

EARTHQUAKE IN JAPAN

Many Houses Collapse and Loss of

Life Feared. TOKIO, Aug. 15 .- A severe earthquake occurred in Central Japan Saturday afternoon at 3.30 o'clock. The shock was particularly hard around Kyoto, Osaka, Lake Biwa and Nagoya. All railroad communication with those districts has been interrupted. Many houses collapsed and it is feared that many people were killed or

Nagoya, with a population of more than 250,000, and one of the principal cities in Japan, located 170 miles west of Tokio, was badly damaged. Details are meagre because of the interruption of telegraphic communica-tion with the cities most affected. Twenty-one deaths and seventy people injured have thus far been reported. One-fourth of the Shiga prefecture sustained considerable damage. Mount Isuki at the northern end of Lake Biwa, an extinct volcano, is reported to have collapsed near the top.




