ECLIPSES IN 1839.

There will only be two Eclipses this year, both, consequently, of the Sun, as follows—

The first will be a total Eclipse, on Friday the 15th March, at 9h. 13m. morning; moon's latitude, 3 minutes, 13 seconds, South, ascending; and, therefore, invisible here, but in Europe partially, and in some parts of America, Africa and Asia, totally or partially, visible. Central and total Eclipse on the Meridian will be, at 9h. 31m., a little east of Cape Saint Roque, or the mouth of the Rio Grande, South America.

The second will be an annular Eclipse, on Saturday the 7th September, at 5h. 40m. 51s. evening; moon's latitude, 7m. 9s. North, descending; and, therefore, invisible here, and in Europe and Africa, but visible in some parts of America and Asia.

Mails for Halifax, Yarmouth, Windsor, Kentville, &c. (via Digby), close at 6 P. M. on Tuesday, and arrive on Wednesday evening.

Mails (by land), for Halifax, Miramichi, Dorchester, &c. close on Wednesdays at 5 P. M. and arrive on Fridays at 7 P. M.; and for Halifax and Dorchester they are made up on Saturdays at 5 P. M. and arrive on Mondays at 7 P. M.

Mails from Saint Andrews and the United States arrive on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday evenings, and close the same evenings, at 6 o'clock.

The *First District* comprises all that part of the city, between the south line of Pond-street, and north line of Duke-street, which lies to the westward of the east line of Mill-street, Dock-street, and that part of Prince-william-street, between the north line of the brick building belonging to Mr. James K. M'Kee, (northward of the Market-square.)

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and the north line of Duke-street, and including King-street, to the westward of the west line of Gernain-street.

Second District comprises all that part of the City between the north line of Union-street and south line of St. James's-street, which lies without or beyond the first district, to the westward of the east line of Charlotte-street.

Third District comprises all that part of the city which lies without or beyond the second district, to the westward of the east line of Sidney-street.

Fourth District comprises all that part of the city lying without or beyond the said third district, to the westward of the east line of Carmarthen-street.

Fifth District comprises all that part of the city lying without or beyond the said fourth district.

PUBLIC PORTERS AND HAND-CART MEN.

For loading, carrying and housing any goods or any other articles on any hand-cart, from the Market-slip in King's and Queen's wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several five districts, the rates of prices are as follow :—For the first district, three-pence ; second district, three-pence half-penny ; third district, four-pence ; fourth district, four-pence half-penny ; fifth district, five pence.

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John, passed July, 1835.

Five shillings per foot for bringing any ship or vessel into the harbour of Saint John, and mooring her in a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the wharves ; and five shillings per foot, for removing and taking any ship or vessel out of the harbour.

In cases where pilots shall be detained on board of vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from the Masters of such vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowances aforesaid.

Coasting vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another ; British or Foreign steam-boats, or British vessels drawing under six feet of water are not compelled to take pilots ; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above-mentioned.

For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from any wharf to any mooring ground, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates : For vessels not exceeding 100 tons, 7s. 6d. ; for vessels over 100, and not exceeding 200 tons, 10s. ; for vessels over 200 tons, and not exceeding 300 tons, 15s. ; and for all vessels over 300 tons the sum of 20s.

- A Pendant under two Balls, close, for eight square rigged vessels.

- A Union Jack, over neutral or enemy's signals, the vessel is detained, or a prize.
- A white flag over any signal, the vessel bears a flag of truce.

A Ball at the mast head, vessel is on shore or in distress : should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In thick weather, a gun will be fired at Partridge Island, in answer to each gun heard at sea. There is a Fog Bell on the Island, which is rung in foggy weather, to warn vessels of their approach to the shore.

When a vessel requires a Pilot, her descriptive Pendant will be shown at a yard arm, instead of a ball.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS.

(NEAR THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.)

The Falls are level (or still water), at about 3 1-2 hours on the flood, and about 2 1-2 on the ebb, which makes them passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. —No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the river Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

The Court sits at any place within the Province to be appointed by any three of the members, the Governor, Chief Justice or one of the Judges of the Supreme Court, or Judge of the Admiralty, being one.

