## THESOLARSYSTEM.

The $S u n$ is the source of light and heat to our system. Its true diameter is upwords of 887,000 miles, its bulk is $1,384,000$ greater than the Earth, and 700 times greater than that of all the planets and satellites together. It revolves on its axis in about 25 days 7 hours and 48 minutes.

Mercury is the nearest planet to the Sun, being about $36,890,000$ miles from it. It performs its revolution round the Sun in 87 days 23 hours, which is the length of its year. The diameter of Mercury is about 2,950 miles; its bulk $1-16$ th of the Earth.

Venus.-Distance from the Sun $68,000,000$ miles; the length of $\mathrm{i}^{\text {ts }}$ year is 224 days 16 hours; the rotation on its axis is 23 hours 21 minutes. Its diometer is about 7,800 miles; its bulk is about 8 -10ths that of the Earth.

The Earth is also one of the planets that revolve about the Sun. Its mean distance is about $95,000,000$ miles, and its diameter about 7,912 miles.

Mars.-Distance from the Sun $145,205,000$ miles; the length of its year is 686 days $28 \frac{1}{2}$ hours; its true diameter is about 4,500 miles, which is rather more than half the diameter of the Earth.

The Asteroids.-Very small planets between the orbits of Mars and Jupiter. Up to this time 62 have been discovered, of which Vesta, Juno, Ceres, and Pallas are the largest; but all are invisible to the naked eye. They revolve at the distance of two or three hundred millions of miles from the Sun, and in periods of from three to five years.

Jupiter.-Mean distance from the Sun 495,917,000 miles; performs its revolution in 4,334 days 15 hours; its true diameter is 88,000 miles, and its bulk is 1,281 times that of the Earth. Length of its day, 9 hours ond 56 minutes. Jupiter has four satellites or moons.

Saturn.-Distance from the Sun about $909,000,000$ miles; the length of its year is 10,755 days; its true diameter is 73,000 miles; its bulk is 995 times that of the Earth. Saturn has eight satellites and is also surrounded with a double ring.

Uranus.-Mean distance from the Sun about $1,829,000$ miles; it performs its revolution in about 84 years. The planet has six satellites.

Neptune, the most remote and latest discovered planet, is $2,864,-$ 000 of miles from the Sun. It is 35,000 miles in diameter; re-

## TRLETIME

Two kinds of time are used in Almanacs; clock or mean time in some, and apparent or sun-time in others. Clock-time is always right, while sun-time varies every day. People generally suppose it is twelve o'clock when the sun is due South, or at a properly made noon-mark. But this is a mistake. The sun is seldom on the meridian at twelve o'clock; inded, this is the case only on four days of the year: namely, April 15, June 15, September 1, and December 24. In this Almanac, as in most other Almanacs, the time used is clock time. The time when the sun is on the meridian or at the noon-mark, is also given under the head Sun slow or fast of clock. This affords a ready means of obtaining correct time and for setting a clock by using a noon-mark, adding or subtracting as the sun is slow or fast.

Old-fashioned Almanacs, which use apparent time, give the rising and setting of the sun's centre, and make no allowance for the effect of the refraction of the sun's rays by the atmosphere. The more modern and improved Almanacs, which use clock-time, give the rising and setting of the sun's upper limb, and duly allow for refraction.

## ECLIPSES.

There will be five Eclipses this year, as follows:
I. A total Eclipse of the Moon just before and after midnight of June 11. Size, 14. 4 digits. Commencing 0 32, ending 340.
II. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, June 27, in the morning. Invisible in America, but visible in the Indian ocean.
III. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, November 21. Invisible in America, but seen in the great Southern ocean.
IV. A total Eclipse of the Moon early in the morning of December 6. Visible. Size 16.98 digits. Commencing 135 , ending 417.
V. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, December 20. Invisible in America, but visible in Asia generally.

Well, here we are, brother farmers, at the beginning of another new year ! Thank God for the infinite mercies of the past, but remember we are to act in the living present-to prepare for a happy future by filling every day and every hour with active duty. No matter what that duty may be, let the motive be good and noble, and the doing of it in the proper spirit will bring along some degree of satisfaction and happiness. But idleness and mental inactivity breed only discontent and re-
morse. Be industrious, be frugal, be honest, for these habits imply a whole train of noble virtues, which do much to insure happiness, not to ourselves alone, but to all about us.

There is no better time than this to make up our plans for the year. Map out the farm and settle what is to be done with each lot, how it is to be planted and cultivated, where the manure for it is to come from, and estimate the cost of all operations connected with it. A liberal outlay for manure and labor will pay a larger outlay than the reverse. Don't forget to take good care of the stock this cold weather. Have regular hours for feeding them. Warm but well ventilated barns. and good care do much to bring the cattle out well in the spring.

