HOTEL "QUINTE" BURNS TO EARTH

Fine Belleville Hostelry Destroyed by Fire Last Night—Loss Will Be Over \$60,000.

Belleville, Jan. 5.—(Special.)—The Quinte, said to be the best hotel between Montreal and Toronto, was completely destroyed by fire, which broke out about 10 o'clock last (Friday) night.

In the early hours of this morning the town firemen succeeded in getting the flames under control, but only the walls of the substantial brick structure, which cost \$100,000 to build, are left standing.

There were few guests stopping at the hotel, as there are few commercial travelers on the road at this season of the year. The Quinte was almost deserted at the time the fire started, the guests and most of the staff being at a hockey match.

Regret is expressed on all sides, for of Belleville's best gathering place of all, the Quinte, was lost, and was admirably kept.



FOR POLAND'S FREEDOM.

National League's Objects Are Militant to Threatening Degree.

Breslau, Silesia, Prussia, Jan. 4.—The articles of association of the Polish National League describe the aim of the league as being "to unite all the national resources for the restoration of the independence of Poland."

The central committee of the league is bound to support any revolutionary action tending to change or destroy the government.

Article 10 reads: "In case of war between the powers that took part in the dismemberment of Poland, the league's principal care must be to secure for Poland at the critical moment an important position and therefore the central committee must prepare plans for a military and an administrative organization. The committee must collect accurate information concerning the amount of money in the country available in the event of war, and also must arrange a military intelligence system, to obtain information regarding the movements of equipment, mobilization, quarters and transportation of troops, the plans of fortresses and magazines, and all technical secrets."

WOULD DISPOSSESS 3000.

Massachusetts Lawyer Lays Claim to Big Section of Chicago.

Chicago, Jan. 4.—On six United States deputy marshals was placed yesterday the responsibility of serving on 3000 defendants notices of ejectment in a suit recently filed in the United States circuit court by Sydney Smith of Cambridge, Mass., who seeks to possess himself of south side property valued at approximately \$400,000.

Mr. Smith claims absolute title to all the land bounded by Thirty-fifth street on the north side to Thirty-ninth street on the south, and from Grand Boulevard on the west to Cottage Grove avenue and Thirty-ninth street on the east.

Mr. Smith's claim is based on the assertion that an ancestor settled on the land in 1848.

Sydney Smith is a well-known lawyer, residing at Cambridge, Mass. He is about 70 years of age.

LABOR-MARKET IN FRISCO.

Ordinary Workmen Wanted—Big Buildings Going Up.

San Francisco, Jan. 4.—The labor situation in San Francisco is becoming normal conditions. There is still a demand for ordinary laborers, especially for the construction of big buildings. The market is becoming more active, and hopes to distribute thousands of such souvenirs among visitors to the city.

Construction work is now going on in fifty steel and frame buildings, ranging from five to sixteen stories in height within the city limits. The market, which was the centre of the retail district, and of the fire.

MONTREAL'S FEVER EPIDEMIC.

Thousands Cases of Typhoid—Well-Known Doctor a Victim.

Montreal, Jan. 4.—The civic medical authorities estimate that there are nearly a thousand cases of typhoid fever in this city and suburbs at the present time.

The suburbs are in the worst position owing to the contamination of the water with which they are supplied. The city water is taken from the St. Lawrence higher up, and is better.

Dr. John D. Cameron, one of the best known of the city's generation of medical men in Montreal, died today, a victim of typhoid fever. He was 38 years of age and a graduate of McGill.

NEW YORK POLICE SYSTEM.

Addition of 1400 Men and New Detective Staff Wanted.

New York, Jan. 4.—An increase of 1400 men, a radical reorganization of the detective bureau, which he describes as "seriously defective," and complete divorce of the police department from all election work, are recommended by Police Commissioner Bingham in his annual report, made public today.

The department now has 8817 men available for active duty.

THE VALUE OF COMPETITION.

Boston, Jan. 4.—A bill to prevent all unfair commercial discrimination and competition, which is understood to be directed against the Standard Oil Company, was filed in the house today.

The Standard Oil Company retails its product in Boston and other places, where it controls the trade, at from 14c to 18c a gallon, while in other parts of the state where it is in competition with an independent company it sells the same oil at 10c a gallon.

CONSERVATIVE NOMINEES.

Vancouver, B.C., Jan. 4.—Hon. R. G. Tait, Dr. McGuire and W. A. Bowser were nominated at the Conservative convention last night.

20,000 OF STRIKE IN MEXICO.

Mexico City, Jan. 4.—It is estimated that 20,000 operatives in the oil refineries on the Pacific are on strike. Their grievances will be arbitrated. They demand higher salaries.

Oregon Train Wrecked.

Conestock, Ore., Jan. 4.—The north-bound Portland express, the fast passenger train on the Southern Pacific Railroad between San Francisco and Portland, was wrecked last night, two miles north of here. The engineer was killed and the fireman is missing. The accident occurred on a recently-filled trestle which had been undermined by rains.

Lumbering in New Brunswick.

Bangor, Maine, Jan. 4.—Reports received here indicate that excellent lumbering conditions have prevailed along the upper St. John River and its tributaries, and that this year's cut will be fully up to last year's. The total amount cut by the operators is expected to be between 55,000,000 and 60,000,000 feet.

