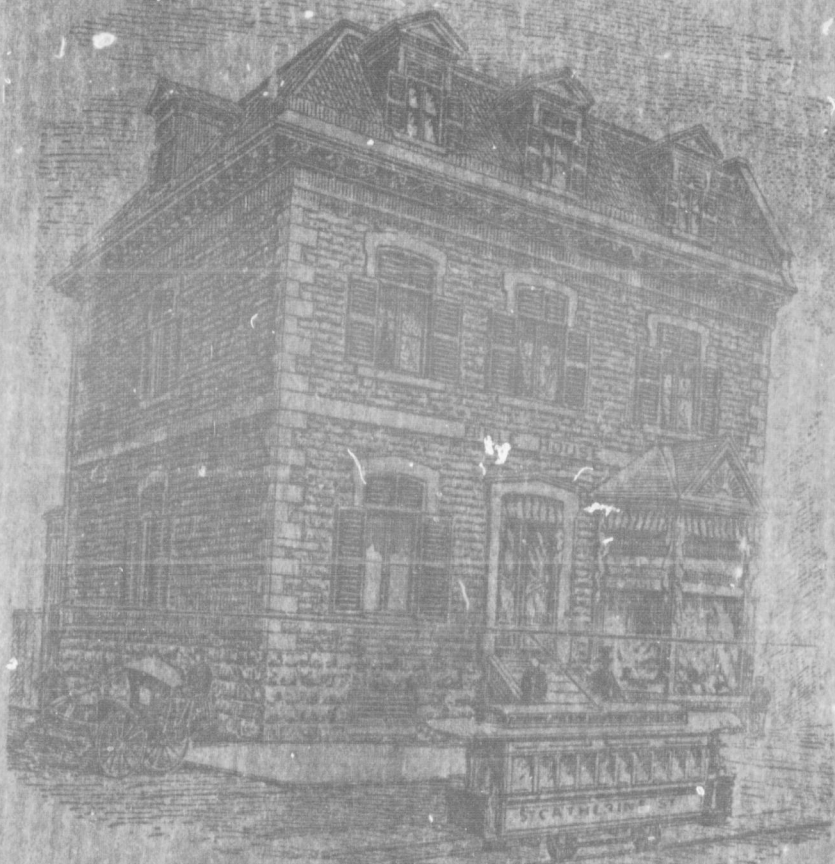

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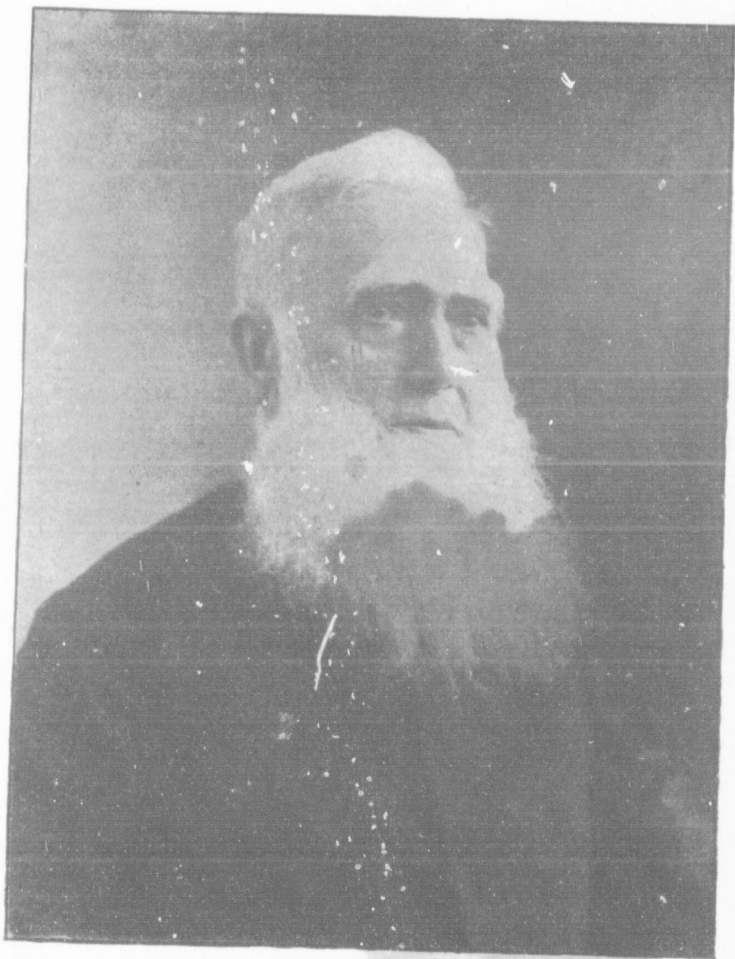

REGULATIONS
OF THE
MONTREAL AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be denominated THE MONTREAL AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY and its object shall be to co-operate with the BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scriptures, both at home and abroad.

II. Conformably to the principles of the Parent Society, the Bibles and Testaments circulated by this Auxiliary shall be without note or comment.

III. All persons subscribing two dollars or upwards, per annum, shall be members of this Society; or, forty dollars at one time, shall be members for life.

IV. The business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, two Secretaries, and a Committee consisting of not less than twenty members, with power to add to their number. Five members of this Committee shall form a quorum.

V. No lay member of the Society shall be eligible as a member of the Committee, unless he is a Life-member, or pays an annual subscription of at least four dollars.

VI. The Committee shall have the power of nominating persons who have rendered essential services to the Society as Honorary Governors for life.

VII. The Committee shall meet once every month, or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

VIII. The whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society, and not required for its own operations, shall from time to time be remitted to the Parent Society.

IX. For the purpose of giving full effect to the benevolent designs of the BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY in their grants for the Scriptures for distribution among the poor, the Committee shall make it their business to inquire what families or individuals are in want of Bibles and Testaments; and it shall be the duty of the Committee to furnish them forthwith at prime cost, reduced price, or gratis, according to their circumstances.

X. A general meeting of the Subscribers shall be held annually at Montreal, when the accounts shall be presented—the proceedings of the past year stated—a new Committee appointed—and a Report agreed upon to be printed under the direction of the Committee, and circulated among the members.

XI. No alterations shall be made in these Laws, except at a general meeting of the Society, called by special notice, to be advertised in two of the Montreal newspapers one month previously.

The attention of Members of the General Committee is invited to the following standing Rule touching attendance at Committee meetings:—

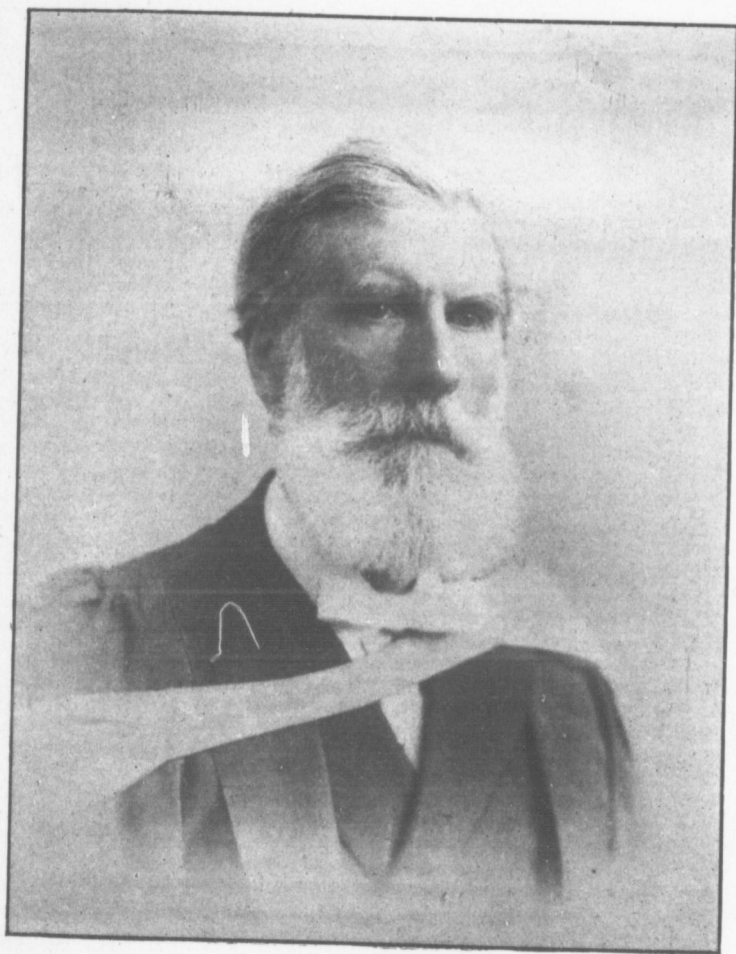

In Memoriam.

THE REV. GEORGE CORNISH, M.A., LL.D.,

For more than thirty-five years a member of the Committee of the Montreal Auxiliary, and for thirty years its Corresponding Secretary, was born at Wootton-under-Edge, Gloucestershire, England, in 1828. He was educated at Highbury College, London, taking his degree of B.A. from London University in 1855, being shortly afterwards ordained as a Congregational minister. In 1855 he came to Canada, and was for a year or two pastor of a Congregational Church in Liverpool, N.S. In 1857 he was appointed Professor of Classical Literature at McGill University, which position he held until his resignation last spring.

When, some years later, the Congregational College of British North America removed to Montreal, he gave it his valuable services as Professor of Greek Exegesis. In connection with the University he was honorary librarian, until, a year ago, that ceased to be an honorary office. He was also a member of the Normal School Committee. For some years he had been a member of the Committee of Public Instruction for the Province of Quebec. His complete grasp of business in its largest sense, coupled with punctilious attention to details, made his services of no small value to the Bible Society; while Montreal loses in Dr. Cornish a humble Christian, a careful teacher, an honoured citizen, and a kindly personality.

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REPORT FOR 1895.

The Seventy-fifth Annual Report of this Auxiliary presents many features which cannot fail to cheer and encourage all its friends.

Comparison, however, of what has been done with what remains to be done must stimulate its readers to fresh effort ; valued helpers have been lost to us during the past year, and their places must be filled by others fired with no less enthusiasm.

Your Committee is convinced that want of knowledge of the great work being done by the Bible Society constitutes a serious hindrance to the increase of its supporters in this city. In order to deal with this, they intend during the coming year to diffuse in a more systematic way information as to the operations of the Society.

They hope to effect this largely by a wider circulation of the excellent publications of the Society, particularly amongst the young, and to this end invite the assistance of Sunday School Teachers and Superintendents.

Your Committee deplores the loss, on the 17th of August last, of the Rev. George Cornish, LL.D., formerly the Corresponding Secretary of this Society. The following resolution was passed regarding this event :—

“ That in recording the removal by death of our most esteemed colleague, the Reverend George Cornish, LL.D.—for more than thirty-five years a member of this Committee, and for thirty years the Corresponding Secretary of this Society, and after his recent retirement from that office one of its Vice-Presidents—the members of this Committee desire to keep in remembrance his eminent services,

freely given to the Bible cause in this country. In the preparation of the series of Reports in which the operations of the Society for so many years are recorded ; in conducting our correspondence with the Parent Society, with Sister Societies, and with our agents in the field, as well as in connection with the meetings of this Committee and of the Agency Committee, his work was invaluable, and always willingly undertaken, even when it made large demands on the time and powers of one engaged in other arduous labours, and after failing health and strength had made it expedient to withdraw from other engagements. He rests from his labours, and in this we rejoice, though we sorrow that one so helpful to the Bible cause should be removed from us."

Your Committee has further to regret the loss of a warm friend and colleague in Mr. Warden King, for many years a member of this Committee and a liberal contributor to the work of Bible circulation.

The work of the Auxiliary during the past year may be thus summarized :—

1.—FINANCE.

The Abstract of the Treasurer's Statement of the Cash Transactions shows the *Total Receipts* (including the sum of \$442, the balance from last year) to be \$16,733, including the following special amounts :—

A grant of \$244 from the Parent Society for the salary of a French Bible-Woman ; and a grant of \$129, the value of Scriptures supplied to Missionary Societies ;

A donation of \$240 by a lady to pay for one Bible-Woman ;

A donation of \$40 from the Perth Auxiliary Bible Society for French work ;

A donation of \$40 from the Paris Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society for French work ;

A bequest (additional) of \$1,190 from the Estate of the late M. Lough ;

\$40 from a Subscriber, which entitles him to be a Life Member.

The Disbursements amount to the sum of \$16,290, in which are included—

A grant of \$762 to the Parent Society ; with \$30 additional from Brockville Branch ;

\$6,343 paid for Scriptures ;
 \$683 value of Free Grants of Scriptures ;
 \$2,057 paid for Colportage ;
 \$1,654 paid for salaries of Bible-Women employed by the
 Montreal Ladies' Bible Association ;
 \$1,280 balance of Mortgage on Bible House.

Your Committee has pleasure in recommending that the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds be voted to the Parent Society in aid of its general operations.

