The number of acres under flax in Ulster, Ireland, has gradually fallen from 301,000 in 1864 to 89,000 in 1884. Is the linen trade also doomed?

Tuos. Kavanagh of Toronto, dealer in fish, etc., has been shadowed by the sheriff at the instance of Mrs. Laidley, and his stock was advertised to be sold on the 9th inst.

Mr. HENRY LAVALLEE, jeweller, Montreal, has assigned after an experience of about three years in a small way. Liabilities between 14 and 15 hundred dollars.

Moore & O'Connor, boots and shoes, Kingston, Ont., have assigned after an experience of 4 or 5 years with very small capital. Liabilities about \$4,000; assets nominally the same.

The Norwich Union Fire Insurance Co. dropped \$64,000 in premiums last year. The company has at length fallen into line with those who take the publicanto their confidence by opening their accounts to the Government.

WORK on the extension of the North and Northwestern Railroad to Callander, Ont., where it will connect with the Canadian Pacific Railway, is proceeding rapidly and connection will probably be made before Christmas.

The following telegraphic despatch was received from Brandon, Man., on the 4th inst:
—Farmers are generally engaged in ploughing. Wheat has been sown within the last day or two. The weather is remarkably fine and mild.

The compromise effected by Lewis Knapp of Shelburne, Out., general storekeeper, early in 1884 was merely a postponement of the evil day. He lately assigned owing about \$1800. His wife owned a couple of houses in the village.

The system of country cheese fairs, which originated, so far as Canada is concerned, at Ingersoll, Ont., but which has been adopted by other progressive centres in the agricultural districts, has now gone into operation at Listowell, Ont.

The debentures issued by the City of Ottawa under the local improvement bye-law amounting to a face value of \$66,957 have been awarded equally between the two highest tenderers, the Metropolitan Loan & Savings Society and Mr. William McKay, both of whom offered 3 per cent premium. In case Mr. McKay declines to receive half, the whole will be given to the Loan Society. It is probable that about \$50,000 worth more will be offered for tender in a few days.

It is stated that J. S. Williams and Henry Lawrence, of Watford, Ont., have been chosen trustees to wind up the estate of M. Campbell, banker, of that village. The estate will pay 25 per cent over and above the two dividends already paid.

WM. HADDENCAMP, formerly employed by the Goodyear Metallic Shoe Company of Nangatuck, Conn., and who absconded to Canada in November with \$20,000 has been arrested After leaving Montreal be proceeded to Port Henry, N.Y., thinking all search for him was over.

THOS. LISABELLE, of the firm of Brosseau & Lisabelle, custom house brokers, who fled to the States with his partner when charges were preferred against them of defrauding the customs by means of false entries, returned to the city recently and was arrested. He has pleaded guilty to the charges against him.

PREFARATIONS are being made by a a firm of lumbermen in New Brunswick to execute a large order for logs from a Boston firm, deliverable early in the spring. The peculiarity about the order is that the successful experiment made two years ago of constructing the logs into a raft for towage along the coast will be repeated.

M. Feiner, merchant tailor, this city, has just compromised with his creditors. The liabilities were \$2,400; the assets \$2,000, consisting of stock and book debts. An offer of 50c on the dollar, payable in four and six months, secured, by Messrs. A. Solomon and S. Krischock, was accepted. M. Feiner attributes his difficulties to the depressed state of business.

Josephus Howard, soap manufacturer of Moncton, N.B., has assigned. Howard is a young man and formerly ran a general store but gave it up to manufacture soap. He has been specially unfortunate, as the factory has been twice burned out within a year and the consequent losses have crippled him, although at the time of the second fire, in September last, the plant was insured for \$1,400, or nearly its value.

S. F. Muscar, jeweller, of King Street, Toronto, is in financial difficulties. Last week he called a meeting of creditors, when he offered 25c on the dollar, which offer was refused, as it transpired he had given his wife a chattel mortgage for \$1000. Notwithstanding the circumstances, however, a further offer of 33\frac{1}{2} cents, secured, payable in 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 months was finally accepted.

Advices from Halifax report that the Furness line steamer Rowena will take 60,000 bushels of Ontario and Northwest grain for London, being the first shipment of the winter season. Three carloads No. 1 red Fyfe came through from Winnipeg, 2,700 miles, and is the first through grain shipment from Winnipeg via Halifax.—The Halifax Steam Navigation company is in financial difficulties. The steamer Ulunda is under seizure for \$3,500, sundry debts.

The dissolution of the well known wholesale dry goods house of A. R. McMaster & Bro., of Toronto, is announced, Captain McMaster retiring from the firm. Mischievous and sensational reports stating that Mr. A. R. Carmichael, for many years cashier and con-

his creditors. This was supposed to have left him a surplus, but the surplus appears to have vanished also, as he has recently been considering the advisability of offering 50 cents in the dollar, spread over a year. Mr. Sullivan's liabilities are about \$10,000; his assets nominally perhaps \$7,000 to \$8,000. An assignment is announced.

FARLEY & Co.'s is the only considerable dry goods failure occurring for some time in Toronto. The liabilities, however, are not heavy for a city retail house, probably because of the well-known condition of the concern for some time past. Mr. Alex. Farley, the sole proprietor, was compelled last February to negotiate for a partial extension with creditors for \$500 and upwards, which was agreed to on the basis of 40 cents in the dollar cash, and the balance-60 per cent-in 3 and 4 months. In August last he found himself unable to go on without a further extension, which on this occasion was spread over 15 months. Unable to meet these engagements as they fell due, he made an assignment on the 5th inst. The liabilities are given at \$32,000. The assets, which are nominally estimated at \$16,000 to \$17,000, must be of very inferior character indeed if they do not yield more than 15 cents in the dollar as given out in the despatches.

THE Rainy Lake Lumber Co., limited, of Rat Portage and Winnipeg, is one of the many enterprises of great promise which began with the golden era in the North West and drooped with the waning fortunes of the boom. The capital was \$350,000, in 3500 shares of \$100 each, of which \$312,000 was understoodto have been paid up. Among the chief promoters were Messrs. J. tor, L. J. Dawson, M.P., W. J. Alloway and Hugh Sutherland. During the boom the assets of the company were estimated roundly at a million, and the local bank which knew them felt that they could boast of such a customer. Mr. Sutherland, who was the president, retired some time ago. The company had been endeavoring for some time past to issue bonds, but without much success. so that the recent assignment took no one by surprise. To add to their troubles their hands struck last June, as their wages were somewhat in arrear. The liabilities are in the vicinity of \$200,000.

A clumsy attempt at swindling was recently made by Ayer Bros., of Newfield. This firm informed their creditors that their store had been robbed by one of their employees of the sum of \$3700, and that, as a conscquence, they were compelled to assign. Some of their workmen were even arrested and examined, in order to give color to the statement. No proof being forthcoming, the men were acquitted, and, in consequence of the openly expressed disbelief in the story, the Ayers discarded the midnight marauder theory and substituted that of somnambulism. In order to make this version plausible, the brother supposed to be a sleep-walker was watched at night and followed to an attic room where \$1600 was discovered hidden in a hole; this sum was produced for the benefit of the creditors. But, as it appeared that, in order to make this story possible, a portion of the house partition had been torn down, the creditors resolved to institute proceedings unless the whole sum missing was returned, and on secing the hopelessness of the case the Avers broke down and turned over the sum of \$3,-695 to the assignee, at the same time throwing themselves on his mercy.

Oromwell, confectioner, was refused by the creditors, and his stock will be sold by auction in the ensuing week.

THANKS to the energetic action of the Health Committee, aided and stimulated by the business men of the city, the back, of what we may now safely term the late epidemic, is fairly broken. That it has somewhat hurt the trade of Montreal, owing to the sensational rumors so zealously disseminated, cannot be denied, but the business of this city has now attained such vast dimensions that it is almost impossible to divert it; and, now that the folly of dreading the importation of infection, through the purchase of goods, which have, probably never been within miles of contagion is fully manifest, it becomes more and more evident that business is returning to its normal channels in probably increased volume.

