The largest seal catch was made by the "Tully", with a full crew, having appeared on the coast in March last, and the Penelope, having sailed from the port of Chatham Bay, when just starting on her spring cruise. About from these vessels, and from the base of the coast from the Casco, the best seal catches were made.

Switzerland a Poor Customer of Canada - Gossip From Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Dec. 28.—According to reports which have reached the Canadian consular office at Geneva, the seal catch of the past season was the smallest on record, allowing for the fact that the seal population of the coast is being rapidly depleted. The cause of the decrease is due in a great measure to a smaller fleet of sealing vessels than in previous years. In 1903 the number of seals taken out was 10,307, in 1904, 24,160, and in 1905, 1000, 35,048 skins, and in 1906, 35,473 skins.

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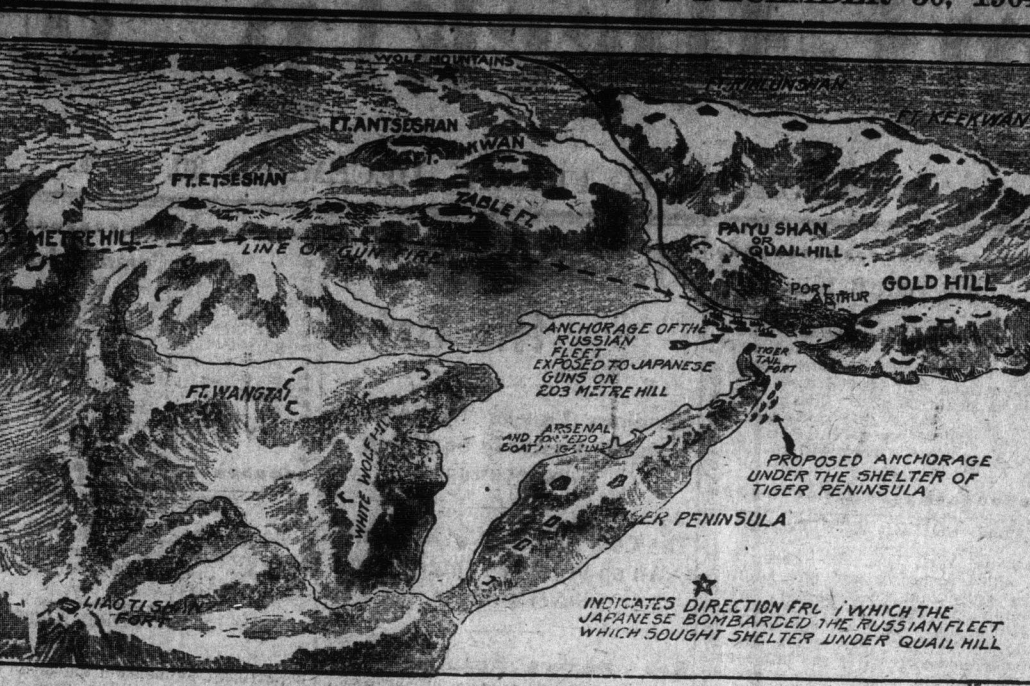
