## VISIT TO THE JULIET.

The World's Commissioner  
Sees the Mine.

## A MUCH TALKED-OF CLAIM

Prospect Shaft Makes a Good Showing at a Depth of Six Feet.

An Excellent Location Within Four Miles of the Trail Smelter—What the Ore is Like—What the Superintendent of the Famous Le Roi Says About the Proposition—The Strike in Musgump and its Results.

Rossland, B.C., Oct. 7.—(Special to The World via Spokane, Wash.)—With Mr. T. R. Morrow, manager of the Juliet, yesterday I visited that much-talked-of claim. The Juliet is situated half a mile from Spawven, two miles from the Nelson & Fort Sheppard Railway, four miles from the Trail smelter, and on the Columbia & Western Railway. The property of the company consists of a full claim of 52 acres, located on the steep western side of Red Mountain, so called from its resemblance to the mountain on which the richest mines of the district are located. On the claim there are two well-defined ledges, which are marked by heavy iron capping similar in every respect to that of Rossland's big mines. On the south ledge a prospect shaft is being sunk, and at a depth of six feet the showing is very good. The rock, a syenitic diorite with a species of blend, is heavily mineralized, and seems to indicate that the mineral vein is of considerable value. A continuous seam of decomposed quartzite, which is a very good prospect, is also shown. The shaft is to be sunk up to the level of the vein, which is estimated to be 100 feet deep. The shaft is to be driven into the side of the mountain following the vein as depth will be gained rapidly. In this work a mortgage expenditure should result in the disclosure of pay ore, for the Juliet is to be an exception to the rule of the camp; the ledge on which it is now being carried on will be found to contain ore chutes of great value.

There is a wagon road to the smelter, and ore can be shipped by railroad or boat to the smelter at less cost than that from mines in the immediate vicinity of Rossland. The showing of the property is such as to justify vigorous development, and the opinion of Mr. Morrow, an expert in the line, who examined the property, is that the Juliet is a better proposition than a great many properties for which more has been removed to the top of the mountain. The present shaft is being sunk, and work will be carried on all winter.

Musgump is now 20 cents, and in demand. The Mining Review in its market report to-day says: "The strike ore in the Musgump has improved the market for the stock, and when the public realizes the fact that the discovery of a substantial rise is certain." The Review has persistently recommended this stock. A representative of the Review visited the property on Saturday and found that the whole face of the rock was in ore which had been broken through about 18 inches from the foot wall.

Early in the day it was understood that the road refused to restate those men who had been guilty of lawlessness, but by a later edict everybody was taken back pending the investigation which is to follow.

DO NOT INVADE CAPE BRETON

North Sydney's Advantages as Canada's Atlantic Port

For a Fast Line of Steamers—A Short Ocean Voyage—Five Days From Queenstown to Toronto—The Business Interests of This Thriving Town—Beautiful Side Trips for Tourists Trade With Newfoundland—The Great Coal Industry.

Away in Eastern Canada, its group of islands separated by narrow channels, forming the northeastern part of North America, extending out into the Atlantic Ocean, is Cape Breton. Here can be found one of the finest and safest harbors in the world, and on its shores are situated the twin towns of Sydney and North Sydney, the latter being the principal subject of the present sketch.

NORTH SYDNEY, C.B. Outside of a few lumber, Annapolis and a few other places, this is one of the oldest settled parts of the Dominion of Canada, dating even from the time of the early French occupation, further historical reference to which time will not on this occasion, permit us to enlarge upon.

North Sydney has already become quite an important place, and there appear to be good reasons for supposing that it will in future largely increase in size and population as well as the importance of its favorable location as one of the most convenient shipping ports in the Maritime Provinces.

The farming and mining districts which are tributary to it are unequalled. It is the principal market for the Counties of Antigonish and Victoria, and large quantities of farm products, live stock, etc., are here constantly being forwarded to different places, and the fleet of steamers of the Black Diamond Line, which make regular trips with full cargoes to Montreal, where this enterprising company is represented by Messrs. Brown & Co. The steamers Buena Vista and Coban have good passenger accommodation. The former is a steamer which we called when crossing the harbor in a fine iron steamer, and they call at Prince Edward Island and other ports on the coast and altogether it should prove an interesting voyage.

