





Mr. Cameron, who was a prominent barrister in this city, died at his residence, Church and Carlton streets, on May 15 last. He made his will, which disposes of property worth \$669,508.20, three days before his death. Yesterday the executors, Alfred Buell Cameron, John Curry of Windsor and E. Douglas Armour, applied for probate of the document.

The daughters of the testator, Mary Adeline Torrance and Catharine Medora Cartwright, receive \$2500 yearly. Alfred B. Cameron is to have \$3000 every year and his wife, should she outlive him, \$1000 per year. Kate Torrance, granddaughter, will get \$15,000 when she comes of age and \$2000 when she is married. A number of employes of the banking firm of Cameron & Curry at Windsor are left small yearly legacies. At the end of 21 years all the property is to be divided into three parts, called the Cameron, Cartwright and Torrance shares, and distributed among the three children of the testator or their legal heirs. Should Mrs. Cameron, the widow, at any time lose her estate, she is to be provided for by the trustees.

The estate comprises \$536,444.53 in real property and \$133,062.91 in personalty.