Messas, Knight & Wilson, founders and agricultural implement makers of Alliston, Ont., are in difficulties. The firm was formerly Aitken, Knight & Wilson, but the senior partner, Mr. Aitken, retired some years ago, withdrawing it is said most of the capital. Meantime it has been a constant struggle to keep the concern afloat, and it is said that for some time past renewals have been the order of the day. No Montreal houses are interested, as the firm has always been regarded with suspicion here. Messrs. Adam llope & Co., of Hamilton, have supplied the foundry for a long time, and, it is said, are the parties most interested in the failure. They had the misfortune of being burnt out in July, '84, and were insured on both shops for \$15,000 and \$5,000 respectively, insufficient, however, to cover their losses.

THE season of lake navigation just closed is claimed by vessel owners to have been the most unprofitable ever experienced. Freights have been scarce and carrying rates low. Sixty vessels have passed out of existence during the year, involving a loss of \$1,016,200. Of these twenty-two were steam and thirtyeight were sail. Twenty-two went ashore and pounded to pieces, nineteen were destroyed by fire, fourteen foundered, four capsized and were broken by the seas, and one was blown into splinters by the explosion of her boilers. Twenty-five were wrecked on Lake Michigan, ten on Lake Huron, six on Lake Superior, six on Lake Erie, and thirteen on Lake Ontario. With the loss of these sixty vessels seventy-four lives perished. THE NATIONAL BANKS OF THE UNITED STATES.

The twenty-third annual report of the Comptroller of the Currency to Congress has just been made public. This is one of the most interesting documents issued at Wash. ington, and we propose to give our readers a resume of its main features.

During the year ending November 1st 145 banks have been organized, with an aggregate capital of \$16,938.000, nearly threefourths of which are in the Western and Pacific States. Since the passage of the National Bank Act in 1863, 3,406 National banks have been organized. Of these 575 have gone into voluntary liquidation, or have allowed their charters to expire, and 104 have been placed in the hands of receivers, leaving 2,727 in existence on the 1st November, the largest number that has yet been in operation at the same time.

Notwithstanding the fact that the new banks organized during the year deposited nearly \$5,000,000 of bonds as security for circulating notes the aggregate of bonds on deposit for that purpose has fallen off from \$325,000,000 to \$308,000,000. The reduction of circulation for reasons other than the call of bonds was greater than anticipated. The chief causes have been the small profit remaining after payment of the Government tax of one per cent per annum, and uneasiness amongst some bankers on the silver question. The latter cause operates through the dread felt that the interest on the bonds held for circulation may be paid in silver with the natural consequence of a fall in their value. The report says "The convictios in general that the faith and credit of this Government is pledged for the payment of its securities in gold coin or its equivalent."

The Comptroller has discussed at much length the difficult and important question of the future maintenance of the National bank circulation, any further contraction in which he regards with alarm.

One of the causes—the lack of profit—he recommends should be as far as possible removed by the repeal of the I per cent tax, and by permitting the issue of notes up to the par value of the U.S. bonds deposited, instead of 90 per cent as at present. For the other cause, the decrease in the debt of the United States, and the consequent diminution of the bonds available as security, he suggests rather than recommends some remedies. He discusses at length the methods under which circulating notes are issued in other countries, and outlines a plan for insuring the payment of bank notes by the creation of a "Safety Fund," on lines orginally suggested by his predecessor, Mr. John Jay Knox.

His reasoning about this matter does not seem to us conclusive, but the whole subject is treated in a sketchy and tentative way. From the results of the 104 banks which have been wound up, or are being wound up by receivers, it appears that if they had been allowed to issue circulation equal to 90 per cent of their capital, secured only by a first lien on their assets as in Canada, the note-holders of 58 of these banks would have experienced no loss. This, he states, shows to what extent it may be safe to allow National banks to issue unsecured notes ! but we hardly think the deduction holds good, since past experience has shown that the business of a bank issuing its own notes without check is likely to be very different from that of the National banks under the present system, which, thanks to the vigorous administration of the Comptroller and his subordinates, has certainly brought banking management in the United States to a high degree of efficiency.

His suggestion as to a "Safety Fund" is to accumulate a fund from the tax upon circulation and other sources out of which the unpaid notes of broken banks might be paid. The plan provides for the issue of a certain proportion of the circulation against U.S. bonds, and the balance on the credit of the banks with a first lien on the general assets, the percentage of the secured issues to decrease, and of the unsecured to increase

as the "Safety Fund" grows and the U.S. bonds available decrease.

We may pass by for the time the questionable policy of taxing the prudent and careful for the benefit of the imprudent or the dishonest. Apart from this there is a manifest weakness in the argument in that it affects to reason from the results of the existing state of affairs as to the probable working of one substantially different. Nevertheless the whole discussion is a noteworthy contribution in the direction of meeting a future want which it is becoming more and more apparent will before long be a serious element in the financial and commercial conditions of the United States. The right course has not yet been suggested, and the problem is a perplexing one. Free issues as we have them are evidently an impossible system with nearly 3,000 banks spread over half a continent. The issue of unsecured notes by these, even under restrictions such as are suggested in the report, would soon become an intolerable nuisance and burden, even although the wild-cat banking of former days might never return. We have before this expressed the opinion that unsecured issues are only permissible where there are a comparatively few large well-known banks, whose credit is a matter of common knowledge to the whole business community. Such conditions are impossible in the United States, and may before long be impossible in Canada.

The Comptroller comes out squarely on the silver question in favor of an honest dollar. He again points out that the continuance of the silver dollar coinage must ultimately lead to the payment of the obligations of the Government in silver, and that the effect of such a course would be to place gold at a premium, to the great disturbance of the trade of the country. His view is that legal tender notes are redeemable in gold, and that National bank notes being payable in legal tenders their position will be determined by the status of the latter. On this very important point there is, however great disagreement amongst good authorities.

The remainder of the report is mainly concerned with statistics. We give herewith the figures in millions, showing the condition of the National banks in 1879 and 1885, which cannot fail to interest our readers.

To get a comprehensive view of the position of banks in the United States the State banks and Trust companies should be taken into account, since they differ but slightly in effect from the National banks. Amalgamating the returns from all the banks and trust companies we get the following figures:

This still leaves out a very important factor, the Savings banks. The returns of these from 15 States show deposits of \$1,095,172; these added to the deposits of the banks and trust companies make up a grand total of 2,747 millions, figures which we can only describe as wonderful.

#### THE FRESH FISH TRADE.

A great deal has been said and written of late about the fresh fish trade between the sea-board Provinces and Montreal and the West, the alleged difficulties in the way of its development being the principal point touched upon. Our railway companies have been blamed unheard and our dealers have been presumed to be negligent in action and

to have preferred to trade with American ports rather than take the trouble to ascertain the possibilities of doing business at Canadian sources of supply.

It is to be regretted that more enquiry and research have not been forthcoming in the discussion of this matter, as merely slight investigation would have proved that certain reflections which have been made, both upon importers and the Grand Trunk and Intercolonial railways, were not warranted by the facts and were misleading and unjust. So far from our dealers being indifferent to the possibilities of the trade, some of them have been enterprising enough to visit the fisheries on several occasions, and have even sunk money in speculation calculated to develop the resources of Canada.

It may be accepted as a fact that the trade in fresh fish between this city and the Maritime Provinces is as large, considering natural conditions, as it is reasonable to expect. Chief among the " natural conditions," is the change to wintry weather which annually drives the fish from our shores for many months to the American coasts farther to the south. There is practically no trade to be done after December from this cause, the supplies at Canadian ports, suitable for the trade, being limited to fresh herrings and some cod and pollock. Haddock is in steady demand, but supplies have to be drawn from Boston and Portland during the season when demand is at its height, as they cannot then be obtained in Canada.

