T. J. Wren, of this town. We congratulate him, and are proud to remember that he was once a member of the BEACON staff.

Numerous complaints have reached us as to the unsightly condition of the shore which is being used as a Town dump. It is not possible to have garbage of the Town dumped or destroyed under the supervision of some Town official, either the Marshall or the Sanitary Inspector? The matter may very well engage the attention of the Town Council at their next meeting.

Mrs. E. Atherton Smith Regent of the Royal Standard Chapter L. O. O. G. S. of St. John, gratefully acknowledges the sum of \$6.50 from Saint Andrews for the Self-Denial Day Fund, \$5.50 of which was amply realized by Master Gerald Babbitt and Miss Alice Caughey by selling (apart from the Marshall or the Sanitary Inspector) \$1.00 donations from Mrs. George W. The Pythian Sisters at the meeting of their lodge on Tuesday evening, lotteried a very handsome cushion made and donated by Mrs. Fred Williamson. The holder of the lucky number was Mr. Gramme, and the sum of \$10.50 was realized by the sale of tickets. This money will be used to purchase wool to make socks for soldiers. Of the proceeds of the whist and social which the Pythian Sisters held recently, \$10 has been given to the Soldiers' Field Comforts Association.

We have seen a copy of the programme of a Memorial Service held in St. Stephen's Church, Toronto, on April 15, for the men of the Canadian Engineers who have lost their lives in the present war. The total number killed or died of wounds, died from other causes, and missing, is forty-eight. A foot-note refers to the fact that this Corps up to April 7, 1917, has resulted in 1860 men for Overseas, viz: 1171 Engineers and 789 Signallers through the Toronto Depot at the Armouries in charge of Lieutenant J. L. Mallory. This does not include 320 men from other centres.

The collection of Waste Paper, which has been going on throughout the winter under the auspices of the Women's Canadian Club, will be discontinued after May 1st. Up to that date everyone is most urgently asked to gather together all available paper and to TIE IT IN TIGHT BUNDLES. It will be called for on May 1st. This is positively the last opportunity for using waste paper for Patriotic Purposes. After May 1st all the paper will be forwarded to Ottawa and there sold. The money will be used for Soldiers' Comforts.

The tern schooner Seth W. Smith, Captain N. M. Clarke, St. Andrews, with a cargo of 340 tons of pulp from St. John, arrived for Norwalk, Conn., went ashore on Friday last on the ledges at the Narrows of the Magaguadavic River while being towed out by a gasoline boat. She was floated at high tide on Saturday, when it was found that her keel and false keel were somewhat damaged. She was towed by the tug Henry Wellman to Calais, where she was to be unloaded and repaired. Both vessel and cargo were insured.

The funeral of the late Mr. George Mowatt took place at 2:30 p.m. on the 20th inst., from Greenock Presbyterian Church, and was attended by a large number of town's people, and by Mr. and Mrs. Fred MacNichol, of St. Stephen, who were desirous of showing their respect and esteem for a very worthy and exemplary citizen. Rev. W. M. Fraser, pastor of Greenock Church, conducted the impressive burial service at the Church and at the grave and was assisted by Rev. R. W. Weddall, pastor of the Methodist Church. The choir sang three selections, the old paraphrase, "Take Comfort Christians when your friends in Jesus fall asleep," the hymn "Peace Perfect Peace," and the hymn "For all the Saints who from their labors rest." The pall-bearers were Charles S. Everett, G. Herbert Lamb, and W. J. Halday, Elders, and M. N. Cockburn, K. C.

On the Van Horne estate the seeding of oats and wheat commenced this week, and a slightly larger acreage will be sown this year than last. All grain in a tract of with formalin before it is sown, and the results of this treatment in previous years have been a 25% larger and a very much more valuable crop. The extensive use of formalin for grain is particularly desirable this year, as the largest possible crops are essential to the rational welfare. There will be no smutty heads of grain if a mixture of 1 pint of formalin and 40 gallons of water is sprinkled over the seed. The sprinkled seed should be covered with bags for two or three hours and then spread to dry before sowing. The cost of treatment per bushel of seed grain is very small. The drier portions of the Van Horne farm have proved well adapted to wheat, and it is hoped that wheat-growing in New Brunswick will become much more general than it is at present.

TOWN COUNCIL

A special meeting of the Town Council was held in the Town Hall on Tuesday, April 24, 1917.

Present, the Mayor, G. King Greenlaw; and Aldermen, Coughley, Douglas, Denley, Finigan, Gillman, Malpass, McLaren, Absent, Alderman McFarlane.

The Mayor stated that the meeting had been called to consider applications at hand for the position of Marshal, etc.

Rev. R. W. Weddall, representing the Committee appointed to investigate conditions in sending a ten-year-old child to the "Maritime Home" for girls, submitted a verbal report, and commended the terms from Manager of the institution at Truro, N. S., showing that in the matter of expense, the Town would be expected to pay one-half of the yearly fee of one hundred and fifty dollars (say seventy-five dollars.) The balance would be assumed by the Privinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and P. E. Island, etc.

The Aldermen present were severally called upon to meet the expense when there was a considerable estate left, without a will, by the father of the child, and which might be legally drawn upon for her support in the proposed conditions in which she might be placed.

