II. SUN.—An Annular Eclipse, September 29th. Begins on earth generally, 5h. 57m. A. M.; ends 11h. 52m. A. M. Central Eclipse begins at 7h. 2m. A. M.; and ends generally at 10h. 47 A. M. Invisible to residents of the Dominion.

Morning and Evening Stars 1875.

Mercury (☿) will commence the year as an Evening Star, but his loss in the sun's refulgent blaze for such frequently recurring periods, leaves but brief intervals in which he may be seen. Then even the close proximity of this planet to the sun renders him only visible during the immediate twilight preceding sunrise, when west of the sun he appears as a Morning Star, and succeeding sunset when he is east of the sun and sets after him and is an Evening Star.

J. F. Lawton, Saw Manufacturer, Corner North and Georges Streets.

Venus (♀) will continue to shine as a Morning Star till 25th Sept., from the 1st October during the remainder of the year she may be viewed as an Evening Star.

Mars (♂) enters the year as a Morning Star, so continuing till August, thence an Evening Star.

Jupiter (♃) begins the year as a Morning Star, remaining so till 17th April, from which time he appears as an Evening Star till 17th April; from which time he appears as an Evening Star till 5th November, whence a Morning Star to the year's end.

Saturn (♄) will be an Evening Star till 7th February; then a Morning Star till 16th August; then an Evening Star for the residue of the year.

FISHERIES' DEPARTMENT.

W. H. Venning, Inspector for Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Sable Island.—1½ miles from east end. Latitude 43d. 48m. 40s. N.; longitude 56d. 45m. 0s. W. Octagonal, white and brown alternately. In thick and foggy weather and snow storms, a steam fog whistle 50 yards south of the Light house is sounded three times in each minute, as follows:—First, a blast of three seconds; then another blast and interval of the same duration; and then a blast of three seconds, with an interval of forty-five seconds, to complete the minute. The whistle will probably be heard, in calm weather or with the wind, from 10 to 15 miles; in stormy weather or against the wind, from 3 to 6 miles.

Sable Island (West end).—Lat. 43d. 57m. 0s. N.; long. 60d. 80m. 0s. W. Revolves in three minutes, shewing three flashes at intervals of half a minute, then a cessation of light during 1½ minute in each revolution. Wood, octagonal, white. In thick or foggy weather and snow storms, a steam fog whistle is sounded eight seconds in each minute, leaving an interval of 52 seconds between each blast. The whistle will probably be heard in calm weather or with the wind from 10 to 15 miles, and in stormy weather or against the wind from 3 to 6 miles.

Yarmouth Harbour.—On end of reef off southwest point of Bunker's Island, east side of entrance to harbour. Lat. 43d. 48m. 80s. N.; lat. 66d. 8m. 45s.; with the lantern on a dwelling-house, built on a wooden pier, the whole forming a beacon. A red light, for the purpose of guiding vessels into the harbour. Visible from the southward between the bearings of N. E. by N. and N. ¾ E. It can also be seen over Stanwood's Beach, when bearing from S. ½ E. to S. E. ½ E., but cannot be run for on these bearings, the only entrance to the harbour being through Yarmouth Sound and round Cape East.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the Western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova Scotia), in lat. 43° 39', N. long. 66° 8', W. It exhibits a plain, revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 235 feet above the level of the sea.

J. F. Lawton, Alexandra Works, St. John, N. B.

Brier Island.—Situate on the western side. A fixed white light, 92 feet above sea level, visible 15 miles. Octagonal white building. A Steam Fog Whistle on Whipple's Point, S. W. of light.

Westport.—On Peter's Island, at the S. entrance of the E. side of the Bay of Fundy. Two white fixed lights, placed horizontally, to distinguish it from Brier Island Light, 49 feet above high water mark, visible ten miles, and is intended to lead vessels into Westport, or through Graud Passage. Square white building.

Boar's Head.—N. entrance Petite Passage, Bay of Fundy. Alternate flashes, red and white, at intervals of 60 seconds. Square white building.