Cows in milk must have good feed, and plenty of it, this cold weather. We can't be too careful, indeed, in the management of all stock at this season of the year; but milch cows are most sensitive to exposure and hard fare. If feeding for quantity, give them moistened food at least once or twice a day. Hay cut short and mixed with Indian meal or shorts, with a little hot water poured upon it, is excellent for this purpose. If put into a tight
vessel when the hot water is on, and covered up to stand a litthe while, the result is still better as it gets a partial steaming. For improvement in the quality of milk, we may feed Indian, linseed or cotton-seed meal. It pays to keep up the condition of the animal while she is giving a good supply of milk, and she will pay from day to day in proportion to the richness and quantity of food given to her.
Don't try to keep more stock than can be kept well. If allowed to run down to low condition now, it will take a long and hard struggle to get up again after going out to grass. There is no profit in such management. It is the most shiftless practice, this half starving of cattle or stock of any kind, and the farmer that tries to get on thus does not deserve to succeed.

To Extricate persons from broken ice.-Let two or more persons hold a rope or ropes, at both ends, stretched over the broken ice; so that the person immersed will catch hold of it.

To Exterminate the Turnip-fly. Dust the young plants with lime when still wet with the morning dew. Do this on successive mornings, and as soon as the plants appear.

It is about time to begin to bestir ourselves. Is that manure forked over? I take it you have a barn-cellar. Who would be without a barn-cellar in these days, unless he has covered sheds over his whole barnyard as some do? There is some objection in keeping hay and live stock over a tight barn cellar, after all; but it is infinitely better, on the whole
than throwing out the manure to lie under the drenchings of the eaves, to smutch up the sides of the barn. An abundance of absorbing material, like dry peat, muck or loam, will obviate the difficulty of the cellar in part, and proper ventilation and a tight floor will also help.

Now is the time to feed out the mangolds. I suppose you have some ruta bagas and carrots left. A daily feed of roots to cattle and sheep is very grateful at this season.

It is a good plan to start some early potatoes in boxes, or a hotbed, to be transplanted when the weather permits, in the month of April or May. Look out for the sheep and lambs. The woodpile may need attention, too; it is n't best to leave this to bother us in the midst of spring work, when it may be easily done now.

Wheels on Plows.-The best way to secure a uniform depth in plowing is to use a beam under the end of the beam. An unskilful plowman can make better work with this addition, than a good hand without it.

Well, here we are, with a prospect of spring at last. Sunshine and shower is the order of the day. Take it as it comes and make the most of it. But it's time to strip off jackets, and seize the handles of the plough. A straight furrow and a deep one, -that's the true doctrine ; but go down by degrees, an inch lower each year, and every time you plough, and not bring up too
much of that yellow stuff at once. It needs an airing before it will give you good crops; but up with it a little at a time, and mix it with the richer surface soil, and you'll find it'll begin to pay. A loamy subsoil, that has never been exposed to the action of the atmosphere, when brought to the surface, absorbs many fertilizing gases, and becomes more and more valuable. But if you have ploughed but five or six inches deep, it is a mistake to go ten or twelve all at once. Take time for it, and you can work down easy, and not sacrifice your crops while you're about it.
It don't pay to stop and lean over the wall, talking hour after hour with neighbour Doolittle. It don't pay to waste time in April. Plant pease and potatoes, sow beets and carrots, as soon as you can after the middle of the month.

To Preserve Milk.-Provide bottles, which must be perfectly clean, sweet and dry; draw the milk from the cow into the bottles, and as they are filled, immediately cork them well up, and fasten the corks with packthread or wire. Then spread a little straw at the bottom of a boiler, on which place bottles with straw between them, until the boiler contains a sufficient quantity. Fill it up with cold water ; heat the water, and as soon as it begins to boil, draw the fire, and let the whole gradually cool. When quite cold take out the bottles and pack them in sawdust, in hampers, and stow them in the coolest part of the house. Milk preserved in this manner, and allowed to remain even eighteen months in the bottles, will be as sweet as when first milked from the cow.

A Busy month, indeed! Work enough on hand. There's the ploughing and planting going on. If we don't fly round at planting, we might as well sit on the rail
at harvest. Then up early, and down late. Spring comes but once a year, and we must make the most of it. It's the mode of ploughing, planting and cultivating, that decides the abundance of the crop, quite as much as the extent of land.

The trees in the orchard need looking after. It isn't best to trim them much yet, but a thorough washing down with strong soap-suds is good any time.

