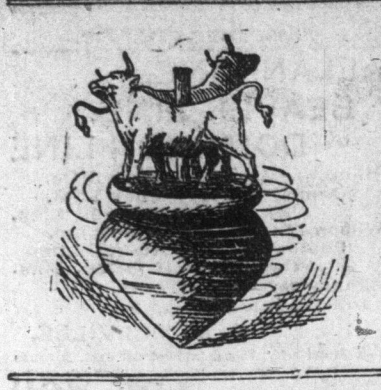

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RAH FOR CANADIAN BUTTER

NOT AS IT IS, BUT AS IT IS ABOUT TO BE

It will no longer rank as a foreign article, but as a Canadian product.

Canadian cheese for many years has commanded a higher price on the English market than that exported from any other country.

For years Canadian factories have been turning out for export to England the very best of cheese.

Each farm wife in addition to her already too arduous duties has had to look after the dairy.

Large at the bottom, small at the top, the middle goes whistling whoop, the old dash churn.

What a nuisance! The old churning in the middle of every one who spent his boyhood on the farm.

Two days each in the churning, the churning moved up as the butter came, a while and the youngster churned so fast that every now and then came from the kitchen the admonition, "Churn slowly, John."

But soon that dasher grew very heavy. John declared it weighed six hundred pounds, and then from the kitchen he heard, "Keep churning, John."

Keep churning, John. He churned for little time longer, and at dawn by the old barrel churn and yoked he would make another stroke.

and placed under the control of Professor Robertson, who is doing his best to make Canada a dairy country. Already over 400 dairies have been established.

It was their opening day. The first of these to be put into operation in York County was formally opened yesterday at Woodbridge.

Mr. J. A. Rindick of the Dairy Department, Ottawa, had been there all the week assisting the directors to put the machinery into working order and to instruct them in the best methods of butter-making.

Some 400 people from the surrounding country gathered for the new creamery in operation. The great attraction was the separator.

In general appearance it resembles the capstan of a vessel, though having probably a larger diameter. The power is applied to a small pulley at the foot of the machine and forces the shaft to revolve once every minute.

On the upper end of the shaft a large steel bowl is loosely, and it is into this that the milk is received. A small wheel at the top allows the cream to escape, while the skimmed milk is mounted up by means of a screw.

The bowl is mounted on a vertical shaft which leads down to the widest part of the wheel. The great centrifugal force of the bowl and milk envelope, forces the heavier milk to the widest part of the bowl where it is collected by the tube already mentioned, while the cream rises to the center.

The separator was manufactured in Copenhagen and cost when set down in Woodbridge \$500. All the other machinery of the factory, including engine, churn, cream vat and churn water, are of Canadian manufacture.

The factory starts with a patronage of 400 pounds of milk per day, which will make about 100 pounds of butter. The estimated capacity of the creamery is 500 pounds of butter daily, and from the interest at present taken by the farming community, will probably reach that limit by the end of the present season.

At present the market will be the city of Toronto, though the directors look forward when they will ship to England. The butter-city firm, the officers of the board of directors are: Mr. John Johnston, president; Mr. John Hallett, secretary; Mr. J. W. Wallace, treasurer; Mr. N. They tried to walk on the level, but remembered that of ice which had partially thawed and then frozen again after a slight fall of snow. Of the solidity of this incrustation there could be no doubt. They were again in another place to slip off, a lot of fragments which were of the purest white.
