Japan Scolds London for Criticism of Ally.

BY WALTER WILGUS.

Tokio, Nov. 4.-Lord Northcliffe's condemnation of the Anglo-Japanese alliance and his warnings to the Australians and Filipines to be on their guard against Japan are evoking a large amount of chiticism from all sections of the Japanese press. The Yomiuri in a long editorial states:

"If the Japanese people are hard pressed by the world wide anti-Japanese antagonism disseminated by such a powerful organ as the London Times they may alter their national policy on the far east form its foundation and unite with the Chinese, Indians, Mohammedans, Egyptians, Negroes, and even the bolshevists in a colossal alliance. What then will be the superiority of the white race, especially the Anglo-Saxons? We are hopeful that Lord Northcliffe properly will observe the actual state of our people: who patiently are bearing insults from the

Want to Scrap It.

In another editorial the same paper

"We had supposed that Great Brit ain would not take sides with the United States, but would remain neutral in case a war breaks out between the United States and Japan, but now Lord Northcliffe syas that Great Britain and the dominions would array them selves with the United States. Under such circumstances it would be best for us to abolish the Anglo-Jananese alliance of our own accord."

Sees Washington Deal.

According to the newspaper Jiji, the Anglo-Jananese alliance, which is regarded as an obstacle to the limitationof armaments, is likely to be brought up at the Washington conference, owing to the frequently stated British desire for a three party agreement which would include the United States. The Jiji also says that it would be impossible to imagine a naval agreement without a political agreement, which would be necessary for an understanding of the open door.

The article, which is believed to be officially inspired, goes on to say that, if this is impossible, then it is essential that there be some agreement regarding China, indicating that Japan would be willing to make concessions in this

Critic of Consortium.

"The consortium," the article says 'was organized for the purpose of international and administrative control of China. Apart from the question as to whether China's finances, rail ways, and communications should be placed under international control definitely, international interference in China's affairs will increase as the consortium becomes more active.

"Although Japan is opposed in prin ciple to international control, as far as practice goes, she will have to bow to this inevitable tendency. An understanding between these powers will have an important bearing on the international situation in the far east.' Hawaii Forts Scare Japs.





How the Prospector Discovers a Gold Mine.

There are many people who will be surprised to hear that rarely, if ever, is one of Nature's stores of gold digclosed by a glittering on the surface of soil or rock.

Take the case of South Africa. Although gold was discovered by Edward Button in the Sutherland Hills (Klein Letaba) during the year 1868, the famous Witwatersrand deposits were not discovered until 1885 on the Strubens's farm at Langlaagte, near Johannesburg: this indicates that the process of prospecting must be slow, for though the risks attendant on this work are great, the reward may be very attractive.

A Game of Hide-and-Seek. Whether gold occurs as an alluvial deposit or in a "reef," it is traced by the prospector with the help of a gold pan." This is a shallow pan of light

sheet iron with dished sides. When "panning" for gold the propector places the sand, soil, or crushed rock into the pan, and adds water to wet the substance to be panned. Then, holding the pan in a tub or stream of water, he adds more water, and by a shaking motion works the heavy mineral to the bottom of the pan. By a lapping process he ejects the sand until there remain only concentrates, among which the gold may be distinguished by its colour and relative beaviness.


