It Should Have Read "the Mutual Benefit Life Association of America."

New York, Oct. 7.—The despatch report-ing a decision rendered by Judge Smyth of the Supreme Court, regarding the dis-position of the reserve fund of the Mutual Reserve Fund Life Association was errone-ous, arising from a somewhat similarity of names. The decision was in a suit involv-ing the Mutual Benefit Life Association of America, a different concern. Mr. John W. Vrooman, Treasurer of the Mutual Be-serve Fund Life Association, made public the following statement respecting the matter today: "The reported decision of Judge Smyth did not refer to or concern the Mutual Benefit Life Association of America, a defunct institution, whose af fairs are being settled through a receiv-ership. The case in no wise related to or affects our company or any of its members, and the error evidently arose from substi-tuting the word 'Reserve F in the title of the company involved for the word 'Benef-tit."






