CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

I.
The Society shall be called the **DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.**

II.
No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-Law, Rules or Regulations of the Society be repealed, annuled, or altered, except at a Meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese; which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said Meeting.

III.
No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Annual Meeting of the General Committee, or at the next previous Anniversary Meeting, of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at such previous Meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

IV.
No repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment, shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote, at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be en-

tered on the Minutes of the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

v.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds, shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same, a member of the Society. Provided that no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such Meeting.

vi.

OFFICERS.

1: The Officers of the Society shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President; and any Life Member may, at any Anniversary Meeting, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3: The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province, of any such Officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent Meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee, for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licenced by the Lord Bishop, and Subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound; to be annually elected, at the meetings of the General Committee, provided that no Annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected, unless he shall, during the year preceding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January, on the day next following the Annual Meeting, on the first Wednesday in March, on the first Wednesday in June, and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October.

4. Special Meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting; but so far as may be, alternately at Saint John and Fredericton.

VIII.

SCHEDULE COMMITTEE.

There shall also be a Schedule Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

1. The President, Treasurer and Secretary or Secretaries of the Society *ex officio*.

2. Three Clerical and five Lay Members of the Society, qualified for election as members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed member by two members of the General Committee.

3. The Schedule Committee shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule, and carrying the same into operation and effect; and

the appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society, as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any Resolution, Bye-Laws or Regulations of the General Committee.

4. Five members of the Schedule Committee, three of whom shall be Laymen, shall be a quorum.

5. The Schedule Committee shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer or Secretary of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

OBJECTS.

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other, viz.

1. Missionary Visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Mission.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships; and assistance, when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a Fund towards the augmentation of the stipends of Clergymen who are poor; and towards the education of the Children of such Clergymen, and towards the making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

10. The formation of a fund for receiving Money or Securities as Special Trusts.

11. Aid to Foreign Missions of the Church of England; with the understanding that subscriptions for this object may be limited to any organization in connection with the Church of England, but if not so limited, will be forwarded to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, for the general purposes of that Society.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

XI.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XII.

LOCAL COMMITTEE.

1. The members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall at the discretion of the Missionary of such Mission, constitute a Local Committee; and so also the members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop,) may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day, previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to depute two Lay Members of the Society, to be elected at the Annual Meetings of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

XIII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

XIV.

THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following members, viz.: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chairman, the Vice-Presidents of the Society; in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman from the Vice-Presidents present; and if none be present, from other members of the Committee; the Secretary or Secretaries, who shall also serve in that capacity at the meeting of the General Committee; the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish (provided that in the absence or sickness of the Rector of any Parish, the duly licensed Curate or Assistant Minister shall be considered *Pro hac vice* a member of the General Committee), and the Lay Deputies elected

by the Local Committees as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee to be the certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex officio* members of the General Committee.

3. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting to make the Annual appropriations of the funds of the Society; and a report of the proceedings of such meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

4. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows:

Firstly. Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

Secondly. Secretary's report to be read; and also a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly. Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly. Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

5. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meetings for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary Meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; and to determine by like vote, the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held. Provided that in every such case, a report of such adjournment, and the causes therefor, shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

XV.

The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons, in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion, for the general purposes of the Society.

of the Diocese. **REPORT.**

As each year comes round the position and claims of this Society press themselves more urgently upon the consideration of its members. Constituted as it is, with increasing interest and confidence on the part of the Church, this Society is fitted to be now, and in future years, a great instrument for the maintenance and extension of true religion in this Diocese.

It should, however, be most clearly understood and noticed, that in the yearly expenditure for Missionary services, the largest amount still comes from the S. P. G. For this—for what that venerable Society has done in past years, Churchmen in this Province cannot be sufficiently grateful. It must be well known by all who read these reports that this grant from England has, most properly, been largely reduced within a few years past; and it should be especially noticed that the amount at present received will, most likely, be subject to a large reduction after December, 1873. It will, therefore, be apparent that should any considerable diminution be made, unless largely increased offerings are made to this Society, or unless the amount paid in the several Parishes for the support of the clergymen is increased, consequences the most disastrous may be anticipated. That the stipends can be reduced is clearly impossible. The present average amount, by the most careful calculation, can scarcely include the necessaries of life, and the expenditure which is absolutely requisite. Upon this point the report of the Schedule Committee calls for most attentive consideration. During the past year this Committee have had long and frequent meetings, and have given careful attention to the difficult questions before them. It has been their design and object to continue and extend the Missions, to increase the amount of the stipends, and so to manage their work, as to relieve, if possible, the burden and anxiety of

the Missionaries. How much would it tend to the attainment of these objects, which every Churchman should have at heart, if only in the several Parishes greater efforts were made for the local support of the clergy, and the amounts required through the Schedule Committee voluntarily reduced.

It will be observed that the Treasurer's Account exhibits a balance in favor of the Society larger than usual. This unfortunately arises from the vacancy of certain Missions, and from the inability on the part of the Lord Bishop to procure the services of a travelling Missionary.

The usual abstracts which follow will show in some degree the work done by means of this Society during the past year. A statistical statement upon the returns of the past six months will also be published in this report. As the six months from January to June includes a portion of the year most difficult for Missionary work, these returns do not present the conditions of the Church as favorable as if they included the work of the full year.

ANDOVER, GRAND FALLS, &c.—Rev. Leo A. Hoyt reports an amount of contributions equal to those of last year, and has forwarded the following report, with reference to his vast mission:

"As the Society makes periodical calls for statistical information respecting missions, I shall lay before you some statistics which may be of use, but which can find no place in the regular list of questions.

"As my mission comprises fourteen Parishes, these statistics will occupy some space; but I shall endeavor to be as concise as possible.

"For my basis I shall take the census of 1871, preferring the search for those who call themselves churchmen to the denial of their existence.