With strange persistency, reference has been made to Halifax in connection with this subject. Halifax is looked upon by the trade as a salt fish port. St. John is coming to the front as a depot for fresh and cured fish. It may seem ridiculous in an article of this kind to speak of "tommy cods," but the fact remains, that for the past three years the trade in this peculiarly named little fish has equalled, and occasionally exceeded, that in all other kinds of fresh fish combined. They are caught along with smelts and were formerly brought into this market from Three Rivers, but after the opening of the Intercolonial Railway, supplies of a superior kind were forwarded from the vicinity of Chatham, N.B., and thirty to thirty-five ears are now handled every winter.

Other fresh fish chiefly in demand are haddock and herring; of the former about fifteen cars and of the latter fifteen to twenty cars are sold here during the same period. Of salmon, Canadian and British Columbian are used exclusively. Canadian smelts are not much called for, only four or five cars being employed during the season. The bulk of the catch is sent to New York, Boston and Philadelphia. Upper Canada lake fish are now being more largely used.

In the discussion which has arisen, the railway service has been openly or impliedly censured by newspaper critics, but it is curious to find that the trade do not sympathize with these attacks, there being in reality no just cause for complaint either on the score of slow despatch or exorbitant freight charges. For example, the fast freight rate from St. John, N.B., to Montreal, a distance of 752 miles, is 30c per 100 lbs for smoked and cured fish, and 40c for fresh; time usually occupied four to five days; express rate for fresh fish \$1.60 per 100 lbs; time 35 hours. In other comparisons below, the outside rate refers to fresh fish.

Freight-rates from Halifax to Montreal, 850 miles, 35c to 40c; time, five to seven days; express, for fresh fish, \$1.70; time 40 hours.

From New York, 400 miles, 30c to 45c; time irregular, though the distance is half the above, say four to seven days; the express rate is \$1.50 for fresh fish; time 12 hours.

From Boston, 365 miles, the rate is 23c for smoked and cured, and 45c for fresh in car lots; express \$1.75; time 12 hours.

From Portland by the Grand Trunk, 297 miles, the freight rates are the same as from Boston. Express rates 75c; time 16 hours.

The Canadian railway service, therefore, makes a favorable comparison with the American lines. So far as concerns the suggestion to attach a car to passenger trains for fresh fish we learn that it would not be feasible. Were Montreal to draw her entire receipts of fresh fish from one point this might be done, but as Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario, Maine, Massachusetts and New York are all sources of supply it is evidently impossible to furnish such accommodation on the passenger trains from the various points.

The attempt to fasten blame upon the railways, and particularly on the Grand Trunk, in the discussion of this question has fallen flat.

#### TEXTILE INDUSTRIES.

The importance of extending the manufactures of textile products as a means of developing the resources of a country, cannot be too highly estimated, and the large proportions to which the cotton and woollen industries of this Dominion have already attained, as well as, the eagerness displayed to take advantage of every improvement in machinery or method of manufacture, prove that this fact is fully recognised by Canadian manufacturers. But it is only by observing the persistent efforts of inventors to improve upon existing machinery, or to design new, and by noting the number of new processes brought before the public, that the importance of these industries can be fully realized.

England, who owes her commercial supremacy in these branches of industry mainly to the cheapness and elegance of her fabrics, naturally leads the way in industrial invention; and the display of improvements in textile machinery recently exhibited in London shows that the inventive genius of her mechanics is by no means exhausted. Cotton and woollen manufacturing machinery have, of course, received the greatest attention, but new machines for dealing with the kindred fibres of flax, jute and hemp also display tokens of the skill and perseverance of inventors. Of late years, however, the enterprising machine makers of Lancashire have confined themselves principally to minor improvements, including great perfection in workmanship, and have not introduced any great deviation in principle from the machinery in use previously, except in the development of the ring spinning frame. In a brief article like this it is of course impossible to specify all the improvements which during recent years have brought about the present high perfection of cotton machinery, but in a few words it may be said, that the most important changes are, that "feed regulators" and "consolidators" have been added to opening and cleaning machines, and that in carding machines numerous improvements have been introduced, including the substitution of steel for iron card teeth, and the introduction of revolving card flats, oscillating fly combs, and web conductors.

In drawing machines, front and back stop motions, (some by electricity) can spring motions, loose bossed top rollers, revolving endless clearer cloths, etc., have been introduced with an increase of efficiency and economy in the working; while slubbing, intermediate, and roving frames have been improved by better winding arrangements, stronger spindles, steel flyers, case hardened rollers, stopping and lock motions, and other minor changes. The self-acting mule, although in general construction unchanged, has received many additions which have tended materially to increase its efficiency. The working parts have been much strengthened and some of the important motions have been made automatic. The speed has been largely increased, and it is now common for spindles to run upwards of 8,000 revolutions per minute, at the same time bearing cops 20 per cent heavier than those formerly made. The machines work more steadily and quietly, with fewer break downs, while their capacity to stand the strain of the extra quantity of work produced. is very much greater. As a consequence, though factory hours in England have been reduced during the last ten years from sixty fo fifty-six hours and a half, the increase of production of yarn per spindle since 1866 is equal to about 22 per cent, whilst the quality of the yarn spun has improved in strength from 8 to 10 per cent.

On this side of the Atlantic it is satisfactory to note that every new change is at once taken advantage of, and that the Canadian mills, both in machinery and products, keep themselves fully abreast of the times. The industry is a most important one, and every step forward must be hailed with satisfaction as an additional source of prosperity for the country.

#### OTTAWA LUMBERING.

Now that the sawing season may be said to be practically over, it is possible to estimate correctly the amount of business done this season by the Chaudiere mill proprietors. Most of these mills have been working for seven months, one having started as early as the 28th April; and, though the count in the various offices is not quite complete, it is gleaned that the total cut will foot up about 277,000,000 feet. Thus it is somewhat less than last year, but it is stated, notwithstanding, that sales have been fairly good.

Lumbermen on the Chaudiere say that, in this season's sales, quality has largely regulated the market, first-class stuff going off readily at good figures, while poorer qualities were slow, and only salcable at figures much lower in proportion. Knotty and rough lumber has not been in such demand as last year, and consequently the net cash returns have not been so large, but good first-class lumber has been readily disposed of at satisfactory figures. An examination of the percentage of good and rough lumber shows that, on an average, of all the season's cut, not more, and perhaps not so much, as thirty per cent can be classed as first-class, while the remainder is divided into lower grades. The season's trade has been on the whole good, and dealers claim that the outlook for a good season next year is promising, unless some unforeseen event should mar the prospect.

It is satisfactory to note that Canadian lumbermen are beginning to realize the immense waste incurred in the manufacture of square timber under the present system, through which, coupled with slow sales and uncertain prices, the square timber trade has not only become much smaller but is decreasing year by year. Timber manufacturers now see that this waste can be avoided by bringing the logs, as they are, to the mills, when the portions ordinarily left in the woods to form fuel for starting bush fires can be converted into marketable commodities. This method offers two advantages, as it will not only preserve the forests by providing a safe-guard against destructive forest fires, but, at the same time, secures a profit on material hitherto permitted to go to waste.

It is an encouraging fact that the South American demand for Canadian lumber is developing larger proportions year by year, this season some lumbermen report very large sales for that market, and, in addition, the English demand during the past season has not only been reasonably good but may even be said to have been wonderfully lively.

