TRUSTEES' FINAL MEETING.

Miss Bowditch's Resignation Accepted and Miss Vallance Appointed to Succeed Her.

A LETTER FROM TORONTO JUNCTION

An Interesting Event to Take Place

Next Thursday Night in Hamilton.

Hamilton, Jan. 2.—The Internal Management Committee of the 1901 Board of Education held its final meeting this evening, and wound up the business before the resignation of Miss Florence Bowditch, kindergarten director, was accepted, and Miss Ethel Vallance was appointed to succeed her. Mrs. Hunter was appointed caretaker of the Wellington-street school.

G. S. Martin, chairman of the Internal Management Committee of the Toronto Junction High School Board, sent a communication respecting the responsibilities of county councils towards high schools in municipalities separate from the county, and the alleged injustice involved. As the matter does not affect the Hamilton board no action was taken.

At the close of the business a vote of thanks was passed to Chairman J. W. Jones.

At the final meeting of the board for 1901, next Thursday evening, large albums containing photographs of the members of the 1900 board, will be presented to ex-Trustees Alexander Turner, F. P. Bailey and J. J. Mason, who retired in 1900 after serving, respectively, 17 years, 16 years and 10 years.

A Unique Act.
There was a unique act at the Star theatre to-night. John Lord and Carmichael, sketch artists, were wedded in the course of the last burlesque, entitled "Papa and Poppa." The happy couple were appropriately dressed. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Mr. Morton, a retired Anglican clergyman, who seemed more interested in the ceremony than either of the contracting parties. Law Row was the best man, and Miss Bert of the Wives, Women and Sons company was the bridesmaid. The bride was given away by Mr. Lord and Bink, who supplied the wedding ring and the groom's presents to the bride.

George S. Burkholder, alternate candidate, visited the Conservative Club to-night on invitation and was well received. It is predicted there will be two Burkholders in next year's Council. Both are Tories.

FOUND DEAD IN BED.

Frederick Stanford Succumbs to Heart Disease in Lodging House.

Frederick Stanford, an old soldier, was found dead in James J. Bowery's lodging house at 218 West Front-street, yesterday afternoon. Stanford for over a year was a night cook at the Red Star restaurant, 57-59 Jarvis-street, but gave up the position about a month ago. Since that time Stanford had been living at the lodging house, and yesterday he did not make his appearance about 5 o'clock, when Mr. Bowery went to Stanford's room he found him dead in bed.

Coroner Greig was called in, and after investigating the circumstances surrounding the death, decided that an inquest was unnecessary, but the body was taken to the morgue in the patrol wagon. Stanford was 60 years of age. It was ascertained that he had been suffering from heart disease, and that he had been drinking heavily.

PROHIBITION HURTS ARMY.
More Drunkenness After Swedish Law Becomes Effective.

Christiana, Jan. 2.—Military Surgeon Arhus, in his report on the condition of the army in the Norwegian army, states that since the prohibition law became effective, drunkenness among the troops has increased, and that temperance reformers advocate the brewing of good small beer containing not more than 2 per cent. alcohol for the use of the troops.

Dr. Arhus also reports that alcoholic drinks are smuggled into prohibited districts in large quantities, causing a startling increase in drug indulgence among the recruits stationed there.

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hurry to provoke a conflict. Little incidents have shown that the sympathy between Britain and France over the Fashoda affair has passed away; and the prospect of a conflict between the two nations in the near future is no indication that the rankings of a year or two ago have been forgotten. The two nations are on amiable terms, and it is not likely that the relations will be disturbed by such a matter as the French shore question.

CANADIAN TOBACCO.

A great many condemn the use of tobacco, but nearly all men use it in one way or another, and the cultivation of the "weed," which for so many years was confined to southern latitudes, is extending northward.

Canadian farmers have taken hold of it in some sections, and it is found to be a money-making process. For some years tobacco has been somewhat extensively grown in Quebec, and a great many of the farmers in that province make the leaf after preparing it in their own way. But within a short time manufacturers have begun using it in conjunction with southern grown tobacco, and the Canadian leaf is found to be as good as any. Essex County, Ontario, has become a centre of production, and an English expert, who has been experimenting, notes that the farmers in that county have brought cultivation to a state of perfection, which insures a ready market. While in 1897 the little amount grown was unmarketable, the output of the last year—some 50,000,000 pounds—has all been sold, and the industry is only in its infancy. While tobacco is a luxury, and its use is frowned upon by a great many people, it is a factor in agricultural pursuits, and if Canadian farmers can make money by raising it they are pretty sure to do so.
