

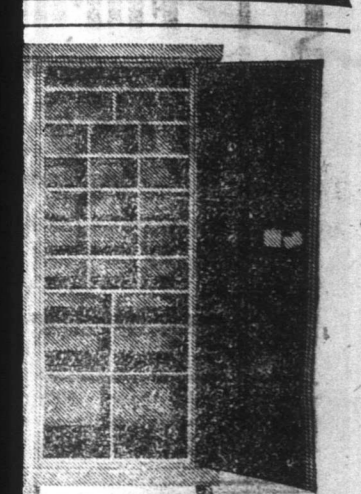

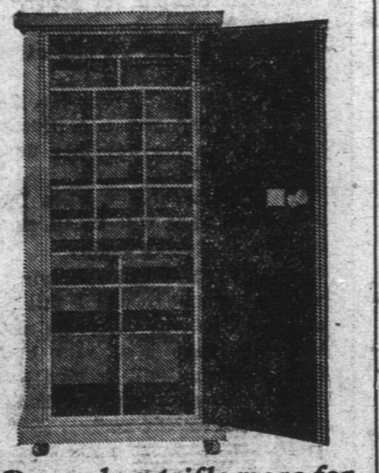

SOLIGNUM.
 A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.
 To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which showed the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.
 Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.
 Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.



Prescribes Sugar for Weak Heart.

Physician Says Saccharine Product May be Carried in Pocket and Eat-en Between Meals.

Ever see a "candy girl with a weak heart, or a candy kid that did not caper nimbly?" For the reason why, see the grave discussion in the medical periodicals summarized this week in the current issue of the New York Medical Journal.

The British Medical Journal began the inquiry in its articles by Sir James Sawyer, who advocates the use of sugar as a heart tonic. He prescribes it also in wasting disorders, some forms of anemia, adynamic rheumatism and nervous diseases. He finds patients increase in weight, power, strength and vigor, and in those of neuroasthenic tendencies he finds that the results are especially good.

The patient is advised to carry with him about half a pound of lump sugar and to eat it from time to time, except just before a meal. In concluding his paper the English physician declares that "beneficent" we must think of members of the sugar group as sustainers and developers of heart muscles and of benefit in a large variety of cardio-muscular troubles.

Pure cane sugar should be used. The purity of the product is assured if two lumps become luminous when rubbed together in the dark. If the lumps do not shine the manufacturer of the same may be denounced as a luminosity.

The value of such excellent cane sugar may be easily recognized, for the matinee girl may see to read programmes by it in a darkened theatre while buying herself with the saccharine refreshment. The carrying of half a pound of sugar may also be made useful to those going home at night who have difficulty in finding keyholes.

A New Potato.

(Scientific American, New York.)

During the past two or three years remarkable progress has, it is said, been made in the cultivation of a new species of potato in the department of Vienne in France.


This potato originated in Uruguay, and is called the "Solanoium Commersoni". In its new environment in France, and by reason of its careful cultivation and selection, it has developed several forms that promise to be fixed, and to possess much value as additions to the food resources of Europe.

Among these forms, all springing from one parent species, there are a yellow variety, a white variety, a red variety, and a variety not specially characterized by color, all of which possess distinctive shapes and qualities. A fact that especially interests botanists and cultivators is that these varieties have evidently not yet reached their final settled forms, and the experiments in Vienne are closely watched because it is thought that they will throw light upon the unsettled question of the general origin of the potato.

LONDON, June 16.
The Imperial Conference in yesterday's session discussed a motion by Premier Ward, of New Zealand for the establishment of a chain of State-owned wireless telegraph stations throughout the Empire. The Postmaster General said that the Government favored the scheme, both for strategic and commercial reasons. It is supposed that it will begin the establishment of stations between England, Cyprus, Aden, Bombay, the Straits Settlements and West Australia. From there links would be made with New Zealand, and later with South Africa. The proposal that the Home Government should enter into negotiations with other governments to secure the adoption of universal international penny postage was not adopted. The Postmaster General said that doing so would involve a loss to the revenue of the United Kingdom of \$2,225,000 annually.

