PROCLAMATION.

(L. S.) Dalhousi**e.** By His Excellency Lieutenant-General the Right Honorable GEORGE, Earl of DALHOUSIE, Baron Dalhousie, of Dalhousie Castle, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Captain-General, and Governor in Chief, in and over His Marsty's Provinces of Lower Canada, Upper Canada, Nova-Scotia, New-Brunswick, and the Islands of Prince Edward, and Cape Breton, and their several Dependencies, &c. &c.

THEREAS, the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Thursday, the 13th inst:

I have thought fit further to Prorogue the said General Assembly until Thursday, the Tenth Day of February next; then to meet for the Dispatch of Business; of which all Persons concerned are desired to take notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

GIVEN under my Hand and Seal at Arms, at Halifax, this third day of January, 1820, in the 60th year of His Majesty's Reign.

A MESSAGE from His Excellency the Governor in Chief by Mr. Secretary George,

Mr. Speaker.

His Excellency the Governor in Chief commands this House to attend His Excellency immediately in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker, with the House, went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber.

And being returned,

Mr. Speaker reported, that the House had attended His Excellency the Governor in Chief in the Council Chamber, where His Excellency had been pleased to make a Speech, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, which he read to the House, and is as follows:

Mr. President and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

T is my first duty to inform you, that the health of His Majesty the King, continues nearly the same as when I last met you in General Assembly.

For some months past, much anxiety, has theen felt on account of the disturbances which have agitated the manufacturing districts in England and Scotland. It appears that mischievous and daring men have stirred up the people to acts of sedition and outrage; but I am shappy to state, that there is every reason to believe, that the resolute conduct of the Civil Magistrates, has put down this disposition to riot and disorder.

If we look around on the nations of the world in all their peculiar difficulties, or wari-

ous degrees of prosperity, we cannot but reslect how sew of them enjoy the peaceful tranquillity with which this portion of His Majesty's dominions is blessed. Among the great natural advantages which Nova-Scotia possesses, I consider the industrious contentment of her people as the surest guide to lead them to a proper use of these bounties of an Almighty Providence.

I am happy to think, that I have not any unfavorable report to lay before you of the

general state of the Province; although, like others, we also have our difficulties.

It is to be regretted, that our Fisheries have not been so successful this past season, as they have been in sormer years; and that our Trade still seels the effects of the general embarrassment of Commerce.

The Agriculture of the Province prospers to my utmost wish:—Under the fanction given in the last Session of the Legislature to this Branch of the Public Interest, by the Institution of the Provincial Board of Agriculture, no less than twenty Societies have been formed for the encouragement and improvement of Farming. The zealous exertions of these Societies have done much good around them almost every where. The mind of the people is roused to this pursuit; and a manly emulation has spread abroad the blessed influence of active Industry.

It is a pleasing part of my duties to suggest to your consideration such new subjects as present themselves in the rapid steps of our improvement; and I considertly trust, that

the Legislature will enable me to promote and confirm this prosperous march.

The want of an accurate Survey of the Province, has been long felt as a very serious inconvenience; and one that necessarily increases with the increasing settlement of the Forest Lands: I recommend this to your attention, as a matter if not absolutely necessary, at least as highly desireable—and, I think, of easy accomplishment.

I also submit to your consideration the practicability of a Canal, to connect the Harbour of Halisax with the Bason of Minas, by the Lakes of Shubenaccadie. This is a work of great importance, and to be attempted with caution: It promises great public advantages; but I do not know the extent of its difficulties—and to ascertain these, by competent Engineers, is all I mean to suggest at present.

The improvement of the public roads will, as heretofore, have your attentive confideration; and, with them, I again recommend the roads lately opened into the Military, and other new Settlements; which, I am happy to say, are prospering to my best expectations.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

The Public Accounts will be laid before you; and, I trust it will appear that the Supplies granted to His Majesty in the last Session, have been carefully and faithfully applied.

Although the Revenue has not augmented largely; still, it has been increasing in the course of this year. I must, however, again advise a prudent application of the Funds that shall be found to be disposable for Public Services.

Mr. President, and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

His Majesty's American Provinces have lately sustained a severe loss, in the death of the Governor-General, the Duke of Richmond. This event, most sudden and unexpected, has been generally and justly lamented; and deeply so in Canada, where his Grace's able Administration, his manly character, and mild and amiable manners, had gained him the confidence and affection of the country.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been most graciously pleased to honor me with that important command; and to appoint Lieutenant-General Sir James Kempt, to the Government of this Province.

While

While I rejoice in the pleasing scene of comfort and prosperity which this Province exhibits; and while I press upon your attention such matters as occur to me to be worthy of your consideration, I look to your more intimate knowledge of local wants and circumstances; and I depend upon that unanimity which has so happily existed between the several branches of the Legislature, to enable me to bestow an unbiassed and equal attention to all points of Public interest. It is no less my duty and desire to give this, than it is your right to expect it; and by thus joining my powers with yours, the important objects for which you are assembled will be most effectually accomplished.

Ordered, That Mr. Archibald, Mr. Haliburton, Mr. Cogswell, Mr. Fraser, and Mr. Prescott, be a Committee to prepare an Address in answer to His Excellency's Speech.

Ordered, That Mr. Cogswell, Mr. J. I. Chipman, and Mr. Haliburton, be a Committee to examine into, and report on, the expiring Laws.

Ordered, That Mr. Roach be added to the Grand Committee of Justice, in the room of Edward Mortimer, Esq. late Member for the County of Halifax, deceased.

Ordered, That Mr. Archibald, Mr. Dimock, Mr. Crane, Mr. Cogswell, Mr. Dewolf, Mr. Fraser, and Mr. Ritchie, of Annapolis Royal, be a Committee of Privileges.

George Smith, Esq. returned duly elected as a Member for the County of Halisax, in the room of Edward Mortimer, Esq. deceased, took his seat, having previously taken the Oaths prescribed by Law, and subscribed the usual Declaration, at the Table of the House, in the presence of the Honorable James Stewart, and the Honorable Brenton Halliburton, two of the Commissioners appointed by His Excellency the Governor.

William Henry Roach. Esq. returned duly elected as Member for the Township of Digby, took his seat, having previously taken the Oaths prescribed by Law, and subscribed the usual Declaration, at the Table of the House, in the presence of the Honorable James Stewart, and the Honorable Brenton Halliburton, two of the Commissioners appointed by

On motion, The House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the consideration of the said Address.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. W. A. Chipman took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair,

The Chairman reported from the committee that they had gone through the Address, and that the committee had made several amendments thereunto, which they had directed him to report to the House, and he afterwards delivered the Address as amended, in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read throughout a first and second time, and, upon the question put thereupon, agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That the Address be engrossed.

Mr. Archibald, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill in addition to the several Acts now in force relating to the Office of Sherist, and the same was read a sirst time.

THE HUMBLE ADDRESS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, IN GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

May it please Your Excellency:

E, His Majesty's dutiful Subjects, the Representatives of His loyal people of Nova-Scotia, beg leave to thank your Excellency for your Speech at the opening of the present Session of the General Assembly.

We most fincerely lament the continued indisposition of our revered and beloved

Sovereign.

It is with great pleasure we learn that the resolute and determined conduct of those in Civil Authority, has, in a great measure, subdued the disposition for riot and disorder, which, for some time past, disturbed the manufacturing Districts in Great-Britain; and that a seasonable check has been given to the seditious disturbers of the Public peace.

We have great reason to acknowledge the manifold mercies of the Almighty Disposer of Events, in the peace and tranquillity with which this Province is blessed; and we considently hope, that the increasing industry and zeal for improvement, so evidently manifested by its Inhabitants, will enable them to avail themselves of the natural advantages placed within their reach.

We regret, with your Excellency, that our Trade has suffered in the general depression of Commerce; and that our Fisheries have not been so successful as in former years.

To your Excellency we are deeply indebted for your liberal and zealous exertions to promote and improve the Agriculture of the Province; we are fully fensible of the advantages this branch of the Public Interest has derived from the institution of the Provincial Board of Agriculture, formed under your Excellency's immediate patronage.

We are fully of opinion, with your Excellency, as to the advantages likely to result from an accurate survey of the Province, and the facilities it would afford to the settlement of the Forest Lands; and we trust, that, 'ere long, we shall be enabled to accomplish this highly

desirable object.

We thank your Excellency for calling our attention to the proposed Inland Navigation, between the Harbour of Halisax and the Bason of Minas; we shall carefully consider this interesting subject, and endeavour to ascertain the extent of its difficulties, and the advantages likely to result from its completion.

The improvement of the Public Roads, and those lately opened in the Military and

other new Settlements, shall occupy our most attentive consideration.

We thank your Excellency for having directed the accounts of the expenditures of the Supplies granted in the last Session, to be laid before us at this early period, and we shall carefully apply the Revenues of the Province to such purposes as may appear to us most conducive to its best interests.

The sudden death of the late Governor-General, the Duke of Richmond, has been sincerely deplored throughout these Provinces, and we deeply lament, as one of its confequences, the removal of your Excellency from the immediate Administration of this Government. We rejoice, however, that the distinguished zeal, talents, and patriotism, of your Excellency, have been justly valued and conspicuously rewarded by our Sovereign, in the appointment of your Excellency to the Supreme Command of His Majesty's North American Dominions; and we considently trust, that the same wisdom which made choice of your Excellency to preside over us, has been again manifested in our savour, by the appointment of so meritorious an Officer as Sir James Kempt, to succeed your Excellency in the Government of this Province.

We are much gratified at the satisfaction expressed by your Excellency for the comfort and prosperity of the Province; and we are sensible that your Excellency's pleasure on this occasion arises from the purest source, as we are mainly indebted for our increasing prosperity and happiness, to the mild, impartial, and judicious measures of your Excellency's Administration.

We begleave to affure your Excellency, that we shall have much pleasure in contributing all the aid which our local information may afford us, to facilitate the Public Service; and we will diligently cultivate a spirit of unanimity and harmony in the discharge of our Legislative Duties, and in the effectual accomplishment of the important objects for which we are assembled.

Resolved, That the faid Address be presented to His Excellency by the whole House.

Ordered, That the Committee who prepared the Address to his Excellency the Governor in Chief, be a Committee to wait on His Excellency, to know his pleasure, when he will be attended by the House.

A Bill, in addition to the several Acts now in force, relating to the Office of Sheriff, was read a second time.

Resolved, That the Bill be committed to a Committee of the whole House.

Mr. Archibald reported from the Committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Governor in Chief, to know his pleasure when he would be pleased to receive the Address of this House, that the Committee had, pursuant to Order, waited on His Excellency accordingly, and that His Excellency was pleased to appoint this day, at two of the clock, at the Government House.

Mr. Speaker and the House attended Bis Excellency with their Address, pursuant to the Resolution of this day.

And being returned.

Mr. Speaker reported that His Excellency had been pleafed to give this Answer:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

THANK you for this Address, conveying to me the assurance of your continued sup-

port and co-operation in the great public trust committed to us.

The prosperity of the Province has been, and still will be, the great object of my endeavours; and it is always gratifying to me to find my humble efforts so cordially assisted by the House of Assembly.

Then the House adjourned until Monday, at leven of the clock.

PRAYERS.

A Petition of Jehu Mosher was presented by Mr. Haliburton; and read, setting forth that the Petitioner is one of the Securities for Nicholas Mosher and Jehu Mosher, junior, contractors for building a Bridge over Cornwallis River. That in consequence of the Contractors failing to perform their Contract, he is now confined in the Jail at Windson, at the suit of the the Commissioners; and praying that the House will be pleased to permit him to re-build the said Bridge, upon his giving ample security to the Commissioners for the performance of the work, or afford him such relief in the premises as to them may seem meet.

A Petition of A. Cunard & Son, was presented by Mr. Archibald and read; setting forth, that the Petitioners, encouraged by the vote of the House in the last Session, sitted out and employed a Vessel at a very heavy expense in the Northern Whale Fishery, which has returned unsuccessful. That the Petitioners, not discouraged by the failure of this first attempt, have again sitted out a vessel for the South Sea Fishery, and surnished her with Provisions and Stores requisite for a voyage of sisteen Months, and praying the surther encouragement and aid of the House in such way as to the House may seem meet.

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie on the Table.

Mr. Haliburton, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill to continue the several Acts for encouraging the Establishment of Schools throughout the Province and the same was read a first time.

Resolved, That the Bill be read a second time.

On motion of Mr. Lawson, resolved, That a Committee be appointed to take into confideration the several Laws relating to the Revenue, and to report, if, in their opinion, any, and what, alteration shall be made, in order to obtain a more efficient mode of securing and collecting the Revenue.

Ordered, That Mr. Prescott, Mr. Lawson, Mr. Ritchie, Mr. Cogswell, and Mr. Roach,

be a Committee for the above purpole.