#### FISH OILS.

An interesting question, which has been raised more than once this season, is, what range of quotations should be adopted at this point to best meet the views of the trade. The local press has for years based its quotations on sales of round lots by importers, but as the importers of these oils are not, as a rule, wholesale jobbers, as is the ease in many other branches of trade here, it necessarily follows that Western buyers find themselves astray when they attempt to buy a few barrels of oil at the newspaper figures. The prices quoted are really those asked by the large importers in their transactions with the wholesale jobbers. Assuming that the importer buys or brings to Montreal, from St. John's, Nild., 200 to 500 brls. of cod oil at a cost of about 52c, he will be willing to sell'lots of, say, 20 to 50 barrels to a wholesale jobber at something like 54c to 55c, which is not too large a profit when risk of adverse fluctuations in prices during his retention of it, storage charges, and other expenses of business, are taken into consideration. The wholesale jobber has to look further for customers than the importer, and travellers' commission or salary alone is an item of considerable expense, not to speak of the greater staff of office and warehouse employees indispensable when the the bulk of the business is made up of small orders. He consequently cannot sell half a barrel or several barrrels of oil much under 59c, and make anything of a profit. With these facts before us it is easy to fancy the irritating effect caused in a local jobbing establishment by such orders as the follow-

"DEAR SIRS,—I see cod liver oil quoted in the JOURNAL OF COMMERCE at 80c; please ship me half a barrel at that price."

An explanation that this price might buy a round lot of ten or fifteen barrels or so, but certainly not half a barrel, has been followed up, more than once, by the query:

—"My money is as good as that of the man who buys a larger lot; is it not?" Such correspondence is neither profitable nor pleasant, but still it only faintly represents the position between Montreal and the West. Between this city and the East the state of affairs is exactly the reverse and as difficult to adjust. A consignor recently wrote to the Journal of Commerce censuring consignees

here for making returns of sales at lower rates than quoted prices. This of course admits of the explanation that consignors in the Lower Ports cannot expect to realize wholesale jobbers' figures. As fish oils pass through so many hands, double quotations are given in our tables of prices current, to represent as clearly and fairly as possible the position of affairs. The attention of small buyers in the West, and elsewhere, is specially directed to the quotations headed "Distributing Prices."

#### THE BREAD QUESTION.

The importance of cheap, good bread to all classes of our population is manifest, but more especially to our manufacturers, whose ability to hold their own depends largely on having well-fed, contented employees and at reasonable wages. The superiority of Great Britain as a great manufacturing country is largely due to cheap bread among her people. We regret to say that Montreal, including the Province of Quebec generally, is in respect of bread, the most expensive place in the world to live in. People, to be sure, can bake their own bread, but in manufacturing centres it frequently happens that every old enough member of a family is employed otherwise in the neighboring shoe or cotton factory, and without some degree of co-operation the process of breadmaking is wasteful of fuel and other necessaries. Then most people prefer the flavor of "bakers' bread." It requires some skill to bake well, and the quality of the domestic batch is not always a certainty. Even in the farming districts, especially of Ontario, it has become customary with bakers to deliver bread from the neighboring towns and cities. sometimes as far as five to eight miles, with out additional charge for delivery.

We are pleased to learn that our late endeavors to inaugurate an era of reasonably cheap bread for the people are not likely to be in vain. Some gentlemen in the city who fancy that a net profit of 20 to 25 per cent should be sufficient to make on bread are . putting their shoulders to the wheel, and there is some probability that Montrealers may before long be in a position to buy their bread as cheaply as do the people in Liverpool, England, or in Hamilton or London, Ontario. In a future number we may make some reference to the most approved baking machinery employed in England and elsewhere. It appears that kneading machinery is almost, if not wholly, unknown in Montreal.

#### SPRING NOVELTIES.

Every branch of Ganadian trade is now preparing, with more or less encouraging prospects, for the coming spring, and none show more activity, enterprise, and confidence than the fancy dry goods houses. The novelties to be offered to the trade this year will exceed in number, intrinsic value, and artistic beauty of design anything that has been hitherto shown, and, while prices will rule cheaper for staple goods, stylish and saleable novelties will still command good rates.

Jerseys still hold their place in popular favor, and it is stated on all hands that purchases of jerseys are much larger this season than ever before; braided lines of course form the bulk of imports, but numbers of plain jerseys are now being imported to be braided in this city after imported patterns. The beaded jerseys so fashionable during the fall just expired are entirely discarded. Among novelties in this line are jerseys braided on edge with the new broad flexible braid, now the favorite in England; gold and silver tinsel braids will also be largely used, and lines embroidered with applique work in wool and silk in all colors will form a new specialty. New lines now being shown are made with peaked scollops. French postilion backs, pointed in front, and short over the hips, and but few plain backed jerseys will be offered. A curious theory is advanced to the effect that it is the continued hold of jerseys on the popular favor that is responsible to a large extent for the stagnation in printed cottons. It is said that ladies now prefer to purchase woollen or union dress goods to wear with spring jerseys in place of the old fashioned print dresses, and the consequent lackfor demand for prints has been severely felt already by manufacturers, especially in England.

Buttons, which were worn last season of large size on mantles and jackets only, will now be wern very large on dresses also. Some beautiful cameo effects in large colored metal and horn buttons are now in the market, and will doubtless prove as fashionable here as in England. Designs in all branches of buttons are far more elaborate, and display more careful finish than in preceding years, some styles being absolutely works of art. Among other novel effects are richly embossed Masonie designs, crests, coats of arms, and scenes from Shakesperian plays.

In frillings and sundries, etc., lisse frilling in eight colors, worked with gold and silver tinsel, have had a large sale, and oriental laces, both in silk and cotton, will prove a staple attraction for the coming season.

Silk handkerchiefs embroidered with snitable holiday mottos are also in large request for Christmas and New Year's gifts, one house alone having disposed of nearly two hundred dozen.

In fancy hose an entirely new departure is about to be imagurated, and in a short time cotton hose printed with cretonne pat-

terns will be offered to the trade. The idea is a novel one, the patterns are artistic, and the general effect bright and pleasing and there is no doubt it will form a stylish and saleable novelty.

On all hands the prospects of the coming season are discussed with confidence, and it is felt that the spring business will indicate a revival of trade in these branches.

#### THOROUGH-BRED STOCK.

The improvement of the live stock of the country by the introduction of thorough-bred cattle, sheep and swine has been steadily kept in view by Canadian raisers for a number of years past. This year it was expected that, in consequence of the dull state of trade in the West and the depression in the British cattle trade, the imports of such stock would exhibit a material decline; statistics show, however, that while the receipts are certainly less, they are larger than many feared they would be.

From the first of January to date, 1305 cattle, 240 sheep and 37 swine were entered for a three months' quarantine, as per Government regulations, but of these the larger number were destined for the States, the St. Lawrence route being the favorite one with Western cattlemen.

The importations to the two countries compare as follows:—

These figures do not include 43 cattle and 4 sheep saved from the wreeked SS. Brooklyn and not yet out of quarantine, and they also do not include births in quarantine, viz., 23 calves and three pigs. Adding these items to the previous total we are enabled to give a comparative grand total of the imports as follows:—

In the last named year the imports were exceptionally large; previous to 1883 they were considerably smaller.

This year not a single case of contagious disease was discovered. The mortality among the eattle was only 3 head, two of these were calves and the other was a heifer which broke its leg and was sold for heef: mortality among the sheep 1. Such a record speaks for itself.

Some idea of the breeds favored by the importers and raisers may prove interesting, and we consequently append the following statements.

#### THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

The message of the President of the United States to Congress is of more than usual interest on this occasion, as the first-under the present administration.

The document is very long, and in places tedious, but the opinions and views expressed are such as will generally commend themselves to reasonable men.

The chief topics of intreest to Canthe fisheries question, the ada are treaty of extradition, and the boundary between British Columbia and Alaska. 3 In the first mentioned, he recommends the appointment of a joint commission to consider the whole subject of the fisheries and such other "general questions dependent upon contiguity; and, intercourse" as are related thereto. With respect to extradition the President favors the extension of the treaty to other crimes than those already embraced; and refers to the negotiations pending with the British Government in this direction in a way which indicates that there is much reluctance on that side. If this is so the Canadian Government might well throw such weight as it possesses into the negotiations, for we are more directly concerned in procuring a wider treaty than even the Mother Country.

