## ECLIPSES.

I.—On the 6th of March there will be an Annular of the Sun, but it will not be visible in Canada.

II.—On the morning of March 20th there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon. It will be visible in this country. At Quebec it begins at 2.30 and ends at 5.37. At Montreal it begins at 2.21 and ends at 5.28, and at Toronto it begins at 1.58 and ends at 5.5.

III.—On the 29th of August, there will be a total Eclipse of the Sun, visible in South America; not visible in Canada.

IV.—On the Evening of Friday, the 13th of September, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon. In Canada the beginning of this Eclipse will be invisible; the Moon will rise Eclipsed. In Montreal it ends at 9.2. In Toronto at 8.39.

## PLANETS.

Mercury will be a bright Evening Star in March, July and October; Morning Star in the East just before Sunrise, in April, August and December. Jupiter will be Evening Star until February 3; Morning Star until May 27, and then Evening Star the rest of the year. Saturn will be Morning Star until 12th February; is Evening Star until November 19, when it becomes Morning Star. Mars will be Evening Star throughout the year. Venus will be Morning Star until September 25, being then in conjunction with the Sun thereby rendered invisible. Its disc, if visible, will be a perfect circle. Toward the end of the year it will be Evening Star, daily appearing further East of the Sun.

### THE SEASONS.

Vernal Equinox—Spring begins March 20th, 8h. 30m., Evening.

Summer Solstice—Summer begins June 21st, 5h. 4m., Evening.

Autumnal Equinox—Autumn begins September 23rd., 7h. 27m. Morning.

Winter Solstice—Winter begins Dec'e'r. 22nd, 1h. 31m., Morning.

## REGULATIONS AND RATES.

*Letter-Rates.*—Letters posted in Canada, addressed to any place within the Province, pass, if pre-paid, for 5 cents per half-ounce, but if posted unpaid, are charged 7 cents per half-ounce.

On letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward's Island, the rate is 5 cents per half-ounce,—prepayment optional.

The rate on letters to the United Kingdom will be—

By Canadian Packet, 12½ cents per half-ounce.

By Cunard Packet, 17 cents per half-ounce, advancing by one rate for each *half-ounce*.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be pre-paid, or they will be charged a fine of 6d. sterling in addition to the deficient postage on delivery in England.

Letters for British Colonies and Possessions, beyond sea, and for Foreign Countries, *via* England, must be pre-paid.

The rate on letters for the United States, 10 cts. per half-ounce.

N. B.—With the exception of those marked with an asterisk, all are to be sent by *Canadian Line* only; for Cunard Line, add to the above rates 5 cents for letters.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction,—“By Canadian Packet,” or “By British Packet,”—and in that case, they are kept over for the packet designated. “By Canadian Mail” is not a distinctive superscription; for any mail for Canada is a “Canadian Mail,” by whatever packet forwarded.

*Registration Charges.*—For the registration of a letter addressed to any place in British North America, the charge is 2 cents.

For the registration of a letter to the United Kingdom, 8 cts.

For the registration of a letter to the United States, 5 cts.

France, and other countries for which letters pass through France, an amount equal to the postage.

No letter can be forwarded as registered unless postage and registration fee are both pre-paid.

*Miscellaneous Charges.*—The charge on parcels, by Parcel Post, to any place in Canada, is 25 cents per pound, [with 5 cents additional, if registered]. No parcel must exceed *three* pounds in weight.

One cent per ounce, payable in advance by postage stamp, is the rate on printed circulars, prices-current, hand-bills, and other printed matter of a like character; and on books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office, addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charges upon prices-current, when addressed to the United Kingdom, is 2 cents each, and must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Postage Rates on certain Miscellaneous Matter passing within the Province of Canada, or to and from the United States:—

1.—Packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, and scions, or grafts, may be posted in Canada for delivery within the Province, or to an address within the United States, on prepayment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce; and when received from the United States, addressed to any place in Canada, such packages may be delivered on payment, by the person addressed, of a like rate.

2.—The limit of weight for such packages will be one pound. No communication, whether written or printed, must be enclosed, in them; and they must be so put up as to be easy of examination, for the purpose of verifying the alleged contents. If put up in bags, the bags must be simply tied at the neck, so as to admit of inspection; and, in the case of such packages mailed in Canada, the nature of the contents, such as “*Seeds,*” “*Roots,*” &c., as the case may be, must be marked on the package by the sender, as a statement of the claim to pass at the reduced rate hereby made applicable to such matter.

