Seventeen counties of North Carolina have availed themselves of a local option enactment for employing convict labor in the work of roadmaking. TO ENLARGE LORETTO ABBEY.

Forty-Five Thousand Dollars Will be Spent
in the Black Educational Standing
in the Province.

When the pupils of Loretto Abbey return
to their studies after the midsummer vaca-
tion, they will find so many alterations
and improvements that it will scarcely re-
semble the institution they left.

The ladies of the Abbey have resolved to
expend about \$35,000 out of the convent
funds in the construction of a western and
eastern wing to the building.

For some time past it has been felt that
which of late has averaged over 200. The
eastern wing will be for chapel and concert
purposes and will comprise an area
of about 140 by 45 feet. The western
wing, which will be about 135 by 60 feet,
will be divided into study, hall, gym-
nasium, recreation room, library, studio
and class rooms.

The new buildings will be fitted up and
decorated according to the very latest
modern and approved ideas, as regards
ventilation, appliances, etc., and it
will thereby be enabled better to ever to
maintain its reputation for being one of
the most excellent schools for culture on
the continent.

At Loretto girls are educated from the
primary grades up to the university cur-
riculum. Among its advantages over the
common school course is the fact that a
complete, comprehensive education in book-
keeping, typewriting, etc., is imparted. It is
worth of note that last term, in a com-
petition with all the schools of art in the
province, the Abbey succeeded in carrying
off the honors, taking first prize in pic-
ture painting, and two out of the total of
three certificates awarded.

The work of building will be under the
supervision of Architect Beaumont Jarvis.

THE STORM IS OVER

And Old Sol Will Shine To-Day—So Say
the Weather Prophets at the
Observatory.

At last Torontonians are to enjoy a little
sunshine. Sol, say the official weather
prophets, will shine forth in all his glory
before this day shall have passed away.

Moderate west winds and a gradual im-
provement in the weather, accompanied by
a slight elevation of temperature, is what
central Ontario's drenched humanity is to
look forward to to-day. This was pro-
phesied yesterday. This was the official
explanation of his miscalculation that the
high pressure area over the Maritime Pro-
vince proved more resistant than his expec-
tations. The result was that the tail-
end of the storm, which was expected to
arrive yesterday, did not arrive until this
morning, but it will be clear by eightfall.

The storm area of yesterday extended
from about Brantford to Richmond Hill,
Montreal, while another and larger area,
which will probably absorb this one, swept
the South Atlantic coast, from New York
to Cape Hatteras. Strange to say, the
country along Lake Erie enjoyed a fine
day, no rain being recorded at Port Stan-
ley. It rained, however, in Muskoka.

It may be added that a warm wave is on
its way east, and that the thermometer
of the course of a week. At Minnetonka, Minn.,
the thermometer registered 90 degrees and
at Minneapolis 87 degrees yesterday.

THE BIG RAINSTORM.

Beaver River on the Kampagne—Farmers
are Very Dependent.

Cherbourg, Ont., July 28.—Beaver
River is making a grand effort to break
all previous records in doing damage.
Last night, after the rain had fallen
30 hours, the danger to property became
very alarming, and to-night the pros-
pects are that it will go beyond the
highest point it has ever attained. It is
impossible to estimate the amount of
rain. The dams and levees of today's heavy
rain are weakened a great deal by the heavy
rains of the 27th. The water is now
at the G. T. R. bridge, and the trains were
greatly delayed. The wheat and hay crops
are destroyed to a great extent, and the
farmers are very dependent.

Tremendous Fall of Rain.

Pictou, Ont., July 28.—The rains of
Sunday and yesterday are unprecedented
in this section. The height of hay in
this section is housed. Wheat, barley,
rye and early peas are more or less
damaged. The raspberry crop is seriously
damaged. At Bloomfield, five sections
from here, including Sunday's rain,
nearly seven inches of water fell in 72
hours, and six inches of it fell in 10
hours.

A TRAINER OF MISSIONARIES.

Dr. Gratton Guinness, a Native of Toronto,
Tells of the Missionaries He
Has Sent Out.

Dr. H. Gratton Guinness of London,
Eng., director of Harley House and Harley
College and Inter-Denominational Training
School, who is so widely known in connec-
tion with foreign missionary work, spoke
at a large gathering in the Northern Con-
gregational Church last night, giving many
interesting details of his work in Central
Africa.