On the question of banks and coinage the President comes out clear and strong against a countenance of the silver coinage. There is in this nothing that his previous utterances would not lead us to expect, but the weighty reasons with which he fortifies his statements must have influence in Congress; if reasoning will do any good at all. The

question is argued at great length, but not more than its importance deserves. The accumulation of silver in the Treasury, the hoarding of gold which has already begun, the imminent danger of a premium in gold, the consequent risk of increased prices, the certainty that the wages of labor will not rise commensurately with the depreciation of the currency, the impossibility of maintaining the circulation of two kinds of money of different values when the inferior coin passes beyond the stage of serving as a token only-all these points are brought out clearly. The effect of the present uncertainty on trade and commerce, and the slack demand for labor which is the result of diminished enterprise, are dwelt on effectively, and the section closes with an unequivocal recommendation of "the suspension of the compulsory coinage of silver dollars directed by the law passed in February, 1878."

There is no subject connected with the United States of more interest to us than this. Canadians, could, and no doubt will, if the opportunity arise, make profit out of a depreciated currency there, nevertheless it is desirable on the highest grounds that sound principles should prevail, and sound views on the coinage have before now been pressed without effect on Congress, though rarely as forcibly as now. It is to be hoped that on this occasion the result may be different, but strenuous opposition may be counted on within the ranks of the President's own party, both on this subject and on that of tariff reform, on which he has made very moderate and general recommendations.

#### RAILWAY DEVELOPMENT IN MANI-TOBA.

We made mention some weeks ago of the enlightened policy adopted by the Government of Manitoba to aid the development of the province by the construction of railways in portions of the country not served by the Canadian Pacific. Since then the operations of the companies interested have assumed a more definite shapes.

The Act of the Provincial Legislature permitted the issue of bonds of the province to the extent of \$7,500 per mile in aid of railways constructed within the province, conditioned on a portion of the land grants of the roads being conveyed to the Government, at the rate of one acre for every dollar advanced; the proceeds of these lands to be held for the repayment of the bonds at maturity, any surplus to revert to the Railway Companies. This provision of the means of payment makes the financial part of the scheme particularly favorable. Judging from the

experience of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which has cancelled over seven millions of its land grant bonds through the sale of less than three million acres of land, the repayment of the loans made by the Manitoba Government will be easy of accomplishment.

Two companies have availed themselves of the subsidy. The Manitoba and Northwestern Railway, an enterprise fostered by the late Sir Hugh Allan, and worked by a company of which Mr. Andrew Allan is president, has extended its road from Minnedosa to the Bird Tail Creek, a distance of a little over 50 miles, making in all 135 miles of road in working order, extending from Portage la Prairie in a northwesterly direction and along the Vailey of the Little Saskatchewan. This road is on the line originally selected for the Canadian Pacific. It passes through a beautiful rolling fertile country, much diversified with lakes and woods, and specially adapted for mixed farming. Many of the original " colonies" took up land on this line, in expectation of the building of the Canadian Pacific, and some parts of the country are well settled.

The Manitoba Southwestern Colonization Company, which is practically a branch of the C.P.R., has also availed itself of the subsidy. 130 miles of road were contracted for this past summer, of which 52 miles have been completed and passed by the government inspector. This road runs through the South Western Manitoba a fine prairie country which has been called the garden of the province. Its settlement has been much retarded by the want of railway facilities, many farmers who took up land in expectation of the building of the road having been 50 or 60 miles from the nearest station. The new extension, will give a great impetus to this part of the province, and remove much of the discontent which has prevailed with respect to the railway policy of the Federal government.

The bonds issued by the Government in aid of these two undertakings, during the present year, comething over \$1,100,000, were placed on the London market during the present week at a minimum price of 105½. Five per cent bonds of the Province of Manitoba, backed by a land grant at \$1 per acre, should be a satisfactory purchase at the price mentioned. We learn that the applications were far in excess of the amount issued, and that the tenders ranged from 106‡ to 110½, certainly an unqualified success for the first venture of the Province of Manitoba in the English market.

#### LEADING LINES.

In almost every trade now-a-days there is some enterprising merchant, who, spurred on by the sight of unsold goods lying in his warehouse, considers the sacrifice of some particular line a better advertisement of his house than a carefully edited column or half column in a leading commercial paper. hoping that enstomers, flocking to buy this particular line, may be induced thereby to deal with him for more profitable articles also. For instance in the boot and shoe trade, rubbers are usually the specialty fixed upon for sale at cost, and many a traveller's chance of selling a bill of boots and shoes depends on the answer he gives to the question "what is your price for rubbers?" The grocer usually selects sugar, an article whose price is almost as public as that of bank shares, for his specialty; but it is reserved for the dry goods trade, with its many branches and almost unlimited opportunities for cutting, to bring the question of leading lines almost to the verge of a fine art.

Several cases in point are known at this moment. One leading dry goods house is now engaged in selling gray flannels at cost, another is making a specialty of grey cottons, while still another offers special discounts to all purchasing at its warehouse within a certain date, coupled with the additional inducement of accepting a four month's bill, dated from the 1st February next, in payment.

This method of leading lines is nothing more or less than a copy of the slaughtering system practiced by United States manufacturers some years ago in this market; a practice resumed more or less from time to time on the approach of any other depression in trade leading to a falling off in the demand for goods at home. It is a well-known custom with some of these houses to maintain prices in the home markets by shipping their surplus manufactures to Canada, and disposing of them here at the best prices obtainable. Against such tactics as these the tariff' is only of comparative avail, for no tariff, however high, can exclude this class of goods. Another illustration may be taken from the present state of the carpet trade in England which, owing to the quantity of cheap German carpets now flooding the market, and which must be sold at any price obtainable, is fairly paralyzed.

#### THE OUTLOOK ABROAD.

The English news this week indicates that an easier money market may be looked for in the near future, unless the trouble in the East assumes a different aspect. As soon as the directors of the Bank of England ceased to borrow money on stocks in the open market, the rate fell away, and since then a wider divergence has prevailed be-

ween the bank rate and that on the street. A temporary tightening may be felt towards the end of the month, as the taxes are gathered and swept into the Bank of England, but, with the opening of the new year, unless the position changes in the meantime, a drop in the bank rate is not at all unlikely.

The low rates for money, and the difficulty of finding employment for immense sums held by the English banks, is naking itself felt in diminished profits, and diminished dividends are looked for. The administration of English banks, in this respect is different from that in vogue here, current profits, after provision is made for a moderate rest, being, as a rule, more closely divided amongst the shareholders. The Economist expresses the opinion that for the current half year profits have been much curtailed, and expresses the hope that directors will "face the position fairly and frankly."

From the continent the most important item we no to is the marked tranquillity into which Spain has subsided, after the first shock at the death of King Alfonso. During his reign she made fair progress towards peace and enlightment, and the events of the last few weeks seem to indicate that the Spanish people, on the whole, find peace and prosperity rather to their liking. Notwithstanding these cheering signs, however, Spanish stocks are in a very depressed state in the English market.

From the United States reports we learn that the surplus reserve of the Associated Eanks has again slightly decreased, being at the close of last week \$26,187,000 against \$26,593,000 on the previous Saturday. The heavy reductions made in the earlier months of the fall could scarcely be looked for now, indeed the position would not warrant so rapid a curtailment of resources, but the expectations of a complete absorption of the surplus by the New Year are evidently not to be realized. Such an absorption, as at once the result and the evidence of increased confidence and a brighter business outlook generally, would no doubt have been welcome, but the revival that has taken place is of considerable extent and value.