Digby Gut.—On Point Prim, at the entrance of the Gut. A fixed white light, 76 feet above high water, and visible 13 miles. Building square—painted red and white vertically. A Steam Fog Whistle on Point Prim, in thick or foggy weather, sounds 8 seconds in each minute, making an interval of 52 seconds between each blast.

Port Williams.—Two fixed white lights, 20 feet apart, perpendicularly, visible from all points of approach. Square white building. Port Williams is distant from Digby Gut Light E. 2½ miles; and from Black Rock W. 28 miles.

Margaretville.—A red fixed light, visible 10 miles from all points of approach. Building square, painted in white and black horizontal stripes. Margaretville is distant E. 37 miles from Digby Gut Light, and W. 15 miles from Black Rock Light.

Black Rock.—A white fixed light, 55 feet above the level of high water, and visible 12 miles. Square white building.

Spencer's Point.—A white fixed light is placed on the top of a building at this point, on the northern shore of Cobequid Bay, near the head of Minas Basin.

Apple River Light.—On Hetty Point, N. side entrance to the River, and three leagues to the eastward of Cape Chignecto. Two fixed horizontal lights, 40 feet above high water, visible 10 miles. Square white building.

Parrsboro'.—On the W. side of the entrance to Parrsboro' River—a fixed white light, 30 feet above high water, visible 9 miles. Octagonal white tower, standing close to high water mark on the beach.

Horton Bluff.—A white fixed light, 95 feet above high water level (rise and fall 49 to 45 ft.), visible in clear weather over the greater part of the Basin of Minas (after passing Cape Blomedon) and above the Five Islands and up to Windsor River, until intercepted by the continuation of the Bluff to the southward of it. Square white building, standing 66 feet from the Bluff.

Burnt Coat Head.—The lantern is erected on a square tower attached to the main building. A white fixed light, 75 feet above high water level, and visible from all points of approach.

Gannet Rock Light.—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands, off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a light of the Fourth order, Holo-photal system—fixed white light 45 seconds, eclipse 5½, flash 5½, eclipse 5½. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white. A gun is fired to answer signals during a fog. Dangerous rocks extend four miles eastward of the Lighthouse.

Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.
This Light bears from the Light House on Brier Island, N. N. W. ¼ W, 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, E. ¼ S., distance 7 miles.

- From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., 7 miles.
 From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W., $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.
 From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.
 To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W. S. W. 2 miles.
 From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N., $\frac{1}{2}$ N., 12 miles.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westward, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

- From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., $18\frac{1}{2}$ miles.
 The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable Seal Islands S. and by W., $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed *white* lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, one elevated about forty-five feet above high water; the other a new tower, erected last season, fitted with a 3d Dioptric light, stands 69 feet above high water level, and visible from all points of approach for a distance of 25 miles in clear weather; and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W., distant about 170 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast (British or American.) Both the buildings are painted white. A fog whistle has been erected on the island, which will be sounded as follows each minute:—Two blasts of five seconds in each minute, with an interval of 25 seconds between each blast. The following are the bearings from them, viz.:

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Mary's) E. S. E., easterly.
 " Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., 13 miles.
 " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.
 " Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.
 " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
 " Little River Head, N. by W.
 " Libby Island Light House (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

[It is recommended that the ships' Compasses should be well compared and adjusted particularly in new ships, before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westward, (or $1\frac{1}{2}$ points), it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay, South Channel, between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S.; but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light (American), on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campobello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed *white* light. The building is painted white, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preaux Lights.—Upon this projecting head land, two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, they where may be useful—both are fixed, and *white*. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet-broad each, horizontally.

A Steam Fog Alarm has been placed in this Station, which will sound twice in each minute.

South-West Wolf Island.—On south-east point of south-west island Lat. 44d. 56m. 30s. N.; long. 66d. 41m. 10s. W. $1\frac{1}{2}$ min. between each flash. Can be seen in clear weather 17 to 20 miles. Lantern surmounts keeper's dwelling, which is a square wooden structure, painted white. Visible from all points of approach.