On motion of Mr. Lawson, resolved, That this House will, on Wednesday next, take into consideration His Excellency the Governor in Chief's Speech at the opening of the Session.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the confideration of the Bill in addition to the several Acts, now in sorce, relating to the Office of Sheriff.

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had made some progressing the business to them referred, and that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again on the consideration of the same, which report the House agreed to.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at eleven of the clock.

Tuesday, 15th February, 1820.

PRAYERS.

A Bill to continue the feveral Acts for encouraging the establishment of Schools throughout the Province, was read a second time.

Resolved, That the Bill be committed to a committee of the whole House.

A Petition of William Pride and others, Inhabitants of the County of Shelburne, was presented by Mr. J. I. Chipman, and read, praying an aid for the road from Sable River to Lewes' Head, and from thence past Spearwater's Tavern, being a distance of about four-teen miles, as the making the said road passable with safety to cattle and carriages would be of great public utility.

A perition of John Todd was presented by Mr. Haliburton, and read, setting forth, that the Petitioner has at a great expense established a Stage Coach and Sleigh, which he has continued to run between Windsor and Halisax, for nearly two years, and praying the aid of the House to enable him to pursue his undertaking, which is acknowledged to be of great public convenience, but unfortunately not beneficial to the Petitioner.

Ordered. That the Petitions do lie on the table.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole House, on the confideration of the Bill to continue the several Acts for encouraging the establishment of Schools throughout the Province.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. W. A. Chipman took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had gone through the Bill to them referred, and that he was directed by the committee to report the same to the House without any amendment, and he afterwards delivered the Bill in at the Clerk's table.

Ordered, That the Bill be engrossed.

Then the House adjourned until to morrow, at eleven of the clock.

Wednesday, 16th February, 1820.

PRAYERS.

An engrossed Bill to continue the several Acts for encouraging the establishment of Schools throughout the Province, was read a third time.

Refolved, That the Bill do pais, and that the title be, An Act to continue the feveral Acts now in force for encouraging the establishment of Schools throughout the Province.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the Bill to the Council, and delire their concurrence.

Mr. Cogswell presented to the House an account from Mr. Treasurer Wallace, of all Monies

Monies received by him into, and payments by him made from, the Provincial Treasury, between the 1st January and 31st December, 1819.

Ordered, That the account do lie on the table, to be perused by the Members of the Hour.

A Petition of John Brison, and others, Proprietors of the Town Marsh, so (called,) in Newport, was presented by Mr. Dimock, and read, praying that a Law may be passed to enable them to make regulations for the sencing and depasturing of the said Marsh Land.

A Petition of Francis Rudolf, and others, Inhabitants of the Town of Lunenburg, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying that a Law may be passed for the establishing of a Public Market in the said Town, for the benefit of the Inhabitants.

A Petition of the Rev. Roger Aitken, President of the Lunenburg Farmers' Society, in behalf of the said Society, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying that a Law may be passed for the establishing of Public Markets, and for holding two annual Fairs, for the sale of Cattle, Horses, &c. within the Town of Lunenburg,

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie on the table.

On motion, ordered, That Mr. Archibald have leave to bring in a Bill for establishing Public Markets, &c. in the Town of Lunenburg.

The order of the day being read,

On motion, His Excellency the Governor in Chief's Speech was read by the Clerk, and thereupon,

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House on the consideration of the said Speech.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Pool took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee that they had gone through the business to them referred, and that the Committee had come to two Resolutions thereupon, which they had directed him to report to the House, and he read the same in his place, and afterwards delivered them in at the Clerk's Table, where they were read, and are as follow:

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that a Committee should be appointed by the House, to report what a clual Surveys have been made under the Resolution of this House in the Session of 1816, by which the sum of seven hundred and sifty pounds was granted to destray the expences of a Survey of the Lines of the Counties and Townships, and also of the main roads of the Province, and what part of the said sum of money has been expended; and also to report to the House what further sum of money will be required to complete the said Survey, and also to report the probable expense of an actual Survey of the whole of the unlocated Lands of the Province.

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that a Committee thould be appointed by the House to enquire into, and report upon, the expenditure of all sums of money, that have been heretofore granted for the purpose of completing the Surveys of the several Lakes and Streams between the Shubenaccadie River, and the Harbour of Halifax. And also, to report what sum of money would be necessary to enable His Excellency the Governor, to ascertain, by competent Engineers, the practicability of the proposed Inland Navigation between the Harbour of Halifax and the Bason of Minas, and the probable sum of money, which it would require to complete the undertaking.

The faid Resolutions were read throughout a first and second time, and, upon the Question

severally put thereupon, agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Haliburton, Mr. Ritchie and Mr. W. A. Chipman, be a Committee, agreeably to the first Resolution of the Committee of the whole House.

Ordered, That Mr. Haliburton, Mr. Ritchie, Mr. W. A. Chipman, Mr. Fraser and

Mr.

Mr. Archibald, be a Committee, agreeably to the last resolution of the Committee of the whole House.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at eleven of the clock.

Thursday, 17th February, 1820.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Archibald, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill, for establishing public Markets in the Town of Lunenburg, and for holding annual Fairs, for the sale of Horses, Cattle, &c. and the same was read a first time.

Resolved, That the Bill be read a second time.

Mr. Haliburton, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill for re-building the Bridge over Cornwallis River, and for the relief of Jehu Mosher and Barzilla Mosher, and the same was read a first time.

Resolved, That the Bill be read a second time.

A Petition of Daniel Dickinson, of Parrsborough, was presented by Mr. Dewolf, and read, praying compensation for an injury he alleges to have sustained by a new public road, lately laid out through part of his cultivated Land, and also for a Bridge erected over Partridge Island River at his own expense, which now forms part of the said road, and is used by the public.

A Petition of Thomas Boggs, Lawrence Hartshorne, Jun. and others, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying for a reduction of the duty payable on spirituous liquors distilled within the Province.

A Petition of James Leishman, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying the further indulgence of the House, in allowing him time to pay the sum due by him to the Province, as surety for David Dundas & Co. Insolvent Debtors.

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie on the Table.

Roach, and read, fetting forth, that the Petitioner has taught a School in the Town of Digby, under License, from the 10th Nov. 1818; that two of the Trustees appointed to superintend Schools in the said Town, have refused to sign his certificate, and praying relief.

Chipman, and read, setting forth, that he is at present under confinement in the Jail at Halisax, at the suit of the King, for the sum of £289, due on certain Bonds entered into at the Excise Office, as security for one John Owen, who was the principal, which sum he is totally unable to pay, and praying relief.

Ordered,

Ordered, That the Petition do lie on the table.

Mr. Prescott, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill in addition to an Act for appointing Commissioners of Sewers, and the same was read a first time.

Resolved, That the Bill be read a second time.

Then the House adjourned until to morrow, at twelve of the clock.

A Petition of Thomas Moody was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, setting forth, that he is at present confined in the Jail, at Halisax, at the suit of the King, for the sum of \pounds_368 , as surety for Moody & Boyle, which sum he is totally unable to discharge, and praying relief.

A Petition of John Otterson, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying compensation for an injury he alleges to have sustained by the alteration of the public road

leading from Truro to Halifax, which runs through part of his cultivated Land.

A Petition of Thomas Kerby and John M'Millan, Painters, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying compensation for services performed in affixing Labels at the corners of the different Streets, describing their names, and also numbering the houses and lots within the Town of Halisax, in the year 1815, amounting to the sum of £40 1 7.

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie on the table.

A Petition of Isaac Ditmars, and others, Inhabitants of the Townships of Clements and Annapolis, was presented by Mr. Ritchie, and read, setting forth, that the Inhabitants of Clements, since their first Settlement in that Township, have been in the habit of catching Herrings on the Shore within the Bason of Annapolis, and curing them for home consumption and exportation, to the great advantage of the Petitioners and the Province at large. That 30,000 boxes of Smoked Herrings have been exported from the Port of Annapolis alone in one season, besides pickled Herrings. That about six years since, the Indians commenced shooting Porpoises at the Gut of Annapolis, for the purpose of making Oil, which occupation they have since followed annually, during the season of the Herring Fishery; and that, from the above period, the said Fishery has been on the decline, and in the last season totally sailed. That the Petitioners attribute this failure of the usual run of the Fish into the said Bason, to the destroying of the Porpoises, and the noise occasioned by the siring of guns at the entrance of, and within, the said Gut and Bason of Annapolis, and praying that a Law may be passed to remedy the evil complained of.

Ordered, That the Petition do lie on the Table.

On motion, ordered, that Mr. Ritchie have leave to bring in a Bill agreeable to the prayer of the Petition of Isaac Ditmers, and others; and thereupon,

Mr. Ritchie, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill for the preservation of the Herring Fishery within the Bason of Annapolis, and the same was read a first time.

Resolved. That the Bill be read a second time.

A Petition of John Hovington was presented by Mr. J. I. Chipman, and read, praying for a remission of the Provincial Duties on a certain quantity of Wine, saved from the Ship Adventure, of London, wrecked on Cape Sable, on the 3d November, 1819.

Ordered, That the Petition do lie on the table.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole House, on the consideration of the Bill in addition to the Act for appointing Commissioners of Sewers.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, Mr. Pool took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had gone through the Bill to them referred, and that the committee had directed him to report the faid Bill to the House without any amendment, and he afterwards delivered the Bill in at the Clerk's table: and thereupon,

Mr. Crane moved that the Bill be recommitted, which, being seconded and put, and the House dividing thereon, there appeared for the motion, sixteen; against it, thirteen.

So it passed in the affirmative, and thereupon,

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House on the consideration of the aforesaid Bill.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Pool took the Chair.

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair,

The Chairman reported from the Committee that they had gone through the Bill in addition to the Act for appointing Commissioners of Sewers, and had made an amendment thereunto, which they had directed him to report to the House, and he afterwards delivered the Bill with the amendment in at the Clerk's table.

The faid amendment was read throughout a first and second time, and, upon the question put thereupon, agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That the Bill with the amendment be engroffed.

Mr. Secretary George acquainted the House that he had three Messages from His Excellency the Governor in Chief, to this House, signed by His Excellency, and he presented the said Messages to the House; and the said Messages were severally read, by Mr. Speaker, all the Members being uncovered, and are as follow, viz.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

In the last Session of the General Assembly a Bill was presented to me, for approval, entitled, An Act in amendment of an Act, passed in the forty-second year of His present Majesty's Reign, entitled, An Act to regulate and establish Fees in the Court of Chancery, which I thought proper to reject: first, because the Royal Instructions, under which I act, assign the right of regulating all sees in this Province to the Governor and Council; and, secondly, because I conceive that a Bill, proposing certain alterations in a Court, of which the Executive is the Head, should not have originated without some representation being first made to me of the necessity of such alterations, or without any previous communication with me on the measure.

As, however, I am of opinion that the Fees in this Court require some diminution, and as they have already been established by a Law of the Province, and can, consequently, only be altered by an Act of the Legislature, I shall readily concur with the House of Assembly and His Majesty's Council, in making such alterations in them, as may be thought advisable.

With this view I lay before you some observations on this subject, by one of the Masters in Chancery, which I recommend to your consideration.

DALHOUSIE.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

Y an Official Dispatch, under date of July 10, 1819, received from His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, I am informed that His Royal

Royal Highnes the Prince Regent does not give his confent to the Act of the Legislature, passed in the last Session of the General Assembly, entitled, An Act relating to Marriages, and the issuing of Marriage Licences.

As the policy and propriety of this Act have occasioned much discussion, I deem it proper to flate, to the Legislature, the reasons which have influenced His Royal Highness

to withhold his affent to the Act.

1st. Because the latitude already given under the Law, as it now stands, removes every, real cause of complaint.

2d. By the publication of Banns, in their respective Congregations, Dissenters of all

denominations may be married according to the rites of their respective Churches.

3d. It, is only when the parties prefer being married by Licence, that the obligation arises of their being married agreeably to the forms of the Churcheof: England. fore, there be any grievance in this obligation it is purely optional, and so far from its being advisable to multiply the occasions on which marriages are to be folemnized by License, much inconvenience and irregularity must arise from the extensive use of them.

4th. That it is not the practice of the Church of Scotland to marry under, License; the Church of England allows it, but is not inclined to, encourage, the practice, being aware that if Licenses were indiscriminately given, there would not be the same, security against

irregular Marriages, as there is when celebrated by Banns.

If Marriages under the Licenses proposed were permitted to be indiscriminately, solemnized by diffenting Ministers of all denominations, according to their respective rituals, it would become a fruitful fource of confusion in a matter where irregularity leads to the most painful consequences, while it would entirely pass by the Established Church, impoverish its revenue, and degrade its authority.