Have an eye to the garden, too. A good kitchen garden is one of the handiest things on the farm. There is nothing like garden sauce to save the dollars at the store. You'll be wanting green pease by-and-by, and early potatoes, and nothing is better than rhubarb sauce and rhubarb pies, either for health or relish, at this season.
If the garden spot is very old, and very rich from over-manuring, just take off six or eight inches of the top, and spread it on your grass land, and you'll find it'll be good for both. Some gardens are overloaded with vegetable mould. Don't begrudge the girls a little lot for flowers!

After this delicious frui ${ }^{\mathrm{t}}$ is picked and eaten, or sold, give the runners a chance to spread and strike into a deep rich soil, and thin out the weak ones, so as to give the rest plenty of room. Do you know that the strawberry can be raised at a profit at less than two pence a quart? Think more of the smaller fruits. They put money in your purse if you are near a market, and give you and your family a royal luxury, at small cost, if you can't sell them.

When raspberries are done bearing, the old fruit-stalks ought to be at once cut out, and many of the weaker suckers also. A1low only six canes to a square foot to stand to perfect themselves for fruit bearing next year.

The gooseberry likes a moist atmosphere and a little shade. Dry and hot weather is apt to give it the mildew. A heavy mulching of straw or swale hay round the roots is first rate. Use much old hay or straw about all shrubs and trees. It enriches the land, and prevents the effect of drought.

To Remove Glass Stoppers when fixed in Bottles.Everybody has experienced the difficulty of removing the stopper of a bottle, when it has become fixed, apparently, immoveably. Well, now, I suppose it would be a good plan to top-dress the mowing lands after haying. It pays well, better than six per cent. stocks or notes, if it is done judiciously. Now is a good time to do it, and a good compost may
be made of muck, road scrapings loam and what manure can be scraped from the yard. Topdressing will enable you to keep down longer to grass, with large paying crops, without drawing too hard on the land. Don't fear the loss of well-composted manure on the top. It is better than burying too deep, and the waste is less. Nature always topdresses, and keeps the roots of most trees, and plants near the surface.
You may top-dress later in the fall with the coarser manures, but a good dressing of loam and compost, after haying, preserves the roots. Besides, it acts as a kind'of mulching for the ground. Shade acts somewhat like menure. A surface deeply shaded or covered, rots like a manure heap, and is fitted to sustain and feed plants. Darkness, moisture and air promote vegetable decomposition. Turn up a board that has lain a long time on the ground, and see if the soil is not mellower and richer than when it was put there. The effect of surface manuring is similar.

The low grounds are now drier than usual, and it is a good time to cut drains. Drainage is one of the most useful inventions of modern times. It makes lands earlier, warmer, healthier, and more productive. The tile drain is the cheapest, and thorough or under-draining the most effective.

Now is the time to get in the grass seed. Grasses do better, on most soils, to be sown the last
of August, or in September, than at any other time, since there is less danger, in an average of years, of being killed by the severity of winter than the droughts of summer. Don't sow any grain with your grass seed. The grasses do better alone, especially if sown now. If obliged to sow in spring, barley is the best crop to sow grass seed with, and oats about the worst.

## HOW TO MAKE MONEY.

Let the business of everybody else alone, and attend to your own ; do not buy what you do not want; use every hour to advantage, and study to make even leisure hours useful : think twice before you throw away a shilling, remember you will have another to make for it ; find recreation in looking after your business, and so your business will not be neglected in looking after recreation; buy low ; sell fair, and take care of the profits; look over your books regularly, and if you find an error, trace it out ; should a stroke of misfortune come upon you in trade, retrench, work harder, "but never fly the track :" confront difficulties with unflinching perseverance, and they will disappear at last ; though you should even fail in the struggle, you will be honoured; butshrink from the task, and you will be despised. By following these rules, however, you never need say " fail;" pay debts promptly, and so exact your dues ; keep your word.

Whatever employment you follow, with perseverance and assiduity, will be found fit for you; it will be your support in youth, and your comfort in age. In learning the useful part of any profession, very moderate abilities will suffice; great abilities are generally injurious to the possessors. Life has been compared to a race; but the altusion still improves by observing that the most swift are ever the most apt to stray from the course.

## THE OCEAN.

Sea Water contains 220 parts of common salt; 83 parts of vulphate of soda; 42 parts of muriate of magnesia; and 8 parts of muriate of lime.
The Ocean, inland seas, \&c., cover $147,8 \mathrm{CO} 0,000$ square miles; a little less than three-fourths of the world is covered with water, and rather more than one-fourth by land. An average depthiof 2 miles would give aearly $300,000,000$ square miles of water. At $5,000 \mathrm{fa}$ thoms depth in some parts, no bottom hàs been found.