3.—Book manuscript, and printers’ proof-sheets (whether corrected or not), maps, prints, drawings, engravings, photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass), and sheet music

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(whether printed or written), may pass in covers open at the ends or sides, and provided that no letter, or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter, be enclosed therein, on prepayment, when posted in Canada, by postage stamp of the ordinary printed-matter rate of one cent per ounce; or upon payment of that rate on delivery on such matter when received in the mails from the United States.

Transmission of Patterns of Merchandise and Samples between Canada and the United Kingdom, and certain other countries:—

4.—Patterns of merchandise and samples may be forwarded between Canada and the United Kingdom, and Denmark, France, Italy, Belgium and the German States, by the Canadian packet mails, at book-post rates, and subject to the following conditions:

**A**—The patterns or samples must not be of any intrinsic value; and this rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern; nor must the quantity of any material or article, sent as a pattern or sample, be so great that it could have on this ground an intrinsic value.

On this point an explanation in a subsequent Departmental Order, appears as follows:

**B**—It has hitherto formed part of the Imperial Post Office regulations that "*samples or patterns must not be of intrinsic value,*" but in consequence of the difficulty that has been experienced in determining what is, and what is not, a pattern or sample of merchandise of intrinsic value, this prohibition has been removed.

The modification is a verbal one, and will not alter nor enlarge in any way, the character of the transmissions permitted to pass by pattern post.

The special prohibition as to intrinsic value has, it is understood, been withdrawn, not because the question of value will not still influence a decision as to whether an article offered for transmission by pattern post is a genuine commercial sample (or pattern) or not, but because as a general proviso it could not well be enforced; inasmuch as every article whether properly a pattern or sample or not, has necessarily more or less of an intrinsic value, and might be held to be amenable to a strict construction of this prohibitory clause in the regulation.

**C**—The patterns, &c., must be sent in covers, open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and such like, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, simply tied at the neck; or, provided that bags be transparent, they may be entirely closed, if they are for delivery within the United Kingdom. Bags, however, entirely closed, even though they be transparent, must not be used for the transmission of seeds to foreign parts.

**D**—The rule which prohibited the transmission through the post, as patterns, of articles of cutlery, &c., has been rescinded; and scissors, knives, razors, forks, steel pens, nails, keys, watch machinery, metal tubing, pieces of metal or ore, and such like



articles, are now allowed to be forwarded by the post as samples, provided they be packed and guarded in so secure a manner as to afford complete protection to the contents of the mail bags, and to the persons of the officers of the post office. Such articles, however, must be so packed that they may be easily examined; and it is made a rule that any packet containing such articles, which may be found to be insufficiently guarded, shall not be forwarded through the post.

No packet of patterns or samples must exceed 24 oz. in weight.

A packet of patterns or samples sent to France, must not exceed 18 inches in length, width, or depth; a packet to any other place abroad must not exceed 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth or depth.

A packet of patterns or samples sent to Germany or Belgium must not exceed 8 ounces in weight.

None of the articles named in the rule D, may be sent as patterns or samples to any place abroad, except Germany, Belgium, and the British colonies, and not to these places when addressed "*via France.*"

There must be no writing or printing other than the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, the manufacturer's or trade mark and number, and the prices of the article.

Any infringement of the above regulations will render the packet liable to be treated and charged as a letter.

The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any article likely to injure the contents of the mail-bags, will apply to patterns and samples; any package transgressing this rule is to be sent to the Postmaster General.

Transmission of patterns and samples within the Province of Canada:—

Patterns or samples of merchandise and goods for sale may be posted in Canada to be forwarded to any place within the Province, on prepayment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce, under the following regulations:

I.—Patterns or samples must be sent in covers open at the ends so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened—or in bags entirely closed, provided that they be transparent, so that the officers of the Post Office may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

II.—The packet may bear on the *outside* the address of the sender in addition to the address of the person for whom it may be intended—also a trade mark and numbers, and the price of the articles enclosed—*inside*, there must be no enclosure but the samples or patterns themselves—the particulars, however, of the trade marks, numbers and price, may be marked on the articles themselves instead of on the outside of the packet at the option of the sender.