The Treasurer's Statement *in extenso* will be found in the printed Annual Report.

2.—ISSUES.

During the past year seventeen thousand and forty-six copies of the Scriptures have been issued as follows:—7,215 Bibles, 5,936 New Testaments, and 3,895 Portions, in English, French, German, Hebrew and other languages. Value, \$6,665.

The gratuitous distribution has been two thousand eight hundred and thirteen copies of the Scriptures, viz., 886 Bibles, 939 Testaments, and 988 Portions. Total value, \$683. The applications from Missionary Societies and from others have received considerable attention. The following have been granted:—To the Methodist Missionary Society, the French Evangelization Society and the Chinese Mission of the Presbyterian Church, the Grande Ligne Baptist Mission, Sabrevois Church of England Mission, Boys' Home, the Samaritan Hospital, Christian Workers, Argenteuil Mission per the Rev. A. B. Given, Anticosti Island, Andrews' Home, Arabians, Oka Methodist Mission, Young Men's Christian Association, Young Women's Christian Association; and various grants of Scriptures through the colporteurs and through the Branch Bible Societies.

3.—THE BRANCH SOCIETIES.

Our District Secretary, the Rev. Henry Gomery, has completed his annual round of visits to the Branch Societies, and his report,

printed in detail later on, shows that his work has been done faithfully and with good results; the sales and free contributions have increased by \$1,015 during the past year. The following summary will be of interest:—

Another year has passed with all its vicissitudes of storm and sunshine, snowdrifts and flooded roads; these have borne hardly sometimes on the outward man, yet upon considering the whole year's work, with all its attendant hardships, there has been cause for congratulation that our good work commends itself to so many Christian friends. Perhaps the cause is not far to seek. It is that we build our trust not on the efforts of the individual Bible Colporteur, Missionary or Agent, but upon the Book of God, the *Message*, not the messenger.

Sixteen new places have been visited by your Agent during the year, with varying promise of future prosperity.

"Hard times" is a not infrequent cry, yet I venture to ask for a single church which has been injured by too great liberality to any missionary effort. Is there even an individual so generous beyond the reach of the promise, "Honour the Lord with thy substance and with the first fruits of all thine increase, so shall thy barns be filled with plenty and thy presses shall burst out with new wine." (Prov. iii., 9-10.)

I would not leave the impression that our Society is falling back in finances, for we have most humbly to bear witness that the good hand of our God has been upon our work to incline the hearts of His people to give more liberally to the Bible cause.

Speaking for the Branch Societies, there is a stronger desire to look up needy and aged persons and provide them with the Word of God. Our sales also have increased, new depositaries have been opened, and interest is awakening in hitherto careless communities.

One word to Ministers of the Gospel. While I desire to acknowledge the Christian zeal and kindness of very many whose co-operation and generous contributions, aye, and hospitality, have gladdened my heart, and proved the Catholicity of the Gospel of Christ, there are yet some who "do not like to see money going out of the parish or circuit" for any object, however grand and holy. For such we pray that their heart may expand under the influence of the suffering Son of Man "who, seeing the multitudes, was moved with compassion on them, because they fainted, and were scattered abroad, as sheep having no shepherd," of whom "Saith He unto His disciples, The harvest truly is plentiful, but the labourers are few. Pray ye, therefore, the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth labourers into His harvest."

May the blessing of our Father dwell richly on all our earnest workers who have gained such a measure of success this year.

"Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name give glory for Thy mercy and for Thy truth's sake."

4.—COLPORTAGE.

During the past year six Colporteurs have been employed—two English-speaking, one French, speaking both languages, and three French; four have been at work the whole year, and two for shorter periods.

They have travelled in the following Districts and parts thereof, engaged in the sale and distribution of the Scriptures :—Chateauguay, Huntingdon, Beauharnois, Joliette, Berthier, Three Rivers, Argenteuil, Dundas, Leeds, Richelieu, St. Hyacinthe, Vercheres, Chambly and Wolfe.

A tabular statement of the work of the several Colporteurs will appear in the printed Report.

5.—MONTREAL LADIES' BIBLE ASSOCIATION.

The Report of the Ladies' Auxiliary Bible Association shows increased interest in collecting funds and a rapidly extending usefulness. The following extract will be read with interest :—

“ Six Bible-Women have been employed, including one supported by the Parent Society for French work, one, by Miss Papineau, for the General Hospital, and one sustained by a lady of Montreal. During the past year 12,215 visits have been made, and in one of the newer districts there have been sold 94 Bibles and 46 Testaments. This quiet, earnest work continues to be carried on, as organized by the President of the Association, twenty-six years ago. It has never been connected with any church or charity. Its field is the city, where the misery, ignorance, helplessness, temptation and despair of the suffering poor almost touch the wealth, comfort, education and luxury of the rich. The workers are Christian women, who offer to those who are walking with weary steps under the cold, dark shadows, the Bible, as holding the only light which can harmonize the discords and harsher colors of human existence, and who, in doing so, seem often to require larger gifts of heavenly wisdom than those who seek to persuade the savage to break his blind idol and worship the great Creator of the sky above him and the earth on which he stands.”

All of which is respectfully submitted on behalf of your Committee.

SPRING TOUR.

APRIL.

24th.—**St. Lambert.**—Had our meeting in the Methodist Church, the Revs. J. W. Dart, M. Watson, and E. R. Kelly, all the Protestant ministers with us, taking part in the best meeting I have seen here. New officers were appointed; I trust they will carry on the work as successfully as our friends in the past year, which is, I think, the best on record.

28th.—**Sunday, at Laprairie.**—I must change this date for next year, as I again had to walk the whole distance to and from here, and the roads were not dry enough to enable the members of the Society, not many at the best now, to come out to the service. Our dear friend, the Rev. T. C. Perry, had worked and persuaded others to work, so we had a fair report.

MAY.

2nd.—**Valleyfield.**—Meeting in Methodist Church, the Rev. Jno. Armstrong presiding, (our old friend has since, by the choice of his brethren, been placed in the president's chair of the Montreal Methodist Conference, upon which honor we present our congratulations), the Rev. J. E. Duclos also taking part; the proceedings were of a promising character. We hope this thriving town will take its due share in Bible work.

3rd.—Drove to **Laguerre**, J. D. McDonald, my kind host, presiding at a really good meeting, when a good report was presented.

5th, **Sunday.**—**Dundee** in the morning, the Rev. Dr. McDonald's people came out well, both in numbers and in their subscriptions; the officers must have done their duty.

Kensington in the afternoon; it was the turn of the Methodist Church. I was told there would have been far more present but for a great funeral late in the morning, but I don't know where they could have found places. Here the funds were well supported.

Athelstan in the evening, the Presbyterian Hall being well filled. The Rev. A. Rowat giving, as always, his generous sympathy and help. Our Secretary reported next morning a goodly subscription list.

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6th.—**Huntingdon.**—One of those early days in spring time, with unexpected sweltering heat, left only a few good earnest friends with energy to attend our meeting. In the absence of the President, W. S. Maclaren, Esq., the Rev. J. Hutchinson took the chair; the Rev. Wm. Craig also took part. Jas. McGregor, Esq., our worthy Secretary, had an excellent report of last year's work.

7th.—**Dewittville.**—A pleasant little meeting of Christian Endeavor, in favor of the work.

8th.—**Ormsdown.**—Meeting in Methodist Church, Col. McEachran presiding, Revs. D. W. Morrison and T. H. Wright with us; fair meeting, but not what this place could do if put to the test.

9th.—**Anderson's Corners.**—Good meeting among my old friends. On this, my third visit, I found the officers had got to earnest work, having collected nearly seventeen dollars.

10th.—**Franklin Centre.**—Great revival of interest was practically shewn by over nineteen dollars' subscription. Miss Pollica and the officers are to be congratulated. The Rev. Messrs Beatty, Davis and Brown contributed to a successful meeting.

12th, **Sunday.**—Morning at **Russeltown.** Kindly reception by the Rev. D. R. Drummond, the new pastor. Subscriptions to be forwarded later.

In the afternoon drove up to **Covey Hill.** Good attendance, fair report. Our President, J. Curran, Esq., had been called away by death since my last visit.

In the evening to **St. Chrysostome**, in the same pastorate. Here also, I found subscriptions had not been gathered.

13th.—**Boxham.**—If the subscriptions are as good as the meeting, we shall look for a great advance. The Revs. T. B. Jeakins and Fowkes gave us their hearty support and spoke well.

14th.—**Hemmingford.**—Meeting in Methodist Church, with only fair attendance; missed our tried friend, Julius Scriver, Esq., M.P., who was engaged in his parliamentary duties. A good report was furnished of last year's work. F. S. Proper, the President, was with us, supported by the Revs. Mackay and Jeakins.

15th.—On the invitation of Mr. Jeakins, gave an evening to **Hallerton**, to interest our friends there in our work. It is not advisable to open a branch so near Hemmingford. Still, we trust there will be a stimulus to the successful work of the general branch.

16th.—**St. Remi.**—At the meeting here it was resolved, on motion of the Rev. Mr. Macdougall, to amalgamate this branch with **Beech Ridge.** The numbers here of our Protestant friends being steadily reduced.

17th.—**Beech Ridge.**—Good meeting here, the Rev. Mr. Macdougall

presiding. Considerable interest was evidenced, although subscriptions were not fully equal to last year.

19th, Sunday.—English River, Howick and Georgetown.—Three services held here, the two first well attended, the third spoiled by a rain storm. According to custom here, this branch (comprising the three stations) no subscriptions are taken up at the time of meeting, but the total returns since our last meeting reached one hundred and eleven dollars and fifty-five cents. We wish other branches could shew as good results.

20th.—St. Louis de Gonzague.—A very good meeting, G. Swanston, Esq., presided. The Rev. J. McCuskar was prevented attending by sickness in his family. Mr. Goodall reported a good list of subscriptions. The chairman gave us a good address.

21st.—Beauharnois.—Meeting here was not as well attended as we could wish, although the Rev. Jas. Boyd had well announced it. This is a place where it has been customary to give the collection at the time of meeting, not to take up subscriptions, a method always unsatisfactory, as any unfavorable weather kills any possible chance of success. Our friends only need organization to make this one of our successful branches.

22nd.—Chateauguay.—A good meeting and a good report. The subscriptions taken up here being more than three times the amount at Beauharnois, in a church composed (I think) of fewer members. Well done, little branch. I took steamboat next morning for Montreal, and two days later started on my trip for places north of the St. Lawrence.

25th.—Terrebonne, where we held a pleasant meeting with this new branch, which showed eleven dollars and forty cents as the result of first year's working. The Rev. Mr. Ascah drove over to be present with us.

26th, Sunday.—Mascouche.—Active work in taking up subscriptions had not been done, so far, but this is promised at an early date by the Revs. Brown and Ascah. Mr. Robinson was appointed Secretary.

27th.—Joliette.—A long ride of over thirty miles over clay roads in the rain, made a pretty hard day's work, followed, however, by a cheering meeting, the pastor presiding. Although the numbers of our friends are few in this French town, the report was very favorable. I had to leave my horse to the kindness of Mr. Carswell, our President, for a few days, while I went to

28th.—Radnor Forges.—This being another venture on to new ground, your agent was glad to be rewarded by a good meeting in point of numbers. Much interest was shown.

29th.—Three Rivers.—Meeting here in Presbyterian Church was

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most promising, the attendance being largely composed of the younger members of the congregation. These we are always glad to see, as we rejoice when the hope of the church shows an interest in such work as ours. Mr. Robitaille sent a good report; the Rev. J. R. McLeod also showed a good list of sales. The Rev. Messrs. Stuart (Anglican), and W. W. Ryan (Methodist) being absent from town, A. Houliston, Esq., our President (and my good host) conducted the meeting.

30th.—Sorel.—Through the kindness of the Rev. Canon Anderson I was permitted, for the first time in the history of Sorel, to bring our work before the Protestants of this place, some being present to whom the Word of God had proved to be a light in a dark place. ("Thy Word giveth light.") The Rev. Mr. Des Brisay, curate in charge, rendered kindest co-operation. My reception here was such as to warrant my placing Sorel on the list for the coming year.

31st.—Back by steamer to Berthier, where Mr. Carswell, of Joliette, had kindly sent my horse. I drove to Kildare where we had an apology for a meeting that night. Many of our friends having left here, it does not seem advisable to spend a day here in future years. Mr. Stafford, our tried friend, will still help us all he can.

JUNE.

2nd, Sunday.—Rawdon.—Had good services in the English Church here, and also at Wexford, large congregations each time. Our friends at Rawdon have done well during the past year. As the Methodist minister was away, my helper was the Rev. W. Davies and also my kind host.

3rd.—New Glasgow preserves the even tenor of its way; the same kindly greetings, with the addition of one new family, that of the Presbyterian pastor, the Rev. P. S. Vernier, who rendered every assistance in his power. The collectors had done their work well for the past year.

