EMIGRATION IN CANADA.

WHAT THE REPORT OF THE INTERIOR DEPARTMENT SHOWS.

There was a Decrease Last Year—Surveying Emigrants in the Territories. In the Northwest Territories—The High Commissioner Asks for More Money for Emigration Purposes.

Ottawa, Feb. 10.—Hon. Mr. Daly presented to Parliament to-day the annual report of the Department of the Interior. It shows that the total number of immigrants who arrived last year was 23,363, a decrease of 2300. Of this number 17,251 declared the intention of becoming residents in the Dominion.

The report speaks encouragingly of the progress of irrigation in the Territories. At the close of the departmental year the total length of irrigation ditches and canals constructed and in operation in the Territories. All of these were constructed in the Northwest Territories.

The most extensive operations carried out during the past season were those of the Calgary Irrigation Company, which constructed some 20 miles of irrigation works on the Bow river.

TO A WORTHY MAN.

Erection of a Memorial Tablet to the Late Mr. Davis in the Temple Emanuel, Montreal.

Montreal, Feb. 10.—On Dec. 6, 1895, at a memorial service held at the Temple Emanuel, it was suggested that in order to perpetuate the memory of the late rabbi of the Temple, S. Davis, Esq., who died on Nov. 30, 1895, who was a man of principle, integrity and honesty, that a memorial tablet be placed in the temple, so that future generations may know that kind of a man he was.

The memorial consists of a slab of Carrara marble, one and a half inches thick, 24 inches long by 12 inches wide, and is set in a frame of the best polished black Belgian marble.

Indeed, many could not obtain admission who were anxious to be present at the first service after the memorial tablet to late Mr. Samuel Davis had been placed in position on the western wall opposite to the seat formerly occupied by the deceased.