TRADE WITH NEWFOUNDLAND. A growing trade in various products is carried on with the western and northern shores of Newfoundland, the nearest point of which—Fort Basque or Chatham—is only 79 miles distant from Cape Breton. The point referred to is to be the terminus of the railway system of the colony, which is to be completed at that point next year, when it is said a line of steamers will be put on to run between there and North Sydney. Then, no doubt, the New World to the Old World will go by this route, and it will dispense with a considerable stretch of long voyage.

AS A SHIPPING PORT. In an interview with Mr. G. H. Dobson, who is an enthusiast over the importance of North Sydney as a great shipping port of the future, he explained that Cape Breton is a point of view, particularly situated to North America as Great Britain is to Europe, with large deposits of coal for the convenience of Cape Breton warehouse, having succeeded the old-established firm of W. Moore & Co. The stock was purchased by the new firm, who have enlarged and extended the business. Mr. Moore has just returned from active mercantile business. His family were among the earliest settlers here. He is interested in the sealing business in the North Pacific. Four years ago a number of vessels were seized there by Russian cruisers. Two of these, as was afterwards admitted, were illegally taken, but so far the Russian Government have failed to reimburse the owners, the principal one of whom is Mr. Moore. The claim on one of the vessels alone, the McGowan, now amounts to \$50,000.

The Western Union cable office here is in charge of Mr. J. Copple, who has been stationed here for 10 years, and has been formerly at Torbay and Canada. Mr. A. S. Bedwin, formerly of New York, is another well-known and experienced manager. The C. P. R. Telegraph Company is well represented by Mr. E. H. Galt, who is manager of the company here, with his office opposite the Hotel Vendome. Messrs. Voght Bros., established here 35 years, have one of the largest retail establishments in the Dominion to the Maritime Provinces. Their store is a credit to North Sydney, and they do a very large business. The

THE EAST ATLANTIC SERVICE. A large three-masted barquentine, the Aurora, from St. John's, Newfoundland, which went ashore on Petrie's ledge, was on the stocks in the Marine Railway docks at the time the writer was here, and a large force of men, under the special supervision of Mr. Forbes, were engaged in making the necessary repairs, which in this case were considerable, the vessel's keel being one, and required to be completely re-cooped. This would occupy some three weeks' time over including material, etc., cost about \$5000.

A GO-AHEAD TOWN. North Sydney has an electric lighting plant and a new and improved system of waterworks is being completed. The town has a population now of about 5000, and if the suburban settlement of Sydney mines be included the population will run over 6000. Against Over-Capitalization. The World has already referred in these columns to the evils of over-capitalization and urged mining companies to avoid this mistake. Below are given the remarks of a gentleman who was director of the United States mint under Grover Cleveland's first administration, upon this topic.

On the other hand, the various owners of a land, or group of claims would combine and seek to attract capital in large lots it would be better to make a property of a size that can be worked to the best advantage. When you have a large property you can work it at a minimum cost and at a minimum risk, especially in locations like Red Mountain, where the claims are numerous. Operated as those mines on the mountains now are, the cost is not. Look at the item of expense for transportation. The narrow gauge furnishes facilities for but a few of the biggest mines in the country, and then at the highest expense. Now, if a company owned both the base and the top of the mountain the road could be built with lower grade and operated by the company itself, and the expense greatly reduced. The cost of operating the mine is also reduced. Instead of working from the top of the mountain down, as they are obliged to do, they can work from the ownership, they could tunnel to great advantage and at a minimum cost extract the ore.

Yes, I think eventually New York capital will be directed to the west, but not until they are well consolidated that they are now. They will be in time. Every one who can look for it now, and you cannot look for it to London no matter what the conditions in the mines, until after election in London it is different. They always have a large amount of capital seeking investment there.

Slovenly Shipments. In the Slovan silver country there are 45 or 50 shipping mines, and this winter will add a dozen more to the list. Slovan is thus more productive than even the Trail Creek gold region.

Mr. Bestock Doing Well. The Kaslo, B. C. people are delighted at the efforts of the Hon. They say that this means that \$25,000 will be devoted to the work, and that in two or three years some 30 miles of navigable water will be added to Kootenay Lake, and an immense mineral territory opened up to hundreds of prospectors who have been awaiting for such a move for years. Mr. Bestock is contemplating on keeping his pre-election promises which sent him to Parliament.