Men Display Most Abject Fear.
Women Far Braver in Grave Crises, Says Nerve Specialist.
"Why do men so seldom shed tears?" a distinguished Brooklyn nerve specialist was asked a few days ago. "Centuries of effort at the suppression of emotion is the answer," the physician replied. "Men are naturally far more susceptible to fear than women. Fear of pain exists in man to an inordinate degree. Long service in hospitals, as interne and as chief physician, qualify me to speak authoritatively on this point. Household Notes.
When it is necessary to measure any liquid by the drop one may dispense with the pipette. Cut a small notch at the edge of the cork, just large enough for a drop to come through at a time; push the cork in tight and pour.
Jars in which lard has been kept for some time can be purified and cleansed of all odor by filling with skim milk and letting stand overnight. Place on the stove and heat slowly until it reaches the boiling point. Scald with soda water.
For bruised furniture wet the part with warm water, dab with a piece of brown paper five or six times, soak in warm water, lay it on the place, apply on that a warm flat-iron till the moisture is evaporated. If the bruise is not gone repeat.
To remove perspiration stains from silk waists sponge the place over your hand with a clean white rag wet in clear water; then cover completely with powdered prepared chalk. Let it dry thoroughly and brush off carefully with a soft brush.
In freezing ice cream put the ice and salt in the freezer and press torn newspapers close around the top, covering all with the ice sack. Turn the crank a few minutes and let it stand ten or fifteen minutes. It will then freeze with about five minutes' turning.
The cleaning of feather pillows is not a task to be dreaded. Place a couple of pieces of board across four tin coffee cans and set in the bottom of the boiler. Put three inches of water in the boiler, place the pillows on the board, cover the boiler and let the pillows steam for an hour, and dry in the sun.
To make an excellent cleaning soap take a laundry size cake of pure white soap, cut it into small pieces and mix it well with three ounces of hot water cover with cold water and let it boil until the soap is dissolved. Then add three and a half quarts of warm water and let it cool; then add a scant ounce of pure ammonia.

Dear Sir,—A family, which I once heard of, consisted of a man, his wife, son and daughter. The daughter was very tidy, neat and clean; but the son was dirty, slovenly and untidy. One day, whilst out walking, the wife could not help but remark on the beautiful and tidy appearance of the daughter. "Yes," said the husband; "but for heaven's sake look at the ragged seat of Johnnie's pants."
It is the same way with this city of ours. We pride ourselves on the fine appearance of our public buildings, parks, and the cleanliness of back yards, but "for heaven's sake" look at the dirty, dilapidated, unsightly appearance of the board fences, vacant lots, telephone poles, etc. I would like for an observant person to start from the railway station and walk down Water Street, and note the condition. Everywhere the beauty and cleanliness of our city is spoiled by some dirty fence, shabby pile and vacant lot, or dilapidated and unsightly buildings.
Starting at the station, which is a beautiful building and a credit to any community, we have, right across the street from it, a dirty vacant place, and to the east of it is even worse, for here is an unsightly board fence, decorated with pieces of posters, torn paper, etc. Then, again, side by side with the splendid buildings of the Angel Engineering Co. and the Horwood Lumber Co. are houses which, by their appearance, must have survived the flood. Further along is the Globe Steam Laundry and C. L. March's building; but across the street from it is an old blacksmith's forge and an untidy fence. And it is the same all along. But just look at the Court House—a grand impos-

ing evidence; but look to the west of it. Here is refuse, weeds and a dirty bank, crowned by a shabby, unsightly building. Truly a fitting ornament to set off the finest building in the country.
We talk about our patriotism, but at the same time let us not neglect our city, and to my mind, no more fitting monument could be erected on Coronation Day than by tearing down these dirty board fences and erecting good pallid ones in their places. This would save three purposes, viz.: It there is dirt and rubbish there the Council could see it; if however, there are flowers and beauty spots, the children could admire them; while advertisers would have to look up some other place to stick their posters, as they could not be stuck on the pallid ones.
The brigades are going to have a parade on Coronation Day; would it be asking too much for the lads to account the number of dirty telephone poles, without paint or decoration of any kind, that they pass in the course of their parade.
I beg that you will excuse me, Mr. Editor, for trespassing so much on your valuable space, but at the same time I hope that you will publish this as, to my mind, it is a matter that every loyal citizen should have at heart.

Get Rich Quick.

