WILL TAX CAPACITY OF THE HIGH SCHOOL

Largest Attendance in its History is Expected in the Term Which Opens Aug. 27th---Must Have More Room---The Manual Training Building Will be a Benefit.

The public schools reopen after the summer vacation on Monday, August 27th. So far only about 150 permits have been issued, but it is expected that during the intervening time before the opening day, the number of new scholars seeking permits will be fully up to the usual quota.

THE EVIDENCE OF POLICE OFFICERS IN THE CLARK CASE

The case against Wm. E. Clark, charged with criminally assaulting little Ethel Train of Brussels street, on the Millidgeville road on Saturday afternoon, of August 4, was resumed in the police court before Judge Ritchie at this morning's session. Quite a number of spectators gathered to hear the evidence which was listened to with marked attention. The testimony of Sgt. Caples and Officer Greer, who arrested Clark, was taken and the case was adjourned till Friday morning.

ENFORCE SCOTT ACT TO THE VERY LETTER

Moncton City Council so Resolves --- I. C. R. Men Not Satisfied With Pass Circular--New Chief of Police Wanted ---Central Telephone Co. Gets Concession.

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Hon. Mr. Emmerson's circular re passes of the I. C. R., issued in reply to representations made by a committee of employees to him last week, does not give satisfaction. Concessions asked for by the employees have not been granted, and the minister will not be allowed to see here. Some concessions have been made from the drastic orders limiting employees to one pass yearly and cutting off employees' wives and families from half fare, but the employees think these restrictions half fare concessions are not sufficient.

PICTOU BARK GOES DOWN

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—The World says today: "With the imprint of his face in the snow, forming a perfect death mask, as the only means of identification, the skeleton of Bernard E. Kiesen, formerly of Plainfield and later of Long Beach, was found by the Canadian Mounted Police in the Klondike.

HOT FIGHT TODAY IN FREDERICTON OVER SEWERAGE

FREDERICTON, N. B., August 14.—(Special.)—The protest of the people of Sunbury against the city of Fredericton's proposed to dump sewage into the river St. John river was aired at a special meeting of the provincial board of health here this morning. Chairman Holly presided, and other members present were Dr. Sproule, Curran and Fisher, and Judge Barker.

SITUATION IN RUSSIA WITH KNIFE AND PISTOL

PETERSBURG, Aug. 13.—Indications at the meeting of the central committee of the old October party, held today, point to the amalgamation of the Octoberists with the new peaceful party of the Regenerationalists, and the acceptance of the programme drawn up by Count Heyden, M. Guchoff and others. The city council last night unanimously passed a resolution in favor of the enforcement of the Scott Act to the letter.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 14.—The freight bores of the Illinois Tunnel Company will carry merchandise to the city center for the first time tomorrow. Announcement to this effect was made by officials of the company yesterday.

KING AND KAISER MEET TOMORROW

LONDON, Aug. 14.—King Edward left London today for the continent, traveling to Port Victoria by special train, and crossing the North Sea to Flushing, where he will land this evening on the royal yacht Victoria and Albert, which will be conveyed by two British cruisers.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Blindness are busy everywhere in the west, and the harvest is now on. In Red River Valley hundreds of men are busy harvesting. The weather conditions are most favorable, being fine and cool.

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—The Town of Canadian Municipalities convention opened in the city hall here this afternoon. The council chamber, in which the convention is being held, was filled with delegates from various municipalities.

BRITISH AND U. S. GUNNERS

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—A special cable to the Sun from London says: "There is great interest in naval circles in the suggestion of Rear-Admiral Beveland of the United States navy for a gunnery competition between picked teams from British and American battleships. In the British navy there is a tendency to discredit somewhat the records of good shooting in the United States navy. It is not denied that there are many good marksmen across the Atlantic, but it is pointed out that the American service target is considerably larger than the British while the Americans do not carry their shooting on the lines of British battle practice, regardless of weather and under conditions such as would prevail in war. Running target practice in the American navy is carried out in smooth water, rendering it much easier to score a large percentage of hits.

THE CASE OF HON. MR. FIELDING

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—The election trial against Hon. W. S. Fielding opened at Lunenburg, N. S., this morning before Chief Justice Westborough and Judge Russell. The morning was taken up in argument by counsel as to jurisdiction of court to try the politician, the statutory time having elapsed. The court will take time to consider the preliminary points before going on with the trial.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—A correspondent of the Times cabling from London says: "The discussion that has arisen in New York touching the value of the Tryptin treatment for cancer prompted me to make inquiries at the London hospitals as to the results that had attended that treatment in this city. The replies to my enquiries, may be summed up in the statement that the experiments with Tryptin have not demonstrated that it is a cure for cancer or useful in the treatment for the relief of cancer patients.