4th.—Shawbridge found a numerous audience awaiting me on this, my second visit. An old friend, the Rev. S. Maudsley, had left here, hence, probably, the organization of last year had not fulfilled my expectations, but work is to be undertaken speedily.

5th.—Morin Flats.—Some local religious disturbance spoils our work here this year, and a heavy storm of rain prevented any meeting.

6th.—Mille Isles.—Large meeting, showing the deep interest of both pastors, the Revs. J. MacCarter and H. Meek. The Depository here reported large sales, and collectors were appointed to efficiently cover the ground. We expect to have a good report here.

7th.—**Lakefield.**—Our first meeting here resulted favorably. A representative organization has been formed, with great promise of future usefulness.

10th.—**Brownsburg.**—A small meeting held here, the first for many years. It is too early to pass judgment upon the probabilities of this place, although much interest was shown.

11th.—**Dalesville and Edina.**—The Rev. Mr. Soutter with a goodly number of his flock were present at our meeting, and, as a result, collectors were appointed to assist in the work of the Society.

12th, **Lost River**; 13th, **Lake View**; 14th, **Arundel.**—These places, although they may not be lost sight of, have not the immediate prospect of becoming paying branches of our Society. Meetings were held in each place, but sufficient interest to organize was not evident at the present stage.

17th.—**Harrington East.**—A well-attended meeting here, but in the absence of the newly-appointed pastor, the Rev. P. D. Muir, who had promised to be there, the meeting commenced so late that it was not advisable to attempt organization.

18th.—**Avoca.**—Found the Rev. P. D. Muir, (recovered from his indisposition which had detained him the previous day) had made every preparation for a good meeting. The Baptist and Church of England members were also in attendance, so that the meeting was a decided success, all these taking part. This was my first visit. Avoca seems clearly to be a good field for our work.

19th.—**Grenville.**—Meeting in Methodist Church which was tastefully adorned with flowers. The Rev. D. Brill, the pastor, the Rev. W. Harris, Anglican; the Rev. Mr. Hamilton, Presbyterian, each helped to render this a happy season. A cordial vote of thanks was rendered to our Secretary, Mr. Wilson, who after many years' faithful service, had tendered his resignation. T. Williamson, Esq., was elected to fill that position. A good report of work done during the year.

21st.—**Cushing.**—The Rev. Mr. Fraser had prepared for a good meeting. The place had been well canvassed. Chas. Cushing, Esq., gave us a pleasant address, adding decidedly to the interest of the evening.

23rd, **Sunday.**—**Grande Freniere**, in the morning, had maintained its good name. Its collectors had been in earnest in their work, securing good returns.

St. Eustache, in the afternoon, had beaten its own past record, and collected a larger amount than in any previous year I have visited this place.

St. Therese in the evening. I had hoped to have met the Rev. W. T. Morrison, just called to be pastor, from whom I expected

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much in the way of co-operation, but he was engaged in another part of his charge. The finances here were not up to last year; we had, however, a good service.

This was the last station on my Spring Tour. On the whole, I am thankful to have found weather and roads so propitious for our meetings, and that the hearts of our friends are still warm in the desire to promote this branch of God's work.

SUMMER TOUR.

AUGUST.

5th.—(From Montreal to Laprarie by steamer) drove to Napierville. Our Secretary, Mr. Marceau, had left for Europe, but before doing so, had made all necessary arrangements for a successful meeting. Good returns were presented by Wm. Marceau, Esq.

6th.—Lacolle.—Meeting in Methodist Church thinly attended, but since our last meeting a strong effort had been made, and \$11.42 collected for our work. The work will be commenced for this year by our Secretary, E. A. Force, Esq.

7th.—Noyan.—Meeting in Anglican Church. A cheering attendance and good subscription, united to make a very pleasant occasion.

8th.—Clarenceville.—Had the most encouraging meeting I have yet seen here; good work should result, with the combined energy of President and Secretary. The sale of Scriptures had been fair.

9th.—Philipsburg.—Had the kind help of the Revs. E. S. Howard and F. Allen. Subscriptions were in advance of last year.

11th, Sunday.—Pike River and Maple Dale.—In my absence, the Rev. E. S. Howard kindly took my place, preaching in both these churches, in his circuit. The fast decreasing Protestant population in these places causes a light subscription list.

12th.—Mystic.—The numbers were small, but our collectors had a better showing. Miss Sulley is inspiring the other officers by her own energy.

13th.—Bedford.—Work here had been delayed, so our numbers were thin. The Rev. W. H. Nye was elected President. We hope no time will be lost by our collectors in commencing their work.

14.—Stanbridge East.—The interest here was divided by an event of great local importance involving also a heavy call upon the generosity of our friends. However, the drawback to our success will, we trust, be only temporary. Rev. C. Rollitt took part in our meeting.

15th.—Dunham.—Met in basement of Methodist Church, R. P. Small, Esq. presiding. Miss E. Baker presented a favorable report Rev. G. A. Mason was with us.

16th.—Frelighsburg.—Meeting in Town Hall. Rev. Canon Davidson presided. Rev. N. P. Yates also took part. Subscriptions not up to last year. I fear the work had been delayed too long to ensure success.

18th.—Abbot's Corners.—Sunday morning. Preached in Baptist Church. The interest here has revived. A good canvas had produced good returns. In the afternoon drove to Abercorn and preached to a large congregation in the Union Church; here also good results had rewarded the efforts of our lady collectors.

In the evening drove to Sutton. A noble congregation was ready in the Methodist Church, service in the other churches being suspended. Rev. J. Garvin (Advent) took part; here a capital subscription list had followed persevering efforts of our collectors, gratifying our secretary, Dr. Cutter, to whom much of the success is due, both in subscription list and sales.

19th.—West Brome.—Small meeting, but subscriptions in advance of last year. We congratulate Mr. Pettes.

20th.—Brome Corners.—Here we elected as secretary Miss E. Morgan, securing, we believe, an efficient officer.

21st.—Knowlton.—Met as usual in Temperance Hall, the Rev. W. Smith presiding. The Rev. W. P. Chambers played the organ, or rather part of it, some of the notes evidently were not in accord with us; otherwise the meeting was most harmonious. Subscriptions fair.

22nd.—Accepting the invitation of the Rev. W. P. Chambers to try a meeting at Bondville, we drove over and broke ground there; had a good audience whom I addressed on our work. A warm invitation was extended to your agent to come again next year.

23rd.—Cowansville.—I had just arrived at our President, Dr. Gibson's, when the rain fell heavily. My fears forboded a ruined meeting, but our friends proved more faithful than I. They came out in good numbers and a most interesting and hearty meeting resulted. Owing to bereavement in the family of the Misses Jaques (in the death of G. E. Jaques, Esq., of our Montreal Committee) the collecting was not fully complete, but under the businesslike care of our secretary, the Rev. Ernest Taylor, we confidently anticipate a good result.

25th.—Sunday a.m.—East Farnham.—Addressed a numerous congregation and received subscription in advance of last year. One venerable friend, the Rev. A. Vilas, had passed away during the year, "Simply trusting," having "witnessed a good confessor."

29th.—**Waterloo**.—Meeting in Parish Hall, E. D. Lawrence, Esq., presiding. Archdeacon Lindsay and the Rev. J. Groulx took part. Report not fully up to last year's; some ladies were added to the committee, we shall look for corresponding results. Sales here have been good.

30th.—**Frost Village**.—Another new station, which, judging from the good reception and actual work done already, promised continued usefulness. The officers elected were: A Whitecomb, Esq., president; Archdeacon Lindsay and the Rev. J. Irwin Strong, vice-presidents; Mrs. McIntosh, secretary.

SEPTEMBER.

2nd.—**South Stukely**.—The work here had been prepared in a very businesslike fashion, so, though the meeting was small our president, the Rev. J. Garland, gave me an excellent report. I was very sorry to miss my friend the Rev. Mr. Fowkes, who was absent at the Methodist district meeting.

3rd.—**Eastman**.—Although this place has been on our list for two previous years and I had preached once on Sunday, in 1893, the next year arrangements had, from some cause unknown to me, failed altogether, this was the first time I had any practical chance of explaining our object and the nature of our work, to an interested audience. 10th.—Cassville.—Capital meeting and fair report, showing that Mrs. Bartlett had worked well.

11th.—Ayer's Flat.—Have now organized a branch here. Carlos Mack, Esq., president; M. Hunt, Esq., vice-president; S. Hetherington, Esq., secy. and depository.

12th.—Massawippi.—Improvement in numbers at our meeting, but report a little behind last year. J. Parker, Esq., presided. I missed our dear friend here, my kind hostess of other years, who had passed away from us.

13th.—Waterville.—Always gives us a pleasant welcome. Dr. Power, the president, too modest to preside, always crowds his minister into the chair, which the Rev. G. Craik occupies with kindly grace, and our secretary who says so little yet always sends in good returns. It is not always the people who say the most who do the most.

15th, Sunday.—Hatley.—Service in Church of England, earnest and impressive. Mr. Boyes had worked with his usual diligence and success!

Way's Mills.—Some confusion as to time spoiled our afternoon meeting here. We have not been able to call this a branch as yet. Will try again.

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Heathton' Sunday evening.—Another new venture. Kindly interest here, but needs more work to make it a success.

18th.—Barnston.—Bright, pleasant meeting in Baptist Church. The Rev. Mr. Reekie, in charge here, presided and gave us a cheery address. An improvement was shown in collectors' work.

24th.—Coaticook.—The Rev. Lee Holmes took part in the meeting held in his own church basement, O. M. Moulton, Esq., in the chair. The Rev. J. Chandler, for so many years associated with us, also another, a lady, each respected and beloved, had died since our last meeting. The Rev. James Green's visit here and at Barnston had gratified his old friends and associates very greatly. Funds in good shape. Sales of Scriptures large, (\$75.00.)

25th.—Dixville.—Earnest though quiet service in the English Church, the Rev G. H. Murray presiding. The financial aid here is small, but the essentially missionary aspect of our work must be practised as well as preached by the travelling agent of the Bible Society, one result of this is evidenced by the invitation given for me to extend my visit next year to three other places, going from Coaticook to *Perryboro, *Hall's Stream, *East Hereford, Dixville, (those marked * being new ground.)

26th.—Compton.—Meeting in the Methodist Church, the Rev. R. Smith presiding. The work here of the secretary is noteworthy, for to his efforts especially our success is due; the ladies of the village allow him, a business man, to do the collecting, Miss Farwell in her district, and Miss Rugg, our faithful depository, are the exceptions.

27th.—Moe's River.—I called here in the afternoon, met a few faithful friends to whom the Society's work commends itself as the Lord's business. Gave an address in the Baptist Church, received their contributions and then journeyed on to Martinville for the evening, where in the Methodist Church our gathering was held; was glad to learn that an increased energy had been shown in the work of collecting subscriptions, as shown in the returns.

29th, Sunday.—Johnville.—The officers here evidently appreciate the blessedness of giving; would that every community could share in the enjoyment of the privilege. I preached here in the morning, at Eaton Corners in the afternoon, and in the evening at Birchton, in all these our work is prospering.

30th.—Cookshire.—The brightest so far of our meetings here. E. S. Orr, Esq., our secretary, presided in the absence of our president and vice-president, both out of town, but each engaged in convention work in other centres. 3rd.—**Bury** (Robinson).—Had a good attendance in the Town Hall, with the Rev. Messrs. Washer (Anglican) and Raney (Methodist). Dr. Wales gave us a report showing subscriptions even better than last year.

4th.—**Scottstown**.—The best meeting I have seen here, and the largest subscriptions. R. B. Scott, Esq., had large returns for sales of Scriptures.

6th.—**Marsboro**.—Preached on Sunday morning to a grand congregation of Bible-loving people. It will not be their fault if God's word does not prosper in its mission throughout the world. The Rev. Mr. McQueen proceeded with the Gaelic sermon immediately after nine. Our friends had given over \$43 to our work.

Drove on eleven miles to dinner at the Manse at **Hampden**, a good number were in attendance in the church here. This was the first time I had visited this place. I think a good branch ought to be formed here. A depository had existed here; I received \$27.80 for Scriptures sold since 1890.

8th.—**Gould**.—Small meeting in Presbyterian Church. Our collectors had secured a fair success, so we look forward for larger numbers and more promising weather next year.

9th.—**Brookbury**.—Considerable advance on last year in financial success, leaving still room for improvement.

10th.—**Dudswell** (Bishop's Crossing).—Cheerful gathering in the Methodist Church here, our friend, the Rev. J. Holt Murray, presiding. Good singing, and sympathetic audience. Funds on the increase.

11th.—**Marbleton**.—Met in Parish Hall the Rev. J. Chapman in the chair, Rev. J. H. Murray also taking part. The slight decrease in funds, we trust, is only for the year. The meeting unanimously elected the Rev. J. Chapman as president.

12th.—**Angus**.—A dark rainy night spoiled our business meeting I hoped to organize here, but have faith to hope for greater success next year. By the courtesy of the Rev. W. Adcock I preached here and at **Ascot** on Sunday; still opening up new ground and sowing seed for another year's reaping.