"St. Francis, 51.—There have been many removals of Protestants from this Parish during the past year, so that at the present time there are but three church families, containing twenty people, living here. The distance from the Missionary's residence, ninety miles, prevents more than a yearly visit to this station.

"Madawaska, 32.—That the church people of this Parish are loyal is shown by the fact that at the Bishop's visit last summer twenty persons were present; four candidates presented themselves for confirmation, there were ten communicants, and the

offertory which was given to the D. C. S. amounted to ten dollars.

"Now that Edmundston has become a Shiretown, it is desirable, if it were possible, to have a more frequent service here than the present quarterly one, from the Missionary living at a distance of sixty miles.

"St. Basil.—Here there is not a single churchman, nor indeed is there any member of a sect except the Romanist.

"St. Leonards, 77.—The church people of this Parish are in general deeply attached to their church, and feel a great deprivation in being obliged to content themselves with a monthly Sunday service during the winter months only.

"I must mention here the decease of the widow of the late Colonel Coombes. The existence of the church in this Parish is owing, to a great extent, to the devotion and loyalty of this worthy pair.

"Grand Falls, 355.—This Parish had since been divided, placing about one hundred and fifty-five in the Parish of Drummond. The Parish of Grand Falls may be divided about equally into the congregations of All Saints and the Portage. At All Saints a service is held on alternate Sundays; at the Portage a monthly Sunday service is held during the summer.

"Gordon, 82.—I have been unable to visit this Parish.

"Perth, 57.—This Parish divides itself into two congregations; one at Smith's Ferry, where I have been enabled to hold but one service during the past year; and one at the River, where week day services have been held with tolerable regularity once a month.

"Andover, 288.—This Parish contains the congregations of Trinity and St. George's.

"Kent, 43.—With the exception of those in the lower portion of this parish, these are members of St. George's congregation in Andover.

"Wicklow, 192.—Of these a small portion are members of St. George's congregation in Andover, while the greater part belong to the Greenfield congregation, where a monthly Sunday service is held and a Church is being built.

"Simonds, 65.—Monthly services are held here on week-days. The church people are devoted and of a good type. Although few in number, they would do much towards the support of a clergyman in their midst.

"Peel, 36.—A little body of Church people living opposite Simonds.

"Wilmot, 160.—There was at one time a large church congregation in this Parish, but for ten years the services entirely ceased, and Methodist preachers visited the parishoners, who, by their professed love for the church, were tolerated by the parents and accepted by the families; so that Methodism is at present in the ascendancy. This, however, I believe only to be temporary, if more frequent and regular ministrations of a clergyman could be secured.

"Aberdeen, 123.—Here is capital material for a good church congregation; but this Parish has to content itself for the present with semi-occasional week-day services."

BURTON AND LINCOLN.—Rev. Richard Simonds reports contributions to the amount of \$104.98, and writes as follows:

"In making the collections I have found a very general readiness to contribute to the funds of the D. C. S., which is the more gratifying, as the members of the Church, in the Parish of Burton especially, have to contribute largely towards the stipend of the Missionary."

"I trust that the interest in our admirable organization, (the D. C. S.) may steadily increase, and also that the new arrangement by which Burton and Lincoln are made one Mission, and Mangerville and Canning another, may prove acceptable to all concerned, and conducive to the permanent welfare of the Church."

BATHURST.—Rev. L. B. McKiel has inclosed the following report:

"The usual amount of Missionary work has been done with corresponding results, which the enclosed returns show. More work cannot very well be done without additional assistance."

"We are attempting to build a new church in Bathurst, certainly not before we need it, and yet it is going to be a work of time, affording ample opportunity for the exercise of patience and perseverance on the part of the building Committee."

"A new site has been purchased in a central part of the town. The cellar for heating the building has been excavated, and walled up. Part of the stone for the foundation has been delivered on the ground, and there are three contracts for material in course of fulfilment."

"The plans by J. T. C. McKean of Saint John are the generous gift of the Bishop of the Diocese."

"The amount of Contributions from this Mission is not made up yet."

CAMBRIDGE, GRAND LAKE.—Rev. B. Shaw writes:—
"I enclose statistical returns from this Mission, and to those returns I have very little to add."

"I cannot promise any more than \$100, as subscriptions from the Mission. The people raise \$280 for the Rector's salary; give another \$100 as subscriptions for general purposes; \$10 more to S. P. G. and \$5.00 for Widows' and Orphans' fund; which makes a total of nearly \$400 in cash every year. More than this I do not think we are able to perform."

"I hope to resign Chipman and Canning into Mr. Sterling's charge after the Annual Meeting."

CAMBOBELLO.—The Society will regret to learn that the Rev. John Symes Williams has been suffering of late from impaired

eyesight, which has hindered him from the regular performance of his duties for some weeks past, and that he has resigned this interesting and important Mission. Mr. Williams wishes it understood, that it is his determination to resume his work in the Colonies as soon as circumstances will permit.

He reports a larger number of communicants than at any previous period, and a larger number at the early celebration on Easter Day last than on any such occasion before. During the past six months, and especially during the season of Lent, the services were more frequent than usual, and were well attended. The more general attendance of young men, and their reverence and attention, were specially noticed.

Since the last meeting of the Society, a considerable portion of valuable land, with a commodious house thereon, has been given in trust to the Lord Bishop, as a glebe and parsonage for the benefit of the Parish.

As a testimony of sympathy and affection, Mr. Williams has lately received a donation of over \$100 from his Parishouers and others.

The contributions amount to \$148.

CANTERBURY.—Rev. T. Martin reports contributions to the amount of \$38.

CARLETON, St. GEORGE.—Rev. T. E. Dowling is thankful to report an increased amount of contributions. It will not be less than \$50.

CHATHAM.—Rev. W. S. Neales has resigned the rectorship of this parish. For the restoration of his health he has been advised to take a sea voyage, and it is hoped he will soon be enabled to assume the charge of a neighbouring parish.

