POULTRY FAIR.—The annual poultry fair at Berlin was hold on Saturday, in connection with the regular weekly market, and in every particular it was a decided snocess. About \$300 was given in prizes ranging from one to ten dollars, the latter for the heaviest turkey. A large number of farmers—between 3,000 and 4,000—was in town. The entries were over five hundred, largely in excess of all former fairs, and over 4,000 lbs of all kinds of poultry were shown, besides hich any amount could be had outside g, very fair prices.

MOUNT FOREST TOWN HALL.—The new Town Hall for this village is all but completed. It is situated in a central part of the Town, is two storeys high, 80 x 35 feet, built of white brick. On the ground floor there is one room for the Mechanics' Institute and one for the Council room. The basement is divided into warehouses for produce dealers. The whole of the upper floor is occupied with the Hall, which is reached by a main stair from the ground floor. There is also a rear stairway to the platform.