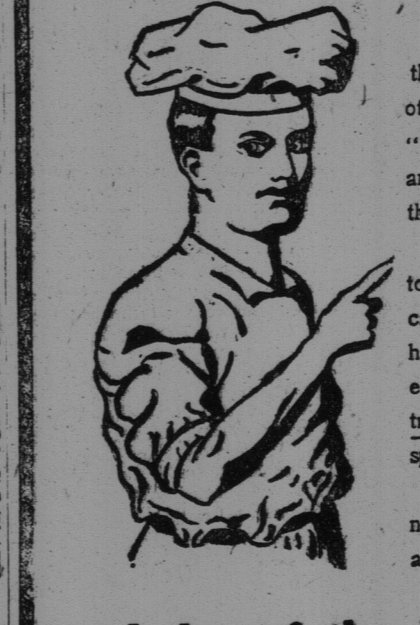

A NICE POINT Reference was made the other day to the decision of a court in New York that the law prohibiting women working in factories before six o'clock at night is unconstitutional. The court held as a fact the need of a living and declared that the contention of the state that women refraining from earning it at certain hours would improve future generations is only a theory. The court held also that the law was class legislation, inasmuch as it did not prevent society women from going to dances and theatres and otherwise keeping late hours which might harm the health of their offspring, and in addition to all this it would do an injustice to maids—old and young—who had little or no direct interest in future generations, but a very pressing need of the wherewithal to buy something to eat. We quote: "It is urged that the general welfare of the state demands that the progeny of women of the factories shall have mothers with healthy bodies, to the end that the state may have sturdy citizens. Does the state look merely to the children of the factory women for its future citizens? Why should the housewife, the woman who toils at home, in mercantile houses, in offices, or she who toils not at all—the society woman—be exempt from legislative interference, injunctive or mandatory, for the same reason? Some of them may be mothers of future citizens and it should be of great interest to the state that their progeny should have proper birth and the question of future citizenship is the only excuse for the assumption of police power, what becomes of the rights of the non-childbearing woman, a considerable class? The case on which this judgment was rendered has been appealed to the United States supreme court."

AN INTERESTING CASE A very interesting case in the law courts of Maine has just been disposed of, the decision being that under the laws of Maine it is not a crime for a man to commit or attempt to commit suicide. One James May of Westbrook was in May last brought into the Westbrook municipal court on a charge of attempting to poison his family with Paris green. He was discharged on this count, but held on the charge of attempted suicide and sentenced to eleven months' imprisonment. His counsel took the case before the superior court, on appeal, but the judgment of the lower court was upheld. He then appealed to the full bench of the law court, which has decided in his favor, and May has been released. It was argued by the prosecution, according to a report of the case, that although no specific penalty was prescribed by the Maine statutes for suicide, yet it was a common law offence, and punishable under statute that prescribes that for any crime not specifically provided for the penalty shall not be less than three months nor more than one year. To this May's counsel replied: "That the Maine laws provided that in the case of an attempted crime half the punishment should be meted out that would have been given had the crime been committed; and therefore, since, if the crime in this case was committed the man would be dead and therefore beyond the jurisdiction of any earthly tribunal, it would be impossible to mete out half the punishment; or in other words half of nothing is nothing."

BETTER PROTESTANT SCHOOLS A series of meetings is to be held in the Eastern Townships of Quebec this week in the interests of better Protestant schools. Hon. Mr. Fisher has strongly supported the movement, and the provincial treasurer has also issued a strong letter, in the course of which he says:—"I was astonished and grieved to learn of the number of school districts in which the school doors were closed during the whole or the larger portion of the year, and of the number of inexperienced, un-certificated and undiplomatized teachers who had charge of the education of our youth. It is our common boast on all public occasions that we are a nation. Let us strive to have it also said of us that we are an educated nation. We are not all agreed upon the causes which have contributed to the present condition of Protestant elementary education in our province, and possibly we are not all agreed as to the means we should employ for its improvement. That something must be done, and done as soon as possible, is an engaging thought of many of our citizens. Hence these public meetings and conferences. We have been so busy improving our individual material positions

in the professions, on the farms, in business terms, and carried so many distinguished names, that it may be taken for granted the interest of the people in the movement has been thoroughly aroused. An excellent list of speakers has been provided for each of the meetings to be held, the press will doubtless do what can be done to see that what the several speakers say shall reach a wider audience than that which may be immediately present, and the local committees are understood to be showing an active and intelligent interest in the work. It remains, therefore, only for the people who are immediately and most directly concerned to show by their presence that all this trouble to which others have gone is worth while. As to that, moreover, there is every ground for expectation that the response of the people to the call of their natural leaders will be all that could be wished."

In explaining the method adopted for the conduct of the meeting, Hon. Mr. McCorkill spoke:—"The meetings are in most cases to take the form of basket picnics, because we want the mothers and the daughters as well as the fathers and the boys present. We all agree with the clergymen who said that 'education commenced at the mother's knee.' None are more interested in the education of our youth than the mothers. We want them present in force with their children. We want the school commissioners, trustees and managers. We want everyone who loves his country, who believes that the education of the rising generation will contribute towards making us a better nation, and who feels a patriotic impulse within him which summons him to help on this good cause."