DALHOUSIE.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

I take an early opportunity of laying before you an extract of a Letter which I lately re-

ceived from Earl Bathurst, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

"Observing, among the Asts recently received from Nova-Scotia, one entitled "An "Act to continue in force several Acts therein mentioned," the effect of which is to " continue, by one enactment, eleven former Acts, wholly unconnected with each other; I " take this opportunity of calling your Lordship's attention to the extreme inconvenience. "attending a practice of this nature, inasmuch as it precludes the separate confideration of the Acts so renewed, and prevents the disallowance, by His Majesty, of any particular " Law, which may be considered objectionable, without exposing the Colony to the extreme "inconvenience of preventing the operation of other Acts, which may be effentially con-"ducive to its interest and welfare.

" Under these circumstances, I have to request that your Lordship would take such mea-"fures as you may consider most effectual for impressing upon the Legislature the necessity

" of avoiding this practice."

In order to comply with this desire of His Majesty's Government it will be necessary in future that all Acts, which it may be found expedient to renew or continue, may be so framed as to allow of their being separately brought under the Royal Consideration. DALHOUSIE.

The copy of the Prince Regent's Order in Council, was read by the Clerk, and is as follows, viz.

At the Court at Carlton-House, the 7th December, 1818,

PRESENT:

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE REGENT,

&c. &c. &c.

HEREAS by Commission under the Great Seal of Great-Britain, the Governor, Council and Assembly, of the Province of Nova-Scotia, are authorized and empowered to make, constitute and ordain, Laws, Statutes and Ordinances, for the public peace, welfare, and good government of the said Province, which Laws, Statutes and Ordinances, are to be as near as conveniently may be agreeable to the Laws and Statutes of this Kingdom; and are to be transmitted to Ris Majesty, for His Royal approbation or disallowance. And whereas, in pursuance of the said powers, an Act has been passed in the Province of Nova-Scotia, and transmitted, entitled, as follows, viz.

"An Act in amendment of an Act, passed in the 28th year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled, An Act to prevent the circulation of base and counterfeit half-pence, and other copper coin, and to establish the current value of English crowns, half-crowns and shillings, in this Province."

Which Act having been referred to the committee of the Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, appointed for the consideration of all matters relating to Trade and Foreign Plantations, the said Lords of the Committee have this day reported, as their opinion, that the said Act ought to be disallowed. His Royal Highness the Prince Regent was thereupon pleased in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to declare his approbation of the said Report, and pursuant to His Royal Highness's pleasure thereupon expressed, the said Act is hereby disallowed, declared void and of none essent; whereof the Governor or Commander in Chief of His Majesty's said Province of Nova-Scotia, for the time being, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

CHETWYND.

A Petition of the Halifax Steam Boat Company, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying for the aid of the House, either by a grant of Money or by a loan thereof, without interest, or that they may be empowered under such conditions as may be thought advisable to make an Issue of Notes to enable them to provide for the expenses of another Boat for the public accommodation.

A Petition of John Finnerty, James Finnerty, and John Hamilton, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying for a further compensation for an injury they allege to have sustained in the laying out a new public road, through their Lands at Springsield, on the Windsor road.

A Petition of James Archibald, and others, Inhabitants of the District of Colchester, was presented by Mr. William Dickson, and read, praying for a Provincial Loan of Money, similar to the one granted to the County of King's County, and the County of Annapolis, in the last Session of General Assembly.

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie on the Table.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole House, on the consideration of the Petition of James Finnerty, and others; and also, the Petition of Daniel Dickinson.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Pool took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee that they had gone through the business to them referred, and that the Committee had come to two Resolutions thereupon, which they had directed him to report to the House, and he read the same in his place, and afterwards delivered them in at the Clerk's Table, where they were read, and are as follow:

The Petition of James Finnerty, and others, was read and confidered, and thereupon, Resolved, That it is the opinion of this committee, that the Petition should be dismissed.

The Petition of Daniel Dickinson was read, and thereupon,

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this committee that the Petition should be referred to a Committee to be appointed by the House, who are to examine into the merits of the ame, and report thereon to the House.

The faid Resolutions were read throughout a first and second time, and upon the question feverally put thereupon, agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That the Petition of Daniel Dickenson be referred to Mr. Dimock, Mr. Allison and Mr. W. A. Chipman, agreeably to the Resolution of the committee of the whole Mr. House.

Mr. Haliburton reported from the committee appointed on the subject of the Surveys of the several Lakes and Streams between the Shubenaccadie River and the Harbour of Halisax, and also, on the proposed Inland Navigation, between the said Harbour and the Bason of Minas: and he read the same in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

That the committee upon inquiry, find that in the year 1796, the sum of £250 was granted to explore the Dartmouth Lakes, and the Shubenaccadie Lakes, and to ascertain the practicability of effecting an Island Navigation from the Bason of Minas with the Harbour of Halisax, and that the Honorable Michael Wallace was appointed a Commissioner to expend the same.

That the Commissioner, with the approbation of His Excellency Sir John Wentworth, the then Lieutenant-Governor, employed Mr. Isaac Hildrith, an experienced Engineer, and eminently qualified to make the Survey; that Mr. Hildrith, with a practical Land Surveyor, and suitable assistants, made the Survey, and returned the Plan of the same, with the Report and calculation of the probable expense of the whole work, into the Secretary's Office, a copy of which Report the Committee beg leave to submit to the House. That the expense then incurred by that Survey and Report, was £208 13 1, leaving a balance of £41 6 11 undrawn from the Treasury. That in the year 1814, the sam of £150 was granted, and in 1815, the surther sum of £150 was also granted, to complete a Survey and Plan of the Lakes, and proposed Canal, part of which money was applied by William Sabatier, Esq. the Commissioner, towards the deepening and removing obstructions in the Shubenaccadie River, and the residue for the payment of Mr. Valentine Gill, who was employed in making a second Survey and Plan, which Survey and Plan were returned into the Secretary's Office, and, as sar as they go, tend to corroborate the Report of Mr. Hildrith, and to shew the correctness of the level he had taken.

That it has been stated to the Committee by the Hon. Michael Wallace, the Commissioner, that the Survey and Plan of Mr. Hildrith, were submitted by the late Commissioner Duncan to the Navy Board: and that they were so well thought of, by that Board, that, had not the war prevented, it was their intention to have sent out a Naval Engineer, to examine and consirm, or correct, Mr. Hildrith's Report and Estimate.

That the Committee further report that in their opinion a Sum not exceeding two hundred pounds, will be necessary to make such further inquiry and report, pursuant to the Resolution of the House, in case such further Report and inquiry shall be deemed necessary.

The Clerk also read the Report made by Mr. Hildreth, referred to in the foregoing Report of the Committee, and thereupon:

Ordered, That the said Papers do lie on the table, to be perused by the Members of the House.

The Chairman reported from the committee that they had deferred the confideration of the Bill in addition to the several Acts now in force relating to the Office of Sheriff, to this day three months.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that he was directed by the Committee to move

for leave to fit again, on the confideration of the Bills to them referred, which report the House agreed to.

A Petition of Temple Piers & Lewis E. Piers, Merchants of Halifax, was presented by Mr. Atchibald, and read, setting forth, that the Petitioners sitted out a Brig at a heavy expence, which sailed from Halifax in May last, and was employed in the Whale Fishery, for four months on the Coast of Newfoundland; that the said Brig, on her return to Port, with a small quantity of Oil, was unfortunately wrecked on the said Coast, and totally lost, in the Month of October following; and praying that they may be allowed to receive part of the sum of \pounds_{400} , voted in the last Session for the encouraging of the said Fishery.

A Petition of David Sutherland, was presented by Mr. Lawson, and read, praying for the Provincial allowance, as Teacher of the English School, at Ship Harbour, from

the 30th April, 1819.

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie on the Table.

On motion, the Petition of Thomas Moody, the Petition of John Owen, and also' the Petition of Thomas Dobson, were severally read, and thereupon,

Resolved. That the said Petitions be referred to Mr. J. I. Chipman, Mr. Cogswell, Mr. Fraser, Mr. James, and Mr. Freeman, and that the said Committee be instructed to report:

1st. As to the truth of the statement, respectively made in the several Petitions.

2d. As to the folvency of the several Petitioners, at the time of the executing the Bonds

at the Excise Office, upon which the judgments against them have been recovered.

3d. What furcties, if any, were taken with the Petitioners, respectively, for the payment of the monies stated in the said Bonds, and in each of them: in order that the House may be enabled to judge, upon the report of the Committee, whether sufficient sureries have been taken, as directed by Law. The Committee also to report the date of the several Bonds referred to in the Petitions; when the money secured by them became payable; at what time these Bonds were placed in the hands of the Attorney-General, and when they were put in suit, and what was the state of the principal Debtors and their several Sureties, as respects their ability to pay, at the times the several sums of money became payable; and further that the Committee do report, on or before Wednesday, the first day of March next.

Mr. W. A. Chipman reported from the Committee to whom the Accounts of the Commissioners for the Province House were referred, and he read the Report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

That the Committee have examined the Accounts, and the Vouchers in support thereof, and find them correct in the amount, and the balance due thereon, as reported by the Committee of Public Accounts: but that it appears to the Committee, that many charges in the Accounts are exorbitant, and some unnecessary, and also improper, among which are the following, viz.

For Interest paid to Messes. Tobin's, £6 8 4; to John Ross, £26 13 6; to William Kidston & Son, £64 16 2; and to Richard Scott, £29 15 9; amounting to one hundred and twenty-seven pounds thirteen shillings and seven pence; also, a charge for sitting up the Grand Jury Room of forty pounds; and also, a surther charge of £62 for 10 chairs,

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and a fum of £21 for a table and cloth for the Council Chamber, amounting to eighty-three pounds.

Ordered, That the Report do lie on the Table to be perused by the Members of the House.

Mr. Haliburton reported from the Committee to whom the Resolution of the House on the subject of the Surveys of the Province, and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

That the Committee, pursuant to the Resolution of the House, have made enquiry as to the actual Surveys of the Lines of the Townships and Counties, and the main Roads of the Province, and have obtained from the Surveyor-General a statement of those Surveys, which they have subjoined to this Report. That it appears to the Committee that the Surveys of the Lines and Roads of Annapolis and King's County, made by John Harris, Deputy-Surveyor, and mentioned in the annexed Report, are, apparently, the most correct and satisfactory to the Committee, of any which they have seen, and if the actual Surveys of the Lines and Roads of the other Townships and Counties, can be had at the moderate Expence, which has been incurred in making those Surveys and Plans, it would be a very desirable object, and by connecting those Plans, when completed, a most correct Map of the whole Province could be made, by which, at one view, the unlocated Lands would be apparent. The Committee further report, that they have enquired into the expenditure of the sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Pounds, granted in the year 1816, for the purpose of procuring a Survey and Plan of the lines and bounds of the Townships and Counties in the Province, and that, by the Surveyor-General's Account of the Expenditure, it appears that the Grant has been exceeded, and that the whole expense amounts to eight hundred and eighty-four pounds four shillings and four pence, of which fum the Surveyor-General has received only fix hundred and fifty pounds, leaving undrawn in the Treasury, one hundred pounds, and the balance of one hundred and thirty-four pounds four shillings and four pence, claimed by the Surveyor General. The Committee observe, that there is included in this Account a Charge of one hundred and eighty pounds, for money paid to Mr. Lockwood, for completing a Map of the Province, which fum does not appear to have been provided for by the Legislature, and that the Account of a Mr. Gill, wherein he has charged twenty shillings per day, and that of Mr. John Roach, Deputy-Surveyor, wherein he has charged fifteen shillings per day, exclusive of his expenses, are extravagant and ought not to have been The Committee further report that from any information which they can obtain they cannot accurately determine what fum of Money will be requifite to complete the running through the Lines of the Townships and Counties, pursuant to the Resolution of the House, but they are of opinion that a sum not less than five hundred pounds, will be requifice for that purpofe.

The Committee have enquired of the Surveyor-General as to the probable expense which would be incurred, by running out the unlocated Lands of the Province, but cannot obtain such information as will enable them to report, pursuant to the Resolution of the House. But as the Emigrants and others, who are desirous of becoming Settlers, on the ungranted and wilderness lands of the Province, experience great and almost informountable difficulty, and inconvenience, in laying out their Lands, for want of a proper Survey, and as the expense of making the Survey of the ungranted Lands will be very great, the Committee submit to the House the propriety of granting such sum or sums of money, as might be deemed expedient, for the purpose of laying out and opening two or three Roads, through such parts of the ungranted Lands, as are most suitable for settlement, and on which Townships might be laid out, and, by such, facilitate the settlement of the great Tracts of Forest Lands, which are to be found in the Western and Eastern parts of the Province.

The Statement of the Surveyor-General, referred to in the foregoing Report, was also read by the Clerk, and is as follows:

SURVEYOR-GENERAL OF LAND'S OFFICF, Halifax, 18th February, 1820.

SIR,

IN compliance with your desire, as Chairman of the Committee appointed by the House of Assembly, to enquire and report, pursuant to a Resolution of the House which you have been pleased to enclose for my guidance and information:

I beg leave to report as follows:

That all the Public Roads throughout the County of Cumberland, have been carefully and accurately Surveyed, and the traverses of the whole taken, and protracted, and a Plan and Report thereof made and returned to this Office.

