



### Crisis in England.

The information at hand about the government crisis in London is very meagre. It is so meagre that it throws little or no light on the actual situation. All that we can gather is that last week it was announced that the Veto Conference had failed and that its members had decided not to make an official announcement of what had caused the failure.

At the meeting of Parliament or Tursday it was expected that Premier Asquith would make an announce ment of the policy of the Government in regard to the House of Lords, House Rule and the Labour Party funds. This statement was not made on Tuesday, and yesterday it was again deferred. In the meantime the Cabinet has held frequent meetings, but nothing is clear but that a crisis is esignation of the Ministry or the disfolution of Parliament. There an pears to be an apprehension in both parties that the Crown may be dragged in the political whirlpool which appears imminent, as witness the ments of the Daily News to the ffect that a monarchial revolution vould be added to a revolution against the Peers by the resignation of the Ministry. It is, however, unnecessary to pay much attention to the chief organ of the Cocoa millionaires.

It is questionable whether the coun sel of these hot-heads will have much effect. The leaders on both sides appear to be still striving to find a compromise, which shall keep the Crown out of politics, and it is to be hoped that success will attend their efforts. It is stated that a conference between the Government and the Op-

position has been arranged. We are not inclined to attach any importance to the announcement that after meeting Premier Asquith, the King summoned the Privy Council, presumably for the purpose of obtaining advice regarding his course in the matter of giving Asquith guarantees to increase the number of Peers sufficiently to support the Government in its policy of reforming the Lords. and that the summons brought together the leaders of both parties.

The meetings of the Privy Council and the Conference of leaders of both parties have probably been confoundd by the Associated Press. There is nothing unusual in the meeting of the Privy Council to give a formal authenscation to executive action decided on by the Cabinet or by a department of the Government. But this action of the Privy Council is purely formal. The deliberative and consultative unctions of the Privy Council are as dead as Queen Anne. Indeed, one of





In New York. One of the most helpful movements in the uplift of the bad boy in New: York grew out of a discussion of conditions, between Ernest K. Coulter and the Rev. Dr. W. Merle Smith, of the Central Presbyterian Church, and took form four years ago in the organization of the Big Brothers, some twenty young men connected with the church' club agreeing to play that part for as many 'little brothers' who had been paroled in the Children's Court. Today there are a thousand Big Brothers connected with a score of different churches in the city, and a like number of small boys who have been in trouble under their protection. The idea is not to give financial aid except in extreme cases, but to make the 'little brother' understand that some one has a real sympathetic interest in him; and it is almost the universal experience among the young men who are taking part in the movement that, . no matter how vicious a boy may be, once his confidence is obtained, he is as clay in the hands of the potter. The Big Brother finds out where the other lives and makes the acquaintance of the family, more often than not in a slum tenement; he intercedes for the boy with parents who are unnecessarily harsh; he asks permission to take the boy to a ball game or a theatre; he lends him the right kind of books and encourages him to study, and one evening of each week is set apart for athletic work, the Young Men's Christian Association allowing the use of the gymnasium for this purpose. Last summer the Big Brothers established a camp in the country where each of the 'little brothers' spent a happy fortnight. -A. H. Hoeckley, in 'Leslie's Weekly.'

### Across Africa.

Two Germans Will Motor From North to South.

Two energetic young Germans, Lieutenant Schmude, of the Artillery Guards, and Dr. Ludwig Muller, a scientist, have planned another trans-African motor car expedition. which has received the August patronage of the Crown Prince. They will not travel from east to west, as Lieutenant Graetz did two years ago, but from north to south, along the projected line of the Cape-to-Cairo railway. Their object is to take measurements and to investigate the possibility of a regular motor car service in various regions adjacent to the line. In German East Africa they will nudertake some special wireless telegraph experiments, besides engaging in scientific research all along the route. The young men will leave Naples in February, equipped with a powerful car; specially built for rough going and for camping purposes, with sleeping accommodation at the top.

BERLIN, Nov. 16.

It was unofficially announced to day that the Imperial Government contemplated the early opening of the frontiers for the importation of for-eign live stock in order to counteract the high prices for meat prevailing here. Chancellor Von Bethmann Hollweg has already given permission to the Governments of Baden and Alsace Lorraine to import a considerable quota of French animals. The Bavarian Government also intends to admit French live stock, and will appeal to the authorities to modify the restrictions of the Danish frontiers It is said that Baron S. C. Hollmer proposes to open all the frontiers except the Russian. However, the sanitary restrictions will be maintained in so far that all animals imported must be immediately slaughtered. The yielding disposition of the Government is described as due to the fact that the Socialists are evidently profiting in the present situation of the famine price for meat. The Government finds it advisable to take the wind out of the Socialist sails before the serval elections to the Reichstag by cheapening meat.

### Count Leo Tolstoy.

News has just been received by sian at a ripe age. His death took place in a poor herdsman's hut, and was the result of over-fatigue and privation endured in a long journey. Tolstoy was one of the most remarkable men of our age-a great writer, a great reformer and a great worker. Born of one of the most noble families in Russia, he served in the Crimoan War, and distinguished himself for bravery and devotion to his native country; a very large land owner, a splendid shot and keen sportsman, he married early a most loving and devoted wife. There was every prospect before him of happiness and conjugal felicity. In early middle age the frightful condition of the Serfs in Russia excited his compassion. He began an agitation for the reform of their condition. Tolstoy was a man of gigantic physical strength and almost superhuman energy. He was not satisfied to be merely an agitator to give away the name). I know you and a most powerful wrifer on behalf have a right, but you know just as of the poor, down-trodden Serfs, he well that you have to work hard for went still further, gave up all his great wealth and toiled as a common son, and you have not got so good a labourer. He was denounced by the Government and his fellow noblemen as a dangerous fanatic, and the tyrannical Greek Church cast him out. Tolstoy went on his way unmoved. Russians might decry him but all noble minds in Europe admired the man for his sincerity and his powerful writings, especially for his masterpiece "Peace and War." Amongst European writers Tolstoy has had many exponents, the best one in English is Mr. Aylmer Mande who has lived with him and written an admirable account of the great Reformer. Tolstoy belonged to the Russian sect known as the Doukhbours, a set of simple Bible Christians who have all things in common. It was mainly through his exertions that a body of these poor people were enabled to emmigrate, and now form a large and most prosperous colony in the Canadian North West. Every year they send aid to their fellows in Russia and help them to migrate. Tolstoy was a most voluminous writer. In his latter years he was engaged on his autobiography which will be most interesting. Whatever one may think of his views none can deny his sincerity, his nobility and devotion to what ha believed his duty. Nov. 17, 1910. OBSERVER.