III.—Any sample or pattern packet containing a letter, or otherwise violating the conditions of the preceding rules is to be rated and treated as a letter.

IV.—The rate of 1 cent per ounce is to be prepaid by Postage Stamp—and if such rate be not fully prepaid by the stamps affixed—the packet is to be rated with the deficient postage and a fine of 5 cents in addition.

V.—Packets of samples and patterns may be registered on prepayment by postage stamp of a registration fee of 5 cents in addition to the postage rate—and provided such packets be duly handed in to the Post Office for registration.

A registration receipt or certificate should always be given for such packets when presented for registration.

VI.—No packet of samples or patterns must exceed one pound in weight; any packet exceeding that weight is to be sent to the Postmaster General.

*Book Post.*—Books, bound, or unbound, posted in Canada, and addressed to any office in Canada, British America and the United States, are chargeable with a rate of one cent per ounce which must be pre-paid by postage stamps.

Book packets are forwarded by post from Canada to the United Kingdom *vice versa*, by Canadian steamer only, at the following rates:—For each packet

Not more than 4 oz. ....	7	cts.
Exceeding 4 oz., and not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. ....	12 $\frac{1}{2}$	“

And so on, the scale progressing throughout by a single rate for every four ounces.

6.—No prints or printed matter will be allowed to pass by book post between the United Kingdom and Canada, unless printed on paper, parchment or vellum.

Book packets addressed to the United Kingdom can be registered on payment of the ordinary registration fee (8 cents) in addition to the postage.

*Book Post with France.*—For a packet of printed matter, or single newspaper, book, &c., not over 2 ounces. .... 5 cents.

Ditto, exceeding 2 ounces, and not over 4 ounces. .... 10 “

Ditto, do 4 ounces, do 8 ounces. .... 20 “

Ditto, do 8 ounces, do 16 ounces. .... 40 “

And so on; increasing 20 cents for every additional half-pound.

The Book-post Regulations between Canada and England apply to matter between Canada and France.

*Newspapers and Periodicals.*—Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates, *if paid quarterly in advance*, by either the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at delivering post office:—

For a paper published 6 times a week. .... 2s. per qr., or 40 cents.

Ditto do 3 times a week. .... 1s. do or 20 “

Ditto do 2 times a week. .... 8d. do or 13 “

Ditto do 1 time a week. .... 4d. do or 6 $\frac{1}{2}$  “

When the above rates are not paid in advance, by either publisher or subscriber, such papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

*Transient Newspapers.*—Transient newspapers, that is to say, Canadian Newspapers, posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or reposted in Canada, must be pre-paid one cent each, by postage stamp, or they cannot be forwarded; except only *British newspapers* distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian booksellers and news-agents, such papers pass free, as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mail.

*Newspapers by Mail from England or United States.*—Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet, are charged 2 cents each on delivery. [This is the American transit charge].

United States newspapers, brought by mail into Canada, are charged 1 cent each on delivery.

*Periodicals passing by Mail in Canada:*—

1.—The rate on all periodicals, other than newspapers, passing by mail in Canada, save such as may be addressed to or received from the United Kingdom, and such as are exempted from postage by statute, will henceforth be 1 cent per 4 ounces weight of package containing periodical matter, whether the package contains one or more numbers.

2.—Any fraction of 4 ounces to be charged as a full rate.

3.—On periodicals posted from the office of publication, or by news-agents or booksellers, to regular subscribers *within the Province*, this rate may remain to be collected on delivery, and must in such cases be marked upon the packages and charged in the letter-bills; but when mailed to go out of the Province, such periodical matter must be pre-paid by postage stamp. British and United States periodicals may be posted in Canada by news-agents and booksellers to regular subscribers in the Province under this regulation.

4.—Transient periodical matter posted in Canada must in all cases be pre-paid by postage stamp.

5.—The above rate will be payable *on delivery* on all periodical matter received from the United States, except that Canadian editors may receive exchange periodicals from the United States free of Canadian postage.

*Canadian Periodicals, posted for United Kingdom by Canadian Packets:*—

6.—Periodicals, printed and published in Canada, may be posted, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom *by Canadian Packet*, on prepayment by postage stamp of 2 cents each number.