Every Day Dangers.

Cleveland, O., Jan. 4.—Eight persons were injured, two perhaps fatally, in a street railway accident shortly before midnight. While running at a high rate of speed, a car jumped the track and swung into an iron trolley pole.

A Quebec Appointment.

Quebec, Jan. 4.—E. Dubord has been appointed member of the legislative council in place of the late Hon. E. W. Larue.

WHY HE COULDN'T VOTE.

Holders of Short Term Leases Barred From Balloting on By-laws.

The World has been advised of several complaints from would-be voters, who went to the polls with every confidence, and were much taken aback when the returning officer informed them their names were not on the list.

The complexities of the assessment law appear to be in a large measure responsible.

One case reported is that of a leaseholder of a valuable property on West Adelaide street. On going to cast his vote for the power by-law he was told that he was not qualified, despite the fact that he paid \$224 in taxes last year. The city clerk's explanation is that the leaseholder's name appeared as that of a tenant, as a 21 years' lease is necessary to give the qualification to vote on money by-laws.

TO SPREAD CITY'S FAME.

Commissioner Thompson Will Ask Reasonable Appropriation.

Commissioner of Industries and Publicity Joseph Thompson is preparing his estimates for the year, and will, incidentally, make a report upon the work accomplished thus far. As Mr. Thompson has been in office only a few months great results cannot be expected, but he will be able to report very satisfactory progress.

The commissioner does not believe in cramped methods, and will, it is understood, ask for a substantial appropriation with which to enter upon a fairly extensive plan of advertising the city abroad. One recommendation he will make will be that advertisements of Toronto as a resort for summer tourists be inserted in southern papers. He will require an appropriation for having souvenir literature printed, and hopes to distribute thousands of such souvenirs among visitors to Toronto. He will also seek to have advertisements placed in papers in Great Britain, pointing out to manufacturers the advantages of Toronto as a location for branches.

BIG NEW YORK FIRE.

Half a Million Dollars Loss in Burning of Furniture Store.

New York, Jan. 4.—Fire destroyed the big furniture store of Cowperthwaite & Sons at Third-avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-first-st. last night, entailing a loss of half a million dollars or more and causing the injury of four firemen seriously. The blaze, which started about 8 o'clock, quickly developed into the stubbornest and most spectacular fire in Harlem for a long time.

About 200 feet from the Cowperthwaite buildings is a Harlem police court and fifty-eight private seepers set up cries of fear and were taken from their cells and paraded in front of the flames for the burning building fell across the elevated structure, and the firemen fighting the flames from the vantage place were forced to leap to the ground.

PACIFIC COAST STORM.

The Little United States Gunboat Sandoval, intended for the use of the naval militia on Lake Ontario, reached her dock in this city today, manned by members of the Second Separate Division of the Naval Militia of Rochester, N.Y.

The Sandoval was captured at Guantanamo during the Spanish-American war. She will proceed to Lake Ontario in the spring.

G. T. R. Shop Changes.

Port Huron, Mich., Jan. 4.—Big changes, it is rumored, will soon be made in the Grand Trunk shops. It is said J. H. McGrath, master mechanic, will be promoted to superintendent of motive power, to succeed Superintendent Jamieson, resigned. J. Laidley, foreman in the machinists' department, is slated for master mechanic.

Ralph Smith and Why He May Not Go to the Yukon. Ottawa, Jan. 4.—(Special).—The name of Ralph Smith, M.P., is generally mentioned in connection with the vacancy of governor in the Yukon. It is no secret that many friends are urging him not to entertain the proposition in another position. Mr. Smith may eventually be of more utility. For instance, were a department of labor created the British Columbia man would stand high in the chances of landing it. However, Mr. Smith may take the governorship.

Shoplifters Sentenced

Three of Them Go Down for From 20 Days to 6 Months. Shoplifters have had plenty of warning in the past. Judge Winchester is determined to put a stop to this crime, as far as lies in his power.

HAVE THE GIANT'S POWER TO FORGE A TRUNK SEWER

But There's No Indication That Provincial Health Board Will Use It.

The citizens of Toronto have voted down the trunk sewer, but, so says Dr. Sheard, the provincial board of health is in the position, if it so desires, of compelling the building of the sewer, wholly independent of what the sentiment of the people may be.

"The city must find the money if the board orders it to be done," is the statement of the medical health officer, which makes it appear that the ratepayers merely had a referendum submitted to them on Tuesday last.

Dr. Sheard, who is also a member of the provincial board of health, is so far as to say that such a drastic move will be made, while Hon. W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary, to whom Dr. Hodgett, secretary of the board of health, referred the newspaper men, stated that the statement of Dr. Sheard was absolutely without reference to anything that was ever said in the department, or by anyone in it.

The clause states that no sewage of any kind, tending to make impure the water supply for domestic use, in any city, town, incorporated village or other municipality shall be emptied in the water, or placed near the source of water supply for domestic use, nor within such distance thereof as may be considered unsafe by the provincial board of health or local board of health to abate or remove the same, shall constitute a separate offence.