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14th.—**Lennoxville.**—Another slender meeting. We resolved to give the village a rest next year and give Huntingville a turn. Collections have been taken up there for this branch for years past. All the books were not yet brought in, so we cannot fully report, but our collectors are staunch and will complete the work.

Gilkieson. The Depositaries reported sales amounting to \$165.

16th.—**Windsor Mills.**—Two weddings divided nearly all the interest of the Protestant community; we wish the participants much happiness, notwithstanding our depleted meeting. Some of our collectors, faithful though their work has hitherto been, had not been so careful to call on all this year, so for the present we note a decrease. However, Mr. Finlay, our secretary, suggests the completion of the canvass, which may improve the financial returns considerably.

17th.—**Kingsbury** had done very well, although the day had been wet, a heavy fall of snow had made the roads very muddy, when a sudden fall of temperature had frozen the mud hard, but for all this our meeting was well attended, the returns during the past year had been excellent. Our secretary, J. McClung, Jr., had left for McGill University, so we elected G. McCrackin, who had proved himself a worthy and efficient officer before. We will expect good returns before the year closes. The Rev. J. McClung stood by us as faithfully as in other years.

18th.—**Richmond** is better in action than appearances would warrant; our numbers seemed smaller in the large and handsome Presbyterian Church. Our president, the Rev. Dr. Tanner, having left, the Rev. Dr. Kellock was elected. Our secretary, W. F. Nelson, expressed a wish to be relieved of his duties, but consented to complete the arrangement for the collections this year and forward the same. The meeting elected a gentleman to fill the office, but as he was absent from the meeting, I waited upon him to learn if he would accept; as he declined to do so, I was pleased to be able to secure the services of H. P. Wales, Esq., for the responsible position.

21st.—**Danville.**—Good numbers attended our meeting in the Presbyterian Church, the pastor presiding, the Rev. W. Henderson, (Meth.) also taking part. With returns not completed, this well conducted branch was able to pay over \$100 in free contributions, be-

sides nearly \$34 for sales. The Rev. J. G. Sanderson and Mr. Leet, both faithful and tried friends, have died during the year.

22nd.—Kingsley Falls.—Meeting here was well attended, the interest of our friends was very manifest. Our sales here had been larger than ever before; our officers had done well.

23rd.—Trenholme keeps up its reputation for earnest, quiet sympathy with the Bible work. The same faces at our meetings. Our success here cannot be measured by the amount raised. We count a new friend here, the Rev. J. S. Sykes, whom I had never found out before.

24th.—Ulverton.—Successful meeting here, the Revs. Adams and Horner being present, the former opening the proceedings and the latter contributing an able speech. In the absence of the secretary, J. Millard, Esq., read the report of increased contributions. Wm. Mountain, Esq., presided.

25th.—South Durham may be "dropped in silence for irregular withdrawal from our work."

27th.—Sunday.—Preached in the morning at the English Church at Bethel, (having looked after the business on Saturday, sales and subscriptions show some advance). The place was so full that more seats had to be brought in. Drove on to Zion, here also found a large congregation and increased contributions. Lawrenceville at night. Met with a very kind welcome from old friends and some new ones. The Rev. W. Humphrey showed great courtesy. I look for Lawrenceville to again become a living branch society.

28th.—Warden.—A good if not a large meeting was held in the English Church Hall, where the secretary, Mr. Bowker, reported that our collectors had gathered a larger list of subscriptions. Rev. J. Thompson presided.

29th.—Savage's Mills.—This church is also under the pastoral care of the Rev. J. Thompson, who took charge of our meeting. I trust that our new organization may secure good results for the furtherance of the King's service.

30th.—Granby.—Meeting in the Congregational Church well attended, all the ministers being present. Rev. B. W. Day presided. Rev. W. B. Longhurst and W. Raney addressed the meeting. F. W. West submitted a favorable report. The choir aided in making the gathering joyous and thankful.

31st.—Abbotsford.—Even Hallowe'en did not spoil our meeting. Our force of speakers was exceptionally strong. Besides the Rev. H. Horsey, who, at the request of Wm. Marshall, Esq., the veteran president, took the chair, we had the Rev. Ernest Taylor of Cowansville and the Rev. A. R. McDuff of Dharmasala in the Punjaub (India.) I should like to hear the same addresses at our Montreal Annual Meeting. Ours was a great blessing. The efficiency of this branch society is well maintained.

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NOVEMBER.

1st.—**St. John's.**—Good arrangements had been made for the meeting in the Baldwin Hall. Our secretary, T. A. Cousins, Esq., had an especially good report as compared with recent years. Our friends, the Rev. W. Windsor and the Rev. B. P. Lewis, could not be with us, but Conference in its wisdom had sent the Rev. G. H. Porter to labor here. He gave us an eloquent address, full of fire, adding much to the interest of our gathering.

ST. LAWRENCE TOUR.

In my journey up the St. Lawrence I hoped to take my horse and buggy on the steamboat Alexandria, but the low water in the river caused several delays and one serious accident. I lost, therefore, four days. All the work had been done in my absence by friends to whom I had telegraphed, except in Gananoque, where some steps will be taken to revive interest in our work, and maintain the honor of this important town. Maple Grove had done fairly well, the Rev. W. Williamson had kindly filled my place here and also at Wilstead, where, owing to the serious illness of our president, P. Richardson, Esq., his daughters were unable to undertake the collecting. Messrs. Robert Wilson and Joseph Cliff had gone over part of the ground.

Lansdowne held its meeting on Nov. 11, the Revs. C. J. Young and J. Fairlie taking the oversight. A good report of sales of Scriptures and contributions was given by Mr. J. Redmond.

12th.—**Escott** held her meeting, the Rev. A. G. Robertson acting for me. Sales of Scriptures had been good, evidencing the value of the local Depository opened last year. Subscriptions had been taken up. A good feeling shown.

13th.—**Mallorytown** had a good attendance with the help of the Revs. J. Wright and L. Conley, and the best report I have seen from the collectors. It is evident that our secretary, Mr. T. Mallory, puts his heart into the work, and that good feeling animates the churches here.

14th.—I visited all the above places and held a capital meeting at Caintown, where our friends had rallied in good force. Some of our collectors had excelled their previous efforts with encouraging results. My reception was of the heartiest. Evidently our work occupies a warm place in the affections of the Lord's people.

15th.—**Lyn.**—Our officials had prepared for a successful meeting and expected it. The Revs. W. Perley and J. J. Wright contributed their share, and Jas. Cumming, Esq., presided over us with genial

wisdom. The report of Mr. O. Mallory was of continued advance.

17th.—**Sunday Morning at Fairfield**, where our friends are comparatively few, and our success is not great, yet some of our friends here we could not pass by without pain. To **Algonquin** in the afternoon, always a cheering place, where a hearty welcome and ready sympathy awaits me. This is practically shewn in the results to our treasurer, the Rev. J. Murdoch giving me valuable help.

Maynard in the evening. The Rev. J. B. Hicks welcomed me to his church. I have here from both Baptist (last year) and Methodist (this year) people, promise of hearty assistance, so hope to form a branch at my next visit.

18th.—**Prescott**.—A noble gathering in the Presbyterian Church with every element to ensure success. The pastors present, the Revs. Stewart and Hughes, who knew exactly what to say—and when to stop; the choir of sweet voices, and, I think, every officer in his place, with G. E. Johnston, Esq., with a good report. I have praised Prescott before, and it is still living up to the standard of merit.

19th.—**Iroquois**.—Our friends here had, despite of several of our friends having left, a report which told of earnest work on the part of our collectors and officers. T. S. Edwards, Esq., our president, was proud of the helpers great and small he had gathered round him, and he had good cause for his satisfaction—so had I.

20th.—**Cardinal** had suffered the loss by death of both president and secretary and by another change, the Depositary, all in this year, enough to cause a collapse in the work in many a branch. Yet here our good and tried friend, K. Macpherson, Esq., our treasurer, approved himself faithful and capable. Another good man had been appointed depositary, and the sales accounts were perfectly rendered and a satisfactory report of contributions presented at our meeting. The Rev. G. Macarthur was the only clergyman present. He presided ably; we passed a resolution expressing our sorrow for the loss of Jas. Thompson and Anson Armstrong, Esqs., good men elected to carry on this department of God's work.

21st.—A long drive with the weather at zero, to **Aultsville**. Thanksgiving Day here brought the largest numbers to our meeting I have ever addressed, Mr. Cook, Esq., presiding, and the Rev. Wm. Service, speaking with ability and force. Dr. Aults' report was in advance of other years.

This promises to be a good field for cultivation, but would be more conveniently reached from Avonmore, four miles away, next year. I was agreeably surprised here by receiving one collecting book with some subscriptions gathered in, ready for me.

25th.—Rain poured down all day, washing away all sleighing to everyone's dismay but mine, having my buggy I was of course anxious to complete my journey with it. Our meeting was at **North Lunenburg**, where a number of faithful friends gathered and a happy and thankful season was enjoyed. The Rev. A Russell read a favorable report, Elias Bush filling the chair.

26th.—Rain continuing, I reached **Wales** and found Mr. Colquhoun compiling his report for the meeting, both were good although we missed the genial co-operation of the Rev. J. McLeod. Upon his own motion Allan Grant, Esq., was replaced by S. Miller as president.

27th.—**Moullinette** had the best meeting it has seen for years, the collectors had worked well and cheered the heart of E. O. Winter, our secretary. The Rev. J. H. Williamson gave us a short but good speech.

28th.—**Cornwall** had not quite completed the collections but the interim report was a favorable one. The Rev. Dr. McNish, Hastie, and Bland (president), our secretary, J. P. Watson, (leading the singing) all contributed to a successful meeting.

29th.—**Summerstown.**—Our meeting lacked the presence of the genial pastor, the Rev. N. McKay, confined to the house by indisposition, just now, but otherwise was a very good one, interest appeared to be on the increase. Captain Baker presided very efficiently.

So ends an encouraging and prosperous month.

JANUARY, 1896.

2nd.—**Brockville.**—We commence the New Year's campaign here with a good report of finances from J. Patterson, Esq., our secretary, also of sales from Mrs. Manuel, the Hon. Judge MacDonald presiding over an interesting meeting in the lecture hall of the Presbyterian Church, the Rev. Messrs. Mackenzie, and Dr. Griffiths being present and taking part in the work of the evening.

3rd.—About a hundred miles by rail before daylight brought me down to **Coteau Landing**, where I left my horse. I found myself in a difficulty, there was not snow enough for sleighing, yet if I started on my long journey with a buggy snow might overtake me at any hour, so I took the sleigh and had a weary drag over bare roads for nearly twenty miles to **Cote St. Henry**, a small Protestant settlement near the French village of **St. Marthe**. Here a faithful few gathered together and praised God for the grand privilege of a free and open Bible, seeking His blessing on the work of the Bible Society.

4th.—An intensely cold drive to **Hudson**, I had to cut my way through a fallen tree—a relic of the recent storm—the hard frozen mud made horrid sleighing and the road seemed long, but a warm welcome at the parsonage, and good tidings as to the success of our collectors cheered me. Our meeting in the Methodist Church was good in every respect. The treasurer, the Rev. W. H. Stevens, had an excellent report, our friends are in earnest in their support and prayers for our success.

5th, **Sunday.**—I had the opportunity of joining in the worship in the churches of **Hudson** and **Como** morning and evening, in the condition of the roads I was glad to have only about fifteen miles to travel. In the afternoon at the invitation of the Rev. W. H. Stevens I drove out to **Cote St. Charles** and addressed the people in the Methodist church upon our work. There is great probability that our friends here will join in with **Cote St. Henry** branch, which needs additional strength.

6th.—A long, weary sleigh drive over bare roads to **St. Andrew's**. I could not cross the **Ottawa** river until I reached **Point Fortune**. The ice crossing here had been swept away and no new crossing marked. However, I took the risk, and my good horse jumped the widest of the cracks; we got safely over and kept our appointment that evening. The Rev. Dr. Paterson, in his report (which will appear in our Annual Report) alluded in terms of deep respect to our late president, **Jas. Middleton, Esq.**, who had passed away during the year. There is decided advance in subscriptions, but sales are small.

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7th.—Lachute.—Dr. Christie was in his place in Ottawa, and two of the local clergy were unable to be present, but the Revs. J. W. Clipsham, R. Cresswell, and N. Waddell were with us at our meeting. The reports from Hugh Fraser, Esq., shewed good sales, and from J. W. McOuatt increased subscriptions. Cheering addresses from the ministers, fraught with earnest sympathy, and hearty singing were signs of spiritual life.

Both of these branches have agreed to change the time of annual meeting to June, when my visits to Argenteuil county, front and rear, can be made on the one journey.

