blank space with your name in ink or by rubber stamp.
9. Upon receipt of packet see that all spaces are marked where stamps have been removed. Any missing stamps must be adjusted with the preceding member or the last member on the list will be responsible for all blank spaces

10 Forward packets to next on list by Registered mail, mark on list exact date sent, advise the Superintendent and send amount of purchase by cheque or M. O. if over $\$ 1.00$, under that sum stamps will be accepted.
N.B.-Dollar bills will be accepted if more convenient, but must be sent under Reg'd cover.
11. This rule must be complied with, whether the buyer has stamps on circuit or not, as no running account will be allowed, unless by special arrangement.
12. Should packets be handed from one member to another, receipt for same must always be taken, or the one delivering them will be held responsible.

General.
13. The Superintendent will use his discretion in retiring books; but none will remain out longer than 3 months unless at special request of seller.
14. Books once retired will not be received again for circuit.
15. A remittance for amount of sales will be forwarded with all retired books, but postage on them will be charged, and a commission of 10 per cent deducted from sales, to cover working expenses.
16. One per cent. will also be charged on all stamps placed on circuit to establish a fund to pay for stamps lost from any cause except substitution. Beyond any sum that may be available from this fund, the Supt. will not be responsible for stamps substituted, damaged, lost in transit or any other way, but will protect sellers in every way possible, as no member will be placed on circuit without furnishing undoubted reference, or is personally known to one of the officers.
17. All letters of enquiry must contain stamp for reply.

These rules will be strictly enforced.
