The "zone system," familiar in Europe, is becoming better understood in this country and is likely to have a widening application. It first became known in 1889 in its application DEBT-PAYING DAY AMONG B. C. to railroad fares in Hungary, and is practically the system used by many electric traction companies in this

GUELPH, Sept. 18.—(Can. Press.) -The harmony and good will which has prevailed at the sessions of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress was rudely disturbed shortly before noon today.

The resolution of Delegate Rolls of Hamilton, that the congress confine itself to legislative matters and discontinue spending its members' money on organizers precipitated a discussion which threatened at times to become

Magnus Sinclair of Toronto denound ed the proposition as the product of a "disgruntled imagination." Delegate Arcand of Montreal, on the other hand, vigorously opposed the work of the organizers who had spent their money to help the Amalgamated Carpenters, "the worst enemies the United Brother-

James Simpson made a vigorous fence of the organizers. They had done much to consolidate the laborers and make the Trades and Labor Congress the representative body it was Warm Words.

At noon the debate was getting hot-ter when Alphonse Verville, M.P., moved the adjournment of the debate but the delegates were determined to finish the fight while they were hot and carried a motion to continue in session till the question was disposed of. A few minutes later a motion was sprung calling for the previous question. Immediately a dozen more were on their feet demanding to be heard. One delegate accused a member of applying "steam roller" methods. The retort was "I would rather be a steam roller

than a gas pipe." Delegate O'Dell of Hamilton remained on his feet and made a determined effort to speak thru a fusillade of cries