The County line at Parrshorough, as far as was required, has been run and marked.

The Public Roads throughout the County of Annapolis, have been accurately Surveyed, the different Surveys connected and formed into one General Plan, and returned into this Office. The dividing line between that County and King's County carefully run and marked.

The Public Roads leading through King's County, have all been Surveyed, and a Plan thereof returned to

this office.

A Survey of the Road from Halifax to Windsor: from Halifax to Truto, with the Roads that diverge from this Main Road to the Shubenaccadie, and towards the Musquodoboit, the Lakes and Waters contiguous to these Roads; the prominent features are pourtrayed on the Map of the whole work, and the Plaus lodged in this Office. This service was performed by Valentine Gill, at the desire of His Excellency Sir John C. Sherbrooke, then Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief.

A Survey of the New Public Roads, from Dartmouth to Fort Sackville, and from Dartmouth to the Truro Road, to the Eastward of Fletcher's Bridge, with a Plan and Report, has been completed and lodged in this

Office.

A Survey has been made of the whole line of Public Roads from the Town of Chester to Avon Bridge.

From Chester to Lunenburg, and from Chester, through Hammond Plains, to the junction of this Public Road, with the Main Road leading from Halifax to Windsor.

The Main Roads leading from the Windsor Road to Rawdon, and through that Settlement.

I have also to Report, that I have given the necessary directions for an accurate Survey of the Public Road,

leading from (near) the Falls of Lahave to Brookfield.

And in furtherance of the object of the Legislature, 1 beg leave to state, I employed Anthony Lockwood, Esq. to assist me in compiling and connecting the several detached Surveys of the Province, into one general Map, on an enlarged Scale, the outline or external limits of which, on the South Shore of the Province, taken from the accurate Surveys of the Coast, by that able and celebrated Surveyor T. F. W. Desbarres, Esq. which, as far as respects the Navigable Harbours, Bays, and Indents of the Coast, have stood the test of minute examination, and excited the admiration, of all experienced Mariners who have visited these Shores.

Thus much having been accomplished, and the lines of the District of Pictou, with its internal Townships of Pictou, Egerton and Maxwelton, having been previously surveyed, and well marked, and also the dividing line between the County of Halifax and Sydney, run out and well marked. The division lines between Chester and Lunenburg Townships, and between New Dublin and Liverpool run out; and it being in contemplation to make alterations, subdivisions and additions, in the old, and to create New Counties and Townships, and which are now under consideration. I did not feel myself justified in proceeding further on this Service, or of the

A Petition of Charles Morris and others, Trustees of the National School, at Halifax, was presented presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying for the aid of the House to enable them to discharge the debt now due, for completing the building erected for the use of the Institution, amounting to nearly the sum of \pounds_{300} .

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie on the Table.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the consideration of the several Bills, which stood committed.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Pool took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee that they had made some progress in the business to them referred, and that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again on the consideration of the same, which Report the House agreed to.

A Message from the Council by Mr. George,

Mr. Speaker,

The Council request a conference by Committee on the subject of the School Bill now before the Council.

And then the Messenger withdrew,

Resolved, That this House do agree to the conference as desired by the Council, and that the Clerk do acquaint the Council therewith.

Oredred, That Mr. Haliburton, Mr. Cogswell, and Mr. Wm. Dixon, do manage the said conference.

And they went to the conference,

And being returned,

Mr. Haliburton reported that the Managers had been at the conference, and stated the substance of the conference to the House.

On motion of Mr. Haliburton, resolved, That this House will, to-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the consideration of the General State of the Province.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at twelve of the Clock.

Tuesday, 29th February, 1820.

PRAYERS.

On motion of Mr. Allison, resolved, That the Trustees of the National School be requested to lay before the House, an account of all the sunds of that School, and from what source they are derived, and how the same are applied, and what is the total annual expense of that Establishment.

A Petition of Walter Bromley, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying to be reimbursed the sum of £29 126, expended in the purchase of Seeds, and for pecuniary

aid for the use of the Indians settled upon the Shubenaccadie River.

A Petition of the Reverend Edmund Burke, and others, the Committee of the Acadian School, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying for pecuniary aid towards the creeding a suitable Building for the purposes of such Institution; and also, for the support and maintenance of the Establishment.

A Petition of the Committee of the Halisax Poor Man's Friend Society, was presented by Mr. Albro, and read, praying for a pecuniary aid to affish in carrying into effect the

benevolent intentions of that Society.

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A Petition of the President and Directors of the Halifax Fire Insurance Company, was presented by Mr. Albro, and read, praying that a Law may be passed to enable the Province to borrow from the said Company, the sum of $\pounds_{10,000}$, on interest, being part of their Capital or Joint Stock, directed by Law to be deposited or secured in the British or Provincial Funds.

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie on the Table.

The Order of the day being read,

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House on the confideration of the General State of the Province.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Pool took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee that they had made some progress in the business to them referred, and that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again on the consideration of the same, which report the House agreed to.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, to consider of a Supply to be granted for the support of His Majesty's Government.

Mr. Speaker left the chair,

Mr. Pool took the chair,

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had made some progress in the business to them referred, and that the Committee had come to a Resolution rereupon, which they had directed him to report to the House, and he read the same in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read and is as follows:

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that a fum of Twelve T housand Pounds, should be granted for the service of Roads and Bridges throughout the Province, for the present year, to be appropriated and applied in such manner as shall hereaster be agreed upon by the Legislature.

The Chairman also acquainted the House, that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to six again, on the consideration of a Supply, which Report the House

agreed to.

The faid Resolution was read throughout, a first and second time, and upon the question put thereupon, agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the Resolution to the Council, and desire their concurrence.

Then the House adjourned until to morrow, at twelve of the clock.

Wednesday, 1st March, 1820.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Speaker delivered to the House the undermentioned Papers, received by him from Mr. Secretary George, which were addressed to his Excellency the Governor in Chief, and accommended by His Excellency, to the consideration of the House, viz.

A Petition of T. F. Gschwind, praying a compensation for services performed by him, as Health Officer for the Port of Halisax, in the last year; also,

A Petition of Edward Ducket, Collector of the Light Duty, for the Port of Halifax, praying for an increased allowance for his services in the collection of the said Duty.

A Petition of Wentworth Taylor, of St. Mary's River, in the County of Sydney, setting forth, that from the great exertions of the Inhabitants, in saving articles from the brig Sir George Beckwith, from Demerara, bound to Newfoundland, which was unfortunately stranded on the Coast, in March last, Duties to the amount of \mathcal{L}_{400} , had been secured to the Province, and praying for a grant of a sum of money, to open and repair Roads adjacent to the Sea Coast, and connected with the main Province Road, in the said County, for the general benefit of the Public; also,

A Letter from Lt. Col. MacColla, acting Adjutant-General of the Militia, soliciting his Excellency's favorable recommendation to the Legislature, that the usual allowance to the Adjutant-General of Militia, for a Clerk, Stationary, and Postage, be allowed to him for the last year, and the like provision made for the Adjutant-General for the present year; and also

A Letter from John Elder and Charles Rathburn, Commissioners of the Main Roads in the County of Hants to Mr. Secretary George, dated, 22d February, 1820, stating the decayed state of the Bridge over the River Avon, recommended to the consideration of the House by His Excellency the Governor in Chief.

The faid Papers were read by the Clerk, and thereupon,

Ordered, That the Papers do lie on the Table. to be perused by the Members of the House.

A Petition of W. K. Reynolds, and others, was presented by Mr. Cogswell, and read, praying that Proprietors of Stone and Brick Buildings, in the Town of Halisax, may be exempt from assessment to pay for Houses pulled down, to prevent the spreading of Fire in the said Town.

A Petition of Jonathan Woodberry, and others, Inhabitants of the Township of Wilmot, in the County of Annapolis, was presented by Mr. Ritchie, and read, setting forth, that, prior to the settlement of the said Township, His Majesty's Government was pleased to issue a Proclamation to encourage emigration from the then New England Provinces, to settle the said Township, then a complete wilderness; and, amongst other things, promised fuch persons as would settle the said Township, the privilege of sending a Member to represent them in General Assembly, as soon as the Township should consist of Fifty Families. That, under the said Proclamation, many Inhabitants of New-England removed to, and settled in, the said Township; that, in ratissication of the premises made by His Majesty's Government, an Act of the General Assembly was passed in the 5th year of His present Majesty's Reign, (1765,) enacting, that when, and as soon as, the said Township should consist of Fifty Families, and upon the same being certified, the said Township should send a Member to represent the Inhabitants thereof in General Assembly. That the said Town. ship now contains more Inhabitants than any other Township within the County of Annapolis. It consists of four hundred families, and has three hundred freeholders within it, as appears by the Certificate annexed. That most of the other Townships mentioned in the faid Act, when, and as they severally extended their Settlement to fifty families, had the privilege of fending a Member to the General Affembly, under the faid Act, and praying that the House would be pleased to take the premises into consideration, and obtain for the Petitioners the privilege promised to them by His Majesty's Government, and confirmed by an Act of the General Assembly, as before stated.

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie upon the Table.

Mr. Fraser, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill for the more easy redemption and foreclosure of Mortgages, and the same was read a first time.

Resolved, That the Bill be read a second time.

Mr. J. I. Chipman reported from the Committee to whom the Petition of Thomas Dobfon, the Petition of John Owen, and the Petition of Thomas Moody, were referred, and the read the Report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

That the Committee gave an early notice to each of the Petitioners, that they would severally be required to afford satisfactory proof of the truth of the Statements made in their respective Petitious, and intimated to them a wish to be furnished with a Schedule of their property, real and personal, and of all their goods, effects and credits, accompanied with an affidavit similar to that required from Petitioners, claiming the benefit of the

Insolvent Debtors Act, leaving the sums to be filled up at their discretion.

That the Committee were not furnished with any affidavits until a late period, which has prevented them from making an earlier report on this subject, and even at this time, the Committee are without such affidavits as they were desirous of obtaining, and those received are are less satisfactory than they could wish, and will not warrant the Committee in conveying to the House their conviction, or belief, of the inability of the Petitioners to satisfy the Judgments against them, although the Committee are induced to believe, that the Petitioners are in embarrassed circumstances, and are not now solvent.

The Committee also report, that the Judgments were recovered against the Petitioners and others, at the times and for the respective sums set forth in the annexed certificate of Mr. Nutting, the Deputy Prothonotary,

That the Judgment recovered against John Owen and Thomas Dobson, therein mentioned, is for impost and Excise Puties, secured on two several Bonds, bearing date, the 11th Nov. 1814, and 25th July, 1815, made by the said John Owen and Principal, and the said Thomas Dobson, as his only Surety, and upon which Bonds there appears to be due for principal and interest, a balance of L.281 17 $5\frac{1}{2}$, about fifty pounds of which, are for interest computed in the said Bonds. That the said Bonds severally became due in one year from the respective dates thereof, and were payable in equal quarterly payments. That the whole sum due upon the Judgment recovered for principal, interest and costs, amounts to the sum of L.289 13 $9\frac{1}{2}$, for which the said Thomas Dobson, the security, has been committed to Gaol, the said John Owen having hitherto kept himself close, in the hope of being ultimately delivered by the Order of the House of Assembly.

That the Judgment recovered against John Moody, Joseph P. Boyle, and Thomas Moody, in the said

That the Judgment recovered against John Moody, Joseph P. Boyle, and Thomas Moody, in the said Certificate mentioned, is also for Impost and Excise Duties, secured in like manner, on three several Bonds, entered into by the said John Moody and Joseph P. Boyle, as principals, and the said Thomas Moody, as their only Security, bearing date the 29th July, 18th August, and 18th September, 1817, respectively, and upon which Bonds there remains due, a balance of L.358 18 $10\frac{1}{2}$, principal. That the said last mentioned Bonds, were also payable in one year from the respective dates thereof, by four equal quarterly payments, and that the amount due on said Judgment, for debt and costs of suit, is in the whole the sum of L.367 12 $6\frac{1}{2}$, and in

satisfaction of which the said Thomas Moody, the Petitioner, was committed to Gaol in December last.

The Committee further report, that the Bonds of the said John Owen and Thomas Dobson, were in July, 1816, placed by the Collector of Impost and Excise, in the hands of the Attorney-General, for prosecution, as will appear by the Certificate of the said Collector, hereunto annexed; and in January. 1817, a writ of Summons was issued, against the said John Owen, and Thomas Dobson, and a Judgment obtained thereon in May following. The Committee also find that the said John Owen, and Thomas Dobson, were generally reported to be solvent, at the time the respective Bonds were taken, and when they became due, and they are of opinion that the amount

thereof might have been secured at that period, and payment thereof since obtained.