7.—This rate will be applicable to all classes of Canadian periodicals posted as above for the United Kingdom, the exemption to which certain classes of Canadian periodicals are entitled, extending to such numbers only as are addressed from the office of publication within the Province.

*Postage Stamps.*—Postage Stamps, of the respective values of 1 cent for newspapers; 2 cents for prices-current for the United Kingdom; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12½ cents for Canadian Packet; and 17 cents for Cunard Packet,—are provided for sale to the public.

*Letter Envelopes*, impressed with Medallion Stamp, and equivalent to the prepayment of postage, to the amount of 5 and 10 cents respectively, are furnished for sale to the public at the following rates:—

The 5-cent Envelope, at \$5.50 per 100, or 66 cents per dozen.

The 10-cent Envelope, at \$10.50 per 100, or \$1.26 per dozen.

*Penal Clause*—The Act contains the following penal clause:—  
To inclose a letter, or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel post, shall be a misdemeanor.

To inclose a letter, or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to enclose any other thing in a newspaper, posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers), shall be a misdemeanor.

On Orders over \$40, and up to \$60.....	30 “
On Orders over \$60, and up to \$80.....	40 “

*Money Orders on the United Kingdom.*—The Canadian Money Order Offices also draw upon all the Money Order Offices in England, Ireland, and Scotland, and the Channel Islands, for any sum up to £10 sterling, and grant as many Orders for £10 sterling each, as may be needed to make up the amount to be remitted. The terms are as under:—

On Orders up to £2.....	25 cents.
On Orders over £2, and up to £5.....	50 “
On Orders over £5, and up to £7.....	75 “
On Orders over £7, and up to £10.....	\$1.00

*Money Orders on the Lower Provinces.*—The Canadian Money Order Offices draw also upon all Money Order Offices in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland. The Orders, like those of the United Kingdom, are made payable in Sterling money, and for sums up to £10 sterling. The terms are:—

For Orders up to £5.....	25 cents.
For Orders over £5, and up to £10.....	50 “

The Money Order Post Offices are furnished with lists of all the Money Order Offices in Canada, the United Kingdom, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland; and the Postmasters are instructed to afford every information in their power, in respect of the places upon which they draw, together with any other information relating to such issues as the intending remitters may desire.

*The Fair Market Value for Duty of Goods*—imported into this Province, shall be the fair market value of such goods in the usual and ordinary commercial acceptance of the term at the usual and ordinary credit, and not the cash value of such goods, except in cases in which the article imported is by universal usage considered and known to be a cash article, and so *bona fide* paid for in all transactions in relation to such article, and no discounts for cash shall in any case be allowed in deduction of the fair market value as herein above defined; and all invoices representing cash values, except in the special cases herein above referred to, shall be subject to such additions as the Collector or Appraiser of the Port at which they will be presented, may appear just and reasonable to bring up the amount to the true and fair market-value as required by this section.

*Packages delivered before Examination.*—All the packages mentioned in any one Entry, although most of such packages may have been delivered to the importer, shall be subject to the control of the Customs authorities of the port at which they are entered, until such of the packages as have been sent for examination to the Examining Warehouse, shall have been duly examined and approved, provided such examination take place within three days after the delivery of the package or packages into the Examining Warehouse, and after twenty-four hours' notice by the importer to the collector; and a bond shall be given by the importer conditioned that the packages so delivered shall not be opened or unpacked before the package or packages sent to the Examining Warehouse, shall have been examined and passed as aforesaid, provided they are examined within the delay aforesaid; and the packages so delivered, or the goods if lawfully unpacked, shall, if required by the Collector of Customs, be returned to the Custom House, within such delay as may be mentioned in the bond under a forfeiture of the penalty of such bond.

*Collectors to File Invoices.*—The Collectors of Customs, at all the ports in this Province, may retain and put on file, after

duly stamping the same, all invoices of goods imported at such ports respectively, of which invoices they shall give certified copies or extracts, whenever called upon so to do by the importers, and such copies or extracts so duly certified by the Collector or other proper officer, and bearing the Stamp of the Custom House at which they are filed, shall be considered and received as authentic, and the Collector shall be entitled to demand for each certificate a fee of fifty cents, before delivering the same.

*Table of Prohibitions.*—The following articles are prohibited to be imported under a penalty of two hundred dollars, together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods, in which the same may be found, viz:—Books, Drawings, Paintings and Prints, of an immoral or indecent character; Coin, base or counterfeit.