Mr. G. A. Blair, one of the Lay Delegates, reports contributions to the amount of \$230.21.

DERBY, NELSON AND BLACKVILLE.—The Rev. Wm. Cruden reports that the contributions from his Mission, although slightly less than those of last year, amount to \$92.00.

The Churches were closed for three Sundays, owing to a severe sickness, the effects of which prevented him attending to pastoral work. Affliction, when rightly viewed, teaches us that this is not our rest, but that "there remaineth a rest to the people of God."

FREDERICTON.—Rev. Canon Lee reports contributions to the amount of \$331.09.

From New Maryland the sum reported by the Rev. J. Pearson is \$39.54.

GRAND MANAN.—This Mission has been for some time vacant. The Rev. W. S. Covert has lately accepted the charge, and he writes as follows:

"My first impressions of Grand Manan, on visiting it in the early part of June of this year ('78) were of a very pleasing and lively character.

"The various industrial occupations of its inhabitants, the prompt manner in which Messrs. Newton and Daggett guaranteed the amount required by the D. C. S., the kindness and hospitality of all with whom I had to do, are I trust duly appreciated.

"If health and strength permit, I hope to enter upon my work there about mid July.

"I know I have your prayers, and the prayers of the Church generally, that the Divine Being may abundantly bless my labors"

GREENWICH AND WICKHAM.—Rev. D. W. Pickett reports \$80 as the contributions from this Mission.

GAGETOWN.—Rev. James Neales writes:

"A serious illness having enfeebled me a good deal this spring, the collection for the D. C. S. was most kindly undertaken by some young ladies of the congregation, and I thankfully forward the amount of subscriptions which they have taken the trouble to collect—\$80.50."

HAMPTON.—Rev. Canon Walker reports subscriptions and collections amounting to \$102.02.

KINGSTON.—Rev. W. E. Scovill writes as follows:

"There has been, but little variety in the regular duties performed by me and my curate at the three churches and two stations, except that we had more funeral services than usual, as one valued member of the church after another were taken from among us with impressive frequency. Of these there was one who had a more than local reputation; I mean that good man, the late Justice S. Wetmore of Ellston. Throughout his long and busy life he used his means and influence in doing good. An earnest Churchman, he was ready to take part in whatever he thought would advance the cause of religion and morality, and was from its first formation a steady supporter of this Society, and all our local charities. He rests from his labors, his works follow him, and being dead he yet speaketh.

"I cannot forbear mentioning that, while I have had to lament the loss of such members of my congregation, and of two of my own family, I have had substantial proof of the kindness and good-will of my Parishioners, who, in addition to other contributions, have given me a gratuity this year of one hundred dollars.

"I have not yet closed the subscription list, but it will not be less than \$180 for the general purposes of the Society."

LANCASTER.—Rev. W. S. Covert reports contributions amounting to \$89.41.

Mr. Covert writes that the regular work during the year has been to have three services every Sunday, with some omissions, owing to stormy weather and bad roads. He was also at a Station for some months past, and held an additional service on Wednesday evenings.

MAUGREVILLE.—Rev. G. H. Sterling reports the contributions to be \$41.25.

MONCTON.—Rev. William Walker reports \$105.08 as the contributions from this Parish.

NEWCASTLE AND GLENELG.—Rev. G. H. Sterling reports \$216.46 as the contributions from this Mission.

PETITCODIAC, SALISBURY, &C.—Rev. Cuthbert Willis writes: "I have now one Sunday service in the month at the village of Salisbury, and the services at Petitcodiac are consequently reduced to once a fortnight." The large and growing village of Salisbury was entirely without the ministrations of the church, and I found the people were very anxious for me to go there, and being offered the Methodist meeting house, I in duty bound accepted it.

"I have been blessed with an unusual measure of health, and consequently our services have been regularly held."

Mr. Willis incloses a list of the services at the church and stations of this extensive Mission.

Contributions for General purposes \$51.21, in addition to which sum \$20 were collected for the S. P. G. and for the Widows' and Orphans' fund.

PRINCE WILLIAM AND DUMFRIES.—Rev. E. A. W. Hanington has inclosed the following report:

"The work of every Priest in a small country mission like this has so much sameness that it is sometimes a task to write a report; but this year I have no lack of material, and only fear that I may be tediously lengthy.

"I will therefore record but a few leading points, among which may well stand first, a visit from our Father in God, for the work of Confirming. He was with us on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, Consecrating two burial grounds, and Confirming 47 (forty seven) persons. Among these were some children of nine and eleven years, and some aged people between seventy and eighty, all of whom are since regular and devout Communicants. This was about double the number I have ever presented to the Bishop for Confirmation in one year, and of these many were

adults who voluntarily applied to me for admission; there were also 9 adult baptisms immediately before and on the day of Confirmation.

"On Monday morning there was an early celebration for the newly Confirmed, at which a large number was present, some walking 3 miles to Church. Altogether the Bishop's visit was a source of much joy, and the Churches were greatly strengthened.

"Of the financial state of the Mission I cannot speak so hopefully as one would like

"During the last two years there has been a great "Exodus" from the Parishes by which we have lost about 75 people, many of them Communicants and supporters of the D. C. S. Indeed in collecting this year we lose names of those from whom we received last year over \$20, and no one comes to take their places

"And yet I am glad to be able to say that the amount subscribed is an increase on last year! The people never gave so willingly and heartily before!

"I attribute their improved willingness to give to Home Missions to the fact that they are sending between \$20 and \$40 yearly to Foreign Missions! Because they are doing a little of the work which Christ commanded us all especially to do, God puts it into their hearts to give more liberally for His work in their own midst.

"I am perfectly convinced that a very considerable work might be done by the Church of the Diocese for the conversion of the heathen, if we would but unite to form and support a Mission of our own, and in order to bring this subject more prominently before the Church I shall move (in Synod) for the appointment of a "Board of Foreign Missions" for the Diocese.

