



Government Cattle Jobbing.

It may be remembered that last November we directed attention to the Government's venture in cattle jobbing. On the 18th of that month we had the following, among other matters:-

"The story runs that the Government in its magnanimity bought a number of heads of cattle in the Burin District. The cattle were brought to the Government farm in St. John's, and a sale was determined on. Instead of proceeding in the usual way and engaging an auctioneer, and advertising the sale in the newspapers, so that farmers and all other persons interested in cattle would know of it, a quiet and less public procedure was decided on."

In the House of Assembly yesterday, Mr. Gear was supplied with some details in reference to this transaction. Twenty-five head were bought by the Government at the Burin exhibition at a total cost of \$1,022.50. It cost \$105 to transport them to St. John's. Some butchers were invited to the Government farm to buy them. Seven of them accepted the invitation and purchased the cattle at a total cost of \$660.50. The Government lost on the deal \$467, and the Premier declared in the House of Assembly a few days ago that the loss was a mere bagatelle. The remark was characteristic of the wanton way in which useless expenditure is made by the present Government.

Government Sanitoria.

In the House of Assembly yesterday Sir Edward Morris, the Premier, moved the House of Assembly into a Committee of the Whole to consider certain resolutions in regard to the subject of the Prevention and Treatment of Tuberculosis. These resolutions were in short as follows:

1. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, out of moneys which may be appropriated by the Legislature for such purposes, to construct, equip, manage and operate hospitals, sanitoria or dispensaries for the treatment of inhabitants of this Colony suffering from tuberculosis, and may accept, take over, manage, operate and control any hospitals, sanitoria or dispensaries which may be erected by any person or corporation in this Colony.

2. Regarding Notification.
3. Regarding Disinfection of bedding, clothing and other infected articles.
4. Regarding Committee of Management.
5. Providing that no loss of franchise shall ensue from use of facilities.

6. Empowering the Governor in Council to make rules to prevent the spread of tuberculosis.
7. Regarding disinfection of chambers occupied by consumptive.

8. Regarding Medical Officers duties in regard to disinfection of such chambers.
9. That any person violating any of the provisions herein contained shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars, to be recovered in a summary manner upon complaint before a Stipendiary Magistrate.

10. That a Bill be introduced to give effect to the foregoing Resolutions.

Recovering.

Mrs. and Miss McCourt, who were nearly poisoned on Ash Wednesday by the eating of tinned salmon, particulars of which have been alluded to in the Telegram, are getting better slowly. We understand the police authorities are investigating this matter with a view to having the parties responsible for the putting up of this food stuff properly and severely dealt with.

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.
A cable from Kingston, says that Jamaica will not send a delegate to the Canadian Conference on the question of closer trade relations between the Dominion and the British West Indies. The States form the Colony's natural market, and the belief is that any attempt in the direction of reciprocity with Canada, would insure the displeasure of the United States.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Feb. 27.
An early settlement of the dispute in the coal trade is apparently more than probable, although it cannot yet be definitely announced. The Executive Committee of the Miners' Federation has agreed to meet representatives of the owners, with some members of the Government and Representatives of the Board of Trade. This meeting of the disputants, with mediators in the effort to smooth away the rough places, is confidently regarded as foreshadowing the termination of what promised to be the greatest industrial struggle of modern times in this country. This clearing of the atmosphere followed a conference between Premier Asquith and some of his colleagues, with members of the Executive Committee of the Miners' Federation, 160 of whom discussed the situation with the Premier for nearly two hours this afternoon. Mutual concessions will form the basis of the expected settlement of the dispute. Until a broad basis of agreement has been reached by the executive and committee and the coal-owners, nothing can be done to suspend the notices to quit. For this reason, many thousands of miners, whose notices expired to-day, have laid down their tools.

New Disclosures

In Dynamite Conspiracy Through 40,000 Letters.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 16.—New disclosures made in the dynamite conspiracy cases through 40,000 letters and telegrams quoted in the indictments as implicating practically all the officials of the International Association of the Bridge and Structural Ironworkers, will be the basis it was declared to-day, upon which the Government will seek to convict the 54 defendants charged with committing or abetting in almost 100 explosions.

The correspondence contained in one of thirty-two indictments and embracing what are termed "unconsummated acts of conspiracy" is held as showing that a vast plot, known to Frank R. Ryan, President of the Ironworkers, and to members of his executive and many business agents was carried on for six years to destroy the property of steel contractors who employed non-union labor. It charges all the defendants with being equally guilty as abettors. It also purports to reveal evidence that jobs became the accepted term and that gradually the officials of local unions began to call on the international headquarters in Indianapolis to assist by dynamite and nitroglycerine in increasing the expenses of the "open shop" contractors. Orin McManigal, Herbert S. Hockin, second Vice-President, and James B. McNamara, became, it is charged, an organized "dynamiting committee."