*Trade with the British North American Provinces.*—The articles hereunder mentioned, when of the growth and produce of any of the British North American Provinces, be admitted into this Province, *free of duty*, from and after the passing of the Act, that is to say:—Grain, Flour and Breadstuffs of all kinds; Animals of all kinds; Fresh, Smoked and Salted Meats; Seeds and Vegetables; Green and Dried Fruits; Fish of all kinds, Products of Fish, and of all creatures living in the water; Poultry, Butter, Cheese, Lard, Tallow; Timber and Lumber of all kinds, round, hewed, sawed, but not otherwise manufactured, in whole or in part; Fish Oil; Gypsum, ground or unground.

*Trade with the United States of America.*—Any or all the articles mentioned in the next preceding resolution when of the growth and produce of the United States of America, may be admitted into this Province free of duty, upon proclamation by the Governor in Council, whenever satisfactory arrangements shall be entered into with the United States for the importation of similar articles from Canada into that country.

*Export Duty.*—Upon saw logs and shingle bolts exported out of Canada, except the same be exported directly to any of the British North American Provinces:

*Free Ports.*—Upon and after the 15th of September, 1866. the Act 23 Victoria, chapter 20, intituled, "An Act respecting Free Ports of Entry," shall be repealed, and provided that the same duties shall be levied in the places now included in such Free Ports as in other parts of this Province, and that goods which have been imported into such Free Ports before the repeal of the said Act, shall, if brought therefrom to any other part of this Province, be dealt with as if imported from a place beyond the limits of the Province.

Vehicles for hire—For each two-wheeled vehicle, 20s.; for each four-wheeled vehicle, 30s.

Stage-Coach, Omnibus, or Stage-Waggon—when drawn by one or two horses, 40s.; when drawn by four or more horses, 60s.

For each close carriage, or corresponding winter vehicle, £5; four-wheeled half-covered carriage, or do., drawn by two horses, 60s.; four-wheeled half-covered carriage, or do., drawn by one horse, 50s.; double dennet, &c., or do., 40s.; gig, caleche, spring cart, or do., 30s.; waggon or vehicle, not above specified, or winter vehicle, adapted for draught of two or more horses, 20s.

Dogs, 7s. 6d. each. (Sheltering or permitting to resort, is keeping a dog.)

Theatres—Annual duty of £30 (above assessments) on proprietor.

Proprietors of Caravans of wild beasts, circuses, &c., to obtain permission from His Worship the Mayor, and pay £25 therefor, and £10 for each subsequent day that the same is open.

Proprietor or proprietors of each steam ferry-boat plying from Laprairie or Longueuil, an annual duty of £50 currency.

Banks or bank agencies, annual duty of £100.

Fire insurance companies, or agencies, annual duty of £50.

Marine insurance companies, annual duty of £25.

Telegraph companies, annual duty of £100.

Brokers or money-changers, annual duty of £25.

Produce brokers, money lenders and commission merchants—an annual duty of £20.

Distillers, or agents of distillers—20 per cent. on the whole of the rental of business premises.

Brewers, or agents of brewers—15 per cent on the whole of the rental of business premises.

Ball-alleys, skittle grounds, nine-pin alleys—an annual duty of £12 10s.

Brick-yards, an annual duty of £10.

Horse-dealers, an annual duty of £2 10s.

#### TAXES COLLECTED BY THE CHIEF OF POLICE.

For licenses issued to carters and others using hackney carriages or vehicles for the conveyance of passengers or transport of goods, wares, merchandise, building materials, produce or other articles in the City of Montreal.

*Hackney Carriages.*—For every Cab, Caleche, or other two-wheeled vehicle, \$5; for every four-wheeled carriage drawn by one horse, \$7; for every coach or four-wheeled carriage drawn by two horses, \$9; for every omnibus or stage coach, \$16.

*Carts, Trucks, Waggons and other Vehicles.*—The licenses for carts, trucks, and other vehicles used for the conveyance of goods, wares, merchandise, &c., shall be divided into three classes:

The first class shall include all carts, trucks, waggons and other vehicles running within the city for hire or reward not otherwise expressly provided for, and shall pay:—For every cart, truck, or other two-wheeled vehicle, \$2; for every waggon or four-wheeled vehicle drawn by one horse, \$6; for every waggon or four-wheeled vehicle drawn by two horses and made to carry a load under 4,000 lbs. weight, \$7; for every heavy waggon, float or other four wheeled vehicle drawn by two or more horses and made to carry heavy articles or materials weighing 4,000 lbs., or upwards, \$9; for every Diable, \$4.