Eight years ago, the Doctor established
a mission at the household of the
Congo River, and during that time 9
missionaries, men and women, have been
sent there, of whom 22 have died on ac-
count of the severity of the climate. Ne-
vertheless the work has been profitable, as
churches have been established at many
points and over 2000 souls have been
brought within the fold.

The Congo Free State comprises an area
as large as Asia, it contains a million
and a half square miles, and containing
40,000,000 people, nearly all of whom are
in a state of heathenism.

Dr. Guinness is a native of Toronto, hav-
ing been born on Yonge street in 1830.
Years ago, but left here when quite young
with his parents for England, his father
having been a missionary.

He returned to Toronto, where he was
connected with the extension of the
Harley College, with which the Doctor
is connected, has sent over 1000 mis-
sionaries, and is still actively engaged in
the work.

Dr. E. H. Hyde, pastor of the church,
occupied the chair last night and those
present listened intently to the very in-
teresting address.

MRS. STERNMAN'S EXTRADITION.

Warrant Issued by the State Department
at Washington for Her Surrender
to the Canadian Authorities.

Washington, July 28.—The State De-
partment has issued a warrant for the
surrender to the Canadian Government
of Olive Adell Sternman, who is held
at Rochester, New York, on a charge
of poisoning her husband. The woman
is alleged to have administered arsenic
to her husband in small daily doses un-
til death ensued, meanwhile resisting the
efforts of the physician to have him re-
moved to a hospital. An autopsy made
by two country doctors failed to show
traces of arsenic, and the charge of
murder would not have been main-
tained save for the action of an insur-
ance company holding a policy on Stern-
man, which caused another and an ex-
pert investigation to be made, with the
result, it is asserted, of revealing large
quantities of arsenic in the body.

HELL THINK IT OVER.

The Special Committee Think That Flem-
ing's Figure for Assessment Com-
missioner is Too High.

"I want \$3000, and I won't accept \$4000."
This is what Mayor Fleming told Ald.
Sheppard and Leslie yesterday morning
when they asked him what salary he wan-
ted to assume the duties that the Special
Committee had assigned to the assessment
Commissioner. They reported the result
of their interview to the committee yester-
day afternoon.

Ald. Burns thought \$4000 was a large
sum. Ald. Leslie thought that there were
a number of men in Toronto who could
do the job for less. He favored offering the
Mayor the salary he now receives as Mayor—\$3500
—and if he would not accept this, then
negotiations were off.

It is probable that the city will estab-
lish a ferry service to Island Park next sum-
mer.

TARTE MUST GO.

Government in the House was present.

supporter of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, pub-
lishes a terrible attack upon Mr. Tarte
today, and declares that if the Premier
does not dispense with his services the
party will know the reason why.

**T. Waldron Loses an Eye and Ear and
E. J. Frank's Head is Out of Order.**

Guelph, July 28.—Because George
Mallott pointed his gun at T. Waldron
while showing him how it worked, Wal-
dron lies in the General Hospital minus
an eye and an ear.

The trigger snapped by mistake, and
the unfortunate man receives the entire
charge in the side of the head. He may
die.

Shortly after this accident E. J.
Frank had his face and arms badly
burned by the explosion of a bicycle
crameling oven. He was thrown across
the room and his forehead badly cut
by the iron door of the oven.

Narrow Escape From Death.

Peter Croft, who lives at 60 McGe-
street, and is employed as a laborer on
the new building at King and Yonge
streets, had a narrow escape from death
yesterday morning. He was engaged in
hosting a block of stone into position
by means of a block and tackle, when

BRITAIN AND UNITED STATES

Clayton-Bulwer Treaty and Monroe Doctrine.

ANNEXATION OF HAWAII

And the Little Tangle That Has Come Up Over the Japan Protest.

Britain Has Taken Possession of the Island of Palmyra, in the Pacific, and Uncle Sam Regards This as Significant. Which Probably It Is—But Britain Owns the Island—Marquis De asserts a Newspaper Man That Japan Doesn't Want to Fight—The Mix is Interesting.