The Office of Register of Deeds and Wills in the County of York, vacant by the death of H. G. Clopper, Esquire, has been conferred on Joseph Beek, Esquire.

In the list of Office-bearers of the *Saint John Temperance Society*, (page 24,) the name of William B. Kinnear, Esq. the original Vice-President of the Institution, is inadvertently omitted; and the names of the Vice President and Treasurer of the *Albion Union Society* are reversed.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Commissioners for Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy—Robert W. Crookshank, Thomas Barlow, John Ward, jun., Lauchlan Donaldson, and W. F. W. Owen, Esquires.

Commissioners for Partridge Island and the Beacon Light Houses.—John Ward, jun., and Lauchlan Donaldson, Esquires.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first light, in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This Light is elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about 2 miles s. s. w. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof, with an improved Lantern and Lamp. This light will therefore be much more beneficial to the trade of the Bay than formerly.

Annapolis Gut Light.—The next Light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the West side of the Gut of Annapolis—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Annapolis Basin. The Lamps and Lanterns were renewed in the Spring of 1835, and reflectors furnished, so that this Light is in high order.

NOTE.—The above three Lights are each single, fixed, and show WHITE lights.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 2½ miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles.

Bearings from the Gannet Rock Light House—

To the Old Proprietor, which dries at $\frac{1}{2}$ ebb, (very dangerous), E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. 7 miles.

“ Black Rock, (always above water 25 feet) off White Head, N.

E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

“ South West Head of Grand Manan, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

“ Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, (dry at $\frac{3}{4}$ ebb) N. W. by W.

$\frac{1}{2}$ W.

“ Southernmost of ditto, called St. Mary's Ledge, (always out of water) S. W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

“ Machias Seal Island Lights, distant about 13 miles, W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about eight miles, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Roaring Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end

of Grand Manan, open.—The red glass having been removed from the Lantern, there is now a flash light—WHITE—and three times in each minute.

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed WHITE light.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, and distant eighteen feet.—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and WHITE.

Partridge Island Light.—This light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice further than that it is a fixed white light.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar, which extends about half a mile s. s. e. of Sand Point, and which dries at two thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed white light.

Quaco.—A revolving WHITE Light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This Light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport;—a new light house has lately been erected here, and the light much improved.

Two fixed white lights, upon the Machias Seal Islands, were put in to operation in 1832—they are elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. W. W. distant about 200 feet, by which they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American)—the following are the bearings from them, viz. :

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.

“ Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 13 miles.

“ Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

“ Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

“ N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

“ Little River Head, N. by W.

“ Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels in standing in to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will then not be more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the E. of the lights.

JANUARY.

We have had a very pleasant and innocent connection. Innocent indeed; for if husbandmen preserve not that character, it is a very strange thing. It is agreed that no men are so free from those temptations which Old Nick is at all times spreading in our way. But then again it is not every farmer that is able to say—"get behind me, Satan!" whenever an opportunity offers for gratifying a passion which is ever and anon whispering, "keep what you've got, and get what you can." So says our minister, and he is a most capital preacher.

"Thirty years to be writing on one topic!" exclaims my good lady Tewabout. "Why, how upon earth can he spin it out so long? I should suppose that it had got threadbare long ago." I tell you what, my worthy madam, my subject will no more wear out than your husband's farm will so do. "Keep moving" is the principle with him and me; which is neither more nor less than *cultivation*.

FEBRUARY.

"What do you mean? is it this coal-dust and sand, which they call composition, or some such name, and which Bill Shaver got a premium for?" "Poh! no, no;—that case of Shaver's was a gross imposition, and deserves exemplary punishment. Have you not read in the farming papers any thing about **BONE MANURE**?" "No, neighbour, no. I take no newspapers; I go right ahead, in the old fashion way, and never bother my brains about

books and newsprints to get my farming information. But what is it about bones?" "Why, neighbour Bluejoint, if you would have a little more liberality, and take a paper of some sort, it would be both to your credit and your profit. Bone manure is made of bones, which, till lately, have been cast away as useless. They are broken up and ground into powder, which is the manure, and is of a very strong and productive quality." "Is that it then? Well, I tell you what,—you experimenters may break your bones with your new notions, if you like it; I stick to the old way. So, I want to hear no more about it." Here the conversation ended, and I came away. Farmers should keep along with the times.