Letters are included to show regular fees were paid to McManigal, and that the cost of doing local "jobs" frequently was discussed in letters.

None of the bac hair shows on the newest armor-like turbans, while the front hair is pulled out from under the hat brim in any way to suit the style of head covering.

The bracelet is to regain the favor which it once held. A very beautiful armband now being worn consists of a plain band of dull silver inset at intervals with large oval opals. Velvet bags with hand embroidery of tinsel, beads and silk are seen. These are often made to match a suit, or as gifts, and mounted in gold, silver or platinum with heavy braid bangles.

Handbags made partly or entirely of fur are immensely fashionable. They have an outside of embroidered velvet, tulle or silk brocade, touched up with tinsel and bordered with fur.

Jackets for the spring are just a trifle fitted in, twenty-six to twenty-eight inches long; sleeves plain, and the collar must give a cachet to the garment, it to be irregular, one-sided or with revers.

The newest drawer is the Isabelle, but with a circular top and flared below to a width of one and a quarter to one and a half yards for each leg, resembling a short, full petticoat when worn.

The evening wraps are simply sumptuous. Made of wonderful brocades and many richly embroidered. The heights of luxury are those of fur, made reversible, so that they can be worn on either side.

A Frenchwoman nowadays adds as a last touch a long-stemmed glowing pink rose to the outside of her muff or pinned on the left lever of her fur coat. It is artificial, but requires close scrutiny to prove it.

Small roses of ribbon trim black turbans as a garland surrounding the crown, sometimes wandering all over it. The large bunches of zourra are as stylish as any trimming can be, their price prohibiting any general use.

The newest models shown and talked of show skirts averaging two yards in width, and a straight, narrow cut that does not slope into the figure; it gives a slim, straight effect, but does leave something to the imagination.





with the best expert we can command, and leave him to determine as to that which is best in the premises. There was a conflict of ideas in the suggestions. If their course was to make provision for procuring an expert, and that nothing can be said or done till his advice is had, then were they not going too fast in asking the Committee to resolve on 17 Sanatoria. However, they were the Government, the responsible people, and if it appeared well to them that an expert was to be secured at any cost, then they would not differ. But if this were granted, and the Government admitted this as their premises, then why did they ask the House to pass Resolutions approving of 17 Sanatoria in this Island?

One Thing Conflicted With the Other.

They were anticipating what this learned man might say. He might be totally opposed to the erection of Sanatoria over the country, and did not the Government know that some of the leading lights on this question were entirely opposed to Sanatoria. Sir Wm. MacGregor was quoted as an authority on the question of tuberculosis. He was quoted by the Premier on Constitutional Law, and he (Sir Robert) feared that his Constitutional Law was very much like the Premier's, not of much value. Sir William was quoted as an authority on tuberculosis. Admitting that that was what did he say? He said in his reports in one place that he would warn them against the bare idea of establishing sanatoria in this country. He, Sir Robert, gathered from the Premier's remarks that his action in this matter is based upon what he terms "vital statistics." These were as he (Sir Robert) had pointed out the other day unreliable as they were compiled from information advanced by persons not

Qualified to Give an Opinion on the Subject.

No disease was more deceptive than this. It required the most minute diagnosis. Those who furnished the statistics could not be capable of diagnosing consumption. Sir Robert gave an interesting description of the three methods of diagnosing the disease and ridiculed the idea of the compilers of information being able to apply them. But even with these tests, Sir Robert continued, the most eminent physician may err. In the year 1902 a most interesting correspondence took place in the London Times between Sir Wm. Broadbent and Colonel La Poer Trench, the former famed the world over and President of the Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis. He had diagnosed the case of Mrs. Trench, wife of the Colonel.

To Be That of Hopeless Consumption.

She was taken by her husband to Dr. Allibone, of London, put under his treatment, and in a few brief months was restored to perfect health. One of the world's most celebrated men in medicine was thus deceived in these three tests which he (Sir Robert) had referred to. If he could err in them, what value could be placed on the diagnosis of teachers or clergymen in outports? Two-thirds of those returns sent in from outports were certified by those whose evidence would not be taken in a court of law as worthy of credence, and yet they were asked to depend upon the reports submitted by people who were incompetent from lack of training and information on tuberculosis. They could not therefore place implicit reliance on the statistics furnished by the Registrar, because they were given by those incompetent to pronounce an opinion on the matter; Premier Morris had said that the greatest reliance should be placed on the reports of the Commissioners. Taking him then at his own estimate of the value to be placed on these reports, Sir Robert found that those very gentlemen to whom attention had been drawn

Had Declared That They Could Not Advise the Erection of Sanatoria Throughout the Island.