8th.—Drove to Point Fortune, road across the river being now properly bushed. Wm. Brown, Esq., presided over a numerous meeting. Everybody who came on wheels praised the state of the roads, and the report shewed finances to be on the increase, we thought last year's was good, but this was still better. Our new secretary, J. McClintock, has done well.

9th.—Aweary drag of twelve miles over bare roads to Hawkesbury, where we met in the Presbyterian church. The report as to monies paid in was not up to last year; the attendance was a little better. The Rev. W. M. Tufts spoke briefly, as did also J. W. Higginson, Esq., our president.

10th.—L'Original.—J. C. Cameron, Esq., asked to be relieved from the duties of president, but our members unanimously re-elected him. The meeting was numerous and a good spirit was evident; an excellent report was submitted. The Rev. J. Bennett rendered valuable aid in a happy speech. Our collectors thoroughly deserved our hearty thanks.

12th.—North Nation Mills.—This branch, with diminished numbers and means, still renders its help to the Bible cause. The old school-house on the hill resounds wit praise and prayer to the God of the Bible, whilst we hear in the intervals of worship, the passing songs and shoutings of those who close God's holy day in coarse revelry.

13th.—Plantagenet.—Sickness had been here, preventing the collectors from going their rounds, so the report of these is to come. Our meeting was an average one, A. W. Anderson, Esq., and the Rev. Mr. Harvie giving speeches.

14th.—Pendleton.—Meeting this year in the Methodist church, we struck a new section, promising fuller usefulness. A decided improvement in numbers also. We added Mr. Thos. Wiley to our officers. Miss Wight gave us a report of increased collections.

15th.—Riceville.—Notwithstanding the loss by death of our president, Mr. Geo. Coutts, we recognize that "the labourer's task was done," and his time of rest had come. Another faithful man had

taken up the work laid down by our brother who had crossed the river, so the Master's work goes on, and we "sorrow not as those who, without hope, for if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with Him." Our meeting was well attended, the Rev. H. Krupp presiding. The good work of Mr. H. Vogan, as collector, was evidenced in the satisfactory report.

16th.—**Vankleek Hill** branch, faithful and true. "Many daughters have done virtuously, but thou excellest them all." M. McCuaig, Esq., presided over an interesting meeting. With a splendid report from the treasurer, and a speech full of wit and earnestness from the Methodist pastor, and the choir with their happy selection of words and tunes, united in making our gathering one to be gladly remembered, the Rev. J. R. McLeod's guiding hand was evidenced in the good arrangement of the whole plan, so successfully carried through.

17th.—**Lochiel (Kirk Hill)**.—The Rev. A. K. McLennan had wisely invited the Christian Endeavour members to unite their strength to our ordinary attendance, so we had the best meeting here I have seen. I pray that the hearts of these young people may be so filled by the Holy Spirit that their lives may be "kept for the Master's use." The usual good report from this branch was presented. I learn that this result is almost entirely the work of one of the two strong churches here. If this has been my fault in the past, I hope to do better next year, and by the kind permission of the Rev. Mr. McKenzie, to address his people and interest them also in our work.

18th.—I drove first to **Maxville** to examine the depository accounts, as I could not do this on Sunday; I found our sales had been good. Then back to **Dunvegan**, where I found a deserted Manse, my kind friend and host, the Rev. R. McLeod, having gone to build up another charge. May he find as true and loyal hearts in his new sphere as those he leaves behind. Hospitality was readily given by Mr. Murray. Much damage to our financial returns had resulted from the endeavor, in the same week, to canvass for another praiseworthy object. This might have been prevented had our collectors commenced their work earlier, but I trust it will be a long time before our friends here will have to give a testimonial to another departing minister.

19th, **Sunday Morning**.—**North-West Glengarry Branch** covers considerable area, so the place of meeting varies from year to year. **St. Eimo Church** has the right this year. Here, too, the pastor, the Rev. N. McKay, had made a change of parishes, but in this case

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I am glad to say that both are within my sphere of work, so that I have not lost my friend. I found a good congregation. Our report was a good one. I drove on west to **Moose Creek**, West Roxboro Branch. The Rev. J. McKenzie gave up his own service, but took part kindly with us, frankly endorsing the work.

20th.—Crysler.—The meeting here was not large, nor was the report as good as I wished, yet there was evinced by the sympathy which the pastor expressed on the part of his people, an encouragement which makes us hope and expect better things.

21st.—Morewood.—Meeting in Foresters' Hall, encouraging in numbers and interest. The Rev. J. Kellock was in good form. Our secretary in his report had no returns from one district, shewing a present deficit, but we appointed, there and then two collectors to take up the work there, so we trust to hear soon of their success.

22nd.—Chesterville.—Good numbers present in Presbyterian church. The Rev. J. Kellock had driven over, as he said, to evidence his sympathy with the work. H. W. Moad, Esq., presided. A fair report was read, but not fully up to the reputation of this village.

23rd.—Winchester was only just recovering from the shock of last week's two great fires. This had interfered with the success of our workers very materially, so the report was far below that of last year. The Rev. D. G. Connery was too unwell to be present at this, our first meeting in his new and handsome church. The Revs. F. McAmmond and J. R. Coutts were with us, and gave addresses; the brevity of these was not their only excellence.

24th.—Inkerman.—Quiet meeting. The first snow-storm of the year had prevailed for some hours, but violent as it was, we were thankful to see the snow, for no loads could be hauled over roads almost bare of snow, but now the roads were so full that only the villagers could be with us. Contributions considerably below other years.

26th.—Sunday morning, Hallville.—Addressed the Sunday-school first, and later the congregation, in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. J. Higgins accompanied me in the afternoon to **Reid's Mills**, where there was a good audience and we may hope for future success in this new opening. The work of collecting in this district follows the visit of the agent so no financial statement can be made up as yet. I had not yet completed the work of the day. On my return my own horse was quickly harnessed for I had no time to lose, having to reach **South Mountain** to address the branch society there. A goodly number filled the Methodist church, large and commodious as it is, the Rev. J. Macfarland coming in from a distant appointment just in time to hear a splendid report from

Mr. W. Bailey, of honest effort on the part of our collectors and increased success following their labors., When I reached the hospitable home of our president, Jas. Mulholland, Esq., I rested from my work, believing it had been a day well spent for the Bible Society, and that all four of those addresses and sermons had fallen into honest and good ground.

27th.—Heckston.—Fairly good attendance in the Presbyterian Church, my old friend, the Rev. Thos. McAmmond, giving us a speech full of thought and feeling, decidedly the happiest I have yet heard from him. The collection of the evening was a good one, but no subscriptions had been taken up.

28th.—Kemptville.—Decidedly the most animated meeting here that I have been present at. The Rev. Messrs. McCann and McDiarmid, well-known friends of the society, with us on the platform, H. Brownlee, Esq., presiding and giving an able speech. Mr. D. Pelton presented a most satisfactory report, and the chairman promises us a still greater success in the coming year.

29th.—Montreal.—Annual Meeting. It was worth the two miles' tramp through the deep snow to catch the train, long before day-break. I came over a hundred miles and was in town before nine o'clock. The arrangements for the Workers' Conference brought me face to face with all my confreres, several of whom I had never seen before. The meeting at night was something like old times, our chiefs did nobly; every speech told of trials past and present, but there was a note of Christian triumph in each, from the earnest speech of Sir William Dawson, the beloved president, all through, to the calm deep tones of the Bishop of Montreal in the Benediction.

31st.—Back to Kemptville for my horse, which the Rev. J. H. McDiarmid had kept for me, then drove on to Oxford Mills where we had the usual meeting, F. S. Jones, Esq., presiding. Report not yet complete.

FEBRUARY.

1st.—Drove ten miles in the rain to Bishop's Mills, enquired of the Rev. D. Madill as to arrangements for the meeting and for accommodations for myself and horse, found the first all right, and for the latter I found a hotel where I dried my fur coat and robes, and was very thankful for the shelter. At night I found a capital audience gathered in the Methodist Church, I was well supported by the Revs. Madill and Barnett. For the first time for fifteen years our work was brought before my hearers—former friends of the society had passed away We re-formed this branch with encouraging prospects.

2nd., Sunday.—An early drive through bad roads, for they were hardly broken since yesterday's rain had crusted the piled-up snow in the narrow, forced roads; however, I reached **Burritts' Rapids** in good time, to learn that our committee had arranged that the service should be in the Church of England, so I was glad to be permitted to preach upon the missionary aspect of our work to an excellent congregation through the courtesy of the Rev. Mr. Roberts. After this, the secretary handed me a larger contribution than I had yet known from this branch.

To **Merrickville** for the evening, where the service was in the Presbyterian Church, the Rev. E. Aston had prepared a bright selection of music and special hymns. He is both composer and poet, so our service was of the happiest kind, and the subscriptions had been gathered in. Before leaving on Monday I had the unwelcome task of securing new officers for this branch as our president is removing, our depository pleads advanced age and asks to be relieved after many years of faithful service; our secretary lies dangerously ill, but other good men are secured to enter into their labors. May God reward the old servants, and give grace and energy to the younger men who supply in their places.

3rd.—**Easton's Corners**.—Hearty meeting in the Methodist Church, good in numbers and spirit, yet the subscription is not quite up to par. New officers were chosen. The Rev. W. Sparling gave a stirring address, so, under new conditions, we go on with courage to the battle against our strongest foe—indifference to the work of the Lord.

4th.—**Jasper**.—Rev. Messrs. Wilson and Aston both with us, the first presiding, the second conducting the choir of sweet young voices, most happily and successfully. This is but our second meeting here, and our numbers were small, but the spirit of our friends was shown in the work already done. We thank the ministers especially for their fostering interest in the new branch.

5th.—By rail to **Carleton Place**, thence I hired a sleigh and droye twelve miles to **Clayton**, where we had a numerous gathering and a good report. We are now handing over to the **Ottawa Auxiliary**, by mutual arrangement, this well-officered and prosperous branch. "Brethren, we commend you to God, and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified."

6th.—Met the usual storm, which seems a recognized visitor at the time of the annual meeting at **Boyd's Settlement**. I was driven from Clayton here by the kindness and courage of Mr. Drummond, jr., but the weather totally prevented any possibility of a

meeting, and I learned that the report could not be given as the books had not been handed in, but the amounts will be forwarded later. This branch follows Clayton, these two being in Lanark County, which is now entirely occupied by the Ottawa Auxilliary.

7th.—Reached Carleton Place through heavy roads and fallen trees, thence by rail to Irish Creek, where my good friend, H. McCrea, Esq., of Easton's Corners (who had kept my horse for me) kindly met me, so I was enabled to reach Wolford in time for the meeting, presided over by Mr. McCarthy, who himself gave us a good speech. The Rev. Mr. Wilson had also driven over to help us, with a happy timely speech. The report told of hard times and low prices.

8th.—Reached Lombardy and held a well attended meeting, the Rev. W. Weese taking part. Through the energy of John Rabb, Esq., our secretary, and good collectors, we had an excellent report.

9th., Sunday.—I started early in the morning for Toledo, arriving there just as another great storm came on. The Rev. J. J. Cameron's congregation, with some others had assembled. He commended our work to the careful attention of his people in a few earnest, judicious words. Our collectors here had not been able to complete their work through storms, and consequent bad roads.

10th.—Chantry.—Fair meeting, but no report.

11th.—Phillippsville.—Storm still continues, completely filling the roads. I got through, but no one had expected me, so there was no meeting nor any report, secretary having removed.

12th.—Forfar and Portland Branch.—Meeting at Portland Methodist Church, the first I have had here. Great interest shown and promise of increased usefulness. Subscriptions to be collected when the roads are better, and forwarded.

13th.—I broke the roads for eleven miles to Westport; it was hard on the man and harder on the horse, but he is a strong French-Canadian and not easily conquered. We had a good meeting. The Rev. Messrs. Burke and Puttenham, full of honest enthusiasm, helped me bravely, and a good report further cheered me up.

14th.—Newboro.—The state of the roads prevented a large meeting. The Rev. Mr. Short was with us; W. Shaver presiding. Both sales and subscriptions have been good.

16th., Sunday.—Elgin Methodist Church had a fair audience to welcome your agent after a long interval. The Rev. Mr. Reynolds added his effort to bring success to our work in this place.

In the evening at Morton, spoke to a considerable number on "Bible Triumphs." I hope to receive from our secretary a good report before the month closes.

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17th.—Lyndhurst.—Good audience gathered in the Orange Hall. The report presented was a shade better than last year, but there is still room for improvement. There is reason to think this will come next year.

18th.—Delta.—Our lady collectors were quite daunted by the roads this year, had it not been that our secretary had himself at the eleventh hour made an effort we would have had no report. We could not expect that he would unaided equal the result of several ladies' work in former years, but he saved the credit of the Delta Branch.

19th.—Athens.—Our meeting here was not large, but of the right kind, my friend and host, the Rev. J. J. Cameron, was alone of all our ministerial brethren, although the Rev. J. Hager sent his apology. J. Thompson, Esq., presided. A fair report was rendered.