"I may add that the amounts offered for Foreign Missions in this Parish are chiefly free will offerings made at extra services or collected by the children.

"The number of services held in the Mission has been as large this year as usual. Baptisms have been more numerous, and many Communicants have been added to the list, yet there is of course, much to dishearten; the numerous removals hinder any very marked improvements in either the number of general Congregations or Communicants, and yet I daily feel that the work of the Church even here, is most important, for many of those now being instructed and cared for in remote Country places, will in twenty years be among the leading men and women of our centres of population.

"And (if you have patience still to read) I must add a few lines more.

"We are opening new work in new places. At St. Croix, McAdam, Harvey Station and other places. There is work for the Church—work we must do "now or never." I therefore ask the Society to make a grant for a new mission in the remote

parts of my field. It may be that even after the grant is made a "man" cannot be found, but all we ask is for the *Conditional grant*.

"This is the first application ever made by the Mission since my work began there, and I pray God we may not be met by a cold refusal or an equally cold putting off.

"Sensible of my great unfitness for God's work, and the little done in comparison with the much to be done, I am yet thankful for the past and hopeful for the future."

QUEENSBURY.—Rev. A. H. Weeks reports contributions to the amount of \$78.00, and he has inclosed the following report:

"On 1st of June I had been in this Parish, Queensbury, something more than 4 months, having arrived here on 19th of January 1873. This return is therefore for that time.

"The Parish is called Queensbury. I officiate also regularly in the adjoining Parish of Southampton. The Mission is returned by late Rector as unitedly containing an area of about 200 square miles with a Church population of 150 souls. There are 3 Churches and 5 stations in Queensbury; there is a farm of about 200 acres, on which there is a parsonage. The late Rector valued it at about \$112 per annum. I have not received any benefit from it yet, and cannot say whether the value will be greater or less.

"The Sunday Schools have not been fully organized yet."

RICHIBUCTO.—Rev. N. A. Coster reports contributions to the amount of \$56.34. Mr. Coster writes:

"That we do not raise as much as last year is not from any unwillingness to support the Society, but from a feeling on the part of some of my flock, who never withheld their aid, that they should give this year to our new Sunday School building which is licensed and used for public worship."

RICHMOND.—Rev. W. Henry Street reports contributions to the amount of \$75, and has enclosed the following report:

"While I am happy to report (notwithstanding the present scarcity of money) the amount of contributions from this Mission to the Church Society as not less than those of last year, I have personally suffered much inconvenience owing to the difficulty experienced by my mission, in meeting the quarterly payments required towards the Missionary's stipend; nor can I, under the present conditions, see any prospect of improvement.

"What with the emigration of several members of the Church and the loss of Railway communication, financial matters here have been of late on the decline.

"Comparing therefore these difficulties, and the many local expenses incurred within the last few years with the slender resources of what is comparatively a new Mission, one cannot but feel that the calls upon the Parish are greater than such a comparison would seem to warrant.

"I have lately endeavoured to impress upon my people the

advantage of the weekly offertory as the proper and only satisfactory mode of meeting the required payments towards the clergymen's stipend, and I do trust that it may be generally adopted, and that the most objectionable subscription list will be banished forever from our midst.

"The congregation at St. John's Church has during the year been most encouraging, and especially comforting was the attendance at the House of God during the holy season of Lent. I have indeed cause for much thankfulness in noticing the growing zeal in the observance of the Fasts and Festivals of our beloved Church. God grant that through these outward and visible means we may grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."

ROTHESAY.—Rev. F. Partridge reports:

"The work of the church is steadily progressing in this Parish. Great interest is taken by all the Parishioners in the well-being of all the working organizations. Alterations of a very satisfactory character have been made in Saint Luke's Church, which have increased the facilities for the decent and orderly performance of Divine Worship. Negotiations are nearly completed for the purchase of the Presbyterian Kirk in Rothesay proper, for use by the congregation worshipping there. This will make the third church supplied every Sunday in the Parish. The Rector acknowledges the great kindness and consideration he has received from his parishioners, and expresses his conviction that the Church in this Parish will by the grace of God flourish and increase more and more.

"Contributions are not less than \$150, which would have been more but for the claims on the Parishioners for the finishing and improvement of the Rectory house and grounds."

SACKVILLE AND DORCHESTER.—Rev. G. G. Roberts writes as follows:

"I have little of interest to add to my statistical Reports for the two past half years. The work of the Church, has, I trust, by God's blessing, been steadily though quietly progressing. I shall be able to send you about \$200 for the general purposes of the D. C. S., and if I can make it more within the next fortnight I will certainly do so. Violent storms and drifted roads during a considerable part of the winter made the work of this large Parish unusually trying, and resulted in my being laid up for about three weeks. Thanks however to the kind assistance of Mr. David Forsythe, my people were only deprived of Divine Service for a single Sunday. I was able to have only thirteen weekday services during Lent, but these were fairly attended. I have baptised two adults recently, and at least six more are preparing to receive that Holy Sacrament before the Confirmation in September next.

"I have again the pleasure of recording a friendly visit from a number of my parishioners, similar to that with which the

Parsonage was gladdened last year. This time our guests came all the way from Debechester, and presented me with a parcel of \$100 besides a liberal supply of turkeys, ham and other substantial articles. Several of our Asheville friends have privately shown their kindly feelings in a similar way, and our neighbors have as usual hauled our annual supply of wood, about thirty loads. Such things are a great gratification and encouragement, as well as assistance to a clergyman; and one or two energetic Churchmen in each Parish of the Diocese might easily secure for their pastor, a voluntary supplement to his scanty stipend, either in such ways as these, or better still perhaps, through a special Christmas or Easter Offertory.