In money matters the New York market is unchanged, but sterling exchange is stronger and higher. We have at various times hazarded the prophecy that sterling rates would not touch the specie-importing point this year, and events have proved this true. We should now be at the lowest point, had the market followed its usual course, but rates are steadily rising, and there is little prospect of a relapse. The cause is not difficult to find. The diminished exports of cotton; the high prices for grain on this side as compared with Liverpool; and, perhaps more than all, the money seeking in-

vestment in long sterling bills, either because of the light demand on this side, or from a desire to place it beyond reach of depreciation by silver, all tend strongly in this direction. If the situation in Eastern Europe assumes the more peaceful aspect it now promises, and the speculators are unable to find another war cry to sustain prices, a drop in wheat is inevitable, and with that a large export. But it will come too late to affect the sterling market to any great degree; it may delay a rise, but is scarcely likely to depress rates again.

The report of the comptroller of the currency on the National Banks has been made public. We give some of the details elscwhere; here we need only refer in general terms to the popularity of the system as shown in the growth of National Banks, especially in the newer districts. In the year ending Nov. 1st, 145 new banks with an average capital of \$116,800 each were formed, and four banks with an aggregate capital of \$600,000, have failed, leaving the total number in operation at that date 2714, with a total capital of \$527,500,000, an average of \$194,360. If we consider what the difficulties would be of keeping so well-informed of the standing of these banks that their notes might be taken freely without the government endorsement, we can gain some idea of the immense benefit to commerce which the present system of circulation, secured by bonds, really is. The Bank of England, which has grown with the English nation, has won for itself a position of monopoly which no bank of modern foundation could possible secure, and has become the natural source of note circulation for England. But its privileges are the result of slow growth, and would be impossible of creation by an Act of Parliament. No institution at all resembling it is a possible thing in a new country like the United States, and the provision of the paper currency of the country must rest between the Government and the newly-organized banks. There are many reasons against the former assuming that office, and the nation may be thankful that the function has been so safely performed by the banks under the national laws.

GLASGOW.—The story of the rise and progress of this remarkable city, the "Commercial Metropolis of the North," as it is termed in England, is, "perhaps, without a parallel" on the eastern side of the Atlantic, and "it illustrates," says the *Economist*, "in a remarkable manner what can be accomplished, in the face of many natural difficulties, by a people possessing those qualities of patient, steady perseverance which characterize the Scotch."

The city is 20 miles from the sea, but the river and harbor, which at one time were scarcely deep enough to float a fishing smack, have been converted within the memory of persons still living into a water-way capable of floating vessels of 5000 tons. This river, the Clyder is acknowledged to be without a rival as regards ship-building. In the improvements referred to there has been expended over 50 millions of dollars. In 1773 the total revenue of the Clyde navigation trust amounted to \$730: in 1870 it had reached \$820,000, and last year it was no less than \$1,455,000. The most successful ship-building year was 1883 when there were launched 379 vessels of a total tonnage of 404,380, of which number 247 were iron and steel steamers of a combined tonnage of about 350,000. In 1801 the population was 77,385, it is now estimated at 545,000, exclusive of a number of independent burghs in the suburbs, whose combined population is equal to fully 50 per cent of that of the city proper. Ten million dollars was expended a few years ago in improvements which led to this spread of the population. Much of the prosperity of Glasgow is attributed to its exceptional water supply which is obtained from Loch Katrine. Four hundred gallons of the purest water is obtained for one penny, The daily supply is 413 million gallons. The health of the city has greatly improved under this influence. The revenue administered by the corporation has grown from \$60,000 in 1801 to nearly 6 millions in 1884, a sum far greater than many an independent Kingdom can boast of. Undoubtedly every Scotchman has reason to be proud of the progress and prosperity of Glasgow.

Anour 250 boot and shoe manufacturers of Boston recently met and discussed the situation concerning strikes, several large ones being now in progress. An organization was formed, under the name of the New England Boot and Shoe Association, and officers were elected. The object of the association is to combine the various small organizations into one body, which may in time assume national and, perhaps, international proportions, and thus be enabled to successfully cope with the Kuights of Labor.

WM. K. VANDERBILT of New York, the celebrated railway magnate, millionaire and stock speculator, died suddenly in that city on Tuesday last at the age of 64. He inherited a great part of his wealth from his father, but unlike many sons so favored did not spend his time in squandering it. He spent some of his early years in farming. Vanderbilt leaves a family of several sons and daughters. His estate has been variously estimated at from 50 to 75 millions of dollars.

THE statement of revenue and expenditure for the month of November last shows that the total receipts of the Dominion amounted to \$2,397,621, and that for the five months from July to November, it amounted to \$12.453 .-074, or a decrease, compared with the corresponding period of last year, of no less than \$1,635,640. The causes of this decrease are various; the lessened importations of articles of food, principally breadstuffs and provisions, are responsible for \$600,000; while the great reduction in prices of nearly all imported articles has caused a large decline in the customs receipts. In addition to this the payment of the interest of the Canadiaa Pacific Railway, which last year was credited in November, will not be due this year, until January, 1886, the dates of payment having, been changed by Parliament, and the absence of this important item reduces the receipts from miscellaneous sources. The expenditure side of the account for the same five months shows a total ordinary expenditure of \$12,811,762, or an increase of \$71,770 over the corresponding months of last year. In addition to this sum, there is the extraordinary expenditure for military purposes in the North-west, amounting to \$1,913,000, which makes a total increase of \$1,985,770.

THE WINDSOR HOTEL .- The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Windsor hotel was held Dec. 1st. Owing to loss of business this summer the earnings have failed to reach the sum of \$25,000 necessary to pay the usual dividend of seven per cent on the capital stock, and consequently this year no dividend will be declared. It is stated, however, that the hotel has not actually lost money. The interest on bonds to date has been promptly met, and it is hoped that under efficient management it may continue to do so, although the probable postponement of our usual winter carnival will, no doubt, further impair its finances. As an example of the damage done to this institution by the recent "scare" it may be stated that the number of transient guests fell off more than 15,000 during six months. This loss will be somewhat compensated for by the increased number of winter boarders now accommodated.

Some Montreal investors have purchased through a firm of financial agents in this city, nearly \$100,000 worth of Quebec corporation securities. The bonds, which are those issued by the City of Quebec to the Lake St. John Railroad, bear interest at the rate of 4½ per cent and are redeemable in thirty years. The figure is stated to be 95½ and is regarded as a good price for this class of securities.

MR. C. R. Hosmer, for sometime superintendent in this city of the Dominion Telegraph Co., has been appointed manager of a leading department of the immense and rapidly growing system of telegraphic connection established by the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. Mr.

Hosmer is eminently fitted by his training, scperience and urbanity for the new position to which he has been called.

MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS:

THURSDAY EVG., DEC. 10, 1885.

The volume of wholesale trade has been moderate, but is considered fair for the season. There is usually little disposition to incur fresh obligations on the eve of inventories and book settlements, and until after the turn of the year a lull in most departments may be expected. It is thought that the quantity of goods moved has been in excess of 1884, but profits have undoubtedly been cut fine. The weather promised well early in the week, but at the close is again unfavorable for sleighing. Better roads are anxiously awaited, as the prospects for the winter season are considered good.

Asnes.—Receipts have been light, but the demand has been less active, and sales of First Pots have been made at \$3.50 to \$3.55. The stock of Firsts is now one fourth of the year production, and there are as many in Liverpool. It is therefore quite evident that the supply is in excess of the demand and should be diminished. No second Pots coming in. Pearls recent arrivals have not been offered for sale. Receipts since 1st January, 5,031 brls. Pots, 388 brls. Pearls. Deliveries, 5,247 brls. Pots, 482 brls. Pearls. Stock in store on Wednesday evening 9 December, 1,240 brls. Pots, 113 brls. Pearls.

Boots and Shoes.—As usual trade is a little quiet just now, but the prospects for the future are encouraging. Most of the travellers are now out, and a fair proportion of orders are coming in. Remittances are very satisfactory. Felt goods, which were neglected, owing to the continued mild weather, are now in good demand, and some large transactions are reported.

