FIRST BLIZZARD A STUNNER

WORSE THAN ONTABIO,

Trains Stalled at Auburn-Drifts 25 Feet Deep at Watertown - Wires Down. Houses Unroofed and Much Damage Reported-A Funeral Rescued By Life-

Camden, N.J., Dec. 27 .- The storm in this vicinity was the most severe since 1886. Electrical wires of all kinds were torn from their fastenings, and Market-street, one of the principal thor-jughtares, was blocked with the debris gughfares, was blocked with the debris until late in the day. At Seventh and Birch-streets seven two-story houses were unroofed, and several of the inmates were injured by falling bricks and plaster. Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Shirley, who reside in one of the houses, had a narrow escape from death. Both were rescued badly hurt. Trees by the score were uprooted in different sections of the city. Considerable damage was done to shipping. At Cooper's Point R. G. Wilkins suffered much loss. Several smail boats belonging to him were torn loose from their moorings and have not been recovered, while several of his steam launches were capsized or sunk. Other vessels in that locality had their masts blown away and were otherwise injured. Henry J. Clossterman, a well-known business man, was struck by a falling tree this morning, while walking along Broadway, and had a leg broken.

A Funeral Rescued By Lifeboats.

Atlantic City, Dec. 27.—In going across the meadows this morning, a funeral bearing the body of a child was caught by the rapid rise of the tide, and the mourners were compelled to abandon the hearse. In attempting to regain the road the horses became unmanageable, and had to be cut loose to prevent the carriages from being overturned. The mourners took to the tops of the vehicles to get out of the reach of the rising water. They suffered acutely from the stinging cold and wind. A special train was sent to their assistance, but had to return for lifeboats to reach the imperilled people. They were brought to this city this afternoon.

Three Railroads Tied Tp.
Scranton, Pa., Dec. 27.—Only Iocal passenger trains are running, through trains on the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western, the Ontario and Western and the Jersey Central Railroads being completely tied up by immense drifts, which fill the mountain cuts. There is an entire blockade of every electric street car line, and traffic is at a standstill on all the city thoroughfares. There is enforced idleness at the mines through the entire region, railroads being unable to put cars into the breaker siding, and there is every likelihood of a full week's idleness for the miners by reason of the storm.

DISASTERS AT SEA.

London, Dec. 27.—The washing ashore of a quantity of wreckage upon the Scotch coast indicates the loss of the steamer Oswald with her crew bound for Cardiff. The wreckage was chiefly washed ashore three miles north of Port Logan, Wigtownshire.



Loosen the rope and the bundle is ready to go to the stack, mow or cutting box.
