THE SCOTT ACT.

Its Main Clauses Boiled Down Into Short From the Madoc Review.

"What territory must be covered by any one petition?" A city or county, or a group of them taken together. The act says, that the word "county" includes every town, township, parish and other division or municipality, except a city, within its territorial limit, and also a within its territorial limit, and also a union where united for municipal purposes.
"What does the phrase Intoxicating Liquors," as prohibited by the act, mean?" Liquors, as prohibited by the act, means it comprehends any and every spirituous or malt liquor, and every wine, and any and every combination of siquors or drinks that is intoxicating.