JULY.

Ladies of the green fields and flowery hill tops, it is with delight we once more meet your smiling lovely forms. Can there be aught that is pleasing here, unless woman too shares in the enjoyment? Here comes the beautiful farmer's daughter. How lightly she treads the verdant pathway, as she bears along the welcome luncheon to the hay-makers! She has been trained to industry and to usefulness, as well as to other female accomplishments. Yonder goes her worthy teacher, the preceptress of the village high-school. She has a just estimation of a female education, and knows how valueless are the gaudy fineries without the solidities. Happy it is for us that mental cultivation is so much attended to.

Come, come, man; don't tarry too long under the old beechnut. It is to be sure a very comfortable thing to roll upon the greensward, and while away an hour or so; but then, mind ye, Mr Louter, you are taking another's time, which is taking another's property forsooth. What a capital principle it is to "do as you would be done by!" Let each one abide by this rule, and see if all things do not work right. Why do you stand whetting your scythe so long there, Soaky? We like music very well, but you have so much of this *taffit tiffit* that it gets to be monotonous.

AUGUST.

The field of wheat. This has been the theme of some of our rhyming rustics. We should think that every farmer would turn poet at this productive season. What is there that may better excite the mind into enthusiasm, than beholding the rich yellow harvest? Well, may we husbandmen, sing in anthems of joy on receiving this bountiful return for our labours. What say, neighbour Toughheart, do you ever feel any of those little internal movements which go by the crack-jaw name of *gratitude*? How often do your clergy preach about it; and how sweetly do poets sing of it! "Thy bounties, Lord, to me surmount the power of language to recount!" So sung the melodist of Israel. O, Toughheart, Toughheart! can you look upon your wavy fields of wheat, your deep green corn hills, your towering mows, and your loaded scaffolds, and feel none of those glowing emotions that inspired the grateful David into song? Methinks I hear you reply—"Come, come, Mr. Flippant, you are getting out of the lot; I never trouble myself about these ere literary matters. How stands the stock market now? I want to make a little investment; but, poh! stay! Caleb, have you charged that peck of meal to the widow Meagrem?"

SEPTEMBER.

This is one of the most glorious months for the farmer; the good things of the earth come tumbling in upon him, "heaps upon heaps!" However, there is no month in the year that may not gladden the farmer's heart, unless it be one of those hearts which we sometimes find incased in the hide of a rhinoceros. How is it in your neighbourhood,

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Mr. Muddlet, about tools? If I do not very much "mis-remember," as my worthy friend the good deacon Spanshankle used to phrase it, you was somewhat in the back-ground last year. Your way was not the right way for a man of business, a go-ahead, push-along, keep-moving husbandman. You was pestered to keep the operation up for lack of implements; your way was altogether *borrow and cobble*. I tell you you once more, and once for all, a *do-for-the-present* practice is worse than no doing. There may be an occasional necessity for it; but keep far away from the habit. Your cousin, Jo Jykes, was in the same bad way; but all at once he took a new start, and off he tramped to the agricultural warehouse. "Oh, wonderation," he cried, here's every thing!" So he filled up his wagon with a good stock of tools, such as a farmer ought always to have, and home he pushed, much satisfied with his purchase.

OCTOBER.

"Some love to roam" away from home. This will by no means do for John Ploughbeam. His love of home is his safety. He must guard against contracting a fondness for being off, off; ay, off from the place of his business, the place of his interest, the place of his family, the place of his love. Call me away from the enticement of the idle and the time spendthrift. Yonder is a horse-race that draws its thousands. Would you venture your faithful mare, Lightfoot, upon the turf? How cruel it would be to put her to her full speed! Farmers should have feeling for these most useful quadrupeds. Poor Ben Bramble was drawn into the trap, and lost a fine gelding. Is there a gathering at the village tavern? I hope there are no farmers there. *Loafers* can never be farmers. Yet some love to roam; some love just to take a little trip down to town, or over to the corner, or to trundlehead's mills, to see what's going on. But they will "hang on;" and this makes a bad case of it. Now, there is no need of going from home to find out the news. The way to have this accommodation is to take a newspaper, and then the news will come to you even to your very door; and your family will also receive benefit in reading the paper. Look to it.