St. ANDREWS AND CHAMCOOK.—Mr. Geo. D. Street reports contributions from St. Andrews, \$219.98; Chamcook, \$20.56; \$250.54.

Taking into account a thank-offering last year of \$50, the contributions this year exceed the usual amount. Offerings to the amount of \$29 have been forwarded for the Treasurer in aid of the Missions of the S. P. C.

St. DAVID AND St. PATRICK.—Rev. D. Nickerson in forwarding the returns from this Parish writes thus:

"I trust to record next year a larger number of baptisms. The half year ending the 6th of June is the one in which the least work is done, owing to the difficulty of travelling the latter part of the winter and in the spring months.

"The Sunday School is going well, and I am teaching the children to respond and to sing.

"A collection has lately been taken up for the W. and O. Fund, but none as yet for the Society. We are straining every nerve to build the parsonage. The cellar wall is being built, and we hope to be in the house by the end of September.

"The Holy Communion is celebrated monthly, and the offertory has been changed from a monthly to a weekly one. The same amount is contributed now once a week which was formerly given monthly. The Envelope System for the payment of the Rector's salary has also been introduced. The congregation, I am told, are increasing, and under God's blessing, I hope the work of His Church will prosper here."

Contributions will amount to \$40 or \$50.

St. GEORGE AND PENNFIELD.—Rev. R. E. Smith writes as follows:

"The duties and services in my mission during the past year have been much the same as formerly.

"The Rectory has been papered and painted very handsomely; the hall being done by a liberal parishioner, Samuel Johnson.

"Notices for tenders for adding a Chancel to Christ's Church, Pennfield, have been issued, and it is our intention, D. V., to

finish the improvements and repairs in this Church during this summer. A very handsome pulpit and neat reading desk, made by Mr. Raymond of Woodstock, the generous gift of His Lordship the Bishop, have already been received, together with other furniture for the chancel. The congregations in both churches are very good. The contributions to the D. C. S. amount to \$178.49.

ST. PAUL'S, PORTLAND.—Rev. Canon De Vester reports \$767.80 as the amount of the contributions from this Parish.

SHEDDIAK.—Rev. G. S. Jarvis, D. D., reports a small addition to the contributions from this Parish, and several new subscribers. He adds "our population is thinned by the facilities for work in the neighboring parishes, on account of railway operations. The whole amount of contributions is \$61.12. For the S. P. G. Missions \$8.24.

ST. JAMES (St. John).—Rev. W. Armstrong reports \$200 as the amount of contributions, to which a further sum may be added.

ST. MARK.—Mr. T. B. Hanington reports an increased amount of contributions from this Parish, viz.—\$411.70.

ST. MARY'S AND STANLEY.—Rev. W. James; the missionary at St. Mary's and Stanley states that the outward and visible signs of prosperity within his mission are quite satisfactory. He reports fifty-two baptisms, fifty per cent. more than usual; number confirmed forty-two, more than double that of other years; Communicants fifty-three, fifty per cent. more than reported last year. He also adds that the amount subscribed for various religious purposes, exceeds that of former years; while the increase of church people, as appears by the last census returns, has been, in St. Mary's, seven and one-half per cent., and in Stanley, forty-seven and one-half per cent.

The missionary asks for a grant of \$300, upon condition that the mission raise \$100, towards the support of an assistant clergyman, who can devote a portion of his time, as a travelling missionary in other parts of the Deanery, or Province, if necessary.

\$83.35 have been contributed to the Society by this Mission.

SIMONDS.—Rev. G. Schofield writes as follows: "I do not know that there is anything remarkable to report in respect to this Parish. We have indeed lost many of our young people, who have been attracted to St. John by the high wages paid there for all kinds of labour. The land in this

Parish is very poor, and little fitted to encourage agricultural operations. At Moose Path, however, we are preparing to build a new Church, after a model kindly supplied by the Bishop. I hope it will be built and paid for before the end of this year. The number of deaths, chiefly among children has been large, amounting to twenty during the year. The number of baptisms is also large, being thirty-eight. I have travelled on duty about 8,000 miles. Our contributions to the S. P. G. are \$44.10.

"We have had to spend about \$70 in repairing the church at Loch Lomond, and on this account our contributions to the D. C. S. are less than they otherwise would have been."

The contributions amount to \$100.

SPRINGFIELD AND JOHNSTON.—Rev. G. Rogers reports contributions to the amount of \$76.56.

SUSSEX AND STUDHOLM.—Rev. Canon Medley has enclosed the following report, dated June 24, 1873:

"For the last six months we have had more sickness than in any one year since I have been in Sussex. Many of these cases have of late been fourteen, sixteen and eighteen miles from my house, and consequently much of my time has been spent on the road. We are also again engaged in church building, which necessarily takes some of my time. As every-one knows the vexed question as to the site of the new church has been settled by Act of the Local Legislature, and although it could not be expected that such a settlement would please everybody, I think I am safe in saying that the majority of Parishioners who attend the services of the Church are perfectly satisfied with the decision. We hope the work will go on smoothly, and the Church be enclosed by the autumn; and as we shall have a hard matter to complete it without aid from those outside, I venture to solicit help from the Church Society."

The new Church at Studholm is in every way most satisfactory; the congregations are increasing, and the amount realized by the offertory is more than three times what it used to be in the old Church. During the past year some alterations have been made in the Church at Dutch Valley, which the Bishop, who paid it a visit last Sunday, pronounced a great improvement. The pastoral work in this part of the Mission is increasing every month, and is indeed quite beyond the control and supervision of one man, and it is much to be wished that a Curate might be found to assist me in this work or that the Church Society should make a separate Mission by taking this part of my Mission in conjunction with Loudonderry. Settlement in the Mission of Upham and Quaco.