White Head, Bliss Harbour.—West of Bliss Island. Lat 45d. 1m. 18s.; long. 66d. 51m. 0s. Can be seen 12 miles in clear weather. Square, wood, white. Red fixed light.

Campobello Island.—North point of Head Harbor. Lat. 44d. 57m. 49s. N.; long. 66d. 54m. 10s. W. Can be seen 15 miles in clear weather. Octagon, white, with red cross. Variation in 1869 $18\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W.

Port St. Andrews.—North point of entrance. Lat. 45d. 4m. 10s. N.; long. 67d. 2m. 50s. W. Can be seen 10 miles in clear weather. Octagon, white. Visible between the bearings of S. W. round S. to N. W. Variation in 1869 $17\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed *white* light, and that the Light House and Keeper's Dwelling are painted red and white, in vertical stripes. The Steam Whistle on this Island is sounded ten seconds in every minute during foggy or thick weather.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a Fourth Order Dioptric Light, visible ten miles, is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The house is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

Revolving Light, Cape Spencer, Bay of Fundy.—Lat. 45 deg. 12m. 30s. N.; Long. 65 deg. 54m. 0s. W. A revolving Red and White Light, elevated 207 feet above high water, shewing Red for 45 seconds, and White for 45 seconds, with an interval of 45 seconds between each ap-

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pearance of the Light, and making a complete revolution in three minutes. In clear weather the Light should be seen at a distance of 20 miles. The Lighthouse is a square, white building, with a Tower erected on it, and is 27 feet in height from base to the centre of the Light, and 35 feet from base to the top of the Lantern. The illuminating apparatus is Catoptric. The Light will be visible between the bearings from E. S. E., round by South to W. N. W.—The Light will serve as a guide for vessels entering Saint John Harbour, Partridge Island Light bearing by Compass N. W. by W. half W. Northerly, the distance being $6\frac{1}{4}$ miles from Light to Light.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain white light. The house is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark. Light visible 13 miles.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the St. Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Grindstone Island Light.—An Octagonal Tower, 60 feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in lat. 45° 43' 13" N. Long. 64° 37' 25" W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's House, one story, situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House:

Cape Enrage Light, by compass, S. 61 $\frac{1}{2}$ W., 10 1-7 miles.

Highest Point of St. Mary's Ledge, by compass, N. 40 W., 6-10 mile.

The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, S. 78 W., 2-10 mile.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., 3-10 mile—it dries at low springs, and has about 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms on it at half tide.

A Sand Bank, S. 15 W., 6-10 mile; it has 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms on its shoalest part at low water springs.

Grand Manan.—There is a Light House and Keeper's house at the "Swallow Tail," on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 103 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Briar Island and Grand Manan. Both houses are painted white.

Little River.—On an island at the entrance of the River. A fixed white light, varied by flashes every 90 seconds, 40 feet above high water, visible 11 miles.

Richibucto Head Light.—This is a fixed White Light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order. The tower is square, about 50 feet high from base to vane, painted white, and stands in lat. 46° 39' 40" N., long. 64° 43' 30" W. of Greenwich.

Cape Jourmain, Straits of Northumberland.—Lat. 46° 10' 00" N.; long. 63° 51' 00" W.—Visible from all points of approach from S. E. around by N. to W. The Light House is an octagonal wooden pyramidal building, painted white, 40 feet high, elevated 72 feet above high water, and stands 66 feet from the extremity of the cliff. The Keeper's house, a one and a half story wooden building, painted white, is situated 50 feet to the westward of the Light House.

Alexandra Works Warerooms, 53 Dock Street.

Point Escuminac Light.—This Light House is situated in Miramichi Bay, north latitude $47^{\circ} 4' 30''$; west longitude, $64^{\circ} 50' 30''$. It is a fixed bright light, elevated seventy feet above high water. A Third Order French Dioptric lighting apparatus has been placed on this Tower, which is visible for twenty-five miles.