NOVEMBER.

A wheel-barrow! Ay, a wheel-barrow is an implement that no real farmer can dispense with. Say what you will, Mr. Goodstick, this is a very important piece of furniture upon the premises. You think that you have no use for one; but, let me ask you, how often do you borrow your neighbour the carpenter's? and how much vexation and scolding have you caused for not returning it in season? and how many times have you damaged it without reparation? and how many times has your good wife said to you, "pray, husband, do get you a wheel-barrow?" and how many times has your neighbour offered to sell you one to prevent the trouble of lending, but you refused to buy? Now I think that a wheel-barrow society would be highly advantageous in a neighbourhood. I would have no one family be without an interest in it, and no one family without a wheel-barrow, kept in good repair. Such a thing may be thought a novelty, but that is nothing against its utility. Have you banked up your house, so as to have your cellar safe against frost? Have you gone round about your buildings, and seen to the clapboards, the shingles, the knot-holes, the glass, the hinges, the brick work, &c.

DECEMBER.

In peaceful and pleasant journey jog we have kept along together thus far. The sun is now high setting, and night will mantle the cottage, and the farm, and the village, and plain, and woodlands, all in darkness!

We know not if we shall meet again on the morrow of the year. It would be pleasant if such were our good fortune. Peradventure it may be; but, again, peradventure, it may not. Here then, honest John Ploughman, who art the *Triplolemus* of modern time, fed and nourished with the true milk of the healthful and comely *Ceres*, let me conjure thee to distribute of thy rich bounties to those that shall in truth most need them. O forget not the widow and the orphan, the sick and the lame, and all the sons and daughters of suffering. See thy plenteousness, and think of them. There are a thousand ways that a farmer may do good if he will, and not injure himself. Need they be pointed out? "Do as you would be done by," and you will find enough to do.

Hah! I see the same old gentleman, *Capt. Finis* yonder, waiting for my arrival, and I have but a short time for the usual ceremony of—stay! I hate the fuss and parade of ceremony; so let me tell you, my friends, at once, that I have thrashed the last sheaf again, and now I am—off.

PLANTING POTATOES WHOLE.—From the earliest period of the history of the Province, it appears the usual custom has been to cut the potatoes previous to planting them, and in general, it must be admitted, the plan has succeeded tolerably well. Of late years, however, a new disorder has arisen among potatoes, generally known by the name of the *dry rot*, a disease which seems to call for a change in the established mode of planting. So long as this disorder continues, the husbandman, to secure himself from the risk of an entire failure, *must plant his potatoes whole*. The necessity for this alteration in the mode of planting is as follows:—the dry rot is a disease, which eats away the moisture of the potatoe and at length causes it to crumble into dust; when therefore a potatoe is cut and put into the ground, each cut has to contend with the disorder tending to affect the moisture, and also with the *air and soil*, having the same influence. With these powers to oppose, the piece of potatoe is very generally destroyed. But when the potatoe is planted whole, the *strong rhind* preserves it in a great measure from the injurious effect of the atmosphere and ground, and it has but the disorder itself to overcome, and which it is generally enabled to do, and to shoot forth its stems before the dry rot can have advanced sufficiently to kill it. It is true that sometimes even the *whole potatoe will fail*, but in that case the farmer may console himself with the certain belief, that if he had planted it in cuts, they would inevitably have failed likewise. We may not be right in our view of the necessity of planting potatoes whole, but whether or not, we think it can be demonstrated that nothing is ever lost by following this method. That many who have commenced on this system, may not, for a while, make it answer as well as planting their seed in cuts, is quite natural to suppose. The plan is new to them, but when a further practice shall have given them experience, there can be little doubt but they will find it satisfy their most enlarged expectations. The two great things to be observed in planting potatoes whole, are, to have the rows very wide apart, and the potatoes planted very close together, the greatest distance not more than seven inches apart.—[Halifax Pearl.]