That the Bonds of the said John Moody, Joseph P. Boyle, and Thomas Moody, were placed by the said Collector of Impost and Excise, in the Hands of the Attorney-General in Nov. 1819, soon after they were taken, and an Attachment at the suit of the King, was issued against them in the same month, (Nov.) at which time but one quarterly payment had become due on the first Bond. That in March, 1818, an alias attachment was issued against them, and levied on the personal property of John Moody, only, to the amount of L.50786 and Judgment was thereupon obtained against them in April, and signed in May following. The Committee also find that in October, 1817, an attachment at the suit of the Hon. Charles Hill, was issued against the said John Moody, and Thomas Moody, for a large sum of money, which attachment does not appear to have been returned into the Prothonotary's Office, but Judgment, by confession, was obtained thereon, against the Defendants in July, 1818, and Execution subsequently issued, which does dot appear to be returned, but which the Committee understand was levied on the real property of Thomas Moody.

The Committee further find that the said John Moody, Joseph P. Boyle, and Thomas Moody, were reputed to be solvent and in good circumstances at the time the last mentioned Bonds were respectively taken. But that the said John Moody and Joseph P. Boyle, the principal debtors, soon after failed and became Bankrupts, but the Committee have reason to believe that the said Thomas Moody was considered solvent, and was able to satisfy

the said Bonds, at that time, and when they became due.

The Committe have also turned their attention to the Act of Assembly, passed in the 57th year of His present Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act for the more effectual relief of Insolvent Debtors," by which ample provision appears to have been made for the relief and discharge of Insolvent Persons imprisoned for debt, at the suit of the Grown, and the Committee cannot perceive any necessity, while this Law is in force, for an application to the House of Assembly, unless in very special cases, and where the object in view cannot be obtained under the regulations and provisions of that Act.

Lastly, the Committee cannot refrain from suggesting for the consideration of the House, the propriety and expediency of adding a clause to the Revenue Laws, by which the Excise Officer shall be made responsible for all Monies secured by Bond, if he shall neglect for the space of thirty days, after any quarterly payment becomes due, to take the proper steps to enforce such payment, or if he shall neglect to take two or more Sureties on each Bond, which the Committee conceive are required by the existing Laws, but which they have reason to believe are

in too many instances not taken.

Ordered, That the said Report do lie on the Table, to be perused by the Members of the House.

On motion, resolved, That this House will, on Friday next, the 3d inst. take into consideration the several Private Petitions now before the House.

On motion, resolved, That a further conference be held with His Majesty's Council upon the subject of the Bill now before the Council, for the continuing the Act for the support of English Schools, and that the Committee of this House be instructed to state to the Committee of the Council, that the House is satisfied that the Ways and Means will be sufficient to enable them to provide for all the Schools which may be entitled to the Provincial Allowance under the said Act, and that the Clerk do request the same.

A Petition of the Trustees of the Pictou Academy, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying for a pecuniary aid towards the support of that Establishment, and in aid of their undertaking.

A Petition of George Grassie, and others, Merchants, interested in the Trade, Agriculture and Fisheries, of the Province, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying for a grant of Money to enable them to discharge an arrear of £163 sterling, due to Nathaniel Atcheson, Esq. for his services during the time he was employed as Special Agent.

A Petition of Gideon C. White, was presented by Mr. J. I. Chipman, and read, praying for a Drawback of the Duties on 3158 gallons of Rum, exported to Boston, in April,

1817, amounting to £131 1s. 11d

A Petition of Boggs and Hartshorne, and others, Merchants of Halifax, was presented by Mr. Archibald, and read, praying for certain alterations in the Revenue Laws, by which in the opinion of the Petitioners a relief will be afforded to the Merchants, and Commerce of the Province, and the Provincial Revenue more effectually secured.

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie on the Table.

Town of Halifax, was presented by Mr. Lawson, and read, stating the expediency of imposing a Duty on the importation of Superfine and Fine Flour, from the United States of America, and the adopting of certain regulations for the benefit of the Export Trade from the Province.

Then the House adjourned until To-morrow, at twelve of the Clock.

Thursday, 2d March, 1820.

PRAYERS.

A Bill for the more easy redemption and foreclosure of Mortgages, was read a second time.

Resolved, That the Bill be committed to committee of the whole House.

Mr. Prescott reported from the Committee on the subject of the Revenue Laws, and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

That the Committee have diligently investigated the subject to them referred, and, in their opinion, no part of the Impost Duties paid or secured upon articles imported in Vessels not owned in the Province, or by non-resident persons, should be drawn back upon exportation thereof. That they are also of opinion, that the Master of each and every Registered Vessel shall, within twenty-four hours after arrival within the District of any Collector of Impost and Excise, report upon Oath, at the Office of such Collector, what articles such Vessel had on board during her last voyage.

The Committee do also most strongly recommend that more suitable persons be appoint-

ed to fill the Office of Collector of Impost and Excise, in Districts where the Collectors have neglected to give the Bonds and discharge the Duties required by Law; and do also recommend that an additional number of Preventive Officers be appointed in the Districts and Ports in the Bay of Fundy. The Committee are also of opinion, that it is expedient to pass an Act, similar to one which was passed in the 18th year of His Majesty Reign, entitled, An Act for the more speedy recovery of His Majesty's Debts within this Province.

Ordered, That the Report do lie on the Table, to be perused by the Members of

the House.

A Message from the Council by Mr. George, Mr. Speaker,

The Council request a conference by Committee on the subject of the Resolution for granting the sum of $\mathcal{L}_{12,000}$, for the service of Roads and Bridges.

The Council have agreed to a further conference on the subject of the School Bill.

And then the Messenger withdrew,

Resolved. That this House do agree to the conference as desired by the Council, and that the Clerk do acquaint the Council therewith.

Ordered, That Mr. Dewolf, Mr. Ritchie, and Mr. Lawson, do manage the said conference.

And they went to the conference.

Ordered, That the Managers who managed the last conference on the subject of the School Bill, do manage the further conference with the Council on the said Bill.

And they went to the conference.

On motion, ordered, That the Estimate of the Expence for the Civil Establishment of His Majesty's Government, for the year 1820, be referred to the Committee of Supply, and thereupon,

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, to

confider further of a Supply.

Mr. Speaker left the chair,

Mr. James took the chair,

Mr. Speaker refumed the chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had made further progress in the business to them referred, and had come to a Resolution thereupon, which they had directed him to report to the House, and he read the same in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read and is as follows:

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that it is expedient to reduce the

Civil Lift for the ensuing year.

The Chairman also acquainted the House, that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again, on the consideration of a Supply, which the House agreed to.

The Resolution was read, throughout, a first and second time, and, upon the

question put thereupon, agreed to by the House.

Mr. Archibald reported from the Committee of Privileges, to whom the two Messages of His Excellency the Governor in Chief to this House, on the 22d February last, were referred, and he read the Report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

That the Committee have carefully examined the Messages to them referred, and as to the matter contained in the abstract of the Letter from Earl Bathurst to His Excellency, relative to the Act to continue in force the several Acts therein mentioned, they beg to

flate, for the information of this Honorable House, that it has been the uniform practice of the Assembly of Nova-Scotia, since it sirst became necessary to continue such Laws, thus to continue in one Act the several Acts which they have considered expedient to renew or continue, nor does it appear to the Committee that any exception has been taken to that mode of continuing the Laws about to expire from that time to the present. But it appears to the Committee that all Acts should be so framed as to allow of their being separately considered, and therefore the Committee submit to this Honorable House, the expediency of so framing their Acts in suture.

The Committee have also had under consideration the first reason afforded by His Excellency to the House of Assembly, for rejecting the Bill which passed in the last Session of the General Assembly, entitled, An Act in amendment of an Act, passed in the 42d year of His present Majesty's reign, entitled, "An Act to regulate and establish Fees in the Court of Chancery," in which His Excellency states that the Royal Instructions under which he acts assign the right of regulating all Fees in this Province, to the Governor and Council; and the Committee are fully of opinion, that the Royal Instructions cannot constitutionally assign the right of regulating Fees in this Province to the Governor and Council, but that the right of establishing and regulating all Fees is constitutionally vested in the Legislature of this Province only.

Ordered, That the Report do lie on the Table to be perused by the Members of the House.

The Order of the day being read: thereupon,

Resolved, That this House will, on Saturday the 4th instant, take into consideration His Excellency the Governor in Chief's Message on the subject of Marriage Licenses.

Pursuant to leave given, Mr. Allison presented a Petition of William S. Church, and others, owners of Vessels in the County of Hants, setting forth, that the Petitioners are greatly aggrieved by the heavy Fees payable at the Custom House, and praying relief.

Ordered, That the Petition do lie on the Table.

Then the House adjourned until To-morrow, at eleven of the clock,

Saturday, 4th March, 1820.

PRAYERS.

A Bill for the appointment of Commissioners to Issue Treasury Notes, and to establish a Loan Office, in the District of Colchester, was read a second time, and thereupon,

Mr. Dimock moved, that the confideration of the Bill be postponed to this day three months, which, being seconded and put, passed in the Negative.

Resolved, That the Bill be committed to a Committee of the whole House.

Mr. Speaker delivered to the House the undermentioned Papers received by him from Mr. Secretary George, recommended to the consideration of the House, by his Excellency the Governor in Chief, viz.

A Petition of F. Carter Pike, Surgeon, praying for a compensation for his Services for Vaccinating Poor Persons of Colour, in the year 1818. Also,

A Letter from Francis Vaughan, Commissioner of Roads at Chester, stating the decayed and ruinous state of the Bridge over Gold River.

The faid Papers were read by the Clerk, and thereupon,

Ordered, That the Papers do lie on the Table to be perused by the Members of the House.

The Clerk communicated to the House a Letter he had received yesterday from Colonel Darling, the Military Secretary, requesting to know what has been done by the House of Assembly, respecting a Drawback due to the Public on 35,326 gallons of Rum, issued to the Troops, by Deputy-Commissary-General Damerum, in the year 1817, for the information of the Commander of the Forces: and thereupon,

Resolved, That the said Letter be referred to Mr. Haliburton, Mr. Cogswell, and Mr. Barss, who are to examine into the subject matter thereof, and report thereon to the House.

Mr. Prescott reported from the Committee to whom the Petition of A. Cunard & Son, and also the Petition of Temple Piers and Lewis E. Piers, were referred, and he read the Report in his place and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read and is as follows:

That the Committee have made the necessary enquiries on the subjects to them referred, and find that the Vessels named in the Petitions, were actually fitted out and employed in the Whale Fishery, agreeable to the Resolution of the House, passed in the last Session, as will more fully appear by the Certificates, and Assidavits hereunto annexed, and the Committee consider them entitled to receive the sum of one hundred pounds, for each Vessel. It also appears by the Petition of Messes. A. Cunard and Son, that they have sitted out a Vessel for the Southern Whale Fishery, and the Committee beg leave to recommend that a Bounty be provided to encourage them in an enterprize that is likely to prove so beneficial to the Commerce of the Province, and thereupon,

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Ordered, That the said Report and the Petitions be referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Fraser reported from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Governor in Chief, with the two Resolutions of this House, passed yesterday, on the subject of Custom House Fees, that the Committee had waited upon, and delivered to His Excellency the said Resolutions, pursuant to the Order of the House, and that His Excellency was pleased to say to the Committee, that he would cause an enquiry to be made into the subject matter of the said several Resolutions, and would convey to the House an answer on Monday next.

On motion, the House proceeded to the further consideration of the several Private

Petitions before the House, and thereupon,

The Petition of Charles Morris and others, the Trustees of the National School. The Petition of the Trustees of the Acadian School. The Petition of the Committee of the Poor Man's Friend Society. The Petition of the Trustees of the Pictou Academy; and also the Petition of George Grassie, and others, were severally read, and thereupon,

Resolved, That the Petitions be severally referred to the Committee of Supply.

The Petition of John Black and others, was read, and thereupon,

Resolved, That the Petition be referred to Mr. Roach, Mr. Lawson, and Mr. Albro, who are to examine into the merits of the same, and report thereon to the House.

The Petition of the President and Directors of the Halifax Fire Insurance Company was

read, and thereupon

Resolved, That the Petition be referred to the Committee of Ways and Means.

The Petition of W. K. Reynolds, and others, was read, and thereupon,

Resolved, That leave be given to bring in a Bill for the relief of the Petitioners.

The Order of the day was read: and thereupon,

On motion, resolved, that this House will, on Monday next, the 6th inst. take into consideration His Excellency the Governor in Chief's Message on the subject of Marriage Licenses.

Then the House adjourned until Monday, at eleven of the Clock.

Monday, 6th March, 1820.

Mr. Speaker communicated to the House, a letter which he this morning received from Mr. Secretary George, and the same was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:

Provincial Secretary's Office, Halifax, March 4, 1820.