"With the help of Mr. Forsythe, now a Deacon, a Station has been opened with much promise, about seven miles from Sussex, on the road to Upham, where a large and attentive congrega-

gation have attended the services of the Church in a School House for the last ten months. There are many Church families in this direction who only want looking after to insure themselves permanent members of the Church, but I feel quite inferior to this work, alone, as I cannot be too thick for the help Mr. Forsythe has given me at this Station, and indeed throughout the whole Mission. Our Sunday School is now again in working order and the attendance is good, many of the ladies and gentlemen joining in taking the burden off my shoulders, as I am unable with three services every Sunday to undertake the superintendence of them, and I hope in a few weeks another School will be opened with a probable attendance of thirty scholars.

Contributions amount to \$200. St. STEPHEN, CHRIST CHURCH. — Rev. J. Rushton has forwarded the statistical returns for this Parish. Owing to pressing local calls for Church purposes there have been as yet no contributions made to the Society. Mr. Rushton trusts that he will be able to forward an amount to the Treasurer in time for the printing of the Report.

St. STEPHEN, TRINITY CHURCH. — Rev. Foster Almond reports contributions from this Parish to be \$20. St. JOHN. — Mr. A. Lawrence Sturdee reports contributions amounting to \$320.

St. JAMES. — Rev. St. Jones Hanford writes as follows: "Having been compelled last winter, in consequence of failing health, to give up the work of the Mission, I went away, under medical advice, for a few weeks, in hopes that rest and the change would, under the Divine Blessing, be beneficial; and am thankful to be able to report that having returned early in May, I have since been enabled gradually to take up my work again, or at least some portion of it, and am hopeful that, in God's good Providence, I shall be able to keep at my post."

After this week I hope, Dav. to go on with the collections; so as to have my returns forwarded in time for the Annual Report.

St. JAMES. — Rev. B. S. Woodman reports contributions to the amount of \$90.

St. WASHINGTON. — Rev. D. M. Bliss trusts that the amount of the contributions will be as great as could be wished for from this Parish. There is still a difficulty with reference to the site of the new Church, and the prospect of its being built is not very encouraging. Several adults are under preparation for baptism.

" My time during the last year has been pretty fully occupied in the ordinary routine of parish work.

" The principal event of interest with us has been the visit of His Lordship, the Bishop in September, on which occasion he administered the holy rite of confirmation to thirty-two candidates.

" Our contributions I fear will not amount to as much as last year, owing to various causes, the chief being the general depression of business and want of money, and the absence and removal of some of the most liberal supporters of the Diocesan Church Society, and the Church.

" We live in hopes that ere long the way may be opened for another clergyman to be stationed at or near Woodstock, as the claims upon the Church are continually becoming more pressing, throughout the whole County of Carleton, on both sides of the River St. John. Truly "the fields are white already to harvest." Since last year I have made a change in my list of services, giving a monthly Sunday service at Jacksontown, and having the Litany and public catechising of the Sunday School children, at St. Luke's church on every Sunday on which I have no service in the afternoon.

Contributions amount to \$297.35.

From the foregoing reports some idea may be formed of the labour performed in this Diocese for Christ and for His Church, and also the amount of offerings in support of this blessed object. This amount it must unquestionably be admitted, is far less than it ought to be, and even less than that of last year.

These offerings might, and they ought to be, largely increased, if not *doubled*. From many parishes which give largely for the local support of the clergy, the contributions to this Society are most generous. But from how many churchmen who give nothing might subscriptions be obtained; from how many might what is now given be doubled—without any hindrance or self-sacrifice!

This would most certainly be done if only those who are the creatures of His bounty would ask of God for His Spirit, to enable them to do as He has plainly commanded. In His hallowed name this Society asks not only for the offerings of the members of the church, but for their zeal, their prayers, their active service, and the devotion of the best of their sons for the work of the Ministry.

By these means the missionary posts now vacant would be filled; many a clergyman now over-burdened with work would be spared in health and strength; destitute places, where are so many sheep not having a shepherd, would be made glad, and in answer to the prayers of faith, accompanied by the works of faith, the labour this Society has in hand would go on prospering, while a blessing, which will be only known of throughout eternity, would rest upon its members.

From the foregoing reports some idea may be formed of the labour performed in this Society for Christ and for His Church, and also the amount of offerings in support of this blessed object. This amount it must unquestionably be admitted is far less than it ought to be, and even less than that of last year.

These offerings, might, and they ought to be, largely increased, if not doubled. AUDITOR'S REPORT.

Report of the Auditor on the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocesan Church for the year ending 30th April, 1878.

- No. 1 is the account of receipts and payments on the general purposes of the Society, embracing missionaries salaries, pensions, salaries of officers and contingencies. Total payments, \$26,921.55. The receipts from collections, payments of Parishes, interest, S. P. G. grant, and including last year's balance, were \$28,088.95, leaving balance in Treasurer's hands - \$1117.40.
- No. 2 is a statement of investments and interest receipts.
- No. 3 is an account of payments by Parishes of the portion of missionaries salaries required to be paid by the several missions. Balance in Treasurer's hands on the account, - 83.00
- No. 4 is a statement of the receipts and payments on account of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund. Balance in Treasurer's hands on this account, 652.12
- No. 5 is the account of the fund for Education and aged clergy. Balance of this fund in Treasurer's hands, 461.79
- No. 6 is the account of the Divinity Scholarship fund. Balance at credit this fund, 117.34
- No. 7 is a statement of the fund for the Endowment of Parishes. This fund is now closed by the payment of principal and interest as ordered at the last meeting of the Society.
- No. 8 is a statement of the account of the former Treasurer of the Society. Payments on account of this debt have been carried to the credit of interest, and in reduction of the principal, now reduced to \$1,505.57.
- No. 9 is a statement of receipts and payments affecting the permanent investments of the Society. The balance in the Treasurer's hands in this account is 509.07
- No. 10 is an account of moneys received, and transmitted to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. Balance in Treasurer's hands to be remitted to said Society; 181.35
- No. 11 shows receipts of interest and payment thereof on account Richibucto Trust. Balance in Treasurer's hands on this account, 10.00

No. 12 is a statement of Cash Balances, showing the total amount of cash in the Treasurer's hands, - \$3082.07 corresponding with the detailed statement above. Account No. 13 exhibits the present assets of the Society for all purposes, \$26,407.64.