From the Pictou Observer.—An intelligent correspondent, whose opinion we much respect, though in many particulars it differs from our own, writes us on the subject of the dry rot in potatoes.—"You and your contemporary are both out on this subject. The riper and finer the potatoe the more liable it is to be attacked by the *small fly* which

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causes the dry rot. Potatoes prematurely killed by frost, or planted too late to be good for food, are always to be preferred for seed. The dry rot is nothing more nor less than the erosion of the potato or set by a swarm of minute maggots, the germ of which being deposited by the parent fly on the juicy cut of a good potato, and becoming quickly animated in warm weather, feeds on as much of the root as is agreeable to its taste, until it has arrived at the rhind, or has passed into a state in which it no longer requires such food. Never mind the speculations of others on this subject; take a microscope, as I have repeatedly done, and examine for yourself. There is no remedy but preventing the deposition of the egg of the *ugly black long-winged fly* which may be seen hovering round the potato when cut, and to prevent it having access the sets should be immediately covered with dry sea-side sand or any dry mould." This opinion on the important subject to which it refers is deserving of attention, and may satisfactorily account for the fact that potato sets thoroughly dipped in quick lime escape the rot, as in that case we can easily fancy the germ of the pernicious maggot which occasions it, to be destroyed by the lime.

ON POTATOES—By T. A. Knight, Esqr.—In a letter which I published last autumn, I stated that I had obtained a produce of potatoes equivalent to 837½ bushels and 3 lbs. (each bushel weighing 90 lbs.) per statute acre, and I then expressed an intention which I now fulfil, of pointing out the means by which such an extraordinary crop was obtained, and by which, of course, other crops of equal magnitude may be again obtained; and I look forward with confidence to obtaining in the present year a produce equivalent to 1000 bushels per acre of potatoes of first rate quality.

The first point to which I wish to direct the attention of the cultivator of the potatoe is, *the age of the variety*: for it has long been known, that every variety cultivated, gradually becomes debilitated, and loses a large portion of its powers of producing; and I believe that almost every variety now cultivated in this and the adjoining countries, has long since passed the period of its age at which it ought to have resigned its place to a successor.

No variety should ever be cultivated which uselessly expends itself in the production of seeds, nor even of full grown blossoms, unless it possesses some valuable redeeming qualities.

The distance of the intervals between the rows should be regulated wholly by the length required by the stems in each peculiar soil and situation. If the utmost length required by the stems be four feet, let the intervals between the rows be four feet also; and if the variety be of dwarfish habits, and its longest stem does not exceed two feet, intervals of two feet will be sufficient.

The rows should be made from north to south, that the mid-day sun may be permitted to shine between them; for every particle of living matter found in the tuberous root of the potatoe plant, has been generated in the leaves. (which act only when exposed to light,) and has descended beneath the soil.

Each set should weigh at least six ounces, and they should never be placed at greater distances from each other, than six inches from centre to centre, and a preference should be given to *whole potatoes*, when such can be obtained. If the growth of the plant be very dwarfish, 4 inches between the sets from centre to centre, will be preferable; and if the form of the potatoe be long and kidney-shaped, a good deal of advantage will be gained by placing them to stand upon their ends, that end which joined the parent plant placed downwards.

The largest produce will generally be obtained from varieties of rather early habits, and rather low stature, there being in very tall plants much time necessarily lost in carrying the nutriment, which has been absorbed from the soil, up into the leaves and down again, in the state of living sap, to the tuber.

Varieties which have strong stems and erect form, are to be preferred, because such are least subject to fall upon, and shade the foliage of each other.

It is much more advantageous to incorporate the manure with the soil by means of the spade or plough, than to put it in with the sets; for in the latter case, a large majority of the roots, during the summer and autumn, do not derive advantage from it.

Early planting is, under almost all circumstances, best; and the period, except for some very peculiar varieties, should never be later than the middle of the month of April.