Those who trusted the Finance Wizard, Charles D. Sheldon, with millions that he might invest in Tom Tiddler's field and make them rich quick have now the sorry satisfaction of knowing that they have lost their money and that the prosecution has failed to trace its whereabouts, but has succeeded in putting the confidence man in prison for five years on one count. There are two other counts in the indictment and whether they will be proceeded with will signify little unless they conduce to the finding and return of some considerable part of the money Sheldon got away with. One of the witnesses testified that according to Sheldon's books the balance due to his clients was \$2,138,000. Sheldon struck Montreal, gathered in some millions, took to flight, cost thousands of dollars to the Canadian taxpayers for detectives to hunt him and to arrest him, for lawyers to get him extradited from Pittsburgh, prosecuted in Montreal and finally jailed for five years.

Schooner Cut Down.

The Port de Grave schooner Pilot, John Butler, master, coming from that place to St. John's, was cut down by the schr. Samuel R. Crane, Mercer, master, of Bay Roberts last evening while beating up the shore of Blackhead near Pouch Cove. The Pilot had her port tacks aboard and was reaching off, the Samuel R. Crane was reaching in when, owing to some mismanagement, she crashed into the starboard side of the Pilot, breaking the rail, bulwarks and stanchions from the fore chains to the quarter deck except in one place, about three feet wide, where the main chains were fastened. Five of the stanchions were broken off clear to the deck near the fore chains. The Crane bumped her right along for a distance of over thirty feet. The first shock broke off two beams in the forecabin. All was confusion when the collision occurred. When the Crane fell off the crew of the Pilot rushed to clear away the wreckage and examine the extent of the damage. The skipper ordered the pumps to be tried, fearing that the schooner had been made leaky. She was found to be O. K. Skipper Butler managed to get into Pouch Cove before dark, where he telephoned to Capt. Strong for a tug. The John Green, Captain Roberts, went down this morning early and towed the Pilot to this port, arriving here at 11.15. Capt. Butler was coming here with a fishing crew and all his fishing outfit, intending to set his traps either in Freshwater Bay or at Petty Harbour. This mishap will cause several days' delay. The skipper and crew say that the other schooner was at fault and will expect Capt. Mercer to make and pay damage. The Samuel R. Crane, as far as the crew know, was not damaged. She was coming from Bay Roberts. She is the schooner that was employed on the Labrador in the Marconi station work last summer. Capt. Mercer beat into port this afternoon.

All About a Parcel.

Last night at 10.30 as a man named Walsh, of Pennywell Road, was coming out of the country near Mundy's Pond, he saw a parcel in a clump of bushes, and going over to pick it up thought he heard the voice of an infant inside the covering. He feared to pick it up, and running out to Pennywell Road told the lady with whom he boarded of his "discovery." Accompanied by the woman he went back to the spot, found the parcel, but neither of them would handle it and they returned home. The man later looked up Detective Sergt. Byrne, who procured a lantern and went to the place designated by Walsh. The officer found a parcel containing boots, dress goods, &c., and on enquiry this morning found it belonged to Mr. J. M. Devine, dry goods man of Water Street. The parcel was worth \$15 and was being sent away from Mr. Devine's mail order department to a customer over the Bay. A pair of boots and socks had been taken out of the parcel. The boy was then placed under arrest. He later restored the articles and, being a young lad, was released from custody.

Fowler Recovering From Operation.

"Bob" Fowler, the veteran Marathon runner, is slowly recovering from the effects of a severe operation at the Carney Hospital, the removal of varicose veins from his legs having been rendered imperative shortly after the 15-mile race at the American league grounds May 30.

They were assisted by three men from Topsail. The trees covering a quarter of an acre of land were burned down.