The above accounts have been examined, compared with the vouchers and last years' balances, and the Auditors beg to report the same correct.

The Auditors recommend that \$1,000 of the present amount in hand be invested, or a larger sum, if the Treasurer will have sufficient remaining in his hands for current demands.

Of any amount that may be invested, \$500 should be to the credit of W. and O. Fund; \$400 to the credit of Education and Aged Clergy Fund, and \$100 to Divinity Scholarship Fund.

Rev. J. Pearson, from the Committee appointed last July with reference to the "Aged Clergy Fund," presented a report, which he read; on motion of the Rev. W. E. Scovill, it was resolved that the same be received, and printed in the Annual Report.

REPORT.

The Committee appointed at the last annual meeting of the General Committee of the Church Society, to inquire into and report upon the provision for those clergymen who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, have the honour to state that they have examined former Reports of the Church Society, and find that until the year 1852 various sums of money were appropriated from the general income to carry out the seventh object of the Society, which then included the Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund; that in the year 1852 it was re-

solved that the present seventh object fund and the Widows' and Orphans' Fund should be separated; and that afterwards, in the year 1858, the sum of £350.14.11 was set apart for the present seventh object: since which time this sum has increased chiefly by the addition of the yearly interest until it now amounts to \$3,801.79.

The present seventh object of the Society includes the augmentation of the stipends of clergymen who are poor, and the education of their children, as well as a provision for those clergymen who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity; but as the first of these demands is met by the usual annual appropriation of the Society's general funds, and as for a number of years no request has been made for assistance in the matter of education, your Committee recommend that \$3,000 of the present seventh object fund be at once appropriated as a special fund for those clergymen who may be incapacitated, reserving the balance as the nucleus of a separate fund for educational purposes, according to the seventh object of the Diocesan Church Society.

The Committee are authorized to state that the Lord Bishop of the Diocese is prepared to make over to the Funds for those clergymen who may be incapacitated, the sum of \$1,000, being the balance of a bequest made by the late Rev. W. Dowdney for the benefit of the Diocese, and left at the Bishop's disposal.

The Committee have also made inquiries respecting the management of similar funds in the other dioceses of Canada, and have learnt that widely different rules exist. From these rules they have selected such as, in their opinion, are best suited for the circumstances of this Diocese; and these, with the addition of others, they now submit to the General Committee, and respectfully request that the same may be printed in an appendix to the Report of the Diocesan Church Society for the present year.

Rules of the "Fund for a Provision for Clergymen who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity."

1. The Fund for the assistance of clergymen who are incapacitated by age or infirmity shall consist of the capital sum of \$3,000, being the amount now specially appropriated from the Fund belonging to the seventh object of the Church Society, of all accumulations of interest, of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions, given to the Society for this special object; and the interest of this fund shall be applied solely to the relief of disabled clergymen of the present diocese of Fredericton.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Loan Committee, invest every hundred pounds of surplus money, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society.

4. Any clergyman duly appointed as rector, missionary, or assistant curate, in the Diocese of Fredericton, not being entitled to a pension from any Fund or Society in England, and being unable to discharge the duties of his office, through mental or bodily infirmity, and wishing to participate in the benefits of this Fund, shall make application in writing to the Executive Committee, who shall determine each case on its own merits, and shall have power to grant such amount of yearly pension, not exceeding \$200, as they shall see fit. The applicant shall also state the annual value of any private property of which he may be possessed, or which is directly or indirectly available for his benefit; and in all cases an application for a pension shall be accompanied by a recommendation from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

5. Should the Executive Committee refuse to entertain the application, an appeal may be made by the applicant to the General Committee.

6. In the event of any application being favorably considered, a pension shall be granted only on condition of the applicant first resigning his cure, with all its emoluments.

7. If at any time there should be more demands upon the Fund than its income will meet, the Executive Committee may revise the whole of the pensions according to their judgment.

8. If any pensioner shall be so far relieved from his disability as to resume any clerical duty for which he receives any settled stipend, the pension shall cease as long as he continues to discharge such duty.

9. No Clergyman shall receive any benefit from this Fund, unless he shall have served at least seven consecutive years in the Diocese of Fredericton.

10. If any pensioner reside out of this Diocese, sufficient proof of his identity and continued disability shall accompany each draft for his pension.

11. The pensions shall be paid half yearly in advance on the first day of January and the first day of July in each year, and shall commence on the first of those days which shall happen after the pension is granted, and terminate on the first of those days which shall happen after the death of the pensioner, or any other event by which such pension is to cease.

12. The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

Rev. J. Pearson gave notice that he, or some one for him will, at the next annual meeting of the General Committee, propose that the rules now submitted for the management of the fund for those "clergymen who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity," be adopted.

Mr. G. A. Schofield, from the Schedule Committee presented a report, which he read, and on motion of the Rev. Canon Scovil it was resolved that the report be received and referred to the Schedule Committee to be appointed this evening.

REPORT OF THE SCHEDULE COMMITTEE:

The Schedule Committee beg leave to submit the following Report :

The different Missions and Parishes have all paid the amounts required according to the Schedule which was passed by the General Committee in July last, with the exception of the Parish of Westmorland. Upon the urgent request of the Wardens, and with the consent of the Rector, the amount required from this Parish was reduced to \$120—the grant in aid being at the same time reduced to \$130. The engagement upon these terms made only for the present year, has been fulfilled.