Rev. Mr. Weddall suggested that a committee be appointed to ascertain what legal steps might be taken in the matter.

Moved by Ald. McLaren, seconded by Ald. Douglas, that the Mayor and Aldermen Finigan and Malpass be a committee to investigate the case and report at the next regular meeting of Council.

The Mayor called attention to the necessity of appointing Standing Committees and Officers.

Moved by Ald. Douglas, seconded by Ald. McLaren, that appointment of Committee be deferred till the next regular meeting of Council.

Mrs. Thekla Cossaboom, beloved daughter of Mr. Henry Cossaboom, passed away on the afternoon of Sunday, April 15. She was 20 years and 7 months old, and had suffered long and patiently. Her father, two sons and one brother are left to mourn her loss, and deep and sincere sympathy are extended to them in this sad hour of their bereavement.

The funeral service was held on Monday, April 16, at 11 o'clock. The hymns were sung by the choir, "Angels bear the news to Mother," "Safe in the arms of Jesus," and "Christian good night." A beautiful floral pillow was a tribute to her memory.

OBITUARY SIR FRANCIS COWLEY BURNAND London, April 21.—Sir Francis Cowley Burnand, formerly editor of PUNCH, died at Ramsgate this morning. He was born in 1836 and had attained considerable repute as a dramatic author and a writer. He has written over 120 plays, most of them burlesque and light comedies, among the latter being The Colonel, which attracted the aesthetic craze of the period. He also wrote two light operas with Sir Arthur Sullivan. He was made a knight in 1892. Sir Francis was editor of PUNCH from 1882 until 1906.

HON. GEORGE T. BAIRD The death of Hon. George T. Baird took place at his home in Andover, N. B., on Saturday morning. He had been ill for some time but the news that he passed away was a shock to a wide circle of friends. Senator Baird had been in public life since 1884, when he was elected to the House of Assembly from Victoria. He was a supporter of the Blair government, although a Conservative, and in 1891 was appointed to the Legislative Council. When the second chamber was abolished in 1892 Mr. Baird was again elected to the House of Assembly. He remained in the House until 1895, when he was called to the Senate of Canada by Governor-General Lord Dufferin. Mr. Baird was not very prominent in the debates in that body, but he was constantly in attendance and an industrious worker.

Of Scotch descent, he was born November 2, 1847, and was educated at the Carleton county grammar school. For four years he was principal of the superior school at Andover, and was also master of that town from 1878 to 1882. He went into the lumber business in 1874 and also carried on a general store, later becoming managing director of the George T. Baird Company.

In 1879 he was married to Miss Ida Jane, daughter of Captain D. W. Sadler, who survives him, with two sons.

Senator Baird was a member of the Church of England.

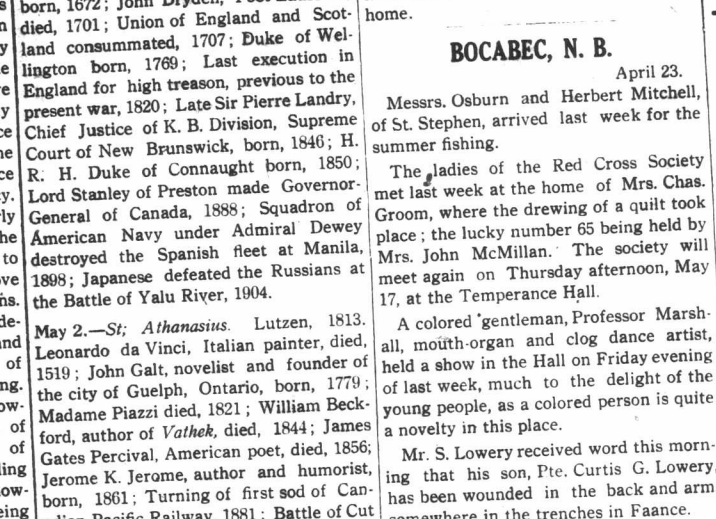

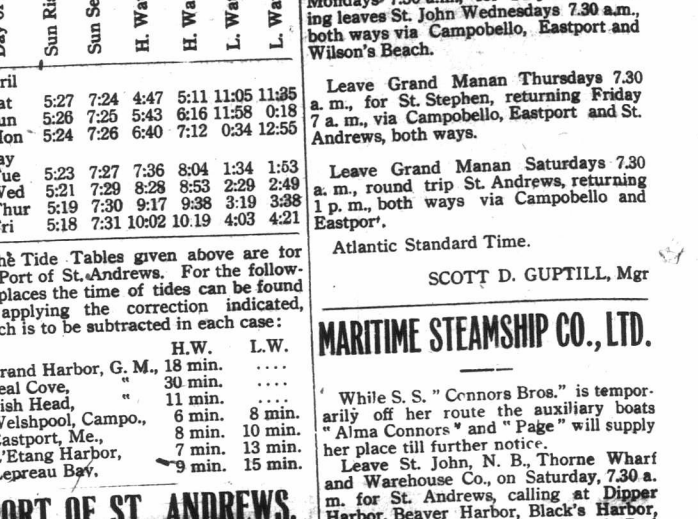