Imperial Topics Under Discussion

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. At the Imperial Conference yesterday Mr. De Villiers Groo, Minister of Public Works of United South Africa, moved a resolution, on behalf of South Africa, against the methods of shipping combines. He cited the Sherman Anti-Trust Law of the States, making rebates illegal and as greatly benefitting American shippers. He added that American shippers were greatly in need of a similar measure. Mr. Buxton declared the feeling of the shippers of the United Kingdom was not strong enough against the rebate system to justify such a legislative prohibition, but he agreed to support an amended resolution providing for concerted action by all the Governments of the Empire against shipping combines when it was shown they were prejudicial to the trade of the Empire. The amended resolution passed.
 The Conference agreed to the proposal of Sir W. Laurier, supported by Sir Edward Grey, suggesting that negotiations should be opened with the Imperial Government with a view of securing to any of the Overseas Dominions the right of withdrawal from any colonial treaty without the assent of the remainder of the Empire. The Conference also agreed to a proposal to appoint a Royal Commission to visit the Overseas Dominions and report on the trade resources and the best methods of their development. A long discussion concerning the "All Fed" route took place. This question revealed numerous difficulties of opinion and practical difficulties. Mr. Lloyd-George explained that the cost of a 21 knot service was prohibitive and that of an 18 knot service enormous. Finally a limited resolution was carried to the effect that it was desirable to establish the best possible service.

LATEST CABLE NEWS.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-Day. Chairman Parsons of the Senate Finance Committee, in conference with President Taft, confirmed the report that 60 Senators are expected to vote for Reciprocity. He predicted that within two weeks the date for the vote would be agreed upon. He gave the President a detailed report of the situation in the Senate, and declared the bill would be passed without amendment.
 Special to Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, To-Day. The finally revised figures of the revenue and expenditure of the Dominion for the fiscal year ended March 31st, 1911, show the Revenue amounted to \$117,780,408. Compared with \$101,037,710 for 1910 the increase is \$16,742,698. The Expenditure on Consolidated Fund or ordinary account totalled \$87,739,988 against \$79,417,747 for 1910, an increase of \$8,322,241. On Capital Account the expenditure was \$33,996,222, a decrease of half a million as compared with the capital expenditure of 1910. During the fiscal year \$3,775,305 was added to the Public Debt which on 31st March last stood at \$340,041,732. The chief sources of the increase in revenue were Customs, \$12,809,261; Excise, \$1,616,483; Post Office, \$1,138,495; Public Works including railways, \$1,171,286.

Rev. John Rowe Dead.

HARBOUR MAIN MOURNS HER SOGGARTH ABOON.

Rev. Father John Rowe, the beloved pastor of Harbour Main parish, passed away from this world of travail to his eternal reward yesterday afternoon. He had been ill the past two years and had been confined to his home most of the time during the past twelve months. His death was not unexpected, although his people entertained hope all along that he may be restored to health and once more his familiar form would be seen in their midst. The Almighty had willed otherwise and the faithful friends of the poor now lie cold in death. He will be sorely missed in the parish of Harbour Main. Mr. Rowe will not be easy to supply his place with a priest who will be so loved by the people of the parish. He is gone but his memory will live in the hearts of all who knew him and will continue to work for good.

Father Rowe ministered in four parishes since he came to Newfoundland in 1882, viz. King's Cove, Harbour Grace, Northern Bay and Harbour Main. The late Rev. Father Henrybury of Terrenceville was his uncle, and he visited him first on his arrival in this country and spent some weeks in his company. After spending a few months at Harbour Grace he was sent to King's Cove where as Curate under Rev. Fr. Veitch (now Monsignor Veitch), he did some of the hardest mission work that is incidental to the climate of Newfoundland in winter, and where many times he risked his life on sick calls over land and sea. His sincerity, simplicity and the personal magnetism that goes with a warm generous heart won the love of all the people amongst whom he laboured, and they will no doubt utter a sincere prayer for his soul when they read the news of his death. He was a friend and adviser that all felt confidence in approaching. He laboured for over twenty years in the parish of Northern Bay, and as a man of that parish said one day here on the street, "There goes Father Row, every fisherman in Northern Bay, Paris would die for him." When he was transferred to Harbour Main Parish in 1905 all the people there regarded it as the great personal loss of their lives and sorrow was expressed in tears by many of his people. Father Rowe gained the same place in the

Heart of the people of Harbour Main.

He possessed a true spirit of Celtic humour that lightened the ills of life both for himself and those who brought their troubles to him for advice or consolation. Beneath a brusque exterior he had a heart as gentle and loving as a child and one was instinctively reminded of our Lord's selection of the Apostle to whom he alluded when he said: "Behold an Israelite in whom there is no guile." Father Rowe had a heart too big and too generous to hold hard feelings against any fellowman. His home at Harbour Main was proverbial for its hospitality as it will be known to many people who have travelled that way. The great loving heart is now at rest. May his soul rest in peace.