Canned Goods.—There has been no important change. Tomatoes \$1.40 to \$1.50 per dozen; lobsters, \$1.45 to \$1.50; mackerel 75c to \$1; sardines, fine \$10.50 to \$11; ordinary \$6.25 to \$9; salmon \$1.40 to \$1.50; spiced salmon \$3.50; finnan haddies \$1.25; Hoegg; roast beef\$1.95 per 2-lb tins; pigs' feet \$3.40; peas \$1.55 to \$1.75; pie peaches, \$1.90; table, 3-lb tins, \$3.30; corn \$1.30 to \$1.80; strawberries \$2; raspberries \$1.80; cherries \$1.75 Bartlett pears, \$2 to \$2.25; plums, \$1.72½.

COAL AND WOOD.—Business is moderate in volume. American anthracite in ordinary distributing lots, stove, \$6.50 to \$6.75; chestnut, \$6.25 to \$6.50; egg and furnace, \$6 to \$6.25. Lower Ports steam \$3.75 to \$4.25; grate \$5.50; Scotch steam, \$4.25; grate \$6 to \$6.50 in retail lots. Cordwood—Yard prices per long cord (cartage 50cextra) are as follows:—Maple, \$6; birch, \$5.50; beech, \$5.50; tamarac, \$5; henlock, \$4.50. Coke \$2.50 per chaldron of 36 bushels; crushed coke (stove or egg size) \$3.30 delivered.

DARRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS.—The butter market has been dull all week, and quotations are nominally unchanged. Cheese has also been quiet with 9c a top price. The cable quotation is 45s against 58s 6d at this date last year. About this time a year ago the price for fine to finest cheese was 11½c to 12c. Eggs are firm. Fresh 22c to 23c, limed 20c. Dressed hogs, \$5.50 to \$5.60 per 100 lbs. At Little Falls, cheese sales were 900 boxes at 6c, 450 at 6½c, 70 at 6¾c, 200 at 7c, 200 at 7½c, 140 at 7½c, 75 at 8c, and 230 farm dairy at 6c and 7c. There were no new features in the market, and stock was mostly of inferior quality. Butter sales—30 packages at 15c and 17c, the bulk at 16c.

DRUGS AND CHEMICALS.—Business has been moderate, as in other departments preparations are being made to take stock. There has been quite a tumble in quinine, and Howards is down to \$1 to \$1.10 and American to 90¢ to \$1. Liverpool advices quote canary seed at 46s to 47s per 464 lbs; hemp seed, 32s 6d per 336 lbs. Linseed oil easier; raw, 22s; boiled and refined 23s 3d per cwt. Olive oil steady at £39 to £40, 10s per tun. In heavy chemicals there is no important change. Sulphate of copper, in sympathy with copper, has advanced. Bleach in England is easier at the moment at £6 5s, but some dealers are asking higher prices for forward delivery. Caustic, 60 p. c. £7 10s to £7 12s 6d; 70 p. c. £8 12s 6d. Sal-soda £2 17s 6d to £3; bicarb £6 15s to £7: Alum £5 to £5 2s-6d. Sulphate of copper £14 10s to £14 15s. At Newcastle soda ash is 13d per degree, less 6 p. c. Dye stuffs—Cutch, 72e to 8c; sumac, \$90 to \$100 per ton for prime brands; extract of logwood 73c; chip logwood 13c to 2c; archil, 27c to 30c per lb. for concentrated; Gambier 6c to 7c; indigo \$1.50 to \$1.75.

GROCERIES,-A fair business for the season has again to be reported. The feature of the week has been the advance in sugar, which has gone up about 1c, refiners now asking 7c for small lots of granulated; for large lots sales could probably be made at slightly easier rates. An advance is reported by cable of 15s to LT per ton on raw, and the position seems to be a strong one. The present price of granulated is not in proportion to the price of raw as compared with the same period last year. Beet at this time in 1885 was worth about 10s per cwt., now it is held at about 15s, while granulated, which sold then at 64c, is now worth only 7c, about 8c would more nearly correspond to the price of the raw material. Last mail reports speak of a slackened demand in Liverpool, prices there favoring buyers to the extent of 3d to 6d per cwt. Stock of raw at that port was 251,336 tons, against 245,-843 last year, excess being reduced to 5,493 tons. Beet was then 14s 74d to 14s 9d per cwt. Demerara, Nov. 13:—Since we addressed you last, a fortnight ago, sugar-making has become general, but general business does not improve as it should, owing to the small amount of wages paid and the very large quantity of native provisions which come to market. The weather during the last fortnight has been very dry, and unless the rainy season makes its appearance soon the outstanding crop will again be affected. 





Remittances are on all hands admitted to be good, and proson at mands admitted to be good, and prospects for the spring trade are encouraging. In the United States, although quietness is the dominant feature of the trade, (as is usual at this advanced stage of the season), the market is neither tame nor uninteresting. Fall and winter goods are demanded only to fill immediate wants, but a considerable business is being done in spring and summer fabrics for future delivery, some houses having re-ceived unusually liberal orders.

FLOUR AND GRAIN.-The flour market has been quiet and about steady. The usual local demand was satisfied at quotations. Receipts have been fair. In one day recently the G.T.R. reported 1,000 brls and the C.P.R. 751 brls. In the grain market sales have been chiefly confined to oats and barley. Oats have sold along lines of rail at 30c per 32 lbs. Good malting barley changed hands at 58c. The C.P.R. brought in 3,235 bashels of wheat The C.P.R. brought in 3.235 bushels of wheat in one day this week. In the West the grain markets have been excited, but generally bullish. Receipts and stocks at Chicago and New York are largely ahead of last year. The Chicago visible supply gives the stock of wheat at 56,783,440, against 44,570,050, last year. K. is materially reduced, and is now 4,000,000, less than last year, so that every week the wheat situation, from our standpoint, becomes more and more interesting, and we think the chances are that farmers will receive a fair price for the balance of their crop. The movement in the spring wheat States has been liberal, but it will soon Show a marked falling off.

GAME AND POULTRY.—The market is steady to firm. Purtridges 50c to 55c per brace; venison carcasses, 6c to 7c per lb. Turkeys, 8c to 10c; ducks, 8c to 9c; chickens and geese 6c to 7c.


GREEN FRUITS.—Apples have continued in good demand at \$2 to \$2.50. Valencia ranges \$4.50 to \$4.75; Januaica in brts \$6.50; Floridas in boxes \$4 to \$4.50. Cramberries \$6 to \$6.50 per brt. Almeria grapes scarce at \$5.50 to \$6 per keg. Malaga lemons, \$2 to \$2.50 per half chest, cocoa-nuts, \$5.50 per 100, tancy Eleme figs, one 1b to ten lb boxes, 13c per lb. Canadian onions in brts, \$2 to \$2.50. Fancy French prunes in 5 and 10 lb. boxes 20c per lb.


HAY, STRAW AND FRED.—The hay market has been steady. Choice timothy sold at \$12.50 and inferior & \$10.00 per hundred bundles. Straw \$5 to \$6 as to quality. Best timothy in bales is quoted at \$15.50 per ton, and secondary quality at \$14.50. Straw per ton, pressed \$9.50. Shorts, best, \$17; ordinary, \$16. Moulie, \$22, \$20 and \$18. Bran, \$14 to \$14.50 per ton. Buckwheat, 50c per bushel.

HIDES AND TALLOW.—The market for local hides and tallow is unchanged; business continues fair. At Boston, domestic wet salted hides continue firm. Buff at the West is nominally unchanged at 10½ c at 10½c. The offerings continue very small, with some large dealers sold up for their whole delivery in December. The increased collection at the West is slow in making itself felt. Dry Southern and Western hides are a trifle easier. New England hides are in small stock and are readily picked up.