I possess, though at present in small quantities necessarily, many new varieties, which promise to prove valuable both on account of the quantity and quality of their produce, and I shall be happy as soon as I have the power, to make them useful to the public. I obtained in the last year from some of these under culture with the plough, (the soil being shallow, and naturally poor, and manure not having been given, in more than ordinary quantity,) a produce equivalent to more than 650 bushels of potatoes, of first rate excellence per acre, and a good deal larger produce from others of inferior quality, but I have not any reason to believe that I possess any variety which, either in quality for immediate human food, or in quantity for affording food to the inferior animals, has reached, or ever approximated the greatest state of excellence which the potatoe is capable of acquiring.—*British Farm. Mag.*

BARLEY.—"As far as my knowledge extends, I believe it is not generally known among practical farmers, that English or two rowed Barley is the most profitable summer grain crop that they can cultivate; it is not particular as to climate, soil, drought or wet—and for some years past has not been subject to blast or mildew. It leaves the land in better order than any other grain crop, it is more easily harvested, and requires but little labour to clean it. For two years' experience I find it equally as good for fattening swine, as any other grain, pound for pound. The present season (1833) we fattened our pork entirely on barley-meal, and never had better. The produce the past season was forty-five bushels to the acre, weighing fifty-one pounds per bushel, raised on land where corn and potatoes grew the year before, part of which is calcareous (nature of lime) and part argillaceous (clayey) soil. The manure was spread on at the time of planting corn and potatoes; the grass looks well and bids fair for a great crop—it looked last autumn fifty per cent. better on the barley ground than on the wheat, which grew side by side."—*Correspondence of the N. E. Farmer.*

Charcoal.—The use of charcoal in preventing the putrefaction of animal matter, has often been commended, and the application of this interesting property of charcoal, to the preservation of provisions for ships at sea, cannot be too often insisted upon. We have another pleasing confirmation of this fact in the statement, "that the crews of two Russian ships that some years since sailed round the world, were extremely healthy—during the whole three years of their voyage, only two men died of the crew of the *Neva*, and the *Nevashada* did not lose a single man—not only their fresh water was preserved in charred casks, but the same precaution was applied to the preservation of their salted provisions. The beef they carried out with them tasted as

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pleasantly upon their return, as it did three years before, when first salted.

Preservation of Fish.—For ensuring the sweetness of fish conveyed by land carriage to any distance, the belly of the fish should be opened, and the internal parts sprinkled with powdered charcoal. The same material will restore even putrescent water to a state of perfect freshness. The inhabitants of Cadiz, and other cities where water has to be kept in tanks for culinary uses, adopt this simple method of purifying their water. While on this subject, it may be well to add, that charcoal well pulverized, is the best tooth powder that can be used, both to keep the teeth white, and to prevent their decay. If you will pulverize it, heat it red hot on a shovel, and then put it in a bottle of pure water; and use this water with a tooth brush—it is still better.

TEST OF GOOD FLOUR.—Flour which is pure and unadulterated may be known by your seizing a handful briskly, and squeezing it half a minute; it preserves the form of the hand in one piece, although placed rudely on the table. Not so with that which contains foreign substances; its adhesive property is weak, and it falls to pieces immediately. The whiteness of the flour is no evidence of its goodness; the different materials used in adulterating flour have a tendency to whiten it.

Flowers.—It is said if you fill flower pots about half full of quick lime, and cover this with a good mould, the flowers may thus be obtained in a very short time, and all the season. The earth should be kept slightly moistened, and pressed down whenever it rises by the swelling of the lime.

RECOVERING FROSTED PLANTS.—It is well known that the injury caused to plants by early spring frosts is not owing so much to the direct action of the cold, as to the sudden application of warmth afterwards. London nursery-men have availed themselves of the knowledge of this fact, in recovering plants during the night. They sprinkle them copiously with cold water before sunrise. This produces the same effect as the application of cold water to a frozen limb—abstracting the frost so gradually as to produce no injury to the affected parts.

Freezing.—A young man in New Hampshire froze his foot, which was perfectly cured in less than 24 hours, by the application of yeast and Indian meal—it is equally beneficial when applied to a burn.

Sure remedy for the Croup.—A distinguished medical friend of ours states, that whenever cynauche trachelais appears, he found a plaster of dry Scotch snuff, to be applied directly across the top of the thorax, invariably effectual. Dr. Shurtleff of Boston also declares—“I have used the snuff in several cases of the croup, and (with the aid of five grains of the powder of ipecac and fifteen of calomel in commencement for an emetic,) I have in no case failed in performing a cure. It is mixed with goose oil or lard, and spread on flannel sufficiently large to cover the neck and breast as low as the pit of the stomach.