The Spanish government is following the lead of France to some extent in its relation to the church. A Madrid despatch says: "The government continues to maintain a firm attitude on the church and state question. A minister today declared that, while the government was desirous of avoiding a breach with the Vatican, it had determined to demand the supremacy of the state. At the first sitting of parliament the government will introduce a bill making the religious orders amenable to the law controlling industrial corporations, and will also introduce a bill providing that members of orders recently expelled from France will be required to become naturalized or leave Spain. The minister added that the cabinet was determined to carry these measures and did not fear papal excommunication."

Regarding the carpenters' strike in Toronto, the Globe of that city says: "It will be a great misfortune if the unfortunate strike of the carpenters in Toronto is allowed to spoil the excellent prospects of the present season. The growth of Toronto has made a demand for all kinds of buildings, and enterprise has adequately responded. The outlook could scarcely be more promising, and the prospective activity has been anticipated by the business community. There is a healthy demand for men in all branches of the building trades. It would be a public calamity if a difference that should be capable of satisfactory settlement is allowed to bring stagnation and distress when healthy prosperity is easily within reach."

SALISBURY NOTES SALISBURY, Aug. 13.—In the absence of the rector the pulpit of the Episcopal church was filled yesterday by the Rev. Mr. Hall, of Dorchester, who preached a sermon that was highly appreciated, from the text found in Matt. xii, 31, 32. Thomas Taylor, of North River, who has been seriously ill, is considered out of danger. Miss Carrie Wilnot, of Fall River, is visiting her mother, Mrs. M. R. Wilnot. Miss Jessie Howie, missionary to Japan, who has been spending a year's furlough in Salisbury with her parents, left last week to take up her work in Japan. Rev. Dr. Archibald, of Acadia College, Wolfville, occupied the pulpit of the Baptist church last Sunday evening.

CHILD EMIGRANTS FOR NEW BRUNSWICK (Canada, London, Aug. 4) The Duke of Argyll recently presided at a drawing-room meeting to help forward the project of Mrs. Close (at whose residence, 101, Eaton Square, the meeting was held) for the benefit of pauper children and the easing of the burden of the poor rates. In addition to the speakers, who present included Sir Charles Tupper, Admiral the Hon. Sir E. R. Fenwick, Sir H. Beaumont, Frances Loveston, Lady and Miss Sankey, Lady Powell, "Brigadier" Howell (Salvation Army) Sir Henry and Lady Cunningham, Lady Jane Taylor, and Sir John and Lady Dorington. At the opening of the meeting Dr. Shawley explained that Mrs. Close's scheme was applicable to children who had no natural protectors. It combined two of the best systems—single cottages, homes and emigration. Her plan was to take children of any age to Canada and to bring them up there upon farms. The scheme was recently approved by the committee of local ladies and gentlemen, who estimated that in the course of a year or two the farm would be practically self-supporting. The profits from the sales of produce would be devoted to the cost of maintenance, which for the first year was estimated at £22 per head, and for which Mr. Ruffer had made himself responsible. The children would, wherever possible, remain in Canada after they attained the age of sixteen. After a speech from the Hon. C. Duff-Miller, the Agent-General for New Brunswick, who stated that the project had the full approval of his government, an executive committee was appointed, with the Duke of Argyll as president. The Duke, replying to a vote of thanks, expressed warm sympathy with the scheme, which, if adopted on a large scale, would, besides conferring a benefit on the Colonies, relieve the rates in England very considerably. Too much praise could not be bestowed upon Mrs. Close for her efforts, which were resulting so successfully. She recalled Lord Strathcona in the way in which she was prepared to cross the Atlantic at any moment in order to further any good scheme for the Colonies or the Mother-country.

Mrs. D. G. Mayes

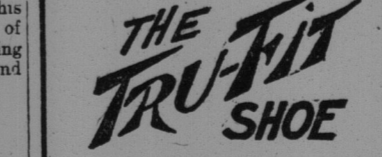

HON. MR. EMERSON LAYS CORNER STONE OF NEW I. C. R. SHOPS

P. for Hamilton, Solicitor-General Jones, Woodstock, county members in the legislature, members of city council, school trustees and citizens. After the stone was laid by the minister of railways, Hon. Mr. Robinson, Mayor Steeves read a large address to the minister of railways which referred to the construction of the large new works, assuring the minister of the appreciation of the citizens of the province in connection with the stone, which consisted of a large block of granite with polished surface, bore the inscription: "1906, Hon. H. R. Emmerson, M. P., Minister of Railways, Deputy Mayor, J. Butler, C. E., deputy minister and chief engineer. This stone laid Aug. 13." After the stone was placed by the workmen Mr. Emerson, stepping forward, formally declared it well and truly laid, saying: "May it be symbolic of the sure foundation upon which this dominion is being today built and created.