20th.—Addison and Greenbush.—Bad roads hindered the attendance, so our meeting was small. The Rev. J. Pimlott, however, is a man of energy, who will help our work. There is a new sphere for our work near here, where it is suggested I should make a visit, Glen Buell, in Lyn circuit.

21st.—North Augusta.—After hard work breaking through drifted roads, found a comfortable home with Mr. Carpenter, and a capital meeting, and good report cheered all hearts. The Revs. J. Lawson and Danby rendered sympathetic service.

23rd.—Sunday morning.—Union service in Methodist Church, Spencerville. The officers had met me on Saturday and had a good report. Rev. J. Sinclair drove me out to Ventnor Presbyterian Church where I addressed the two congregations gathered there, upon the "Triumphs of Bible Work." Mr. J. Burnie had an excellent report of this branch. I repeated this address in the evening at Spencerville, to the Societies of Christian Endeavor and Epworth League.

24th.—Hanesville.—A good number assembled to hear about our work, but it is evident that this place is not ripe to make a good opening for a prosperous branch.

25th.—Brinston's Corners (North Matilda Branch).—Little energy apparent here, but with the re-instatement of R. Weir, as our secretary, we look for renewed life in this old branch. Memo.—To hold next annual meeting at Dixon's Corners' Presbyterian Church.

26th.—North Williamsburg.—Great improvement on last year in numbers and interest. While the local minister is wondering whether his influence for good among his people is being a success, I have no doubt on the point for here last year the Presbyterian and Lutheran churches had no pastors, while this year both are supplied,

so their influence is evidenced in the fact that where the minister leads, his people follow.

27th.—Winchester Springs.—Some local revival services had interfered with the success of the collectors, and our numbers at the meeting were scanty and the report considerably below the average, yet our sales had been fairly good.

28th.—Dunbar and Elma.—A large number of young people assembled in the Presbyterian church, but the persistent efforts of a few disorderly persons marred our success, and tried the patience of those who desired to listen. Our friend, the Rev. Mr. Stewart, was with us. The collecting had not yet been done here.

MARCH.

1st.—Colquhoun.—Rain poured on Saturday, Feb. 29th, and today the roads were impassable, except to the agent of the Bible Society. The service in the Presbyterian Church was attended by a few living close by, who, however, listened to a short address on the privilege of being "Co-workers with God." (A report of good work has since been sent in from this branch.)

I hurried on through flooded fields, my sleigh being afloat several times, however it kept right side up. When I reached Grantley the responsible officer in charge of the church had made no preparation, not expecting anyone over such a road; I was therefore compelled to drive on and wait another opportunity and better weather to bring our work before our new friends in Grantley. The rain moderated before I reached South Finch and at night a good assembly nearly filled the Presbyterian Church, and the next morning we had our business meeting; had a good report both of subscriptions and sales of Scriptures.

2nd.—Avonmore.—Fair meeting and good report. The Revs. F. De Long and T. A. Mitchell addressed the friends.

3rd.—Drove through bush roads to Gravel Hill, having to break through miles of wet snow. The meeting was good and the report better than last year.

4th.—Heavy snow and strong winds had filled the roads. I was within reach of Maxville and Dominionville, so drove through these places to balance up depositaries; reached Apple Hill, the Rev. D. McLennan gave me a hearty welcome, and presided over a good meeting. We also had a good report.

5th.—Alexandria.—Capital meeting, many young people present; good service from the Rev. D. MacLaren. Collectors had done well.

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6th.—Glen Sandfield and Brodie Branch.—Small meeting, but some of our collectors had done remarkably well.

7th.—Drove through drenching rain to Dalhousie Mills, only to find the Manse empty, the Rev. A. K. McLennan having been called away to Boston through his brother's illness. Hospitality was given readily by Mr. Morrison.

8th., Sunday.—Dalhousie Mills.—Church was only partially filled owing to the storm which had demoralized the roads. The lady collectors had been busy, so we had a fair report.

Cote St. George Church was full in the evening, yet I missed some of our friends whose faces I have learned to look for here. The secretary had as good a report as the times and weather had permitted.

9th.—A lucky mistake in the road sent me on to the river De Lisie, where I found nearly ten miles of good driving, which brought me nearly to Coteau, where I left my horse and took train into Montreal, after a hard winter's work.

Another year has passed with all its vicissitudes of storm and sunshine, snowdrifts and flooded roads; these have borne hardly sometimes on the outward man, yet upon considering the whole year's work, with all its attendant hardships, there has been cause for congratulation that our good work commends itself to so many Christian friends. Perhaps the cause is not far to seek. It is that we build our trust not on the efforts of the individual Bible Colporteur, Missionary or Agent, but upon the Book of God, the "Message," not the messenger.

Sixteen new places have been visited by your Agent during the year, with varying promise of future prosperity.

"Hard times" is a not infrequent cry, yet I venture to ask for a single church which has been injured by too great liberality to any missionary effort. Is there even an individual so generous beyond the reach of the promise, "Honor the Lord with thy substance and with the first fruits of all thine increase, so shall thy barns be filled with plenty and thy presses shall burst out with new wine." (Prov. iii., 9, 10.)

I would not leave the impression that our Society is falling back in finances, for we have most humbly to bear witness that the good hand of our God has been upon our work to incline the hearts of His people to give more liberally to the Bible cause.

Speaking for the Branch Societies, there is a stronger desire to look up needy and aged persons and provide them with the Word of

God. Our sales also have increased, new depositaries have been opened, and interest is awakening in hitherto careless communities.

One word to Ministers of the Gospel. While I desire to acknowledge the Christian zeal and kindness of very many whose co-operation and generous contributions, aye, and hospitality, have gladdened my heart, and proved the Catholicity of the Gospel of Christ, there are yet some who "do not like to see money going out of the parish or circuit" for any object, however grand and holy. For such we pray that their heart may expand under the influence of the suffering Son of Man "who, seeing the multitudes, was moved with compassion on them, because they fainted, and were scattered abroad, as sheep having no shepherd," of whom "Saith he unto His disciples, The harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few. Pray ye, therefore, the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth more laborers into His harvest."

May the blessing of our Father dwell richly on all our earnest workers who have gained such a measure of success this year.

"Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name give glory for Thy mercy and for Thy truth's sake."

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REPORT OF BRANCHES.

DANVILLE.

The Fifty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Danville Bible Society was held on October 16th, 1894, in the Advent Church. The Rev. Henry Gomery made the address of the evening. The three ministers present each spoke of the glorious work of the Gospel. The Rev. J. G. Sanderson's voice we shall not hear this evening, for God called him to Himself. For sixteen years he was a cordial friend and helper of this Society. Another firm friend and generous giver we miss this evening, Mr. Joseph Gibson; and still another, Mr. George W. Leet, who served on the committee for thirty years without a break, never once absent from the annual meeting until last year. Will his successor have such a record? We hope so. The faithful collectors from the seven districts brought to the treasurer \$118.77, which, with the collection at the annual meeting, made \$123.13. From October, 1894, to October, 1895, we have sold eighty-nine copies of the Word of God, worth \$34.07. Grants have been made of Bibles, worth \$4.40, and four copies returned to the Bible House. We have now on hand 139 copies, worth \$57.60.

REPORT.

The Thirty-sixth Annual Report of the Ladies' Bible Association and Bible Women's Effort, presents no new features. It is a record of faithful work, day by day, and week by week. Why should we expect it to be different? As in the days of Isaiah, the Word of the Lord must still be taught by "precept upon precept, precept upon precept, line upon line, line upon line, here a little and there a little, here a little and there a little."

Let us glance for a moment at the work. It is carried on in the most simple manner. The city is divided into six districts, exclusive of the General Hospital, which forms a district by itself. In each of these a woman is at work, her instructions being that she is to reside either in or near her district, and "to visit, as far as practicable, every family, especially those not connected with any church, within its limits." Her duty is "to read the Scriptures, hold religious conversation and prayer with families and individuals, and invite to Mothers' Meetings conducted by her Superintendent, or other work connected with the Mission."

Mark one thing. She gives no charitable aid. Beyond the small sum allowed her of one dollar monthly, to purchase food in cases of absolute necessity, (for any further relief she must apply to her Superintendent), she goes forth with nothing but the Word of God in her hand, offering for acceptance the Living Water, the Living Bread.

Sometimes the door, which had been opened in anticipation of some temporal gain, is shut in her face, but nothing daunted she will return day after day till she obtains an entrance. Not unfrequently the privilege is given of seeing some fruit of her toil and labour, but in many cases the work is carried on without any apparent direct result in the winning of souls to Christ.

Pointing weary mothers to the Burden-bearer whose love is beyond even a mother's, the children to the perfect "Child Jesus," the sinful and erring to the perfect sacrifice for sin; the sick and sorrowful to Him who Himself "bare our sicknesses and carried our sorrows," such is the work the Bible-women's Effort reports.

On the strength of its breadth and singleness of purpose, it appeals for support not to any particular denomination, (for it is undenominational) but to all who love our Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity and truth. The privilege of actual missionary work is not given to all, but none are withheld from some share in it. If we cannot go ourselves, at least we can help others to go, first by our prayers and interest, and secondly by our own offerings, and the offerings of others.

In this connection we would thank most gratefully the collectors of the various districts, who give up their time to this always tiring, and not always pleasant work.

We have to report the great loss to the Society in the death of Mrs. Vanneck, who, to use the words of a former report, "was a true and faithful friend of the Ladies' Bible Society; the incidental expenses connected with the Mission, rent of rooms for Mothers' Meetings, assistance to extreme cases, reading matter, etc., etc., were met from a fund specially raised during the past years by her untiring zeal. For some time before her death she was laid aside by serious illness, but still her active interest never flagged, and we cannot but pray that God who calls His workmen home, but carries on His work, may raise up one to fill her place.

Great regret was felt by every member of the Committee at the resignation of Mrs. Lewis as secretary. Her long experience in such work made her presence most welcome. The Association was happy in securing for a time the services of Miss Stirling, until her departure from Montreal, and the work has now been taken up by Mrs. Harry Hague. There is no change to record this year in either the Superintendents or Bible-women.

We would call special attention to the report of the St. Lawrence Ward.

Throughout 1894 this district was without a Bible-woman, owing to lack of funds; the matter was made the subject of much earnest prayer. On New Year's Day, 1895, (to quote from the Treasurer,) the answer came in a cheque for \$240, the Bible-woman's salary for one year. The giver withheld her name, but said, "I have put it first in my Saviour's hand, and I trust He will guide its course and let His blessing go with it all through." That this has been the case, the report for this year plainly shows, and we are sure will bring to the giver its reward.

We would tender our grateful thanks to the British and Foreign Bible Society for their grant for the payment of the French Bible-woman, and also to those who have responded to the call of the collectors, and to all who have in any way helped on the work; reminding them that "all that Jesus began to do," ours is the privilege to continue if we will only act up to that privilege.

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HOCHELAGA AND MAISONNEUVE.

The Bible-woman in connection with the work in this district, expresses her thankfulness to God for the good work accomplished during the past year. In many of the homes that have been visited there is a marked change for the better.

Many of the poor, tired mothers, who receive no encouragement from any other source, are cheered and helped by the entrance of the Bible-woman, bringing with her the Word of God, which giveth light, and as the precious promises are held out to them, some who have been almost giving way to despair, have taken fresh courage, and with renewed trust in God have again taken up the weapons of warfare, determined to fight to the end. In several cases, souls that were sunken in darkness and sin, have been brought to Christ, and are trusting Him as their personal Saviour. One case worthy of mention is that of a woman with a husband and large family to look after; she was scarcely able to read, and having no opportunity of attending the house of God, had never heard the blessed truths of God's Word. As the Bible-reader called upon her for the first time when she was in trouble, she was very pleased to see her, and seemed much comforted by conversation and prayer. At her repeated visits, as they talked together, her lack of any knowledge of the Word of God was painfully apparent. As she heard of the great love of God to man, and that God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life; she said, "Is that in the Bible?" The reader said, "Yes, and many more such beautiful truths," and as she read to her of Christ coming as a babe and living here on earth and then dying for us in order that we might be saved, she stopped the reader, and said, "Is that true? for if it is, it is very beautiful." This was her soul's first breathing after God. At every visit of the Bible-woman, she would ask for more of those wonderful truths to be read to her, until she saw such a beauty and loveliness in the life of Christ, that she was led to take Him as her own Saviour. Her simplicity and faith were beautiful, as she accepted the pardon purchased for her with the death of Christ. "Surely," she said, "the least I can do is to believe and trust Him, after all He has done for me." She is now rejoicing in a Saviour's love, and seems very happy and bright.

Quite a number of such cases might be spoken of, did space permit, but we let this speak for the good in other homes. Sometimes fathers are left with a number of helpless children, or mothers left with a large family to support. Then with loving words of counsel and advice their eyes and thoughts are directed to him who

hath said:—"Cast thy burden upon the Lord and He will sustain thee"; or "leave thy fatherless children, I will preserve them alive; and let thy widow trust in Me." Leaning upon His promises they go forth day by day trusting in Him who is ever their helper.