Miscou Island Light.—This Light House is situated on Birch Point, north latitude $48^{\circ} 1' 00''$; west longitude, $64^{\circ} 30' 00''$. It is a fixed red light, elevated seventy-nine feet above high water.

Shediac Lights.—On Point DuChene Wharf, in the summer, north latitude $46^{\circ} 14' 6''$; west longitude $64^{\circ} 31' 5''$. It is a fixed White light.

Two Fixed White Beacon Lights on Shediac Island, visible ten miles.

Miramichi River.—Light House on Portage Island. Fixed White Light, elevated — feet above high water.

Two Beacon Lights on "Preston's Beach," about five miles above Escuminac Light. Two Beacon Lights at Oak Point. Two Beacon Lights at "Grant's." All fixed white Lights. Visible ten miles.

Caraguet Island, Bay de Chaleur.—Square Tower on Keeper's dwelling. White.

River St. John Lights.—Green Head, Sand Point, Oak Point, No Man's Friend, Oromocto Shoals, Wilmot's Bluff, Cox's Point, Robertson's Point, and Fanjoy's Point, Grand Lake. Visible ten miles.

Rates of Pilotage.

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of St. John—passed 9th April, 1862.

One dollar per foot for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her in a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the wharves; and One dollar per foot for removing or taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such vessels, the sum of Two Dollars per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting vessels (unless square rigged), going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, vessels not exceeding 100 tons burthen, registered at any port within the Dominion, Steamboats, and Vessels propelled by steam, trading and plying between this port and any port or ports in North America, and all Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

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WHARFAGE.

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For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For vessels not exceeding one hundred tons, One dollar and Fifty cents; for vessels over one hundred, and not exceeding two hundred tons, Two Dollars; for vessels over two hundred, and not exceeding three hundred tons, Three Dollars; and for all vessels over three hundred, and not exceeding four hundred tons, the sum of Four Dollars; and twenty-five cents additional for every fifty tons each Vessel may measure over four hundred tons.

First Distance—From Partridge Island to Musquash Head, bearing North West, One dollar per foot.

Second Distance—From Musquash Head to Point Le Preaux, bearing North West, One dollar and Twenty-five cents per foot.

Third Distance—From Point Le Preaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West, or North Channel, bearing South East, one dollar and Fifty cents per foot.

Fourth Distance—From the North Head of Grand Manan, or North Channel, as aforesaid, to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, or Brier Island, bearing South-East, One dollar and Seventy-five cents per foot.

For conveying one passenger from any public stand to any part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, 30c. If coach detained, there shall be paid for every time not exceeding half an hour, fifty cents (50c); and for every additional half hour after the first, fifty cents (50c). Provided always, that in case any driver shall be required to cross the ferry to Carleton, he shall, in addition to the foregoing fares, be entitled to demand and receive the ferriage for himself, his carriage and horses, both going and returning.

Time for going through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

A Letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding one ounce and a half....	9
A Letter exceeding one ounce and a half, and not exceeding two ounces...	12
A Letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding two ounces and a half..	15

And so on, adding three cents extra for every additional half ounce.

If unpaid, such Letters will be liable to a rate of five cents per half ounce.

The same scale of reckoning by half ounces is applicable to Letters to and from the United States, but the rate on such Letters is six cents per half ounce.

Postage on Drop Letters, one cent, and must be prepaid.

On Packet Letters to and from the United Kingdom, pre-paid, the scale of rates is as follows:—

A Letter not exceeding half ounce in weight.....	\$0 6
A Letter exceeding half ounce, and not exceeding an ounce.....	12

And so on—adding 6 cents for every additional half ounce.

Letters via New York, when so addressed, are sent weekly: postage 8 cents.

Letters for Newfoundland, 6 cents; Bermuda, 6 cents; West Indies, via Halifax, 12 cents.

It is advisable that all Letters should be prepaid, and by Postage Stamps.