They averred that statistics from the outports were not as they might be. They also said the city was the hot-bed of consumption. They emphasized this, and if he (Sir Robert) read correctly between the lines, they were not slow in recognizing the fact that out of the city may proceed that pollution which caused such a deadly disease to sweep the outports. Would it not be better to confine their efforts to the city at the present moment—to go to the fountain head first and deal with that? Was it not possible that from the filth, dust and dirt, the lack of sanitation in the city, they might have spread all over the Colony that disease which they so greatly

dreaded? Was not our outport life an ideal life for health and vigor if they gave the people proper food, clothes and houses to live in? Was it not true that outports were the ideal places to live in, swept as they were by the breezes from the ocean.

And Bringing Down Upon Them The Ozone From God's Heaven.

Here in the city we mortals were filled with villainous odors that arose from the gutters and streets. Not so in the outports. Might not the conduct of the sealfishery have something to do with it? Some years ago he (Sir Robert) introduced a Bill in reference to the overcrowding of sealing steamers, where men breathed an awful atmosphere, packed as they were like sardines in a box, all calculated to undermine their health and transmit disease to their progeny, and begetting a race not like the men of old times when sealing vessels went from outports, but an inferior race by reason of physical degeneration. Was not that another aspect of the question as to the propriety of permitting 300, 400 or 500 men, except under special regulations, to crowd together in these steamers? He contended recently that if they came to their conclusions and based them upon the experience of other countries.

Then it Was Not in Sanatoria That They Should Look for the Radiation of this Dread Disease

but rather in building up the bodies of the people by better food, clothing and homes. That was the secret of Germany's success in stamping out the plague there. Look at England and they found that Dr. Bulstrode, in his report to the Health Officer of the Government Board, said that better conditions of living was what was wanted, and that had been done there to stamp it out. England had the lowest death rate in the world from consumption. It was effected by bringing about a better condition of things as regards the housing of the poor, cheaper living, better homes and generally bettering conditions for the working classes of England. Then looking at the illustrious examples set by Germany and England, was it not their duty as statesmen to take advantage of that knowledge and profit by it? The Premier had said they should be guided by those who had studied the disease.

He (Sir Robert) Agreed With Him.

What right had they who had not studied to fix upon this country the maintenance of 17 Sanatoria that might be condemned by the very scientific man they might bring here? He had perused the reports of the Public Health Commission and could not find that amongst their eighteen distinct recommendations they had recommended Sanatoria in every district. In fact they stated that they could not recommend the establishment of one institute. They had taken the cue from Sir Wm. MacGregor, another witness produced by the Premier, who advised that we should not dream of establishing here these institutions. The Commission held that much could be accomplished by providing better homes for workers, and to do this

Very Detrimental to the Health of the People.

The Commissioners advocated the establishment of abattoirs, and here Sir

Robert scored present day methods, when meat was often dressed in filthy places. In the whole suite of thirteen recommendations there was not one for the establishment of Sanatoria. What he differed with the Government upon was as to the liability of the statistics before them and the desirability of taking over and maintaining these 17 Sanatoria. There was no other difference between them on the question: It was the duty of all to try and stamp out the terrible plague. It was a matter which they should arrive at a conclusion by wise, deliberate, unbiased and unprejudiced debate. They should all have time given them to arrive at a sound conclusion on these Resolutions. He would ask the Premier to permit the matter to go no further until to-morrow, when he would have further observations to make upon it.

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Taxation Should be Lowered to Enable the People to Live Better.

They also referred to the need of better municipal regulations governing sanitary matters. They recommended a moderate anti-spitting law, weekly examination of places of amusement to ensure cleanliness and proper ventilation and the enlisting of the sympathy of people to carry out their advice. They recommended the distribution of literature, but he (Sir Robert) had set the example in this. Next they advised lectures throughout the country by medical men. They speak of instruction in the schools, the teaching of hygiene, another very excellent recommendation; the fumigation of houses, improved Vital Statistics, and arranging for an anti-consumptive exhibit. That latter recommendation would be useful to those practising medicine; the inspection of meat, cattle and milk, most necessary, he thought. There was very grave danger there. He (Sir Robert) believed

as regards their soundness and the absence of any disease in them. No person could have two opinions on that matter, that the sooner they made a law that no cattle should be imported from Canada unless there is with them a certificate from a competent veterinary surgeon that oxen or sheep imported are free from tuberculosis, the better. A penalty should be imposed and anyone vending the carcass of an animal seen to be tubercular should be punished. Here Sir Robert dwelt on the great discovery of Dr. Koch, showing that the lower animal could transmit the disease to man. But it had been placed beyond peradventure that man could transmit the disease to the lower animal. The Commission had also recommended better cooking of food. Certainly most desirable. They said bad cooking was