The second class shall include all carts, waggons, or other vehicles used by merchants, traders, manufacturers or contractors, for the conveyance or delivery of the articles or effects dealt in, manufactured, or made use of by them, for each of which there shall be paid, in addition to the rates charged for in the first class, \$2.50.

The third class shall include all carts, waggons or other vehi-

cles used by expressmen, bakers, brewers, distillers, farmers or gardeners, for each of which there shall be paid, in addition to the rates charged for in the first class, \$5.

Parties obtaining licenses, as aforesaid, shall moreover pay the annual assessment on all working horses employed in drawing the above mentioned vehicles or carriages, at the rate of \$2.50 each, and also twenty-five cents for each number granted by the chief police.

Furniture or Luggage, per load, 20 cts. Lumber, green or hard, from rafts, 500 feet, board measure, 20 cts. Molasses, Sugar or Oil, one puncheon, hogshead or load, 20 cts. Pig Iron, Lead, Copper or Tin, one ton, 25 cts. Bar Iron or Steel, one ton, 30 cts.

For every additional  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile for above description of goods 10c.

And from any of the Harbour wharves to any place in the 2nd or 3rd division within  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile distance from the boundary line of the first division and *vice versa*, or from any place (exclusive of the wharves) to any other in the city and *vice versa*, provided the distance do not exceed  $1\frac{1}{2}$  mile,—instead of 15, 20, 25 and 30 cents, the rates shall be 25, 30, 35 and 40 cents.

*From any place in the Western Section of the First Division ;*

To the stores and wharves below Wellington bridge, north side of Lachine Canal, 20c. The stores and wharves below Wellington bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, 25c. The Basins above Wellington bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, 25c. The Basins above Wellington bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, and the Stores, Stations, &c., at Point St. Charles, 35c. The Factories, &c., at and above St. Gabriel Locks, north of Lachine Canal, 30c. The St. Bonaventure Street Railway Station, 20c. The St. Bonaventure Street Station, from the lower wharves of the Harbour, 25c. And *vice versa* for one load.

And from any place in the Eastern section of the 1st Division, instead of 20, 25, &c., the rates shall be 5 cents additional. For any excess over the weight fixed for a load, additional, *pro rata* rates shall be paid. If delay is caused to the carter, by the employer, beyond the usual time, the carter shall be paid *extra*, at the rate of 5 c. for every quarter of an hour. If a carter is called and there be no load ready for him, or if unable to load without assistance) he shall be paid as if he carried a load the distance thus unnecessarily travelled.

#### DIVISIONS REFERRED TO ABOVE.

The *First Division* shall comprise the East, Centre and West Wards, (including the south-west side of McGill street, and the north-west side of Craig street), and shall be subdivided into two sections, Eastern and Western, the line of demarcation between them being the centre of St. Lambert and St. Jean Baptiste streets.

The *Second Division* shall comprise St. Ann's, St. Antoine, and St. Lawrence Wards (exclusive of McGill and Craig streets).

The *Third Division* shall comprise the St. Louis Ward (exclusive of Craig street), the St. James and the St. Mary Wards.

### COURTS.

*County Court.*—Presided over by a resident Judge in each County. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed \$200; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant, or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant to \$400. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These courts also possess equity powers to the amount of \$200, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

*Court of Quarter Sessions.*—Chris. Armstrong, chairman. This court is held four times a year for trials by jury in cases of larceny, misdemeanor and other offences.

*Surrogate Courts.*—The jurisdiction of these courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Upper Canada, and all matters arising out of, or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Court.

*Law Circuits.*—The Circuits are held twice a year in each county; between Hilary and Easter Terms, and between Trinity and Michaelmas terms. Clerk of Assizes—Deputy Clerk of the Crown, *ex-officio*.

*Division Courts.*—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge, but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to action of debt or contract amounting to \$100, injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to \$40, but not to actions for gambling debts, liquor drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, &c., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, mali-

cious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P., for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in two months in each division or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge.