SIR,

N compliance with the request of the House of Assembly, signified to the Governor in Chief, by the Committee which waited upon His Excellency this day, the Collectors of His Majesty's Customs for the Ports of Halisax and Shelburne, have been directed to lay before the House, a Statement of the Fees now taken by them, and the several Officers of the Customs within their respective Districts, together with a Copy of all the Instructions which they have received on the subject of Fees since the year 1807, and a Statement of all the King's Customs, collected by them and their Deputies, respectively, since the year 1816.

I am also instructed to acquaint you, that, by command of His Excellency, the Collector of the Customs for the Port of Halifax, will present in person to the House of Assembly

the D ocuments required of him, at twelve o'clock, on Tuesday next, and will give such other information, consistent with his Official Duty, as the House may desire. I have the honor to be,

Ordered, That the Letter do lie on the Table.

Mr. Secretary George acquainted the House that he had a Message from His Excellency the Governor in Chief to this House, signed by His Excellency, and he presented the said Message to the House, and the said Message was read by Mr. Speaker, all the Members being covered, and is as follows:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

MUST again specially recommend to your notice, the Road through the Military Settlements, lately established in the Counties of Annapolis and Lunenburg. I rode through these Settlements, last October, and as I am satisfied that they deserve every encouragement, I earnestly hope that the House will not now be less disposed to promote their prosperity, than they were in the last Session.

I conceive it also to be my duty to call your attention in a particular manner to the Road from Halifax to Chester, which is literally impassible. A great part of the population of the South and West Coast, is in consequence obliged, when desirous of visiting the Capital, to come by Sea to Halifax, or to make a circuitous Journey by the Northern Coast

of the Province.

The House will at once see the necessity of making some provision to remedy this inconvenience.

I also strongly recommened to the care of the House, the great leading Road from Musquodoboit to St. Mary's River and Guysborough.

And they went to the conference.

And being returned.

Mr. Dewolf reported that the Managers had been at the conference, and stated the sub-stance of the conference to the House.

On motion of Mr. Dimock, relolved, That no Bill be brought into the House after Monday the 20th instant.

On motion the House proceeded to the further consideration of the several Petitions before the House.

A Meffage from the ouncil by Mr. George,

Mr. Speaker,

The Council have not agreed to the Resolution of this House, for granting the sum of £12,000, for the service of Roads and Bridges.

And then the Messenger withdrew.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House on the consideration of the several Bills which stood committed.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Pool took the Chair.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had gone through the Bill for the appointment of Commissioners to Issue Treasury Notes, and to Establish a Loan Office in the District of Colchester, and that he was directed by the Committee to report the said Bill without any amendment, and he afterwards delivered the Bill in at the Clerk's Table.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to fit again on the consideration of the several Bills to them referred, which the House agreed to.

Ques. 1. In Custom-House Regulation do you consider the Port of Shelburne for the purposes of entering and clearing Vessels to and from such Port and Halifax respectively, as similar to the Custom-House at New-

Brunswick?

2d. Do you consider the Ports of New-Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and Cape-Breton, as Foreign Ports, and demand fees accordingly, and if so, under what authority?

3d. Do not many of your Deputies in the Out or Member Ports of this Province, hold Deputations jointly or separately from yourself and the Comptroller of His Majesty's Customs?

4th. Are not several of your Deputies within your own knowledge, now holding Deputations from the Naval Officer of the Port of Halifax, and acting as Deputies in that Department?

5th. What Fees are taken by you upon clearing out Vessels from 50 tons and upwards, for Foreign Ports or Coasting Voyages respectively?

6th. What authority have you to appoint Deputies in the Out or Member Ports of the District of Halifax : what

Instructions do you give them: what Fees are they directed to receive?

7th. What is the amount of His Majesty's Customs and of the Fees respectively received by you, and the several persons acting under you, in the different parts of the Province respectively, during each year since 1816?

8th. What is the amount of His Majesty's Customs taken and received at the Port of Windsor, in any one year, since the year 1816?

9th. What is the amount of Fees taken and received by your Deputy at the Port of Windsor, in any one year since the year 1816?

10th. What are the Fees taken by your Deputies in the Out or Member Portsof this Province, for reporting?

11th. By the Records of your Office can you ascertain at what period the District of the Custom-House of Nova-Scotia, comprehended the present Province of New-Brunswick, and the Islands of Cape-Breton, and Prince

Edward Island.

12th. At what period was a change made in the mode of transacting business at the Custom-House, as respects

Cockets to lade on board, and Permits to landarticles: why are they now given separately and not together

for the whole lading as formerly, and what difference is ocasioned in the Fees by the newly adopted mode?

13th Would not one General Cocket be sufficient to authorise the lading of a whole Cargo, although the Cargo might be owned by twenty or more persons, and do the Acts of Parliament require more, and do you give separate Permits for landing articles to correspond in point of Number with the number of Cockets?

14th Is one general rule practised by all your Deputies or persons acting under you, as respects the mode of granting Cockets?

15th. Do you, when requested, deliver a specification of the particular items which compose the amount of Fees demanded by you upon the entrance or clearance of Vessels?

16th. Will you specify what items compose the Bill of charges now produced?

17th. Is the appointment of Deputy Comptroller of the Customs, of any service, if the appointment is held jointly with the Deputation under you?

18th. Do you conceive that any advantage is produced to His Majesty's Revenue, of the Customs, by the appointment of your Deputies at the Out or Member Ports of your District, to be Doputy Comptroller of the Customs?

19th. At what time was an additional Surveyor and Searcher appointed at this Port: has it occasioned any additional expense to Vessels, and cannot one officer of this description perform that duty at this Port?

20th. Have your Deputies in any cases within your knowledge, received the Fees appointed under the Fee Table, to Surveyors and Searchers, and Waiters, if so, have such Deputies paid you any part of such Fees?

21st. In Vessels cleared from the Member Ports within your District to the Province of New-Brunswick, the Islands of Cape-Breton and Prince Edward Island, what are the Fees, if under fifty tons; what are the Fees if between fifty and one hundred tons; and what Fees are paid by those over one hundred tons?

On motion of Mr. Ritchie, resolved, that the Collector of His Majesty's Customs for the Port of Haisfax, being a Member of His Majesty's Council, should be received as such when he attends the House.

The Collector of His Maj fly's Customs attended the House, and coming to the Bar

uncovered, Mr. Speaker informed him that it was the pleasure of the Houle that he should fit and be covered, and a chair being placed for him at the Clerk's Table, he, being feated, delivered to the House the following papers, viz:

A copy of the Table of Fees, taken by the Officers of the Customs at the Port of Halifax, in Nova-Scotia.

An account of the Annual Receipt of His Majesty's Duties at the Port of Halifax, and at the several Out Ports within the District thereof respectively, during the years 1816, 1817, 1818, and 1819.

An extract of a Letter from B. B. Dean, R. Thompson, and George Wyke, to the Collector and Comptroller, dated, Halifax, 28th October, 1811, on the subject of the Coasting

A copy of a Letter from W. Roe, J. Williams, J. Buller, and William Boothby, Commissioners of the Customs, to the Collector and Comptroller, dated Custom-House, London, 17th July, 1817, on the subject of a general certificate of the landing of a cargo.

A copy of Notice respecting certificates to cancel Bonds, dated London, 17th July, 1817. A copy of a Letter from F. T. Luttrel, J. Barne, B. B. Dean, and J. Buller, Commissioners of the Customs, dated Custom House, London, January, 1818, on the subject of Veffels carrying Goods from Cape Breton, Nova-Scotia, New-Brunswick and Canada, not to be deemed carrying coastwife; and also,

An extract of a Letter from the Honorable Board of Cultoms, dated, London, 10th July, 1819, to the Collector and Comptroller, relative to the principal Waiter's Fee.

After which the Questions before stated, were, by Order of the House, severally put to the said Collector by the Speaker, to which Questions he made the answers respectively, as followeth, viz:

Answer to Question 1. They are governed by the same Table of Fees, I believe.

Answer to Question 2. 1 do consider them as Foreign Ports, and that I have a right to receive the Fees under my

Answer to Question 3. If they do, with one exception, it is irregular, and not sanctioned by me.

Answer to Question 4. I believe they do hold those Commissions, and I should make no objection to their doing so.

Answer to Question 5. I must refer to the Table of Fees.

Answer to Question 6. I am not prepared to answer to that question.

Answer to Question 7. The first part of that question relating to the amount of the Customs, is answered by one of the documents given in ; the latter part relating to the amount of Fees received, I consider to be of a private nature, and therefore conceive I am not bound to give any information to this Honorable House thereon.

Answer to Question 8. Answered by the statement of Duties already given in.

Answer to Question 9. I beg to refer to the answer to the 7th Question.

Answer to Question 10. I should hope that they were governed by the Table of Fees.

Answer to Question 11. If I am furnished with a written memorandum, I will endeavour to give an early answer. Answer to Question 12. I found myself authorized on my arrival to follow that practice, and I am not aware of any change.

Answer to Question 13. I consider that as a very loose practice, and that I am authorized by the Acts of Part liament to pursue the course I now do. Twenty importers may be interested in one Cocket, and Permits granted accordingly.

Answer to Question 14. I cannot answer this Question.

Answer to Question 15. I am not aware of any such demand having been made, but if it had been made, I should have had no objection to comply with it.

Answer to Question 16. If you furnish me with that Bill of Charges, I will take time and consider whether I will answer it or not.

Answer to Question 17. None whatever.

Answer to Question 18. That is a question which affects the interest of another Officer, and which I decline answering.

Answer to Question 19. There is no such officer appointed.

Answer to Question 20. They have, and I, together with the Comptroller, have received one half. Answer to Question 21. The Table of Fees makes no difference with respect to the Tonnage of Vessels.

The Collector of the Customs then withdrew from the House.

On motion, resolved, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration, and report upon the Petition of David Crowell, Junr. and others; and also, the Petition of W.S. Church, and others, complaining of the Fees taken by the Officers of His Majesty's Customs; and also, to Report upon the documents and facts which have been laid before the House, by the Collector of His Majesty's Customs, for the Port of Halifax; and also, to Report if any, and what grievances exist; and what may be the proper remedy therefor.

Ordered, That Mr. Fraser, Mr. Ritchie, Mr. Lawson, Mr. Prescott, Mr. Sargent, Mr. Bingay, Mr. Smith, and

Mr. Cogswell, be a Committee for the above purpose.

An engroffed Bill for the appointment of Commissioners to Issue Treasury Notes, and to establish a Loan-Office in the District of Colchester, was read a third time. Resolved Resealved, That the Bill do pass, and that the title be, An Act for the appointment of Commissioners to Issue Treasury Notes, and to establish a Loan Office in the District of Colchester.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at eleven of the Clock.

Resolved, That the Bill he read a fecond time.

A Bill to authorize the sale of one third part of the Glebe Land, in the County of Lunenburg, was read a second time.

Resolved, That the Bill be committed to a Committee of the whole House.

Mr. Haliburton reported from the Committee to whom the Petition of the Halifax Steam Boat Company was referred, and he read the Report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

That it appears to the Committee that very great advantages to the Public, have been derived from the running of the Team Boat, between Halifax and Dartmouth; as the Country is rapidly improving to the Northward and Eastward of Halifax, and Roads of Communication opened in different directions from Dartmouth with the interior of the

Country, and others are projected.

That in the opinion of the Committee, it will be more extensively beneficial to the Country, if the Company should establish the second Boat proposed by them, so as to have one Boat constantly employed. The Committee are also of opinion, that, in addition to the advantages which the Act of Incorporation affords to the Company, by giving to them the exclusive right of using such Boats, some aid should be granted to the Petitioners, and considering the Team Boat as affording to the Public almost all the advantages which might be derived from a Bridge,

The Committee recommend to the House to assist the Petitioners by a loan of a Sum of Money, without Interest, for a certain period, or by a grant of a sum of Money, not

to be drawn from the Treasury until the second Boat shall be provided.

Ordered, That the Report do lie on the Table to be perused by the Members of the House.

Mr. Flemming reported from the Committee to whom the Petition of F. Carter Pike, was referred, and he read the Report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's table, where it was read and is as follows:

That the Committee have examined into the merits of the Petition; and find that the Petitioner did attend upon, and Vaccinated, nearly one hundred of the People of Colour, fettled at Hammond Plains, which occasioned him much trouble and some expense, and therefore recommend that the sum of sixteen pounds should be granted to the Petitioner in sull for his services, and thereupon,

On motion, ordered, That the Report be referred to the Committee of Supply.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, to consider further of Ways and Means.

Mr. Speaker left the chair,

should be paid on every Hog, which may be imported from the said United States.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again, on the consideration of Ways and Means, which Report the House agreed to.

