





### Obituary

MRS. WILLIAM BOLEN.

(H. F. SHORTIS.) On Sunday last there passed to her eternal reward, fortified by the rites of the Roman Catholic Church, of which she was a consistent and exemplory member, Margaret Walsh, widow of the late William Bolen, for many years caretaker of the old Commercial Rooms in St. John's.

During her married life she was a patient, kind and loving wife, a good neighbour and faithful friend, and she has now gone to her reward that awaits those who have finished life's course and Pept the faith.

Her long life in many respects was a remarkable one: among her acquaintances she was esteemed for her superior qualities of head and heart, her singularly upright character, her noble personality and the magnanimity of her soul: but none except her intimate friends knew the full grandeur of her life, the charities, according to her means, which she dispensed with such unostentations generosity-the deep spirit of her faith, which was animated by every action and found expression in the most beautiful practices of piety. She endeared herself to all by her beautiful character, her deep spirituality, her unobtrusive piety, and her kindness, unselfishness, and unfailing thought for all about her. For many years she was a leading member of the choir in the cathedral in Harbor Grace, and also took part in concerts for charitable purposes. Doubtless she inherited her great musical and vocal talent from her father-her voice being of great range, richness, sweetness, and in her rendition of her part she kept the audience eagerly listening to every note and held them enthral-

and Lady Downes. The certificate of freedom was presented in a silver-gilt casket, adorned with enamelled views of St. Paul's Cathedral, the Leathersellers' Hall. and the Technical College of the Livery, and the arms of the Company