Printed Books and Pamphlets, under 48 ounces in weight, can be forwarded by Post in the Dominion and to Newfoundland, at the rate of one cent per two ounces; Periodicals, one cent per four ounces.

Transient Newspapers require to be prepaid—two cents each. Dominion news papers for subscribers do not require to be prepaid, the charge being one cent on delivery; prepayment can be made either at the Office where mailed, or by the subscriber at the Office where delivered, at the following rates: For a paper issued once per week, five cents per quarter; twice, 10 cents; and so on.

Pamphlets, Periodicals, and Books, to pass at the above rates, must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides or ends.

No words or marks (except the name and address of the person to whom sent), shall be written on any Newspaper, Pamphlet, Book, Periodical, Parliamentary or Government paper.

Any violation of these Regulations will subject such Newspapers, Pamphlets, Periodicals, or Books, &c., to be treated in every respect as Letters.

Book Postage to United Kingdom, under 1 oz., 2 cents; 1 to 2 oz., 4 cents; 2 to 4 oz., 6 cents; 4 ounces and under 8 ounces, 12 cents; 8 ounces and under 12 oz., 18 cents; 12 oz. and under 16 oz., 24 cents; 1 lb. and under 1½ lb., 36 cents; 1½ lb. to 2 lb., 48 cents.

Periodicals printed in Canada can be sent to United Kingdom for 2 cents.

REGISTRATION.—The system of registration is applicable to all description of letters without distinction, whether they contain articles of value or not. It also applies to parcels. The charge in addition to postage is for letters 2 cents; to United States, 5 cents; parcels 5 cents; to England, 8 cents.

PARCELS.—Parcels closed at the ends and sides can be sent by mail throughout the Dominion, at a rate of 12½ cents per half lb. The weight of each parcel is not to exceed 8 lbs., nor the size to exceed 2 feet in length or breadth, and 1 foot in thickness. The parcel must not contain any glass, liquid, or any substance liable to do injury to the mail, under the penalty of a forfeiture of the parcel if discovered. The parcel is not to contain any writing. Parcels must be pre-paid by stamps. The sender, by writing his name on the outside, can have the parcel returned in case of failure to reach the person addressed.

POSTAGE STAMPS.—Postage stamps are provided at the respective values of ½, 1, 2, 3, 6, 12½, and 15 cents: all bearing as a device the effigy of Her Majesty.

Patterns and samples are transmitted between the Dominion and the United Kingdom at the same rate as per book post. The pattern or sample must be open at the end or side, except in case of seeds, drugs, &c.; which can be sent in closed transparent bags.

Persons remitting money should obtain a Money Order, as the Department is not responsible for the loss of a letter containing money; and in no case should a money letter be sent without registration. No notice is taken of any unregistered letter.

Letters for the British and Foreign West Indies, Cuba, Porto Rico, Mexico, Central America, South America, China, Japan, the Sandwich Islands, and the Australian Colonies, are forwarded daily via New York, if so addressed and prepaid. Mails leave New York for Cuba and the West Indies every Tuesday and Thursday; for St. Thomas, Brazil, Buenos Ayres, Monte Video, and the Atlantic Coast of South America, on the 28th of each month; for Panama, Central America, Chili, Peru, and the Pacific Coast of South America, two or three times per month. Mails leave San Francisco for China and Japan, about twice per month; for Sandwich Islands, Fiji, and Australia, once per month.

Postage on Letters—Bahamas, 3 cents; Bermuda, Cuba, Jamaica, and St. Domingo, 10 cents; other British West India Islands, 21 cents; Danish Islands, 13 cents; other Foreign West India Islands, 51 cents; Sandwich Islands, 9 cents; Aspinwall, Colon, Costa Rica, Guatamalo, Mexico and Panama, 13 cents; China, and Japan, 10 cents; Nicaragua, 13 cents; Brazil, 18 cents; Buenos Ayres and Monte Video, 21 cents; Bolivia, Chili, and Peru, 25 cents; Ecuador, 28 cents; Fiji Islands, 13 cents; New Zealand and New South Wales, 15 cents; other Australian Colonies, 10 cents; newspapers, 4 cents each; printed matter, 3 cents per 2 oz. These rates prepay correspondence in full to New Zealand and New South Wales; but correspondence for the West of Australia, and for the Fiji Islands, will be liable to a further charge on delivery.