IRON AND HARDWARE .- There has been some enquiry from the West for pig-iron for January and February delivery. The Scotch market is strong, and 51s has been cabled as the price for choice makers' brands. The American market preserves a strong tone, and indications are that prices will go still higher. Hopes are expressed by the Scotch makers that they will soon be able to sell in the United States at better prices than for some years past. It now turns out that the warrant market was recently excited, owing to reported sales of Scotch iron to U.S. buyers: these sales have been more or less exaggerated. Late advices state that manufactured bad has advanced 10s per ton. There have been some sales of bar-iron on this market during the week at steady prices; other metals are dull, and no activity is expected before the opening of the year. Late English cables are as follows:—Warrants 42s 8d. Middlesborough No. 3 foundry, G.M.B., 32s. London tin £931786d; three months' futures £94786d Market firm; G. O. B. Chili bars, £41 15s. east selected copper £47; Soft Spanish lead £12 7s 6d; Silesian spelter £14. Hallett's Butimony \$36. Late advices from New York report as follows:—Iron.—The situation of the market is substantially as reported last week. The only new feature is that complaints are made of deliveries due this month, in the case of some Lehigh brands being rather backward. Furnace men continue to take orders for delivery the next three weeks at old prices, but the backwardness of deliveries referred to throws business into dealers' hands, and for moderate lots certain to be delivered promptly an advance of 50c on first hand prices is paid. The market is firm at \$18 to \$18.50 for No. 1 X foundry, \$16 to \$16.50 for No. 2 X foundry, and \$15 to \$16 for grey forge Scotch pig is quiet. All brands are held quite firmly, however, in the absence of excessive supply on the spot.

LEATHER.—The leather market is now between the seasons, and in consequence what business is being done is done by manufacturers, who think that prices have not yet-reached their highest figure. Prices are very firm especially for sole, and splits, and a rise may be expected after the holidays. Many houses having jobbing orders are now buying ahead, and some large sales have been effected at stiff rates. A fall in slaughter hides is ex-









pected after the turn of the year, but though this may affect black leather, it is not likely that prices for sole will be at all weakened. Well-informed dealers state that the present state of affairs cannot long continue, and that either the price of hides must go down or that of leather go up.

Liquons.—Wines and spirits have sold more freely, and at the close there is a fair demand at steady prices, particularly for the former. Brandy, though somewhat slow of sale, is firm; rye, gin and rum have gone out well.

LIVE STOOK.—At Liverpool under light offerings and a steady demand, prime Canadian steers made 13c per lb., the highest price since the middle of September. Fair to choice grades were at 121c, poor to medium at 111c, and inferior and bulls at 81c to 10c. The improvement on the low grades is not so decided as on the upper. These quotations are calculated at \$4.80 in the £. Dresded beef in Liverpool is cabled higher at 44d. Another Liverpool cable quotes refrigerated beef at 6d for hindquarters, and 4d for forequarters. A London cable quotes refrigerated beef higher at 3s 10d for hindquarters, and 2s 10d for forcquarters per 8 lbs by the carcase. The Carthquarters per 8 lbs by the carcase. The Carthaginian from Halifax for Glasgow took out 559 head of cattle. The market for export cattle has been quiet, with light offerings and no business, which gives a nominal character to values. A few sellers on the market this morning asked 4c per lb. live weight. There was a fair demand for butchers' cattle at firm prices on account of the light supply and good quality of the offerings. Some choice beeves sold at 4c per lb., live weight. Other sales were at 2½c to 3½c, as to quality. Sheep were very quiet at about 4c. Receipts of hogs were light, and there was a good demand at \$4.50 to \$4.60 per 100 lbs. Calves were scarce, with a few sales at \$4 to \$8 each as to quality.

POTATOES.—The local market is firm at 59c per bushel, and offerings are limited because of the rot and the consequent indifference of dealers to stock up. Prices in the Spring promise to be exceptionally high. Nova Scotia is making large shipments to distant points. Advices from Demerara, dated Nov. 13, contain the following:—Our market has been glutted, and the retail price for dry and picked barrels has been \$1.50 per brl. Many of the cargoes have arrived in bad order. Arrivals have been, Amy D., from Meteghan, N.S., 890 brls: Byron M., from Cornwallis, N.S., 1,200 brls; Alice from Cornwallis, N.S., 706 brls; and the China from Halifax, N.S., 1,000 brls.







BUTTER.-The receipts are fair, with offerings of inferior quality far too plentiful and stocks of this class are accumulating. There is no expert demand, and the principal business is in small lots of choice quality, which sell at 15c to 16c. Medium is quoted at 11c to 12c, and inferior 8c to 10c. Eggs are unchanged, with a moderate de-mand. Dealers are paying 20c per dozen for fresh, and selling pickled at 17c Cheese quiet and unchanged; there is a moderate business at 91c for the best Sept. make and 81c for second quality.

COAL AND WOOD .- A fair trade in coal is reported and prices continue unchanged. Stove and nut sell at \$6 a ton delivered, egg and grate at \$5.75, and the best soft at \$5.50. Wood is unchanged at \$5.00 a cord for the best hard \$4 for second quality, and \$4 for best pine.

COAL OIL.-Trade is fair and prices the same as last week. Canadian refined sells at 15c a gallon for single barrels and at 14lc for five to ten barrel lots. Carbon safety at 19c. American oils unchanged at 23c for prime and at 26c for water white. Crude firmer at 78c to 79c per barrel in Petrolea, and refined unchanged at 11c per gallon in car lots.

Drugs .-- As a rule dealers report a quiet trade, but orders were a little more numerous than during the previous week. Prices are steady. Turpentine 58c to 60c a gallon; alcohol at \$3.27 per gallon; castor oil at 10c to 12c; opium at \$3.80 to \$4.00; glycerine. steady, at 16c; quinine, \$1.15 to \$1.20; morphia, \$1.80 to \$2.00; bicarbonate of potash. 18c; potass iodide, \$4.40 per lb; tartaric acid 55c to 60c; cream of tartar, 33c to 35c; linseed, raw, 66c; do, boiled, 68c; best Dutch madder, 12½c to 14c; cochineal, 40c to 45c; camphor, 35c to 45c. Oil of peppermint steady at \$5.20 to \$6. Hemp seed, 5c to 5½c.

FLOUR AND GRAIN .- The trade in flour has been very limited this week, and prices are nominally unchanged. During the latter part of last week extras sold at equal to \$3.65 and spring extras at equal to \$3.60; yesterday, superior extras were quoted at \$3.80, and other grades unchanged. Patents are quoted at \$4.75 to \$5 for No. 1 and c. \$4.25 to \$4.50 for No. 2. The stock in store is 500 barrels as against 375 barrels last week and 1,000 barrels at the corresponding period of last year. Wheat quiet and steady. On Wednesday there was a little more life, with sales of No. 2 full at 85c, and No. 2 red winter at 87c. No. 2 fall, Jan. delivery, sold at 86c to 86dc, and No. 2 spring is nominal at 87c cash. There is a little doing in Manitoba wheat; No. 2 hard is quoted at 98c, and frosted at 80c. The stock in store is 184,610 bush, against 161,913 bush at this time last year, and 76,110 bush at the corresponding period of 1883. Borley quiet and steady; high grades continue scarce No. 1 is quoted at 90c and No. 2 at 80c. No. 3 extra sold at 69c to 70c, No. 3 at 59c, and No. 4 at 48c to 50c. Stocks in store 100,165 bush, against 92,496 bush, last week and 121,-851 bush, at the corresponding period of last year. Outs are quiet and steady, with sales during the week at 33c to 34c on trade. Pork steady, with sales of small lots of new at \$12.50 to \$13. Hops are quiet, and prices unchanged, at 7c to 9c for new. White Beans sell at \$1.30 a bush for hand-picked. Potatoes are firmer, with sales of car lots at 50c to 55c on track, and small lots at 60c to 65c per bag.

\*\*SWoon.—There is a moderate trade at unchanged prices. Selected lots of fleece continue to be quoted at 21c to 22c and ordinary at 19c. The demand from the factories is fair, with sales of Supers at 23c and extras at 26½c to 27c.
