

Hitherto the engineering department has been unable to estimate accurately the cost of local improvements before the work was commenced; and the city has been unable to sell the bonds until this work was completed. The necessity of raising several millions dollars each year to carry on these operations without selling bonds has complicated the financial problem, and has cost the city many thousands of

When Waterworks Engineer Fawkes arrived in Calgary in February one of the first changes he made in the method of administration of the waterworks department was in the system of checking up the various work. Mr. Fawkes originated a cost system chart of extreme simplicity, by which the average cost per foot of each piece of work can be ascertained at a glance, as well as the number of men employed on the job, the number oflours per week which each one worked. The engineer goes over his charts very week, checks up the various tems, compares the cost of similar pieces of work under different forenen, and issues written criticism. It has been found that there is considerable variation in the cost of work under the direction of different foremen, and already the head of the depart-




