EDITORIAL NOTES.

Next week will again see the anniversary of Acadia, when our town will no doubt be filled with visitors.

Wolffville may be a rather conservative town, but it is becoming pretty generally understood that when our people undertake anything it is not done by halves.

Stirring war news is the order these days, and if yesterday's dispatches are to be relied on it looks as if the war was practically over in South Africa.

Among those who received the LL. D. degree at the centennial celebration of the University of New Brunswick on Tuesday were the following well known in Wolffville, all of whom have our congratulations.

The well-informed editor of the Orchardist, in his write-up of the Queen's Birthday sports here, says they were held on the campus.

It is with much regret we record the very sudden death of Frederick, on Tuesday, 29th of May, of Professor Theodore Harding Rand, D. C. L., of McMaster University, Toronto.

Dr. Rand was a native of Cornwallia, a graduate of Acadia College, where he received the degrees of M. A., and D. C. L., and where he was professor for two years.

From 1871 to 1883 he labored in New Brunswick in the same kind of service, for he put into successful operation there the Free Schools of that province.

In Ontario he rendered large service to the Baptists especially, and to the general education of the province, by securing the establishment of McMaster University as an independent institution.

As a poet and literary writer he has done services that has won high praise from recognized authorities, and that has found favor with an appreciative public.

The funeral will be held at Central Baptist Church, Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The services will be in charge of Rev. C. H. Martell, M. A. The sermon will be by Dr. Kohnstedt. Other clergymen will assist.

On Tile Draining.

Where a main is required to receive the water from the laterals, the main should be a larger tile than the laterals, usually a 3 inch main with two inch laterals.

Where two lines of tiles were laid at right angles to one another and the upper line was laid three inches and, I sunk an oil cask and cut openings for the tiles about fifteen inches above the bottom and covered the cask with plank, the object being to enable me to remove the sand which was discharged by the upper tile.

Sometimes the formation of the field enables one to drain the land in two opposite directions. It is well to take advantage of this, always aiming to make the drains as short in any one direction as possible.

I have not yet determined how far apart tile drains in dyked land should be laid, but at present deem fifty feet about right.