The faid Resolutions were read throughout a first and second time, and thereupon,

Mr. Lawson moved, that the second Resolution, so far as relates to imposing an additional Duty of Ten Shillings on every Horse, be not agreed to the House, which, being seconded and put, and the House dividing thereon, there appeared for the motion, nine; against it, twenty:

That every facility, confishent with the public interest, should be afforded to persons exporting dutiable articles to the United States of America, to enable them to obtain a Drawback of the That the Committee are of opinion that the Commissioners of Duties upon exportation. the Revenue should be invested with discretionary power to establish such rules and regulations, under which dutiable articles, exported to the United States of America, may be entitled to the Drawback, as may be deemed sufficient to guard the Revenue from loss, and be best adapted to the variations to which our trade with that country must in all probability be exposed. Penakies against relanding dutiable articles, shipped for exportation may be continued or augmented. But the Committee are of opinion that a leffer degree of evidence of the landing of fuch articles in the United States than has heretofore been required, should hereafter be received as satisfactory. That in respect of the general benefit which would arise from subjecting to the leffer duty only such articles, of West India Produce, as may be imported into this Province in vessels owned here, although purchased with the produce of any of the British North-American Colonies, the Committee are unable to form a correct and decided opinion; it appears clearly that the navigation of the Province would be benefited, but it feems probable that such a measure would operate unfavorably upon our Fisheries, and the Produce of the Province, exported to the As the larger duty payable upon West-India importations, not purchased Weil-Indies. with articles of our produce or manufacture, has operated to encourage the increase of every article which this Province may from its industry and resources export. The Committee conceive that a departure from that long established principle of Revenue regulation, a measure of sufficient importance to merit the serious consideration of the General Asiembly.

Your Committee have paid particular attention to that part of the Petition which prays for the adoption of a mode of securing the Provincial Duties altogether novel in this Country; the privilege sought for, that Importers may have the option of securing the Duties payable on such importations by instalments as heretofore, or of depositing the articles in Warehouses, in Custody of the Collector of Impost and Excise, if granted by

the Legislature, will be attended with additional trouble and expense, and will require an adoption of all our Revenue Laws to such proposed system. The advantage to be derived from the change appears to be doubtful. Precedents drawn from the practise of our Parent Country are inapplicable in many respects. The vast disproportion which exists in the Duties upon the same articles (as compared with the prime cost) in Great-Britain and in this Province, renders it dissicult to decide, whether a practice, there sound convenient and beneficial, could be introduced without prejudice here; granting to the Importer, the option would render it necessary for the Province to prepare for the alternative. The adoption of the Wharehousing system to the total exclusion of the other has not been suggested as desirable. Under all the circumstances therefore, the Committee forbear to recommend any thing decisive upon this subject, but beg to refer it entirely to the decision of the Assembly.

That in the performance of his dangerous and important Duty, the Health-Officer incurred various expenses, which the Committee recommend should be repaid to him, together with a compensation for his services in full to the present period; and the Committee are of opinion that, for such expenses and services, the Petitioner should be allowed the sum of one hundred and ten pounds.

Mr. Archibald reported from the Committee appointed to prepare Instructions to be given to the Committee of this House, to be used in a further conference with the Council, on the subject of the additional Excise Bill, that the Committee had prepared the Instructions accordingly; and he read the same in his place, and afterwards delivered them in at the Clerk's Table, were they were read and are as follow:

That, in the last Session of the General Assembly, the attention of the House was called by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor to the flate of the Revenue, with a recommendation from His Excellency that it should be further advanced; and the House, in their Address in answer thereto, undertook seriously to consider the expediency of further augmenting it; and the House did accordingly take the subject into consideration, and being of opinion that an additional Duty of Excise should be imposed on all Goods imported into Province, they accordingly passed the Bill in Question; from the limitation of the Colonial Trade, the Goods, Wares and Merchandise, upon which the Assembly considered the additional Duty of one and a quarter per cent. should be paid, must principally be imported from Great-Britain, although that part of the Goods thus subject to the additional Duty, are of the growth, manufacture, or produce of Great-Britain; and as the Duty levied by that Act attaches only upon such Goods, Wares and Merchandise, as are confumed in this Province, it appears to the House, that it is a Duty constitutionally imposed upon, and payable by, the Inhabitants of the Province. The House further state, that this Duty is not complained of by the Inhabitants of this Province, who are subject to the payment of the customary rates and duties imposed by the Legislature; but the objection is principally made by interested individuals, many of whom are transient persons, having but a temporary residence within the Province, for the purposes of trade. The House are surther of opinion, that the importations from Great-Britain, are not in the least diminished by the imposition of this Duty; and, as the Province is still in debt, and its Revenue on the decline, owing to the depression of the West-India Trade, from which its principal support has been derived; for these reasons, the House were, at the time of the continuing this

Law, and still are of opinion, it ought to be continued; and the House further state, that during the progress of the Bill, in the House of Assembly, no remonstrance was made against it, by Petition or otherwise, either in the last or present Session.

A Message from the Council by Mr. George,

Mr. Speaker,

The Council have agreed to a Bill, entitled, An Act to continue an Act, entitled, An

Act to revive and continue an Act, made and passed in the thirty-eighth year of His prefent Majesly's, reign entitled, An Act to amend, and render more effectual, an Act, passed in the eighteenth year of His present Majesty's reign, entitled, An Act to prevent forestalling, regrating, and monopolizing, of Cord Wood, in the Town of Halisax; and also,

A Bill, entitled, An Act in further amendment of an Act, passed in the second year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled, An Act for appointing Firewards, ascertaining their duty,

and for punishing thefts and disorders at the time of fire.

The Council have agreed to three Resolutions of this House, for granting the following sums, Viz.

£19 19 6 to Gideon C. White.

£25 to Daniel Sutherland.

£25 to Thomas Holland,

And then the Messenger withdrew.

Mr. Fraser reported from the Committee on the subject of the Custom-House, and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered the same in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read and is as follows:

The Committee appointed to take into consideration and report upon the Petition of David Crowell, Junr. and others, and the Petition of W. S. Church, and others, complaining of the Fees taken by Officers of His Majesty's Customs; and also, to report upon the documents and facts which have been laid before the House by the Collector of His Majesty's Customs, for the Port of Halifax; and also, to report if any, and what grievances exist, and what may be the proper remedy therefor, having met for the above purposes, having examined witnesses, and given full and mature consideration to the subjects committed to them, report as follows:

That, from the circumstance of the Collector of His Majesty's Cestoms for the Port of Shelburne not having yet given, under the directions of His Excellency the Governor in Chief, the information required by the House upon the subject of the Petition of David Crowell and others, your Committee have been unable to examine and report as particularly upon the grievances stated in the said Petition as the subject seems to require; but, from the many facts disclosed in the Documents accompanying this Report, and which have resulted from the inquiry induced by the order of the House in other parts of the resolution, your Committee conceive much proof is afforded in support of the great evils, and oppressive burthens, endured by the Coasters and others described in that Petition.

THAT your Committee have reason to believe, that the complaint contained in the Petition of W. S. Church and others, that the Fees taken in the Custom-House at the Member-Port of Windsor are grievous and oppressive, is well founded; in support of which, your Committee reter to the Affidavits of several Ship-Owners annexed to the said Petition, the Answers and Documents of the Collector of His Majesty's Customs as laid before this House, and the examination of the Comptroller of His Majesty's Customs accompanying this Report, and made

before vour Committee.

THE Committee have not yet obtained direct and positive proof of the amount of Fees received at the Member-Port of Windsor for the years 1816, 1817, 1818, 1819, but have no hesitation in stating, that evils, to a very great extent, do exist, respecting the mode generally practised by Custom-House Officers, and more especially so in the Out or Member Ports:—That Deputy-Collectors are in most cases Deputy Naval Officers, and, demand and receive Fees allowed in the Fee Table to the Collector, Comptroller, Surveyor and Searcher and Principal Waiter.—Nor does it appear that the Revenue of the Customs is in the slightest manner, benefitted by such accumulation of Officers and expence; or that any Deputation whatever is made or given to such Deputy-Collector by either the Comptroller, Surveyor and Searcher or Principal Waiter: But, on the contrary, that such Deputies are instructed, by the Collector for the Port of Halifax, to take all the Fees particularly given in the Fee Table to such Officers respectively, which these Deputies invariably do, and account to the Collector for the Port of

Haltax only for the half of all such Fees.

The Committee have reason to believe (for the Collector refuses to give information, and the Comptroller declares himself incapable) that during the years 1816, 1817, 1818, 1819, upwards of £ 3000 have been received by the Deputy-Collector at Windsor under the name of Custom House Fees, while, during the same period, by a return made by the Collector, the King's duties in that Port have not exceeded 18s. 10d. The great disproportion between the Fees paid by the Inhabitants of the Province trading at that Port, and the sum received to His Majesty's use, forcibly impresses the mind with the conviction of the unjust and ruinous nature of such a tax; A tax, your Committee cannot forbear stating, unsanctioned by any Law, and imposed on Coasters almost wholly employed in the unproductive shipment of Plaister of Paris to the Ports of New-Bronswick, and to which they can pass whithin the short period of 24 hours. That in one vessel, of 75 tons, belonging to one James Wilcox, and engaged in the Trade of Plaister during the last summer, the Custom-House Fees alone amounted to upwards of Eighty Pounds, nearly equal to the expence of Navigating the Vessel, the whole of which Trade is subject to the like and similar burtheus.

THE Committee conceive, that, in all the Member Ports, the above mentioned Officers, excepting that of Deputy-Collector, ought to be, and can be, discontinued without any hazard to His Majesty's Duties or Customs in these Ports, while the Coasting Trade will be essentially relieved from its present embarrassed and oppressed state.

Your Committee cannot forhear remarking, that this formidable and expensive list of Custom-House Officers comprehended in the person of one individual whose duty and employment almost entirely consist in the receipt of Fees, would be far less burthensome but for the enlarged, forced and interested, construction put upon the

terms and expressions used in the Fee Table.

That all British topsail Vessels are considered Foreign Vessels, and Fees charged accordingly; while Foreign Vessels are considered without the pale and provision of the Table, and no Fees allotted for them but such as the caprice or conscience of the Custom-House Department prescribe. Ports also which were Member Ports of Halifax when the Fee Table was established, and paid the Fees of Coasters only, are now considered as Ports of distinct and separate Colonies; and Fees taken by the Custom-House in three-fold proportion.

THE dismemberment of the Province, by the separation of New-Brunswick, Cape-Breton, &c. from Nova-Scotia, has, according to Custom-House construction, occasioned a great increase of Fees. This measure, so utterly inconsistent with the rights and privileges of His Majesty's Subjects in this Province, and so very burthensome and unjust in its operation, your Committee conceive should immediately, in the most respectful and urgent manner, be brought under the consideration of His Majesty's Government. Your Committee also beg leave to recommend, that the Coasting Trade, and the Fees to which it should be subject, may be regulated by Law, without interfering in the smallest degree with the regulations of that portion of the Foreign Trade in which

His Majesty's Government may be pleased to allow us to participate.

In the course of a laborious and diligent inquiry, your Committee have obtained a knowledge that many evils, and violations of Law, do exist in the Halifax Department of the Custom-House in this Province, upon which your Committee conceive the Resolution of this House imperatively requires them to Report. The evidence of the facts, upon which the Committee have founded their opinion, is herewith submitted to the consideration of the House, —And the Committee are of opinion, that they are warranted, from such evidence, further to state:—That the Hon. T. N. Jeffery, the Collector of His Majesty's Customs for the Port of Halifax, contrary to an Act of Parliament, has received King's Customs in dollars at 4s. 6d sterling instead of silver at 5s. 6d. sterling the oz. by which Debtors for His Majesty's Customs, have paid upwards of five per cent. more than they were liable to pay, and that the Collector has frequently ass, have paid upwards of five per cent. more than they were liable to pay, and that the Collector has frequently ass, have paid upwards of five per cent. more than they have rate, accrued to the Collector. One of the Witnesses has stated to your Committee, that a letter from the Board of Customs, received in 1813, by the Collector, directed a discontinuance of the above practice, which was, notwithstanding, persisted in until 1817, and occasionly since.

That the Collector, unauthorised by Law, considers British topsail Vessels, direct from Ports in Great-Britain, and indeed from all other Ports out of the Province, as Foreign Vessels, and charges the increased Fees as for Foreign Vessels. This is a fact proved, and merely requires to be stated to show its aboutdity and illegali-

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That the said Collector, unlawfully and arbitrarily, varies the Fees, in the Fee Table, particularly in the cases of Registers, General Clearances, Entries, Cockets, Permits, Anchorage, &c. In most cases, he receives 10s. at the Custom-House for endorsing each Register, sometimes but 5s. The Committee have caused eight Bills, for Custom-House Fees, promiscuously taken, to be analized and arranged in such manner as to shew at one view the Fees taken, compared with the sum which it appears might be lawfully received, and the difference

noted &c. in the annexed Document.