Cure for the Hooping-Cough.—Dissolve one scruple of salt of tartar, in a gill of spring water—add ten grains of cochineal, finely powdered—sweeten this with loaf sugar. Give to an infant the fourth part of a table spoonful, four times a day; to a child 2 or 3 years old, half a spoonful; and to one 4 or 5 years old, a spoonful may be given. The relief is instant, and the cure in general, within 5 or 6 days.

Cure for Wens.—Wash them two or three times a day, with strong salt water, water in which salt has been dissolved.

Cure for the Influenza.—Drink very freely of barley water sweetened with brown sugar, and strongly impregnated with acid; and observe strict temperance in diet.

Cure for Cancers.—Take the root of dock, boil it until soft, then use it by way of a poultice, taking care to renew the application two or three times in a day. This simple remedy has effected a complete cure.

Cure for the sting of a Wasp.—Apply an onion to the part affected—the cure is instantaneous. Probably the same remedy would succeed as to other insects, bees, hornets, &c.

Cure for Burns and Scalds.—Apply a plaster compounded of Burgundy pitch, beeswax, and a little sweet oil; it will yield almost instant relief from pain. Allow one fourth wax, add oil, lard, or fresh butter to it, to reduce it to a consistency, so as neither to melt by the warmth of the flesh, nor irritate by its hardness.

Burns and Scalds.—Clarified honey, applied on a linen rag, is said to be an excellent remedy for burns and scalds. It is easily tried and can do no harm, and perhaps may prove as useful as it is cheap and simple.

To prevent wounds from Mortifying.—Sprinkle sugar on them. The Turks wash fresh wounds with wine, and sprinkle sugar on them. Obstinate ulcers may be cured with sugar dissolved in a strong decoction of walnut leaves.

Poison.—To cure the poison occasioned by the sting of a bee, wasp, hornet, &c. wash the part affected with the water of ammonia (hartshorne,) and if much diseased, dissolve a piece of carbonated ammonia (the size of a pea) in water and drink it. This remedy is said to have relieved persons when a sting has nearly caused mortification.

Cure for sore backs of Horses.—White lead, moistened with milk or sweet oil, is the best remedy for sore backs of Horses, and if applied in the early stage of the wound, is always efficacious.

Cement.—Isinglass, boiled in spirits of wine, will produce a fine transparent cement which will unite broken glass so as to render the fracture almost imperceptible, and perfectly secure.

Nankin colour.—A pail full of ley, with a piece of copperas half as big as a hen's egg boiled in it, will dye a fine nankin colour, which will never wash out. This is very useful for the linings of bed quilts, comforters &c.

TO TAKE STAINS OUT OF MAHOGANY.—Mix six ounces of spirit of salts, and half an ounce of rock salt of lemons, powdered together; drop a little on the stains, and rub it with cork till it disappear. Wash off with cold water.—*Cunnabell's Nova Scotia Almanack, for 1839.*

How to catch Owls and Rabbits.—The Americans have a plan of catching owls and rabbits, which is rather curious. **OWLS**—When you discover one on a tree, and find that it is looking at you, all you have to do is to move quickly round the tree several times, when the owl, in the mean time, whose attention will be so firmly fixed, that forgetting the necessity of turning its body with its head, will follow your motion with its eyes until it wrings its head off. **RABBITS**—Place apples in the parts where they frequent, after sprinkling them with snuff, and when they come to smell, the sudden effort to sneeze which they make never fails to break their necks, and even, in some cases, has been known to cause them to tumble heels over head a considerable distance.

A TABLE

FOR FORETELLING THE WEATHER, THROUGH ALL THE LUNATIONS OF EACH YEAR, FOREVER.

(Formed by Dr. Herschell, and revised by Dr. Adam Clarke.)

This Table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years' actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions acting the earth, and will, by simple inspection show the observed kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be constant or never found to fail:

Observations.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter are to *midnight*, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

2.—The nearer to *mid day* or *noon* the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

3.—The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, that is, from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

4.—Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to these periods.

—The observer should be within sight of a good vane, and the cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.

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