During the past year the following changes have been made in the Diocese : The Rev. D. Nickerson has been appointed Rector of St. David and St. Patrick, in the place of the Rev. J. S. Thomson, who has left the Diocese. The Rev. A. H. Weeks, formerly missionary at Buctouche, has been appointed to Queensbury, which had been left vacant by the resignation of the Rev. W. H. Tippet. The Rev. C. R. Matthew, missionary at Petersville, has resigned his cure, and the Rev. J. P. Sheraton has been appointed to the mission. The Rev. J. F. Carr, formerly curate to the Rector of S. Marks, has been appointed Rector of Kingsclear. The Rev. R. Simonds has taken charge of the Mission of Burton and Ruslagornis, which is now separated from Mauger-ville. To the latter has been added the Parish of Newcastle, and the Rev. G. H. Sterling has been invited by the Parishioners to take the spiritual charge. In all these Missions the grants and conditions attached remain as ordered by the General Committee, except

only in the case of Mougerville and Burton. To Mougerville and Newcastle a grant has been made of \$300 on condition of Mougerville contributing \$300 and Newcastle \$100, and to Burton and Ruslingornis a grant of \$300 on condition of a like contribution by the Mission.

Your Committee regret to say that four Missions in the Diocese are vacant, viz., Buctouche, Albert, *Grand Manan, Newcastle (after the removal of Rev. Mr. Sterling.)

They are also sorry to have to report that no person has been found to serve as travelling Missionary in the Diocese. They are fully convinced that much good might be done by such an agency, and earnestly hope that some one will be induced to undertake the work before long. During the year, notice of suspension of stipend has been sent to eleven Parishes, all of which have since fulfilled their engagements.

Your Committee recommend that Bye-Law 4, Section B and C, be amended so as to require the engagements before 17th August; in case of failure, the stipend to cease on 1st October. Finding that the Treasurer's account shows a surplus above the expenditure, although arising principally from the fact that many Missions have been vacant during part of the year, your Committee, in the Schedule which they recommend for next year have endeavoured to increase the stipends in such manner as to bring them upon a more equal footing. This result, though much to be desired, is hard to be accomplished on account of the varied and sometimes fluctuating resources of the Missions. It is hoped that wherever it is required, the Mission will make increased exertions to bring the Church nearer to its position as a self-supporting Church.

In this connection your Committee deem it their duty to call attention to the fact that a reduction in the grant from the S. P. G. will be made in a very short time. It will, therefore, be absolutely necessary for every

*Grand Manan—This Mission will shortly be supplied by the removal there of the Rev. W. S. Covert from Lancaster, which will then be left vacant.

Mission and Parish to make greater efforts, or the present services cannot be maintained. Some Missions, while contributing the amount required in aid of the Missionary stipend, have fallen short in their contributions to the general fund of the D. C. S. Should this continue, the Society will be compelled, at no very distant day, to withdraw or reduce the grants now made to such Mission. The Schedule recommended for next year, and the returns, correspondence, and minutes of business transacted by your Committee during the past year accompany this Report.

The following letter was received by the Lord Bishop after the late meetings of the Society. It is now printed at the request of his Lordship and the Schedule Committee :—

SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL IN FOREIGN PARTS.

20 Duke Street, Westminster, S. W.,

30th June, 1873.

MY DEAR LORD :

1. I have the pleasure of announcing the amount of assistance which the Society can promise for the year 1874. The terms of the Society's resolutions are :
(6.) That the sum of £2,325 be granted for the Diocese of Fredericton, in the year ending 31st December, 1874, to be administered by the Bishop and Committee, in accordance with the Society's Bye-Laws and Regula-

tions: that this grant be also charged with any claims for pensions which may arise in the year and be admitted by the Society; with any expense for the passage of missionaries from this country to Fredericton, which may be incurred here in accordance with the Regulations; and with any other expense strictly appropriate to the Diocese and sanctioned by the Society.

That the pensions of Mrs. Arnold and Mrs. Milner (together amounting to £100) be paid in 1874, as heretofore.

That the sum of £120 be granted for six *Divinity Exhibitions* at King's College in 1874; three of £25 each, and three of £15 each.

2. Last year the Society made an appeal to the Christian sympathy of all our friends and fellow-labourers in foreign parts, by proposing that "*in every Christian congregation which derives help from the Society an annual collection should be made to assist the Society in its missionary work among the heathen in India.*"

I am instructed to express a hope that the Society may receive some token of sympathy in missionary work, if not from every congregation in your diocese, at least from those who are assisted by the Society. I would further ask you to let us hear before the end of this year what reception the proposal meets with in your diocese. We trust that by stirring up the zeal of many hearts in this cause, the progress of missions throughout the world may, by God's blessing, be accelerated.

3. The Day of Intercession, December 20th, which unite us all together in common prayer, has had one happy result in awakening a desire for increased opportunities of communication with Christian friends from abroad on subjects of common interest. We shall be much obliged to you, if you will make known through Church newspapers, or in any other way, the wish expressed in the following resolutions of the Society, and if you will commend the second of them to the attention of Churchmen in your diocese:

"(1.) *Resolved*, That the Society takes occasion to express its desire to enter into more friendly and sys-

tematic communication with members of the Church in foreign parts on the occasion of their visiting England.

“(2.) That a Visitor's book be opened at 20 Duke street, Westminster, to which clergymen and laymen of the Church coming from abroad should be invited to send their names and addresses, and the period for which they stay.

“(3.) That communication be opened with the Colonial and American Bishops, and the Corresponding Committees of the Society abroad, requesting them to make known the desire of the Society to Churchmen on the occasion of their visiting England, with a view to their names being recorded in the proposed book.

“(4.) That the book be open to the inspection of members of the Society and other persons interested in the welfare of the Church in foreign parts, in the hope of promoting the intercommunion of members of the Church at home and abroad by mutual conference and friendly and hospitable meetings.

“(5.) That members of the Society resident in or near London, and wishing to cultivate acquaintance with members of the Church abroad, be invited to communicate to the Secretary the times and occasions when it would suit them to receive visitors.”
