Helsingfors, Aug. 11—Swedish and Finnish non-Socialist newspapers appearing for the first time since the introduction of the independenc law into the landtag, unanimously condemn the law and the method of passing it Likewise they criticize the policy of the Socialist majority as an unconstitutional pro-vocative to Russia prejudical to the cause of Finland's independence for which all of the nation stands.

Mackensen's Forces Renew Drive and Draw Attention of Crisis to Roumanian Situation Once More; Silence of Russian Army Gives Rise to Apprehension as to Latest Developments

By Courier Leased Wire.

London, Aug. 11 .-- The military critics here are watching the German attack in Roumania with increasing interest. The greater part of Moldava, the only section of the country remaining in Roumanian hands, is being attacked, as shown in official despatches, from the north, west and south and the Russians and Roumanians, who until recently conducted a victorious offensive, are now losing ground at all points.

Field Marshal von Mackensen's thrust in the neighborhood of Fokshand is the most serious of the operations being carried out by the German troops and the furious resistance of the Allies is not meeting with success. The enemy's passage of the Suchitza, reported, yesterday, is regarded as placing in immediate jeopardy the Mariasesti junction railroad, the possession of which is of immense importance to the Russians and Roumanians. Attention is called here to the absence of the Russian official statement yesterday, while it is remarked that the Roumanian report does not appear to deal with the latest events.

POLISH AIMS. Petrograd, Aug. 11 .-- The Polish National Council, which is assembled at Moscow, has endorsed the resolution of the Polish Socialist Congress and the programme outlined by the congress for future endeavors with reference to Polish independence after the war are as follows:

"To secure from Austria and Germany and all neutral countries sanction for Polish representatives in the peace conference.

"To secure the assistance of the Polish chief military commission in accomplishing the withdrawal of Poles from the Russian army.

"To appoint committees to explain Poland's reconstruction plans. "To unite all organized forces of Polish society to help free Russia in her strugle with pacifism. "To make an effort to have the Polish question put forward in the peace negotiations."

PILSUDSKI TO BE RELEASED . London, Aug. 11 .-- An Exchange Telegraph Company despatch from Amsterdam announces that, pursuant to instructions from Berlin and Vienna, Brigad ier-General Pilsudski, of the Polish legion, will be released from detention by the German authorities in Poland: His release is conditional on his going to Switzerland and remaining there until the war ends.

MENTION TO MOTORISTS

Not infrequently, motorists allow their storage batteries to become al-most totally discharged and, in some cases, nearly dry

Too many motorists are apt to treat the storage battery as they would treat a dry-cell—they have the impression that there is nothing to do but use the battery until it is exhausted. Consequently, they pay no attention to it, as long as it does its work, with the result that by the time it becomes inoperative the battery is very seriously harmed.

It should be remembered that dry-cells are not intended to be re-charged or used again, while storage batteries, by virtue of their electrochemical nature, may be used con-tinuously throughout their life, by recharging from a source of electric

Do not neglect to take a few sparl plug cores with you on your trip. The metal parts of a spark plug will last almost indefinitely, but the cores must break in time, and that usually means buying a new spark plug. As of the cost of a new spark plug, it means economy to carry a few with you. Also carry a few extra gaskets.

A direct cause of rapid tire wear particularly the rear tires, is in the misuse of the brakes. The brakes on a car should be very seldom locked. They should not be locked in wet weather any more than in dry.

When the brake is locked, those parts of the rear tires which are in contact with the ground are planed off, as rapidly as though the tires were held against a piece of cutting machinery. If does not take long for a tire to blow out after it has been subjected to this treatment for any

It should be a rule with everyone who drives to use the brakes sparing-ly and never to drive his car rapidly enough so that he will be compelled to make a sudden stop

If you use an enamel cover for you tires, be sure you put it on right side up. Sometimes one finds one put on upside down, which will cause it to hold the rain instead of shedding it.







Every good prophe priest and king points onward to the Lord Jesus who when on earth was the prophet like unto Moses, speaking just what the Father told him; who is now our great high priest within the veil, ever living to make intercession for us; and who when He comes again shall be the true king of Israel, reigning in and we shall be His associates and joint heirs, the twelve apostles ruling over the twelve tribes of Israel (Deut. xviii, 18, 19; John xii, 49, 50; Heb. vii, 24-27; Jer. xxiii, 5, 6; Zech. vi, 12, 13; Rev. i, 5, 6; v, 9, 10; Luke xxii, 28-30). What a glorious future to keep ever before us, to wean us from all present

entanglements and enable us to run with patience the race set before us (Heb. xii, 12.)
