Parish Notes.

“Summer suns are glowing,” and the holiday
 season has come round once more. Most of the
 Parochial organizations have wound up their
 affairs for the time being, and members of the
 congregation are already scattering. The Rector
 is going to begin his holiday at the end of July,
 when he goes to the Georgian Bay on a visit to
 the Rev. Street Macklem. During August the
 Parish will be in the charge of Mr. Rounthwaite
 and of the Rev. E. C. Cayley.

On June 12th, being the first Sunday after
 Trinity, the Rev. J. F. Rounthwaite entered upon
 his duties as Assistant Curate.

On Trinity Sunday, Miss Maud Cayley's Bible
 Class was closed and its members handed to the
 Rector the sum of \$24.50. This money was
 subscribed during the five months the class has
 been held, and is to be devoted to the repairing
 the roof, and the “doing up” of the Clergy's
 vestry.

The Provost of Trinity College preached a
 sermon on behalf of Trinity University, in St.
 George's, on June 12th. This sermon was one
 of a series which is being given to collect funds
 and to awaken interest in our great Provincial
 Training School. Cards were distributed all
 over the Church on which people desiring to be
 subscribers could write their names. Although
 many members of St. George's have already been
 approached on this subject, several cards were
 filled in, and about \$20 subscribed and more or
 less promised for five years.

The Chancel Guild desire to thank Mrs. Keat-
 ing, Mrs. Burton and Miss Moore for gifts of
 flowers for the Church during the month of June.

On Monday evening, June 13th, the members
 of St. Agatha's Guild gave a social evening.
 The entertainment was provided for themselves
 by themselves, and nothing marred the joyous-
 ness of the occasion, but the rain which poured
 in torrents.

The Sunday School Festival is fixed for
 Saturday, July 2nd. The outing is to be held at

Lambton Park whither the children will be conveyed by the street cars. The cost of this annual outing amounts to something like \$53, and the Rector is anxious to have subscriptions sent in, sufficient to cover this amount and the sum of \$8.05 still owing for last year's picnic.

This number will be a double number and will include the July and August numbers of the *Dawn of Day*. There will be no further issue till September. This is owing to the scantiness of Parish news in the summer months. It also saves the management very considerable expense.