Registered letters for New Zealand and New South Wales—a fee of 12c. in addition to postage. A letter cannot be registered to any part of Australia, excepting New South Wales, or to the Fiji Islands.

West Indies—British and Foreign—postage on letters, 12 cents per half ounce; newspapers, 2 cents each; printed matter, 6 cents per four ounces.

Mail Steamers for the United Kingdom, leave Quebec or Portland every Saturday; New York, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays; Halifax, every alternate Tuesday. The Mail Steamer for Bermuda, leaves Halifax every fourth Monday. For Newfoundland, leaves Halifax by steamer for England.

When Money Orders exceeding \$100 in aggregate amount are issued in one day and to the same person, by one or more Offices upon another Office, the Postmaster of the Office drawn upon (if necessary) may delay the payment of such Orders for six days.

All Money Orders shall be drawn upon Printed Forms supplied by the Post Office Department; and no Order will be valid or payable unless given upon the regular Printed Forms.

The Commission to be charged upon Money Orders shall be as follows:—

For Local Orders on Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, P. E. Island, British Columbia, and Manitoba—On orders not exceeding \$4, 2 cents; \$4, and not exceeding \$10, 5 cents. Exceeding \$10, and not exceeding \$20, 10 cents. Exceeding \$20, and not exceeding \$40, 20 cents. Exceeding \$40, and not exceeding \$60, 30 cents. Exceeding \$60, and not exceeding \$80, 40 cents. Exceeding \$80, and not exceeding \$100, 50 cents.

For Orders on Newfoundland—On orders up to £4, 25 cents. Over £5, and up to £10, 50 cents. Over £10, and up to £15, 75 cents. Over £15, and up to £20, \$1.

For Orders on the United Kingdom—On orders up to £2, 25 cents. Over £2, and up to £5, 50 cents. Over £5, and up to £7, 75 cents. Over £7, and up to £10, \$1.

For Orders on British India—On orders up to £2, 30 cents. Over £2, and up to £5, 60 cents. Over £5, and up to £7, 90 cents. Over £7, and up to £10, \$1.20.

The person to whom an Order is payable, can have it paid to a second person by writing on it, "Pay to the order of ——— (the name of the second person to fill the blank), for value received."

The Governor in Council may authorise the admission, free of duty, of any machinery to be used in any Canadian manufactory, on satisfactory evidence that like machinery is not then manufactured in Canada.

WEATHER TABLE—TIME BALL.

Table for Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year.

This Table, and the accompanying remarks, are the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon, in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will, by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom found to fail.

Observations.—The nearer the time of the Moon's change to noon or midnight, the more nearly will the result accord with the prediction.

The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e., from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

The Time Ball, on top of the Custom House Building, St. John, N. B.,

Will be hoisted half its elevation each day (Sundays excepted) at fifteen minutes before 1 o'clock. At one minute before 1 o'clock it will be hoisted its full height; and at 1 o'clock, mean time, the Ball will be dropped. A Chronometer keeping correct Greenwich time, should then shew 5h. 24m. 15s., and the difference between this and the time shewn by a Chronometer, is its true error on Greenwich time at the moment. As the above hour of 1 o'clock, when the Ball drops, represents 5h. 24m. 15s. at Greenwich, the error of a Chronometer may be ascertained, no matter where the Ship is lying. Masters of vessels arriving at Saint John, should compare their Chronometers by the Time Ball, as it will enable them to get the sea rate, which frequently varies from harbor rates. Latitude 45d. 16m. 42s. N. Longitude 4h. 24m. 15s. West.