Washington, July 28.—Public men in Washington were generally surprised when the announcement was made in the cable dispatches a few days since that the question of the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty had been raised in the British Parliament in connection with the proposal to annex the Hawaiian Islands to the United States, and was consequently prepared for the response of the British Government that the one question was not involved in the other. The matter is regarded here with all the greater interest, because both subjects, the validity of the treaty and the annexation of Hawaii, are under consideration by the American Congress, and both, in all probability, will receive attention during the next session. The Senate Committee on Foreign Relations, which has already reported upon the annexation treaty, has undertaken an investigation of the present status of the Clayton-Bulwer convention, and the general expectation, on account of the predictions of the members of the sub-committee having the question in charge, is that a report will be made favorable to the abrogation of the treaty.

There is also a large element in the Senate which regards the treaty as objectionable to the Monroe doctrine. Others look upon it as liable in an indirect way to have, through its reference to the Nicaragua Canal, a bearing upon the Hawaiian question. One of the points in doubt on the part of the committee is how the treaty is regarded by the British Government. It appears that, while England has generally acted in Central American affairs as the weaker party, it is expected to act if there had been no treaty, the English authorities have never given expression to any dissenting sentiment as to the continued effect of the agreement made between Sir Bulwer Lytton and Secretary Clayton.

BRITAIN TOOK PALMYRA

And the Yankees Kick—Although the Island Belongs to Britain.

Washington, July 28.—Official information of the action of the British Government in taking possession of the Island of Palmyra, in the Pacific Ocean, has been received at the State Department. The action of Great Britain in taking possession of the island at this time, following as it does the submission of an annexation treaty to the Senate by the President, is considered very significant by the authorities here. Whether it is intended to complicate matters, so as to stave off annexation, or whether Great Britain proposes establishing a naval station, Canadian officials in question, her action is regarded as one of the highest importance, and with developments which have been connected with the treaty, it is now the intention of the State Department officials to gather all the information possible in regard to Palmyra Island. Should their search strengthen Hawaii's right to the territory, the British are supposed to send instructions to Minister Sewall, directing him to urge the State authorities to protest to the British Government against her action. The United States will, of course, uphold such a protest, and the officials believe that it will result in the removal of the British flag from the island, should it prove to be territory really belonging to the Hawaiian group.

So far as the officials have been able to learn up to the present time, Palmyra Island was occupied a good many years ago by a number of Hawaiian citizens, who raised the Hawaiian flag over the territory. The island was first discovered by the famous British navigator, Captain Cook, who reportedly lost his life in the Hawaiian Islands.

According to the Hawaiian Government, Palmyra was discovered by a surveyor, so that its extent cannot be accurately estimated. It was known some time ago as American Island.

BRITAIN OWNS IT

London, July 28.—With reference to the report secured by Great Britain of Palmyra Island, Polynesia, it is officially stated that the island has been British territory since 1888. The report is supposed to have arisen from the fact that H. M. S. Wild Swan called there last May on a periodical visit.

JAPAN IS FOR PEACE

Has Never Thought of Hobbnobbing With Spain Against the United States.

New York, July 28.—A despatch to The Herald, from Paris, says: "It was supposed to break out between the United States and Japan it will be in spite of Marquis De personally, as well as politically."

"In the first place," said Marquis De, "I wish you would contradict a statement that I am here, charged with an official mission to strongly protest in the name of my Government against a usurpation fraught with peril."

Do not think it possible that any opposition manifested in Japan to the annexation of the Hawaiian Islands by the United States will take any more extended form than a mere protest made—remember this point—made in the name of the Emperor, and that a dignified diplomatic way is absurd.

"Japan is simply seeking to protect herself from the interests of Japan in those islands may not suffer injury."

"The Emperor, I know, will not support any such course. The Emperor is in the Ministry or in the control of the different branches of the Government are of the same mind, and the Emperor upon this subject, and Japanese public sentiment is one of strong friendship for the United States. The Hawaiian question cannot possibly bring about a conflict, either armed or diplomatic, with the Americans, in spite of the jingoism."

Preparing for a Crawl Down. Washington, D. C., July 28.—State Department officials say that no new issue is presented by the seizure of Palmyra Island by the British, except for some days ago by an incoming vessel, for Great Britain has maintained a claim to the island for many years. The island is said to lie in the Polynesian group, and, although Hawaii asserted its claim to the island, the Government has not been strongly impressed with the validity of the claim.