That the said Collector, in the appointing Deputies for the Out or Member Ports, gives a Deputation from himself alone, or purporting to be the joint Deputation of the Comptroller and himself, which he alone signs.—Such Deputies received instructions from, and account to, the Collector only. They have been in the practice of receiving the Fees, allowed in the Fee Table to the Surveyor, Searcher and Principal Waiter. The Collector has demanded, and received, from such Deputies, the one half of the Fees by them taken at such Member Ports, under the head of Collector's, Comptroller's, Surveyor and Searcher's and principal Waiter's Fees, until recently, and has retained such half to his exclusive use. It appears that he has recently allowed the Comptroller a part of the Fees received under the head of Comptroller's Fees. The Collector himself acknowleges, that the Revenue of the King's Customs is not benefitted by his Deputies at the Member Ports holding Deputation from the Comptroller; and the Comptroller states that they do not hold Deputation from him. This corrupt, and oppressive, mode of managing business, by which the Fees of so many Officers are levied upon the Navigation and Trade of the Province, occasions much discontent, particularly in the Member Ports, and, while it accumulates additional expenses on the subject too heavy for him to bear, works no advantage or increase to the Revenue.

That the said Collector has, for many years, received, at the Port of Haiffax, the Fees appointed for the principal Waiter, amounting to upwards of L80 per annum. And this not only without authority, but latterly in direct and open violation of a positive order from the Hon. Board of Customs. It even appears, that, since the receipt of such order, the Collector has continued to receive such Fee as before, and directed the Clerk to discontinue the column of Waiter's Fees, and include such sum in the Collector's, which was done, and the amount

paid the Collector.

By an enlarged, and as the Committee conceive a forced, construction of the Fee Table, the Fees received at the Custom-House amount to upwards of 60 per cent. upon an average above what can fairly and legally be demanded under the Fee Table. In the Out Ports, the excess upon Coasters will probably amount to upwards of 200 per cent. as, in those places, one Officer receives the Fees allowed to four, and for them all upon the enlarged

construction put upon the Fee Table at Halifax.

Your Committee are therefore of opinion that evils of grievous and oppressive nature do exist in the Department of the Custom-House of Halifax, and although, from the various impediments and delays which have much retarded the Committee in the inquiry, they have not obtained such direct and positive proof, particularly as respects the Out Ports, as they probably would were it advisable to protract the inquiry, yet the Committee conceive that abundant evidence has been produced to ground a conviction, that great eviz do exist, and require minediate redress;

UNDER this view of the subject the Committee now call the deliberate attention of the House to the facts disclosed in the evidence accompanying this Report. If the House shall be of opinion that the Colicetor has, knowingly and wifully, violated the Acts of Parliament made for the direction and government of His Majesty's Customs, and that he has arbitrarily and oppressively exacted Fees under colour of his Office, in direct opposition to the Laws, the Orders of the Board of Customs, and in violation of his Official Oath, the Committee conceive it altegether unnecessary to recommend to the House to take early measures to obtain recress of such enormous abuses: But they cannot refrain from remarking, that, unless some relief is obtained for the Coasting Trade of the Province, it must still, more and more, decline, and finally sink under the burthen of a ruinous and destructive regulation.

Baron DALHOUSIE, of Dalhousie Castle, Knight Grand Cross of the Must Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Captain General and Governor in Chief, in and over His Mojesty's Provinces of Lower Canada, Upper Canada, Nova-Scotia, New-Brunswick, and the Islands of Prince Edward and Cape Breton, &c. &c. &c.

May it please Your Lordship,

Its Majesty's Council and the House of Assembly beg leave to represent to Your Lordship, that the depressed state of the Commerce of this Province requires the fostering care of His Majesty's Government.

His Majesty's Council and the House of Assembly have cherished the hope, that the respectful representations which they left it their duty to make in the last Sessions of the General Assembly, relative to the injurious effects produced upon the Commerce and Fisheries of this Colony, by the Convention then recently entered into with the United States of America, would have attracted the attention of His Majesty's Government, and that some measures for their relief would have been devised

His Majesty's Council and the House of Assembly are thoroughly convinced, that the disappointment of these expectations does not proceed from any want of attention to their interest on the part of His Majesty's Government, but from the complicated nature of the subject necessarily introduced to their consideration.

His Majesty's Council and the House of Assembly now beg leave to solicit Your Excellency's good offices with His Majesty's Government, to procure for His Majesty's Subjects in this Province an extension of the same indulgence which has been granted to the Island of Newfoundland, by the 39th Section of the 59th Geo. 111. chap. 52d, which would have a great tendency to relieve the present embarrassments of Commerce, until the wisdom of His Majesty's Government, shall devise measures for the general regulation of the Trade of British North-America.

His Majesty's Council and the House of Assembly trust that His Majesty's Government will be disposed to grant this indulgence to the Province of Nova-Scotia, as its facilities for carrying on the Fisheries, which form the staple of both Colonies, are not equal to those of Newfoundland.

Ordered, That the Address do lie on the Table.

Ordered, That the toregoing Resolution be published in the Royal Gazette, for the

Ordered. That the Clerk do carry the Bill to the Council and desire their concurrence.

On motion of Mr. W. A. Chipman, resolved, that Mr. Speaker do inform His Excellency the Governor in Chief, that this House will be ready to be prorogued by His Excellency by two of the Clock on Monday next.

Then the House adjourned until Monday, at ten of the clock.

Monday, 3d April, 1820.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Archibald reported from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Governor in Chief, to know his pleasure when he would receive the Address of this House, that, owing to the lateness of the hour on Saturday, he had, as Chairman of the said Committee, communicated the Resolution on the subject, through His Excellency's Aid-de-Camp, Major Couper, and that His Excellency had been pleased to appoint this day at half past twelve o'clock, at the Government House.

On motion the amendments made by the Council, to the Bill, entitled. An Act for the more speedy recovery of His Majesty's Debts within this Province, were severally read by the Clerk; and thereupon,

Mr. Roach moved, that the consideration of the said amendments be deferred to this day three months, which, being seconded and put, and the House dividing thereon, there appeared for the motion ten, against it ten,

So Mr. Speaker gave his casting vote for the motion, and it passed in the affirmative.

Mr. Speaker and the House attended His Excellency the Governor in Chief, with their Address, pursuant to the Order of yesterday.

And being returned.

Mr. Speaker reported that His Excellency had been pleased to give this Answer:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

OU cannot doubt of the sentiments with which I receive this Address, still I must assure you, that, as presented to me by the Representatives of the People of Nova-Scotia, in their Legislative capacity, I receive it as one of the highest honors that can be conferred.

I have endeavoured, to the utmost of my abilities, to fulfil the Royal Instructions; and the gracious intentions of His Majesty respecting this Province; and this public declaration, of the satisfaction of the Country, will ever

be to me a most gratifying record of my service here.

The magnificent Testimonial of your regard, which you propose for my acceptance, is infinitely enhanced in value as being presented in a form that attaches it to those honors which have been conferred by my Royal Master; to these it shall stand in my esteem nearest, and in a manner associated, but it is my first duty to obtain his Majesty's permission to accept of it. Should his Majesty be most graciously pleased to grant my request, I shall inform you of it, meanwhile I beg you will accept from me a return of those expressions of farewell which close this Address, and of the kindness of which I am deeply sensible.

A Message from the Council by Mr. George,

Mr. Speaker,

The Council have agreed to a Bill, entitled, An Act to authorife the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief, for the time being, to appoint Commissioners to Islue Treasury Notes, to an amount not exceeding £20,000.

And then the Messenger withdrew.

On motion, the Message of His Excellency the Governor in Chief, to this House, on the 21st February last, communicating the reasons which have influenced His Royal Highness the Prince Regent to withhold his affent from the Act, passed in the last Session of the General Assembly, entitled, An Act relating to Marriages, and the Issuing of Marriage Licenses, was read by the Clerk, and thereupon,

Mr. Archibald moved, that this House do come to the several Resolutions sollow-

ing, Viz.

Resolved, That the House deeply regret that His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been advised to withhold his affent from that Bill, as this House are of opinion, the confining Marriage Licenses to the Clergy of the Church of England creates an invidious distinstion, which is not only injurious to the Church itself, but grating to the feelings of a large and respectable majority of His Majesty's Subjects in this Province; and that this House considers every attempt to increase the Revenue, or extend the authority of the Church of England, by such means, at the expense of Christians of other denominations, as a violation of that Law which encouraged them to fettle themselves in the Country.

Resolved, That this House have great reason to believe that the suggestion which influenced those who advised His Royal Highness to withhold his affent from that Bill, arose

from interested individuals within this Province.

Resolved, That the uncertainty of the duration of the present Session, has prevented this House from taking any further step at this time, to remedy an evil so justly complained of throughout the Country; but that this House will, in its next Session, resume the subject, and take such measures therein, as may appear to them best calculated to remove the jealousies occasioned by the rejection of this Bill, and to preserve that harmony among persons of different persuasions, so essential to the peace and happiness of the Province.

Which motion being seconded, thereupon,

The first Resolution was put, and agreed to by the House.

The fecond Resolution was put, and the House dividing thereon, there appeared, for the passing the same, eleven; against it, eighteen:

A Message from His Excellency the Governor in Chief, by Mr. Secretary George,

Mr. Speaker, His Excellency the Governor in Chief commands this House to attend His Excellency

immediately in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker, with the House, attended His Excellency the Governor in Chief in the Council Chamber, where His Excellency was pleased to give his the feveral Bills following, Viz.

An Act to authorise the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief for the time being, to appoint Commissioners to Issue Treasury Notes, to an amount not exceed-

ing Twenty Thousand Pounds,

An Act to continue an Act to encourage Persons engaged in the Lumber Trade; and authorifing Courts of Session to make regulations for preventing obstructions in bringing the same, with other articles, down the several Rivers of this Province; and also the Act, paiied fed in the fifty-ninth year of His present Majesty's reign, in addition to, and amendment thereof.

The Honorable Michael Wallace, Acting President of His Micelty's Council then prefented to His Excellency the Governor in Chief, the Joint Address of His Majesty's Council and the House of Assembly to His Excellency, requesting His Excellency to endeavour to procure for His Majesty's Subjects in this Province, the same indulgence which has been extended to the Colony of Newsoundland, by the Act of 59th Geo. III. to which Address His Excellency was pleased to say, that he would take the earliest opportunity of complying with the request of the Council and the House, as expressed therein.

His Excellency was then pleased to make the following Speech, viz.

Mr. President and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council, Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

HE attention which has been given to the dispatch of the Public Business of this Session, is entitled to my best acknowledgements, and enables me now to relieve you from further attendance,

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

I OBSERVE with satisfaction that the Supplies which have been voted for the Public Service, have been proportioned to the circumstances and means of the Province. I thank you for them in His Majesty's name; and you may rely upon their being faithfully applied.

Mr. President and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council, Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

I CANNOT allow you to separate without expressing my personal thanks for the support I have received in the administration of the Government, and for the repeated assurances of your approbation in the discharge of the duties of my station.

It affords me great satisfaction at this moment to see the Province in the enjoyment of peace, contentment, and abundance of all the necessaries of life. It is perhaps still more pleasing to see the fairest promise of a continuance of those blessings increasing too by a rising spirit of industry, the active efforts of which will best express its powers and importance.

Leaving you in that state, I cannot but feel most anxious for the suture. Convinced as I am, that Nova-Scotia is growing in strength more rapidly than you are aware of, and that every year it is acquiring multiplied powers of energy and exertion, I feel it my duty to point out to you the objects which appear to me above all others important, to promote those happy prospects. Pre-eminent in these I consider a continued encouragement to the pursuits of agriculture as the only source and solid soundation of the prosperity of this and any other country. On it your commerce and your sisheries will grow to consequence; and while it languishes, these also will be limited and unprositable.

The state of the Province requires more extended means of education; and this College, open to all classes and denominations of Christians, will afford these means in the situation best suited to make them generally available. I am myself fully convinced that the advantages will be great even in our time, but growing, as it will grow, with the prosperity of the Province, no human foresight can imagine to what extent it may have spread its blessings, when your children's children shall compare the state of Nova-Scotia to what it is now.

Or less consequence, but yet most important also, I ensider the existence and state of the Militia. It is the constitutional desence and security of the Province; and the protection of I wenty Thousand young and willing sons of your own families, ought not to be slighted or neglected by Government or the Legislature. The Militia is not at present what I have wished to see it, but there is all the loyalty I could desire, and, in many battalions, all the zeal and discipline I could possibly wish.

THE scope of the Chief Command which His Majesty has been pleased to intrust to me, holds me responsible to watch over, and enquire into, the administration, circumstances and improvement, as well as the defence, of every one of these His Majesty's North-American Provinces. Under the Messing of God, I will do so to the best of my abilities; and not only by inquiry, but in the succeeding years by personally visiting every one of them. I should indeed feel infinite satisfaction in seeing the measures now only begun, still persevered in here, and realing all the hopes which I believe the great majority of the people of Nova-Scotia at this moment entertain.

HAVING thus discharged what I conceive to be an important, and perhaps my last important duty here, it only remains for me to offer my fervent prayers for the happiness

and prosperity of you all individually.

Afterwards the Honorable Michael Wallace, Acting-President of His Majesty's Council, by His Excellency's Command, said:

GENTLEMEN,
