Montreal, March 31.—A Star special cable from London says:

"Fast mail matters are exciting much interest in Canadian circles. Mr. Dobell says he found on his arrival that the progress of Messrs. Petersen's arrangements was more satisfactory than he anticipated when in Canada. In other quarters it is confidently declared that the whole of the necessary capital has been underwritten. Mr. Petersen, himself, said to-day that he was too busy to make a statement, but it is noteworthy that meetings of his associates are being held.

"Mr. Cecil Rhodes arrived at Madeira today. In the course of a recent conversation he spoke most warmly of the service Canada had rendered to the empire by compelling the British Government to clear the German and Beigfan treaties out of the way of future inter-imperial co-operation. These treaties formerly blocked his way in his tariff arrangements in South Africa. Sir Wiffrid Laurier, he said, has now got rid of them for us and the whole empire."

Eight squadrons of cavalry, four maxim guns, a battery of horse artillery, two battallons of infantry and the whole of the mounted troops reconnoitered the Dervish position, 18 miles from Atbara, this morning and encountered 500 of the enemy's horsemen, whom they drove in, and, pressing forward, found Mahmoud's position, in the heavy bush, strongly entrenched, with pits filled with rifemen and protected by a thick zereba. In the centre was a small hill with three tiers of entrenchments filled with spearmen. The whole position was swarming with Dervishes, alert for the attack.

The artillery opened fire at 1000 yards. The effect was apparently good, but it was difficult to judge to a certainty, in consequence of the thick bush. The Maxims also swept the front of the position. The Dervishes, however, did not reply, evidently awaiting an attack at close quarters. Having ascertained the enemy's position, the reconnoitering force retired. followed by the Dervish horsemen, who did not attack, but retreated under shell fire.

SIR WILLIAM VAN HORNE

Says the Only Alternative Now is to Ar-Chilkat Route. Montreal, March 31.-When asked to-day for an expression of opinion regarding the Senate's rejection of the Yukon bill, Sir William Van Horne, president of the Canadian Pacific, made the following statement: "I would not on any account criticize the action of the Senate, but I am sorry the bill is rejected, and I fear it's rejection will prove to be a mistake, and that Canada will lose the cream of the Yukon trade. I have never doubted that the Chilkat was the best route, but the Teslin route seemed necessary to independence and to the saving of a whole year's trade if nothing more. If the freedom of the Chilkat route can be secured by arrangement with the United States, that now seems to be the only alternative."





Sutherland, carriagemaker, Lancaster, petitions against D. R. McDonald (Con.), of Glengarry. His majority was 466 over two opponents—D. C. Rae (Lib.), and D. M. McPnerson (Pat.)

T. Dextras, grocer, Cornwall, petitions against the recurn of J. MacLaughlin (Con.), in Stormont. There were two other candidates, A. Muhern (Lib.), and Joan Bennett (Pat.) Mr. MacLaughlin's majority was 177. worth and North Bruce. Bennett (Pat.) Mr. MacLaugnlin's majority was 177.

G. M. Boyd's majority in North Grey was 137. The petitioner against him is J. S. MacLellan, carpenter, Owen Sound. J. Cleland was the Liberal candidate.



The Mayor pro tem also wants a high and dry sidewalk on Winchester-street, near the bridge. Both improvements would be in the alderman's neighborhood.

CALIFORNIA SHAKEN UP.

ousiderable Damage Done in San Franci Half a Million and Closed Down.

San Francisco, March 31 .- This city and portion of California State was shaken by an earthquake at 11.43 last evening, which lasted between 30 and 40 seconds which lasted between 30 and 40 seconds and traveled from east to west, with a slight vertical vibration. Great damage to property is reported, but there does not appear to have been any loss of life, though several families in this city had very narrow escapes from being crushed beneath falling houses.

The navy yard at Mare Island was damaged to the extent of \$500,000 by the earthquake, Work there has been shut down and 1700 employes are idle.

Some buildings in this city were badly shaken, and, though standing, are in such a tottering condition that they will tumble down at the slightest disturbance. A tenement house on Elementina-street is badly warped. A house on Fifth-street was thrown down. The old Supreme Court on Larkin-street was badly shaken, one of its chimneys being tilted at an angle and another turned around on its base. The Claus-Spreckels building, which is 19 storeys high, was swayed by the vibration like a tree in a storm, Along the waterfront a tidal wave rolled in, causing damage to the shipping.

The shock was apparently confined to Northern California, reports from the southern portions state that no shock was felt there.

Mr. Bertram's Perlinent Remarks.

Mr. Bertram said there was no gainsaying the fact that a railway entering the Boundary Creek country from the south would render that country from the south would render that country tributary to the United States to a greaker extent than if there were no railway at all. Trade should first be directed into Canadlan channels before opening the doors to an American road. A year hence things might be different. [Hear, hear.] The people of Canadla felt very keenly the Illiberal treatment by the United States, and, therefore, we could not be too careful in directing trade into American channels. Competition by railways was pretty much of a delusion, as it was not long before the companies reached an agreement. His own experience was that he had been able to get better rates to a non-competitive point than to a competitive point. He resented Mr. Lister's reflection upon the Council of the Toronto Board of Trade, which was a thoroughly processitative body. 