The Mothers' Meetings are still held on Thursday afternoons; one special feature of interest in these meetings is the number of children who attend, and from the child of four years upwards, repeat passages of Scripture learned from little cards given them. This will, we believe, be of lasting good to the children, as many of their mothers cannot take time to teach them Bible verses.

The Tuesday evening evangelistic service is full of interest and power. There has been quite an increase in numbers attending, and some have manifested a strong desire to lead a different life, and are earnestly seeking after God.

A children's choir has been formed in connection with these meetings, which is proving a great source of good, both to the children and to the meetings.

One thousand four hundred and ninety-eight visits have been made by the Bible-woman during the year, and 1,050 hours occupied.

ST. MARY'S DISTRICT.

A district that has been worked by the same Bible-woman for twenty-six years, must necessarily present a great sameness in the report, especially as this one does not consist of a shifting population; but the mothers of to-day are those who were themselves taught as children in the Mission room.

The poor are always the poor, their trials, and temptations, and needs are the same as last year, and every year before it; so also is their readiness to hear and receive the Word of God; "all whose means are scanty are rich in faith," to use the words of the Bible-woman herself. The needs of the body are often similar to the needs of the soul, and "hunger," and "thirst," and "nakedness," are words that strike home to those who know the actual daily reality of that state. One woman said, after rising from prayer, "He can give strength without food." This has been a year in which the faith of the poor in the district has been much tried.

Want of work, (the hardest trial of all to those able and willing to work,) returning day after day from the factories with "no success" written on their faces.

But the faith of many has been encouraged by looking back over the past, and seeing how they were then helped, and several direct answers to prayer for food and work have strengthened those whose faith was falling.

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Many have never known such hardship as this winter. One woman (with the honour of having the largest family in the whole district), had to limit the food to two meals a day; her thankfulness that it was two meals instead of only one, or perhaps none, constrained her constantly to speak of God's goodness.

One is struck with the neighbourly acts of kindness of the poor to each other; sending dinner to those without a dinner, or gladly lending a trifle for coal out of hard won earnings; acts whose full significance those who give "out of their abundance," can hardly comprehend.

The Mothers' Meetings still keep up their large attendance, and a growing love for God's Word is distinctly manifest; many in the busy time of moving regretted that the meetings were closed as they would have left their work to attend them. One poor man, dying of consumption, alone all day, as his wife had to go out to work, said, "The Bible is my companion."

A good deal of sickness, principally typhoid, was prevalent during the last months of the year; this was probably owing to the mild, open autumn, which, although not healthy, was a cause of much thankfulness to the poor, as, with husbands out of work, and little or no fuel or food, the winter is dreaded.

The Clothing Club, with the Library attached to it, still continues its good work, and is much valued by the people.

The Saturday Sewing School, so kindly undertaken by young ladies from the West end, who carry on the work most systematically and regularly, has increased in numbers, and the blessing it will prove to the children in acquiring habits of cleanliness and neatness, as well as being brought in contact with brighter lives and surroundings than they themselves possess, cannot be estimated.

The number of visits made in the year was 1,521, and the hours occupied 1,006.

FRENCH WORK.

A year of faithful labour of your French Bible-woman is past, with what measure of success God only knows, but we are assured that this work has not been in vain and that the Word of God read in 498 families during the year, must have left some lasting impressions in their hearts.

The work of your French Bible-woman is totally different from that of the six other Bible-women employed by your Society. Day after day she goes with her satchel filled with Bibles and New Testaments, knocking at the doors offering her books for sale—to whom? To prejudiced and hostile people, who are repeatedly told and taught by spiritual advisers that the Bible is a bad book. It

takes the wisdom of the serpent and the harmlessness of the dove to meet those enemies of the Bible and show them that they are deceived, and that this book is the most precious of all books. The Bible-woman must know how to choose such portions as will most likely excite a desire to know more of it.

I am happy to notice that Madam Piché, understands her work better and better, and knows how to reach the minds filled with prejudices, and answer their questions and meet their obstacles.

She has remarked a growing desire to know more of the Gospel, and also that the yoke of the Church is more felt as it weighs heavily on their shoulders, and that there is a deep-seated desire for emancipation. In one of her reports she says:—"A large number are still in darkness and are satisfied to remain in that position; but there are also some who are seeking after truth and are conscious of their ignorance. Among others, a woman told me, 'I need not buy a New Testament to-day; see, here is the one I bought from you two years ago. At first I was told it was a bad book to read, and that I had better burn it, as it was dangerous to keep such a book under my roof. As I wanted to make myself sure whether that was true, I began to read, and I found in it nothing that was not beautiful and calculated to do me good.'

"Everywhere we hear words like this:—'Priests forbid the reading of the New Testament because they want to deceive us. We do not want any more of that confusion in their sermons. We should have each our book to make ourselves sure whether what is taught to us is true. This is why there is so much infidelity, priests are not trusted and quite a number do not believe.'"

The work of your Bible-woman would seem to be fruitless, were we to judge by the apparent results. She needs the prayers of the Christian public, and may those who are interested in God's work remember her in their prayers.

We are timid of facing opposition; few of us would dare to visit the enemy's camp offering the forbidden book. Let us uphold the arms of those that fight in the plain, and we shall see great results.

Madame Piché has made 2,333 visits, was enabled to speak and read in 498 families, sold 6 Bibles, 54 New Testaments, 9 portions, and received in cash \$12.77.

HOSPITAL WORK.

The Bible-woman engaged in Hospital Work, reports having visited during the past year, 2,716 patients in the General Hospital or in their own city homes, where they may be seen and advised or assisted.

The lines on which this mission is worked, differ from all others. It is carried on wholly among those around whom have gathered the cold shadows of loneliness, ignorant old age, sickness and suffering. There are no Mothers' nor Social Meetings connected with it, and no Clothing Clubs, as in the districts. No Bible is offered for sale, but its soul-satisfying truths are explained and its promises are read to those who are saddened by separation from family and friends, and softened by the helplessness of pain and disease.

Only a true believer to whom special strength and aptitudes have been given, could go from hour to hour, day to day, year to year, to meet the young and old, boys and girls, men and women, sometimes from distant lands, but more frequently from nearer points and more cruel surroundings, and speak to them of a forgotten creed, or by sincere winning words persuade them to seek till they find, light and life and perfect peace.

Scattered through the daily records of all this faithful visiting, are proofs, not only of how ever-varying are the forms in which the active sympathy and Christian spirit of the Bible-woman are exercised, but of the many ways in which she is encouraged by expressions of heart-gratitude and acknowledgments of new convictions of conscience, such as, "Last evening brought me joy. A young girl rapidly followed me, after I had left the church I attend, calling me by name, and saying, 'I must speak to you, you were so kind to me in the hospital.' Continuing to walk with me, she told me of the comfortable situation in which she had been working for months, and of the regularity with which she read the Bible I had given her." As the history of the young girl had been a very sad, very hopeless one, the change was most cheering. Again, "A young man, who had only left the hospital two weeks previously, returned in an awakened, anxious state, to confess that he was seeking to know and follow our Saviour." Another, "who had been associated with Christians in Ontario, found himself among the careless and profane, and working on the Sabbath, felt unhappy, and 'longed to be right with God again.'"

And still another, who, with an elderly man, became particularly interested in my reading in the men's ward. I urged the younger to consecrate his whole life to God.

Sometimes the patients gather around the reader in groups. "A woman," the Bible-woman notes, "who confessed herself a weak Christian converted at one of the Mills's meetings, was listening attentively, when one after another joined uninvited. All belonging to widely differing churches, were most anxious to learn the truth, each one in turn asking many questions. Their thanks were

warmly given, while one, to whom the Scriptures is a forbidden volume, said, 'I like to hear the Bible being read.'

It is the weary, lonely, aged ones who recognize all that it means to them to hear again the truths to which they often listened in early life, but which have lost their hold. An old man of eighty-four, who died recently in intelligent peace, continued to repeat that "it could only be God's holy spirit that could have suggested the passages that suited him so well, and did him so much good!"

While the review of the past year's hospital work gives a large number of acknowledgments of spiritual benefit, as a result, it does not veil its difficulties nor disappointments. The successful in material interests, even in days of sickness, turn a deaf ear to all appeals.

Passing attention to the great realities of death and judgment, often chills to indifference. Loud unbelievers resist conviction, while all who have no moral sense, emphasize their lack of it by asking for Bibles which they do not intend to open, and deceive by professing to reform, when no disposition to do so is manifested. Reports, reviews, visits under the circumstances which they describe, make this mission not only increasingly important, but searchingly serious and solemn to all to whom its history is brought, and, therefore, must prove to the benevolent supporter of it, a constant subject of thankfulness to Him who inspires every wise and good thing.

ST. LAWRENCE WARD.

Through the providence of God in answering special prayer, we are able once more to report the work of our Bible-woman in this district. We feel, therefore, that first we must render our grateful thanks to Him who has heard our prayers, and has permitted us to take up again the work which for a time we were forced, through lack of means, to lay aside. We feel too that in our choice of a Bible-woman for this district we have been guided by His hand, and that He has not only enabled us to undertake the task, but chosen the instrument which we are to use.

The report of the Bible-woman shows that the work, thus providentially begun, has, as was to be expected, been greatly blessed by God. It is that of an earnest consecrated woman, filled not only with a desire to serve her Master, but with enthusiasm for her own special work, feeling it to be a great privilege, and conscious at the same time of the great responsibility it lays upon her. She shows too, that spirit of loving sympathy which means so much in work among those who are "poor and ignorant, and out of the way."

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To quote her own words, "It is not enough to read, and pray, and talk to them about Jesus and His goodness, but one must do something for them. . . . little acts of kindness, help in case of sickness."

These words are a fair summary of the Bible-woman's work throughout the year. It has been faithfully done with patient perseverance in the face of much discouragement, and with a prayerful reliance upon Him who sent her. Let us follow her in her work. No Bible-woman having been in the district for a year, the ground had to be broken afresh. She began by seeing the people and endeavouring to bring them to the Weekly Prayer Meeting, entering their names in a book. This meeting was held regularly during the year, and no better evidence of success can be given than the steadily increasing interest taken in that little gathering. The people had first to be "compelled to come in," but as the work went on, and they became conscious more and more of the presence of God in their daily life, they came willingly to hear His Word and pray to Him, and some were not afraid to speak at the meeting and tell the others what "good things the Lord had done for them."

The principal work of the Bible-woman is house to house visitation. This was systematically begun and faithfully carried out. She reports that there is little or no active opposition. There is no prejudice against the Society. It is undenominational, and runs counter to no class feeling. She was received kindly by all, and even those who, at first showed some impatience, having expected to receive temporal aid, soon came to recognize the Bible-woman as a friend, and looked to her for sympathy and counsel.

It will be noted that in this district few sales of Bibles and Testaments are made. It is rare to find a family who do not possess at least one copy of the Word of God. Yet, in many instances, it is a sealed book to those who have it in their homes, and many are in what might almost be called heathen darkness. To such, the Bible-woman is indeed a missionary, bringing out the treasures of the Word, and showing them that in Christ they have a friend and sympathizer in all the cares of daily life.

Of results that are apparent, it is too soon yet to speak. The work is unobtrusive in its character and similar in its effects. But we feel sure that fruit is even now ripening to God's honour and glory. The work, as shown in the report, is Christ-like in its character. To the Bible-woman it is given to say as Peter did of old, "Silver and gold have I none, but such as I have give I thee. In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, rise up and walk." The result she leaves with Him who sent her.

SOUTH POINT ST. CHARLES.

The story of the Bible-woman's work in this district for the past year, does not differ in any essential respects from that of former years; it is just the same tale of steady, patient effort, in humble dependence upon Him in whose strength the work is carried on, with restful confidence in the assurance that "our labour is not in vain in the Lord." This is the one and only impetus that constrains with ever increasing power to larger effort and deeper devotion. We thank God for the patient cheerfulness of our Bible-woman in South Point St. Charles, and for the encouragement granted her from time to time in seeing the erring reclaimed, the weary comforted, and the wandering sheep brought home to the fold of the Good Shepherd.

One specially encouraging incident of the past year, was the conversion of a Hollander, strongly tinctured with the free thought of his native land. Our Bible-woman found him in the course of her visiting a sick man, one on whom consumption was laying its dread hand; she followed him from his home to the hospital, and back to his family again, untiring in her sympathy both for his physical and spiritual condition; and reading, pleading, praying with him, God used her for his salvation, and some weeks before his death she had the deep satisfaction of hearing him—who had once questioned and doubted his own need and God's rich provision for that need—giving testimony to his joy and peace in believing, as one saved by "the precious blood of Christ."

We feel that our Bible-woman has been given great wisdom and tact in dealing with those with whom she meets in her daily rounds, for she has so endeared herself to many, that they turn naturally to her in all the exigencies of life, as one who shares their joys and helps them to bear their sorrows, they feel that her home and her heart are open to them at all times, and they never hesitate to call upon her for sympathy, and advice, and assistance, no matter how untimely the hour, and so she would need "a heart at leisure from itself," ever responsive to the demands made so constantly upon her. She is called for in sickness, in death, in adversity, in family disagreements, in unneighborly disputes, and a quiet, soothing word from her, with gentle expostulation, will often bring order out of confusion, and bitter words will be exchanged for conciliatory and forgiving ones. Thus she goes on in her quiet ministering, a well-known and valued friend and adviser in many a humble home, who would be sadly missed were she in any way hindered from going in and out among them.

The Mothers' Meeting has been very largely attended this fall

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and winter, an average attendance of 28 or 30 each week. There are about 90 names on the roll of a voluntary Sunday Bible Class, an average attendance of 55; Bible Class, 12; other classes, 20.

NORTH POINT ST. CHARLES.

Through all the Bible-woman's monthly reports for this year there runs a glad strain of thankfulness to the Almighty for calling her to this work of visiting the poor and friendless, cheering the discouraged, and telling the captives of sin and lust of the deliverance and salvation wrought for them through the death and life of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus the Christ.

It is impossible, in a few lines, to give many incidents from the hundreds of visits made in this district. The easiest part of the work is watching with and comforting the sick; and the most trying is advising and helping those out of work. Unavailing search for work often produces a despair that leads to unbelief, but even this trouble, when brought to God in prayer, has been again and again removed, and the needed work found. The Lord does provide for those who put their trust in Him, and the testing of faith causes many families to feel dependence on God for all things.

Here is an extract from a monthly report:—"I had conversation to-day with a Mrs. S., who through sickness and poverty had become despondent. Through the Holy Spirit's blessing, by the message read to her from the Scriptures, she accepted Christ as her personal Saviour, and her despondency was changed to a song of praise."

Another extract tells of a conversation with a young sailor out of work. He showed a Bible that his mother had given him before he went to sea, and promised to read it again daily, and ask God for forgiveness and direction. The temptations of a sailor's life had caused him to forget his mother's teaching, but his heart was touched, and he seemed to be now in earnest in seeking salvation. He promised to write to his mother, and rejoice her heart by telling of his hopes and determinations.

Again she says, "Sometimes I am weary in the work, and am glad of the evening's rest; but I am never weary of telling the unconverted how to come to Jesus for pardon and peace, and of trying to comfort the bereaved and troubled, with appropriate passages of Scripture. Infidels may scoff and find fault with God's Word, but I thank God I have found it as powerful as ever to heal the troubled and comfort the sorrowful."

The Bible-woman has been greatly encouraged by the attention

which the French Catholics of her district pay to her reading of the Bible. Their dislike of the Protestant Bible was removed when they found it told the story of Jesus' life and death so plainly.

It requires great tact to work among those who are not Protestants; let us pray earnestly that the Holy Spirit who knows the need of all hearts, and how to reach them, may give her just the words that will reveal God the Father and Christ the Saviour unto them. It is her aim to place some portion of the Bible in every house, trusting that it may do its work.

Miss Lightbody has made 1,982 visits this year, sold 94 Bibles and 46 Testaments, which amounted to \$38.80.

REGULATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR AGENTS
AND COLPORTEURS.

(A)—THE DISTRICT SECRETARY.

1. The District Secretary is charged with the oversight of the various Branches, Depositories and Agencies of this Auxilliary.
2. He has to make periodical visits, once a year, if practicable, to the Branches, for the purpose, in conjunction with the Office-Bearers of the same, of holding public services, at which services special information touching the operations of the Parent Society and of this Auxilliary is given by him ; and any necessary public business between the Branches and this Auxilliary is despatched. On such occasions he is also expected, in such ways as he may deem proper, to encourage and stimulate the people to greater zeal and effort in the work of Bible circulation.
3. He has to make annual visits to the several Depositories and Agencies connected with this Auxilliary, for the purpose of inspecting the books or stock therein contained, and of taking account of the same with the Depositories.
4. He is authorized to receive, and to give receipt for the same, any moneys due to this Auxilliary on purchase account, or offered as free contributions.
5. He may take orders for supplies of Scriptures, should such be tendered him.
6. All receipts of money and orders for Scriptures are to be duly recorded by him, and reported to the General Agent.
7. Timely notice must be given by him to the General Agent of his intended visits to Branches or Agencies, in order to the preparation by the latter of the necessary statement of accounts for stock-taking and settlement with the Depositories.
8. Any omissions or discrepancies that may be found in the statement so furnished and the books of the Depositories must be reported in writing to the General Agent, with a view to the immediate rectification of the same.
9. A monthly Report is to be prepared and sent by him to the General Committee of the Branches and Depositories visited by him, of the public services held, and of moneys received, and also of colportage operations, should these in his judgment call for special notice.
10. He is charged with the preparation of an Annual Report to the Committee, giving an account of the work and condition during

the year, of the various Branches, Depositories or Agencies that are comprised within the Society's field of operation ; and also with preparation for publication in the Society's Annual Report, of the list of Branches, etc., with their Office-Bearers, together with the Subscription Lists of the same.

11. New Branches or Depositories may be organized or opened by him in or for such districts as may be found desirable to occupy as new centres of operation.

(B)—THE GENERAL AGENT.

1. The General Agent is charged with the management of the business of the Society, as conducted in and from the Bible House of Montreal.

2. He has under his care the stock of Scriptures and other property belonging to the Society in the Bible House, and is held responsible for the safe keeping and good condition of the same.

3. It is his province to attend to the retail sales of Bibles at the Bible House, and to keep account of same.

4. A Monthly Report must be prepared by him and submitted to the General Committee at its regular Monthly Meeting of :—(a) the condition and amount of stock on hand, or required ; of the number of copies sold during the month at the Bible House, with an account of cash received for the same, together with a statement of the same items in the corresponding month in the previous year ; of the state of account between this Auxillary and the Parent Society, or other parties ; of applications for grants of Scripture ; and, generally, of any other matters he may deem of importance to bring under the notice of the Committee. (b) Of receipts and disbursements made at the Bible House during the month.

5. Special Reports may be called for from him by the General Committee or any of the Sub-Committees.

6. Notices of all Meetings, whether of the General Committee or of the Sub-Committees, are issued by him ; and he has charge of the place of meeting of the same.

7. On the receipt from the District Secretary of the programme of his intended visits to the Branches or Depositories, the General Agent is required to furnish him with the accounts of the several Branches set down on the programme, at least one week previous to his, the District Secretary's, departure on his tour of visitation, in order that time may be afforded for examination of these accounts by both Agents together if found necessary.

8. Copies of the Monthly Report and of the Abstract of the Annual Report of the Parent Society, as also copies of all other publications sent to the General Agent, which may contain information useful to the District Secretary in his visits among the Branches, are to be

promptly and regularly sent forth from the Bible House to such places as he, the District Secretary, may designate.

9. All mistakes, omissions, or irregularities that may be reported by the District Secretary, as existing in the books or statements or accounts appertaining to any Branch or Depository, are required to be placed on file and promptly attended to; and such file may be called for at any meeting of the General Committee or Agency Committee.

10. Orders for supplies of Scriptures from the Branches, the District Secretary or Colporteurs are to be carefully entered and promptly executed; and in case of any unavoidable delay occurring of the kind of books ordered not being in stock, notification of the same must at once be made to the persons sending the order, and further instruction sought from them.

11. An account current with each Colporteur employed by the Society is required to be kept of all books sent to his order, of cash received from him, of time spent in the service of this Society reported by him, and of payments on account of stipend made to him.

12. The General Agent has to prepare for the Corresponding Secretary all statistics or other details appertaining to the department of the General Agent that may be called for in the preparation of the Annual Report of the Society or of any Special Report.

13. On the publication of the Annual Report, the General Agent is required to distribute, without unnecessary delay, copies of the same to subscribers entitled to receive them, both in the city and country districts.

14. The General Agent has the oversight of such Assistant or Assistants as may, with the sanction of the Committee, be employed in the Bible House.

RULES RECOMMENDED FOR BRANCH SOCIETIES AND BIBLE ASSOCIATIONS.

The following Constitution of a Branch Society and Bible Association is inserted for the purpose of facilitating the formation of those useful institutions. Persons in the country are particularly invited to form themselves into Auxiliary Societies. Besides discharging the duty of assisting in disseminating the Word of God (which is incumbent on every Christian) they would consult their private advantage, and thereby be enabled to obtain Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, whereas at present they purchase from country merchants at a higher rate.

1. That the object and Constitution of the British and Foreign Bible Society have the cordial approbation of this meeting.

2. That a society be formed to be called "The Branch Bible Society, for the purpose of co-operating with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Montreal Auxilliary Bible Society, in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scripture, both at home and abroad.

3. That, conformably to the principles of the British and Foreign Bible Society, the Bibles and Testaments to be circulated by the Society shall be without note or comment, and those in the language of the United Kingdom of the authorized version only.

4. That all persons subscribing one dollar per annum or upwards, or ten dollars or upwards at one time, shall be members of this Society.

5. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretaries and a Committee consisting of not less than three other members; and that three members of the Committee constitute a quorum.

6. That every clergyman or other minister who is a member of the Society shall be entitled to attend and vote at the meeting of the Committee.

7. That the Committee shall meet once a quarter or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

8. That the Committee divide this neighborhood into districts, and appoint collectors for each district, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations and collecting the annual fees of the members.

9. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by the Society shall be remitted yearly, after deducting incidental expenses, to the Auxilliary Bible Society of Montreal, on condition of the Society granting to this the same privileges which the Parent Institution grants, in such cases, to the Auxilliary Societies.

10. That the Committee shall make it their business to enquire what families or individuals, residing within the several districts, are in want of Bibles or Testaments, and unable to procure them; and that it will be the duty of the Committee to furnish them therewith at prime cost, reduced prices, or gratis, according to their circumstances.

11. That a general meeting of the subscribers be held at in the month of _____ each year, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year reported, and a Committee elected.

12. That these resolutions be published in such a manner as the Committee may direct: and a copy of them, signed by the chairman, transmitted to the President of the Auxilliary Bible Society of Montreal.

NOTE.—Branches or Depositories selling Scriptures on credit, do so at their own risk and responsibility, as it is contrary to the rules of the Society. There is no need for it, as other provision is made for the poor.

COLPORTEURS.

1. The Classification of Colporteurs shall be as follows :—To be known respectively and indicated on the Monthly Report as :—Class I.—Class II.—and Class III. That promotion be made from one class to another only on account of fidelity, success or length of service, and by vote of the General Committee ; that the Monthly Allowances be for Class I., \$40.—Class II., \$35.—Class III., \$30, with addition of fifteen dollars per month where the Colporteur, by direction of the General Committee, uses in his work a horse and a conveyance.

2. Colporteurs are required to keep carefully within the limits of the District assigned to them as their field of operations, and not to labor beyond them without the sanction of the Committee.

3. They are expected to visit, as far as practicable, every family within the limits of their field, in order to ascertain whether or not they are supplied with copies of the Scriptures, and, when these are found to be needed, to supply them at such prices or on such terms as may from time to time be ordered by the Committee.

4. In the case of poor families or persons, Colporteurs may, in the exercise of due care, supply copies, either at reduced price, or by loan, or by gift ; but all transactions must be recorded and reported to the Committee.

5. Sales on credit are made without the sanction of the Committee and at the sole risk of the Colporteur making them.

6. The Committee require that a daily record be kept of the places visited, of the number of copies sold, and of the moneys received for the same ; and, further, that a monthly report of these and other matters properly belonging to their work be made by each Colporteur. For this purpose blank forms are supplied, which the Committee expect each Colporteur carefully to study and fill up.

7. All monthly reports shall be made up to the 25th of each month, and on that date mailed to the Corresponding Secretary for presentation to the ensuing Monthly Meeting of the General Committee.

8. All days that are not reported as spent in the service of the Society, due allowance being made for sickness or bad weather, will be deducted in the payment of the monthly stipend, unless leave of absence has been before obtained from the Committee.

9. When in the neighborhood of Branch Societies, Colporteurs are required to report themselves to the officers of the same, in order to receive from them such co-operation and advice as they may be

able to give ; and, also, to report themselves to the District Secretary whenever he may visit any part of their district, that they may have the benefit of his suggestions, and may assist him in his public meetings, etc., should he need assistance.

10. Colporteurs when on duty for the Society, are required to abstain from taking part in public political meetings or discussions, and also to avoid, as far as possible, points of controversy between different Christian denominations or Churches.

11. The general work and duties of Colporteurs are, to circulate the Word of God among all classes and creeds of the community, and, as opportunity offers, to read the Scriptures, hold religious converse and prayer with families or individuals. When the great object of the Society can be promoted by religious services and addresses to public assemblies these may be held. But in proceedings of this character the Committee desire that Colporteurs seek the countenance and co-operation of Ministers of the Gospel, without distinction of denomination.
